To undergo an extensive damage repair job, C.G.M.M. freighter Canadian Importer will arrive here early tomorrow morning to go on dry dock. This is the targe joh that was referred to by B.C. Kerley, Pacific Coast manager C.G.M.M. on a recent visit here. The work will take a month or more and will keep in employment the large crew of men which has been here for the last couple of months on the

Canadian Coaster job. This will be the first visit to this port of the Canadlan Importer. she has been in the C.G.M.M. intercoastal service and arrived on the coast recently from Montreal. The vessel was built in Vancouver in 1919. One of the larger type of the company vessels, her gross tonnage is 5465 and length 400 feet with beam of 52.4 and depth 28.8. She has had a varied and at times a hectic career having once been in a smash-up on

this coast. The present work is made necessary through the Importer having gone ashore in the St. Lawrence River near Montreal months ago.



It is generally agreed that although signs of any concerted action towards the American republic joining with the other nations are none too numerous at present, the basic sympathies of the American people are behind the League and that one day, soon or late, the United States will come in.

What of Russia? At this question, many will simply arch their eyebrows to indicate that such a step is quite beyond the pale of practical international politics. Russia is an outlaw among respectable nations, and until she showns signs of contrition she cannot very well be asked to discuss membership in the League of Nations.







## SYNOPSIS OF

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occapation and improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge ty addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gov-

land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be ob tained from the Land Commissioner Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland for agricultural purposes; minimur price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grasing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and

Lease of Crown Lands." Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being btainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or

GRAZING Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free ermits are available for settlers compere and travellers up to ten
