NEW CAVE MAN IS DISCOVERED

Skull of Race Having Snout-Like Noses Found at Gibraltar.

London, Sept. 20-Portions of human skull, including the frontal bone, belonging to the mysterious Neanderthal race that vanished from the earth about 25,000 years ago has been discovered at Devil's Tower, Gibraltar, by Daisy E. Garrod, of Oxford University. The bones were buried at a depth of ten feet and with them were the rude stone implements used by these cave men of prehistoric Europe.

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five

For more detailed information see PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further in formation regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment
