Their Story Can't Wait Forever.

BESIDES being a sad loss to Prince Rupert, the passing of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas McMeekin removes another chance to capture from those living the absorbing and stirring early history of the city.

The tragedy of such a prospect can be read between the lines of the Daily News report announcing Mr. McMeekin's death: "Thomas McMeekin, former alderman, pioneer resident and founder of the wholesale produce company here bearing his name, died in hospital last night..."

Gone now, except through second-person version, are Mr. McMeekin's own recollections of the problems and activities of that almost forgotten city council. Gone, too, are his comments on the life and thoughts of those enterprising families who migrated from many points to create this city out of wilderness.

Although official records and newspaper files can, to a degree, contribute to this uncompiled history, there is still lacking that intimate recollection which breathes life into the chapters. There are those in the city now whose memories could furnish this needed quality, but their story will not wait forever on the passage of time.

The unwritten book is growing thinner. It should be started now.

The Odds Come Down

AN EXCITING and desperately close finish appears to be in the making for the U.S. presidential campaign which now finds its contestants, weary but game, galloping into the home stretch.

From what at first looked like a walk-away for the Republicans' renowned Ike Eisenhower, the race has turned into a nip-and-tuck battle in which the little dark horse from Illinois, Adlai Stevenson, has shown stamina and an excellent turn of speed.

For Eisenhower the experience of a political campaign must have been a disillusioning one, and for many of his followers it certainly has. Either through poor advice or inescapable necessity, he has found himself joining hands with vicious critics of his former senior officer, General Marshall.

In spite of all this he remains to a large extent in public opinion the great soldier who moved armies with determination and statesmen with diplomacy. Moreover, it cannot be denied that he still possesses these qualities. But in politics their application is less sure and, by some strange chemistry in this medium, his opponent seems to emerge as the man with the greater determination and diplomacy of the two.

Stevenson has added another feature to the campaign, of which the value to him is an undetermined factor. It is a darting wit, too sharp and quick to roll his listeners in the aisles but devastating in print.

Although their policies will guide a huge portion of the votes, the decision in the final analysis will rest on the character and personality of the candidates themselves. Judging it on this basis alone, the outcome should be close.

But, to quote the old song, there is something about a soldier...

Choice—Fight or Quit

MY SYMPATHIES are all with the Hon. Jimmy Sinclair, Arthur Laing, MP, and the other young Liberals who believe that their party should fight every election on every front.

My sympathies are also with that hard-bitten old Tory, Herbert Anscomb, who believes that the old guard, undisguised should concede nothing to the new most-extreme right wing party, which calls itself Social Credit.

I think it would be a disaster for Canada if we got the same kind of muddled-up result in the federal election next year as we got in B.C. last June. Yet we could take a big step toward that if the Liberals step into the booby trap which the Social Crediters have set before them in B.C.

IF THE Liberals abdicate in the two by-elections in B.C. they will be setting the stage for their own elimination in the provincial election which Premier Bennett says is coming soon. For all of the arguments which are now being used to get the Liberals to stay out of the by-elections will apply with a thousand times more force when the real election comes around.

It is not true that by staying out of the by-elections in B.C. the Conservatives and Liberals thereby avoid "splitting the vote." Under the numbered vote system now in effect in B.C. it is impossible to "split the vote." It is impossible to "lose your vote" in the sense that votes were said to be lost in the old days when people voted for candidates who did not win.

Under the present voting system in B.C. all Liberals give their first choice to the Liberal party and their subsequent choices to other parties, in order of preference. Hence, if the Liberals or Conservatives abdicate and default on running candidates, they deprive their own followers of first choice votes for the candidates they really want. Even if the Liberal or Conservative candidates do not emerge either first or second in either of the two by-elections they simply cannot "split the vote" by being in the field.

THE RECORD of the new Social Credit government deserves to be put to the test. Do the people approve its handling of the Hospital Insurance—especially the announcement that many who owe up to \$100 on back premiums are to be forgiven what they owe, but some others are to be made pay arrears—and all that without refunds of premiums to the vast majority of law-abiding people who have paid up to \$100.

Do the people approve the Social Credit government's refusal to pass the necessary order-in-council to allow the recount of votes in Vancouver-Burrard? Above all, do the people approve the selection of cabinet ministers from outside the ranks of the elected or defeated candidates who ran on the Social Credit ticket in the last election?

If the Social Credit candidates who did run were not fit to sit in the cabinet why was that fact not admitted?

LIBERALS who mistakenly believe they can only, temporarily, abdicate in the provincial field to Social Credit should study what happened to their party when they did that in Alberta some 17 years ago. Likewise Conservatives might study what happened to them in Saskatchewan.

Alert Defender Is Able to Stop Marked Finesse

On rare occasions, an alert defender has the opportunity to prevent declarer from taking a marked finesse. In today's deal, Mr. Champion opened the jack of hearts against Mr. Abel's three no trump contract.

Mr. Abel elected to win with the queen on the board. With the spade suit practically wide open and only six top winners, things didn't look too good. He led a club and finessed the 10. When this held, the prospect was a little brighter. However, if Mrs. Keen had the king of clubs and at least three others, it would be necessary to finesse clubs twice more. And that meant finding two more entries to dummy.

Mr. Abel figured that if Mr. Champion's heart holding included the 10 (as seemed likely from the opening lead), then he could lead his low heart and finesse dummy's nine. Later the lead of the king of hearts to dummy's ace would furnish another entry.

He led the low heart. But Mr. Champion had other ideas. He promptly played the 10. It took dummy's ace to win this—and now the hope for two heart entries was gone. Mr. Champion took full credit for a fine defensive play and, of course, he was justified.

Mr. Abel could have made his bid by playing differently at trick one regardless of the subsequent defense. The right play was a little hard to see and somewhat beyond Mr. Abel's capabilities, although Mr. Heinsite, naturally, described it as "automatic." It was to win the first trick with dummy's ace of hearts and to drop the king from the closed hand.

Now both of Mr. Abel's remaining hearts would be lower

ORIGIN OF MUSICAL SCALE

Early Chinese Invent First System of Tones

By ROSALEE THAIN

The first country to organize music into any kind of a system was China. It succeeded in doing so as early as 2486 B.C. and history tells us a very interesting story about the origin of the Chinese musical system.

Emperor Hoang-ti ordered a man named Ling-lun to go to the north of the Kwenlun mountains and to stay there un-

til he had evolved some system of music.

Ling-lun went and spent several days there without food. The valley in which he found himself was surrounded by pretty bamboos. He cut some of these and blew into them for a whole day, but without results. He got fones, but no system and tired out he fell asleep.

Next morning, he awakened and saw two lovely birds sitting

on the bamboos; two Phoenix, a male and a female. The male sang six tones and the female replied, singing six different tones. Ling-lun cut twelve bamboos and tried to imitate the sounds of the birds.

He was successful and found that the male sang what we now call C, D, E, F sharp, G sharp, and A sharp; the female sang C sharp, D sharp, E, G, A, B. When these two series are put

together, there are the twelve semi-tones of the chromatic scale—the system of organized musical tones which has been in use ever since.
