Another Million and Half Men Expected to Join the Million and Quarter Strikers

LONDON, May 3 .- Unless the unforeseen happens it is expected that another million and a half men will cease work at midnight and join the million and a quarter miners who are idle.

Premier Baldwin told Parliament this afternoon that a continuance of the coal subsidy to the coal industry was out of the question.

The strike situation cast a pall of gloom over the financial district, although, according to ressponsible railway anthorities, it is not likely that the whole train service will cease, if the threatened general strike becomes effec-

On the other hand it is stated both by members of the National Railwaymen's Union and the Society of Locomotive Engineers that they will obey the strike call to a man but have offered to run food trains.

LONDON, May 3 .- Premier Baldwin told Parliament loday that labor leaders by ordering a general strike were threatening the base of orderly government and were nearer proclaiming civil war than Britain had been before for centuries.

"The only light heard in the country today are those who either envy or hate us because they see the whole of democratic freedom entering a course which, if successful, can only substitute tyranny." the Premier declared. "It is not wages that are in peril but freedom of our very constitution."






