# WHEAT POOL OFFICIALS EXPECTED SOON

## ARRANGEMENTS HAVE BEEN MADE FOR STEAMSHIP LINES TO HANDLE GRAIN

### Forest Fires Raging Northern Minnesota and Canadian Side

WINNIPEG, May 18.—Hundreds of northern Minnesota settlers today joined the fire rangers in an endeavor to cope with an outbreak of forest fires caused by continued hot dry weather. At least 75 fires are reported in the northern half of state, sixteen of which are out of control.

Fourteen settlers in the Cramer district were burned out night when the wind reached a velocity of 40 miles an hour.

Along the north shore of Lake Superior bad bush fires are reported but as yet no serious damage has resulted although the Fort William water supply was threatened early today. In the district of Du Bonnett, Manitoba, 47 fires were reported last night and airplanes were used to transport fire fighters. The situation is improved today.

### LEADERS WILL NOT VOTE ON BUDGET TODAY

When Indisposed and is Paired  
With Premier Mackenzie  
King

OTTAWA, May 18.—Neither Mackenzie King nor Arthur Meighen will participate in the vote on the budget which is expected to be reached tonight. This unique situation is the result of agreements made this afternoon whereby the two leaders are paired owing to indisposition of Mr. Meighen. The Premier expected to open budget speech this afternoon will be followed by Hon. R. Bennett for the Conservatives. Liberals are predicting a majority of ten or eleven for the government.

### KELSEY WILL BE OPERATED

Bruce Johnstone Again Taking  
Charge of Hotsprings Hotel  
for Season

Bruce Johnstone, who for several years conducted the hotel at Lakeview Hotsprings, is taking possession and will charge this year. Since he died, several others have been operating the hotel without great success. Now he has returned to the lake and is making preparations for the opening of season.

### MINERS TAKE SOVIET CASH

Secretary Cook Accepts Donation from Russian Miners With Deepest Thanks

MOSCOW, May 18.—Soviet news agency announced today that Secretary Cook of the miners' federation has accepted "with deepest thanks" money given by the Soviet miners to aid the strikers and asks that the funds be transferred immediately to England as the miners need it very greatly.

Previous reports said a million dollars was offered during the general strike but was refused.

### INNOCULATION OF CHILDREN AGAINST DYPHTHERIA GERMS

EDMONTON, May 18.—A preventive campaign against diphtheria is being waged here. More than two thousand young children have been inoculated with a view to making them immune. A test made two years ago when 150 children were inoculated shows that not one has had diphtheria since.

### Canadian Constitution Improvement on Old Country Declares Governor General in Address

VICTORIA, May 18.—"Although I am not a Canadian by birth or heritage I am an 18 carat Canadian by affection," Lord Byng told the Canadian Club of this city at a luncheon given in his honor at the Empress Hotel yesterday.

"When I go home I am going to talk to some of the cynics there and am going to say I have seen a country about whose future I am full of optimism," continued the Governor. "You have a constitution derived from what is best in the constitution of the Old Country and from what is best in the constitution of your next door neighbor. You have a blend of the monarchical with the presidential government. What can be wrong with that? You have none of the prejudices, of feudalism, which the old land has to live down."

At the meeting of the hospital board last night it was decided to advance the salary of Miss Murphy and Miss Lee from \$80 to \$85 a month. Miss Murphy is instructor of the pupil nurses in addition to nurse and Miss Lee is head operating nurse in succession to Miss Solloway and also has charge of the case room.

### Amundsen Spending Few Weeks at Nome in "Explorers' Club" Cabin and is Fussy Over News

NOME, May 18.—Amundsen and three companions, who arrived Sunday from Teller after a flight over the pole, settled down today to a routine life in a cabin here and exchanged reminiscences of their experiences in flying over the top of the world, with indications that it would be June 15 before the boat arrives to take them southward. The explorers have christened the cabin "Explorers' Club."

Yesterday Amundsen showed signs of great perturbation when he learned that an account of the flight had been wired to Premier Mussolini at Rome by Captain Nobile and to deny. The publisher refused to publish the story as there might be of time to deny it after reading something there. "I would want the story."

### Arrangements Are Made with Steamship Lines to Call at Prince Rupert

CALGARY, May 18.—The Wheat Pool has made arrangements for some of the largest steamship lines to send their vessels to Prince Rupert to load cargoes on the opening of next grain season. It is planned by the Wheat Pool to ship most of its Oriental bound grain to the new Pacific port, but it also will ship to United Kingdom and European continental ports by that route as steamships will in most cases give the same rates from Prince Rupert as from other Pacific ports. The rail rate is the same and the steamship rate.

The Oriental business is increasing every year and it is planned to use Prince Rupert particularly for that business as time is saved and it is possible when the grain gets going that way that better steamship rates may be obtained from Prince Rupert than from Vancouver.

The capacity of the elevator is such that four big steamers may load there each day, according to the official report of the present management. By working all night this may be increased one third.

One feature of shipping through Prince Rupert, which makes officials favor that route is the fact that the port charges will be very low, and there will be no railway switching charges or other worries.

### TAGGED SALMON CAUGHT SOUTH

Had Been Liberated in Atlantic and Was Taken in Gulf of Georgia

VANCOUVER, May 18.—Sergeant John McLean of the city police on Sunday caught a ten pound salmon in the Gulf of Georgia with a mark which had been placed on the young fish by the federal department of fisheries. It was liberated in the Atlantic Ocean for the purpose of discovering the migratory travels of the salmon.

### AIRMEN KILLED WHEN NOSE DIVING

SAN DIEGO, May 18.—When an aeroplane went into a nose dive and fell 200 feet about ten miles south of here yesterday Pilot Davis and Mechanician Fraser attached to the U.S. Marine Corps aviation service, were killed yesterday.

### COOLING PLANT OF BERRY GROWERS IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

VANCOUVER, May 18.—Fire last night destroyed the cooling plant of the B.C. Berry Growers' Association at Port Hawke and also three houses. It is estimated that the damage amounts to \$30,000.

### Keeping Prince Rupert To Fore.

Prince Rupert is being kept to the fore in various ways. A few days ago Fred Stork discussed this city and district for half an hour or more in the House of Commons and gave the members there something to think about. He was a government supporter and his address was strong for the government side, but he did not forget to mention this city and that with emphasis.

Prince Rupert is also being kept strongly to the fore through the Wheat Pool which recently leased the elevator and which will ship grain this way in large quantities during the coming season. That is great publicity and something that will make our position permanent.

### Recovery Always Slow From Strike.

Recovery from a strike or any blow which stops the wheels of trade is always slow. It is comparatively easy to stop things but more difficult to get them going again. Once the cog slips it is liable to do permanent damage. That is the trouble. While British people were quarrelling among themselves, other countries were using the occasion to get business away from them. So it always is. There is always permanent loss from industrial disputes, loss that can never again be made up.

### Need Of Home Supervision.

Nothing in the world can take the place of the home. Boys and girls may benefit from state supervision, from school supervision, but when it comes down to fundamentals, it is the home training that really counts. Discussing this the Edmonton Journal says:

"Some statistics have been prepared on the strength of Canadian juvenile court records, which show that very few cases arise from homes where there is strict parental supervision and regular attendance at school is insisted upon. The conclusion is drawn that, if the wave of juvenile crime is to be checked, it can only be done by the strengthening of the right kind of family influences. As one editor, in commenting on the report, puts it, we shall have to pay a heavy price if we insist on taking down the old motto, that used to be worked in colored yarn, 'God Bless Our Home,' and on replacing it with the modernism 'Let's Go.'"





The Storage won the toss and took advantage of the grade but the earlier exchanges were in favor of the Terminals and it was not long ere Wiper, profiting by some loose defensive work, beat Murray. After a spell of midfield play in which team work was lacking on both sides, the Storage broke away and Erskine made the scores level with a shot that gave Howe no chance.

Farquhar was mainly responsible in regaining the lead for the Terminals when he got across one of his few real centres, and Owen, meeting the ball with his head, made no mistake in registering point number two. Shortly afterwards the Storage were awarded a penalty but Macdonald made little use of the spot kick, the ball hitting the upright and ultimately going past. Lambe also failed to accept a good scoring chance shortly afterwards and the teams retired at half time with the score standing two to one in favor of the Terminal.

### Second Half

Even play featured the opening of the second half with the Terminals always a little more dangerous. Owen was sadly at fault twice in the early stages of this half when he was presented with good scoring chances, missing the ball completely on one occasion. The Storage were awarded another penalty and this time Lambe was entrusted with the kick, but fared no better than his team mate, shooting the ball straight to Howe who had to make little effort to clear.

At the other end the Terminals forced a corner and Walters' kick from the flag was helped into the net by Murray to make the game almost safe. 
