

**Native Sons Request is Reasonable One.**  
The request of the Native Sons of Canada in convention assembled in Vancouver that appeals to the Privy Council be discontinued and that all matters of law shall be dealt with by a Canadian court of appeal, is a reasonable one. It has been asked by many public bodies in the past and many newspapers and public organizations have discussed it pro and con.

Because of the agitation against Privy Council appeals it was decided a few years ago that only very important cases with constitutional significance should be referred overseas. The result has been that the Privy Council judicial committee has had little to do recently.

There is a general feeling in this country that Canadian courts are wholly competent to deal with Canadian affairs and that the reference of cases to the Privy Council in England tends only to create irritation and is a danger to Imperial relations.

**Purely Matter For Liberal Party.**

The announcement that an honorarium is to be raised for Hon. Ernest Lapointe by members of the Liberal party is a matter for Liberals only or for admirers of the French Canadian statesman. It is not in any sense a political matter. If the Liberals wish to give their money for that purpose they have a perfect right to do so, but it must not be thought that any person who does so is showing any slight to the man who led the party for a long time and who is acknowledged to be one of the brilliant speakers of Canada. Many will think that Mr. Lapointe was well enough paid when he received his salary as minister of the crown.

**Is There Really A Governing Class.**

Is there really a governing class? is being often asked today. At one time it was thought that a few people had the divine right to say what the rest of the people of the world should do and how they should conduct their public affairs. That day has passed. It passed in Canada when William Lyon Mackenzie, grandfather of the illustrious head of the Liberal party in Canada today, fought the family compact to a finish and won.

Since that time Canadians have been trained in the art of Government. True, they have not always been successful and neither have British statesmen under the old system always been successful. Modern amateur statesmen are proving that they can get just as good results as could the men who considered they were too good to live with the common people and who set themselves up as being the lords of creation.

Canada has no governing class and does not want one. Every man is eligible for the highest positions and if he has the ability, has a perfect right to a seat at the councils of the country if his fellow citizens will it.

**THE PHANTOM OF THE OPERA**

Lon Chaney is Mysterious Figure Who Inhabits Cellars of Building

Opera goers and music lovers generally will find "The Phantom of the Opera," coming at the week end, of unusual interest, inasmuch as the story is laid in and around the famous Paris Opera House, and includes among its many big scenes a production of Gounod's "Faust" in exactly the style this opera was presented in 1880.

"The Phantom of the Opera," is produced from the famous novel by Gaston Leroux, and deals with a mysterious figure who inhabits the deep cellars below the opera house, and from there, posing as a ghost, controls its destinies. The heroine of the story is a young opera singer, and with her the Phantom falls in love.

The production of "Faust," which is one of the scenes in the production, was preceded by four months of research in the archives and libraries of Paris, Berlin, Vienna and Bayreuth. Five architects, four costume designers and their staffs visited the opera houses of all these musical centres, securing data, making sketches of settings and costumes, in order that all the opera scenes might be absolutely accurate.

For the making of the picture a replica of the Paris Opera House was built at the Universal studios. The exterior of the opera, approximately two city blocks in width, the grand staircase with its six levels, rising to a height of a hundred feet, the foyer, which is the promenade of the fashionables between the acts, the salon de danse, the stage, the great auditorium, with its five tiers of boxes and balconies—all of these are reproduced exactly in the settings, in full size.

The Paris Opera House is the largest and one of the most beautiful of the world's theatres. It was started in the time of Louis Napoleon, and in the revolution which overthrew him it was used as military headquarters. The cellars were turned into prisons. With the establishment of the present government the opera house was again devoted to grand opera, and has been world famous ever since for its spectacular productions.
