SNOW COVERS ATLANTIC SEABOARD TODAY SIXTY MILE GALE BLOWING AT VICTORIA YESTERDAY HOLDING BACK SHIPS

Ten Thousand Men Engaged in Clearing Snow in New York

Sixty mile gale damages shipping off Atlantic coast and Furness liner is in trouble with Hanover standing by

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—Eight men are believed to have been drowned when three barges foundered off the New Jersey coast last night in a snowstorm and 69 mile gale that overlooked a multitude of small craft bound for New York.

This morning the entire north and central Atlantic seaboard is blanketed with heavy snow and ten thousand men are employed clearing New York streets.

The Furness liner Manchester Producer, bound from Halifax to Liverpool with general cargo and cattle, is reported in bad shape. Her rudder is gone and the German steamer Hanover is standing by.

Sir Henry Thornton Sees Great Prospects in Development of a Nation Based on Local Industry

Urges Need of Immigration to Utilize Natural Resources of Country Which are now Undeveloped

TORONTO, Feb. 4.—Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, in an address delivered before the Young Men's Canadian Club here, dealt in a business way with the problem of Canada and intimated that the solution lies in immigration so that the unsettled arable lands of the nation can be broken to the plow and turned into productive farms.

"While we have shown a measureable progress in that the lines have been rehabilitated and our net operating earnings have increased from less than \$3,000,000 in 1922 to approximately \$32,000,000 in 1925, they do not meet the annual capital requirements," he said. "But we must remember that a large part of the lines were built in advance of settlement and for the purpose of opening up the country. Therefore, if the result of our net earnings do not meet the fixed charges we must remember the character of the mileage. One of our objects and, I might say, our duty is to try and secure settlers to open up the territory, for there is no other way that the indebtedness incurred can be wiped out. The mileage on which the money was spent is there and no scheme of amalgamation or sale can wipe it out and repudiation of the debt we cannot contemplate as Canadians."

EGG SITUATION IS IMPROVING

Increased Buying Diminishes Stocks on Hand Says Minister of Agriculture

VICTORIA, Feb. 4.—Increased public buying on the strength of the low egg prices is having a real effect on the egg situation, said Hon. E. G. Barrow, minister of agriculture, who returned here today after attending the conference of the British Columbia Poultrymen's Association at New Westminster. "The campaign which producers have been conducting to increase egg consumption is eating into the huge surplus which has been depressing the market."

BAIL GRANTED STEWART WOMAN

Gladys Gale Charged With Murder Released on \$10,000 Bonds at Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Feb. 4.—Gladys Gale, awaiting trial at Okalla on a charge of murdering James Donald at Stewart on January 1, was yesterday released on \$10,000 bail.

No application for bail has yet been made by Ruby Dolan, who was jointly charged with the murder along with Gladys Gale.

ELEVATOR DONE ON FEBRUARY 15

C.P.R. STOCK MAKES JUMP

Rose Yesterday From 156 to 160 Due to New York Buying London Hears

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—C.P.R. stocks made a sudden jump yesterday from 156 to 160, a rather phenomenal move for so stable a stock. Various causes are said to have contributed to make the big Canadian railway securities attractive.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The sharp rise in price of Canadian Pacific Railway stock here to approximately 160 is understood to be largely due to New York buying, according to the Times of this city. The advance is regarded as having relation to the recognition of the company's large holdings in Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company, which stocks recently made a sensational climb.

FILM ACTOR IS LOST IN STORM

Famous Lamonia Ballroom in Santa Monica Battered by Waves Yesterday

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 24.—Reginald Benny, film actor, and three companions are feared to be lost with a small yawl on which they were sailing yesterday in the worst storm that has lashed the California coast in years.

Last night the famous Lamonia ballroom at Santa Monica was badly battered by the waves and it is expected the loss will reach \$300,000.

CHILDREN LOSE LIVES ON MONTREAL ISLAND FIRE EARLY TODAY

MONTREAL, Feb. 4.—Three children of Alphonse Verden, ranging from five years old to eighteen months, were burned to death when the home was destroyed on Montreal island early this morning.

Victoria Had Biggest Storm on Record Yesterday When Sixty Mile Gale Raged, Steading to 48

VICTORIA, Feb. 4.—The great storm, which has been sweeping the North Pacific for the past two days, was felt in full force here yesterday when the wind increased to 69 miles an hour. Outbound shipping was delayed by the storm, several vessels waiting over until today before putting out to sea.

After blowing for an hour at the sixty mile rate, the gale sank back to about a 48 mile rate, at which it was raging last night.

The storm, according to the local meteorological office, was the strongest ever recorded here.

LOG CARRYING BARGE WAS IN DISTRESS: IS LATER REPORTED O.K.

Hubert Ward, local representative of the Vancouver Dredging & Salvage Co., was notified this morning to get a tugboat and derrick scow ready to proceed to the assistance of the lumber carrying barge Black Wolf, which was in distress north of Milbank Sound. A later message was received cancelling the arrangements and stating that the barge was all right again and was proceeding. It is believed that the Black Wolf's cargo shifted in the strong southeast wind prevailing. She was being towed by the Pacific Monarch.

PRINCESS CHARLOTTE FOR ALASKA SERVICE

Observation Room Being Especially Fitted to Give View of Scenery to Passengers

VICTORIA, Feb. 4.—The steamer Princess Charlotte will again be operated on the Prince Rupert Alaska service this year and is already outfitting here with that end in view. Alterations are being made to the observation room with view to giving passengers a better view of the magnificent scenery on the northern run.

Three vessels will be used on the Alaska run this year.

TACOMA PLANT BURNS

TACOMA, Feb. 4.—The plant of the Dolge Lumber Co. was destroyed last night by a fire the loss amounting to \$130,000.

GALLERY OF ELEVATOR IS BLOWN AWAY

Columbia Elevator at Vancouver Crumpled by Logging Means of Loading

VANCOUVER, Feb. 4.—During a heavy blow here last night the conveyor gallery of the Columbia elevator collapsed, the entire structure, 200 feet long, disappearing into the water. No one was injured.

The loss from the falling of the gallery amounts to \$4,000. A temporary structure is being erected today in order to facilitate grain loading.

KAMLOOPS-KELOWNA RAILWAY TO OPEN ON FEBRUARY 15

WINNIPEG, Feb. 4.—Effective February 15 passenger service will be inaugurated on the new Kamloops-Kelowna line of the Canadian National Railways in British Columbia according to an announcement made here today by the transportation and passenger departments of the system. "A diesel oil electric motor car will leave Kamloops daily except Sunday on arrival of train number two, the Continental Limited, from Vancouver, will return on the same day in time to connect with the west-bound Continental Limited at Kamloops for Vancouver.

Cesspool Of Corruption Is Strong Language.

H. H. Stevens behind the privilege of parliament makes a slashing charge at the customs service of this country. He ought to be compelled to back up his statements. If they are true, then a thorough investigation should be made and the culprits punished. It is difficult for us to believe, however, that there is anything like wholesale corruption in such an honorable service. Doubtless there are customs officers, just as there are men in any walk of life, who do wrong things and who make profits for themselves at the expense of the public or of their neighbors. These are but few and our opinion is that the same obtains in the customs service.

It is to be hoped that Mr. Stevens will be specific in his charges and that the government will act quickly and thoroughly on those charges. They should be either proven or withdrawn.

King George Reads Speech From Throne.

Despatches from England yesterday make it seem as if King George was asking the different factions in parliament to try to agree among themselves so that the country might not suffer. This is not exactly correct. The speech is written by the cabinet and placed in the King's hands and it is the Conservative government of Great Britain that asks parliament to agree with them. In other words the government is asking the opposition not to oppose some measure, probably a protective measure, that they are about to introduce. The King is the mouthpiece for them.

Why Allow Criminals Free On Technicality.

Because of a technicality criminals, who have been regularly tried and convicted have been allowed to go free. Not only has the country been put to great expense for nothing but the people have been taught disrespect for the efficacy of the law. This is not by any means the first time that a judge has given that kind of judgment. Doubtless he thinks he is doing right but he is none the less a danger to the community. One particular judge is always singled out by lawyers who take up those cases because he seems to be the one who will lend them a sympathetic ear. He may be technically right from a legal point of view, but the people of the country do not see it that way. They think more and more that the law is an ass, when interpreted in such a manner.


There seems to be a difference between law and justice. Lay people are taught that the courts are courts of justice, but lawyers call them "law courts" which is quite a different thing and just what they often are. Chief Justice Hunter was sitting in a "law court" when he let those men go free and not in a court of justice.

Utilities Audit May Be Good Thing.

As long as it is not too costly an audit of the utilities department for the purpose of finding out if our utilities have been really paying should be enlightening. It is to be hoped if such an audit is conducted that the auditor will use plain English in his report and make it quite clear to the lay mind what he means. So many reports of auditors mean nothing to the average person because the average person is not trained in the ways of an auditor.

Take as an instance the average financial statement produced at a public meeting. Very few people realize what it means. They cannot even read it intelligibly. In this case the information is needed so that the people of Prince Rupert may know how they stand exactly in regard to the public utilities and it is to be hoped the audit will make that clear without any "ifs" or "buts."

BETTER TIMES THIS COUNTRY

Royal Bank Monthly Letter Tells of General Improvement in Financial Conditions

LUMBER ONLY EXCEPTION
Fewer Commercial Failures and Merchants Depend Less on Borrowed Capital

The conclusion that the year 1925 marked a decided improvement in the economic condition of Canada can now be supported by a variety of statistical evidence, the figures of foreign trade, bank debits, railway loading and earnings all show an increase over those of the previous year, says the Royal Bank monthly letter.

The chief source of improvement is to be found in the increased productivity in the primary industries of agriculture, mining and fishing. The total yield of wheat, provisionally estimated at 422,327,000 bushels, is the second largest crop in history and compares with 262,000,000 bushels last year. There were substantial increases also in the coarser grains. The preliminary official estimate places the total value of the field crops of 1925 at \$1,112,694,000 as compared with the final estimates for 1924 and 1923 of \$955,235,900 and \$899,226,200 respectively. The increase is largely accounted for by the value of the wheat crop \$466,755,000 which is the largest on record. The crop was exceptionally well distributed and with more balanced relations between agriculture and the other industries, the farming community is in a better position to support general trade activity than it has been in several years.

Foreign Demand

A change for the better has come over the live stock industry. Cattle receipts at the leading markets were heavier and stockyard returns show a substantial increase. There was a keener foreign demand for Canadian cattle and the export of animals and animal products both in volume and value exceeded those of the previous year.

Dairying continues to make gratifying progress, especially in the middle west. The production of creamery butter and cheese was larger and is estimated in the aggregate to have returned the largest revenue in the history of the industry. Exports of butter from Canada for the twelve months ended 31st October 1925 were 30,813,735 lbs. against 21,415,324 lbs. in 1924 and 12,214,981 in 1923. The fishing industry in the Maritimes had an exceptionally good season. A larger number of vessels were engaged and the total landed value of the catch was substantially in excess of the previous year. The total salmon pack of British Columbia was approximately 1,625,000 cases of all grades, a little less than in 1924 when a record was established. The sockeye pack was slightly larger than last year and export demand was stronger.

Mining Advance

A great advance has been made in the mining industry both in the development of established fields and the discovery of new mineral areas. Gold production for 1925 reached a record value of \$35,768,000. Lead and zinc show large increases and the market for these two metals has been strong. A marked improvement is also noted in the production totals of nickel, copper and cobalt. Asbestos production increased but coal, owing to protracted labor troubles, showed a loss in tonnage from the previous year. The total value of Canada's mineral output in 1925 has been officially estimated at \$228,440,000 an increase of \$18,857,000 over the figures of 1924.

Pulp and Paper

The pulp and paper industry had a fairly satisfactory year despite a tendency to lower prices. Newsprint production was well maintained, and for the first time on record the output of Canadian mills exceeded that of the United States. The total

output for the first eleven months was 1,313,121 tons, an increase of 112,469 tons over the corresponding months of last year. The expansion of the pulp and paper industry in Canada has been remarkably rapid. From 1919 to 1924 the capital investment increased from \$275,767,000 to \$459,457,000, while in the same period the total value of the output advanced from \$140,186,457 to \$223,749,645.

The improvement in the business and industrial situation became more pronounced in the fall and was fortified by the general increase in agricultural purchasing power, which gave a stimulus to all activity. The number of freight cars loaded, which is the best general index to the volume of commodities moving in trade, began to improve in the second half of the year and the loadings for 1925 exceeded those of the previous year both for merchandise and in the aggregate.

Mills Are Busy

The farm machinery industry has emerged from the depression of recent years and both domestic sales and exports have been in substantially larger volume. The cotton mills have been operating at a higher rate in recent months and the industry is in a much more favorable position with cheaper raw material. The situation in the woollen goods industry, however, continues unsatisfactory owing to foreign competition aggravated by depreciated exchanges. Other lines of textiles, including knitted goods and clothing have experienced a revival and reports as to the prospects for trade are almost everywhere better.

Buying generally, however, continues on a conservative basis, although here and there are indications of future commitments being made on a more extensive scale. Commercial failures for the year both in number and extent of liabilities, show a considerable falling off. There has been a movement toward consolidation in the wholesale trade and generally speaking the business of the country is in stronger hands; inventories are low and merchants are depending less than formerly upon borrowed capital.

Construction work has played an important part in the increased business activity. Building operations have been going forward on an enlarged scale and the total value of contracts awarded for the year is estimated at \$297,973,000, an increase of 7.8 per cent over the final figure of 1924.

Canadian Automobiles

The automobile industry continues to expand. The production figures of cars and trucks in Canada for the ten months ended October 1925 exceeded by 8357 the total production of 132,580 for the entire year of 1924. The industry has been benefited by the restoration of the McKenna duties in Great Britain and export business has increased over the previous year, as well as domestic sales.

During the year considerable progress has been made in the removal of obstacles which since the war have blocked the way to the development of international commerce and the general trend of world trade has been towards recovery.

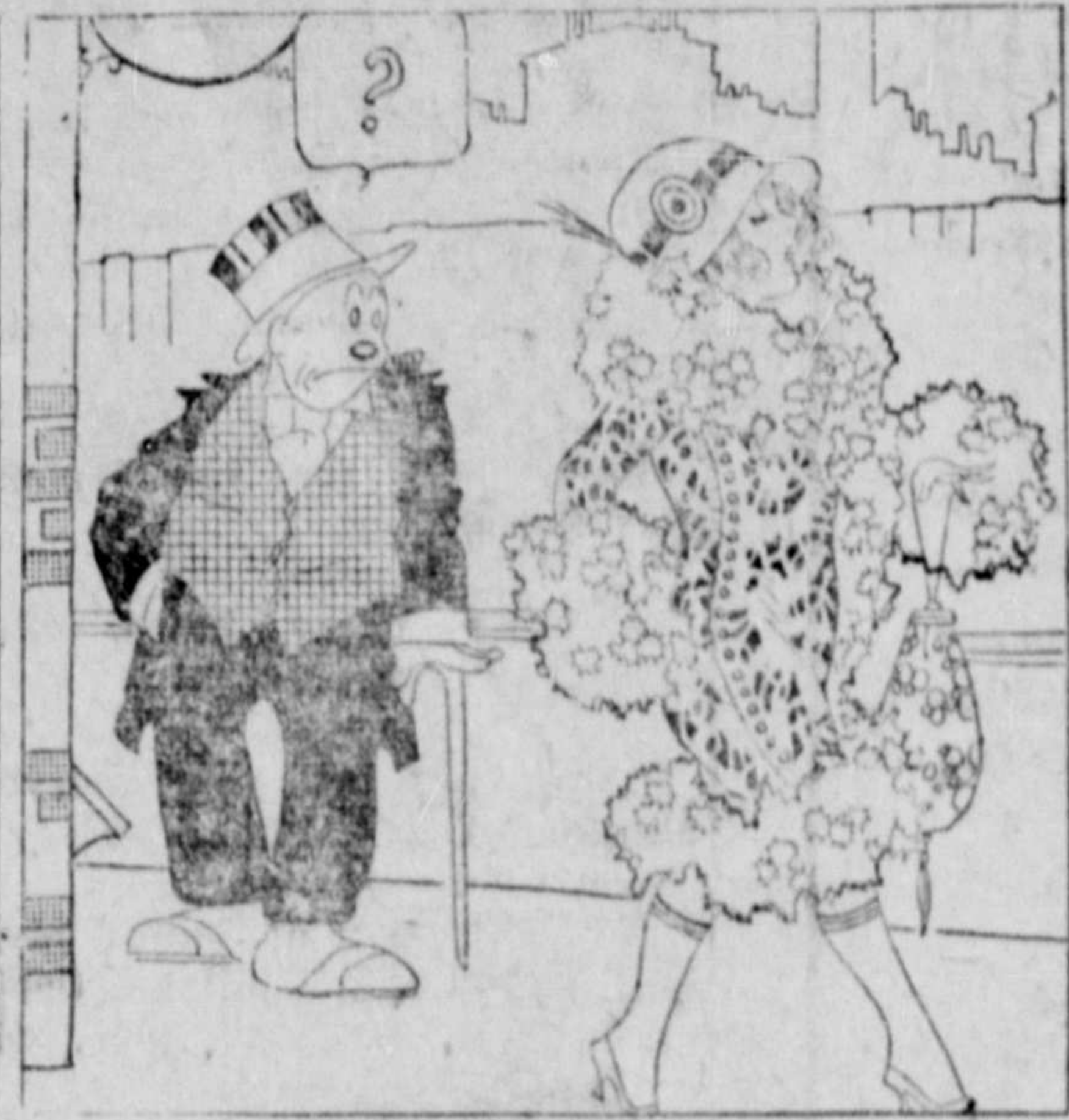

LEGISLATION IN ONTARIO

Provincial Parliament at Toronto Will Deal With Number of Important Matters This Month

TORONTO, Feb. 4.—With the approach of the opening of the Ontario Legislature on February 10, indications are that the session will be as long as that of last year, when the provincial parliament took ten weeks to get through its business. The government has given no indications of major legislation, but the two opposition parties are preparing for more vigorous fighting than in the previous two sessions of the present parliament. It is admitted that this may project important measures into the proceedings of the House. The Progressives under the leadership of W. E. Rancey, former Attorney General, have already held a caucus at which they discussed their tentative program. The Liberals will hold a caucus immediately before the opening of the session when they will decide upon their course. W. E. N. Sinclair, Liberal leader, has been busy in the recess speaking in various parts of the province. He has severely criticised the government on its temperance policy particularly with regard to 44 beer and he has also charged it with extravagance.

Educational Bill
Premier Ferguson has several matters he will bring before the House as Minister of Education. One of these is township school boards. Last year the bill to create township school boards in the place of the present "school sections" went to second reading and was then withdrawn. The Premier will this year give the members an opportunity to express their views and also the views of their constituents. Scores of meetings have been held in the townships to discuss the matter and many of them have passed resolutions either

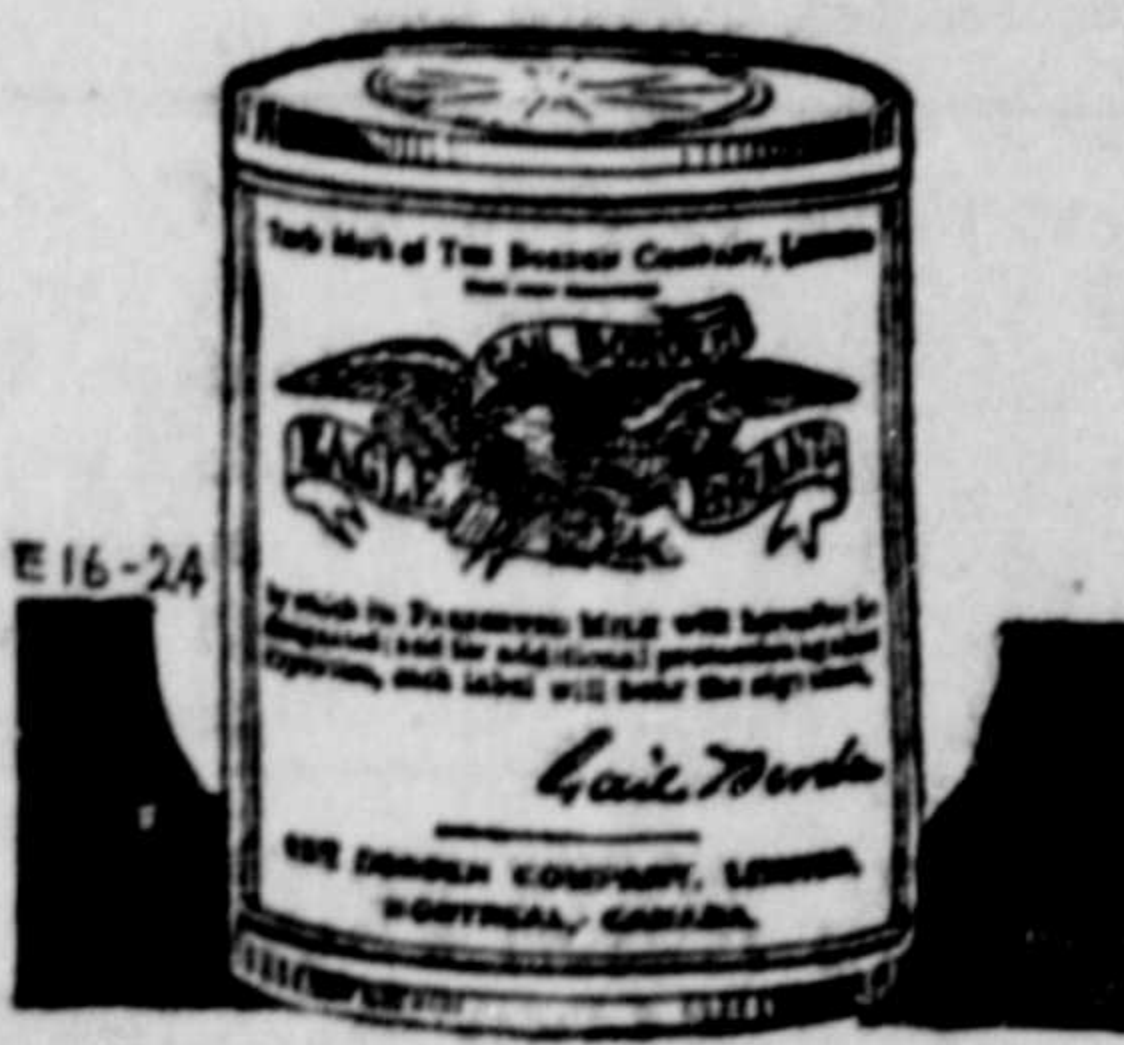

for or against the proposed system. These will be presented to the House so that the members can get the feeling of the people.

The Premier will also bring up the matter of the teaching of the first two years of university work in collegiate and high schools. This also came up last session. The object of the proposal is to give relief to the universities in certain courses and provide cheaper and higher education for those unable to get to university centres.

Marriage Laws

A bill introduced by E. R. Wigle, Conservative member for Centre Huron passed last year making it compulsory to get a marriage license three days before the day of marriage will be repealed, it is stated. The provision has caused considerable inconvenience to scores of parties throughout the province. On one occasion, because of the failure of the groom to get his license three days ahead, a big church wedding had to be postponed. The young couple cancelled an ocean trip to Europe in consequence. The bill providing for the granting of the license three days before the marriage was a private one. The original bill would have put further regulations on marriages. The most enthusiastic of its supporters wanted all marriages advertised before being allowed. The House compromised on the three day section and the others were deleted.

It is generally believed, although here has been no official announcement that Hon. W. H. Price, Provincial Treasurer, will bring in measures to increase the revenue of the province. Whether these will be new taxes or changes in the present levies had not yet been divulged.

Vacancies in House

In the debate on the reply to the speech from the throne both opposition groups will criticise the government for not holding by-elections to fill the seven vacancies which have occurred since the last session. The Liberals will contend, as Mr. Sinclair, has been contending on the platform, that a portion of the people have been disenfranchised because they have no representative in this session of parliament. The vacancies are: London, East Simcoe, Cochrane, North Norfolk, East Kent, Kenora, Centre Grey. Two were held by Conservatives, one by a Liberal, three by Progressives and one by Labor. In the protest the Liberals will be supported by the Progressives.

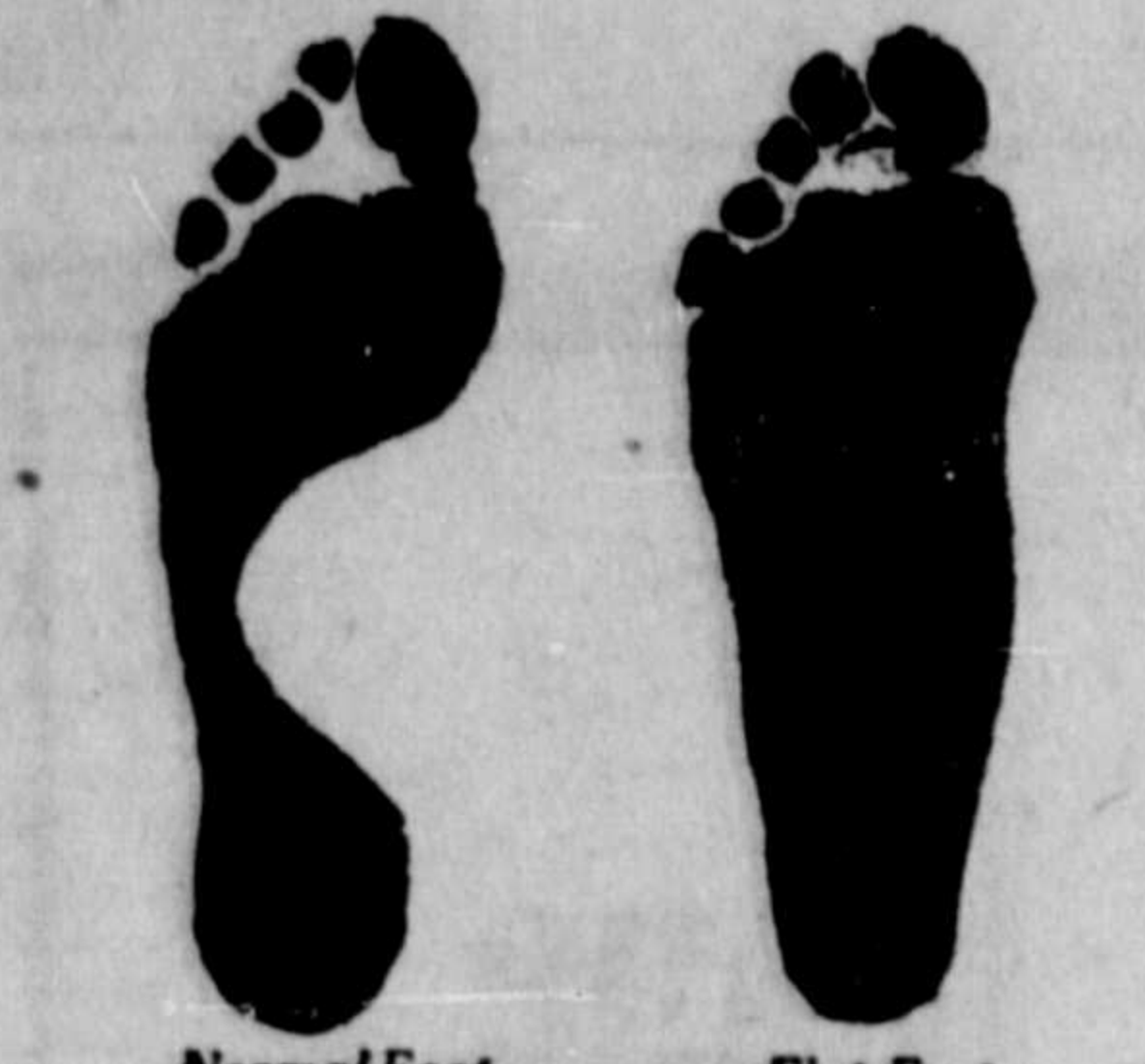

INDIAN IS NOT PICTURESQUE

Old Life is Passing and Natives of Prairie Adapting to New Conditions

REGINA, Feb. 4.—The gradual passing of the North American Indian as an historic figure in the life of the Canadian Northwest, is foreseen by W. M. Graham, Indian Commissioner for the three prairie provinces.

The steady assimilation of the growing generations of Indians and the tremendous transformation of habits and mode of living of the race generally, are stressed as indications that the days of primitive existence in the backwoods, tepees, log cabins are gone forever.

The development of the Indian to his present status, according to Mr. Graham, has been somewhat like that of a small boy learning to swim—extremely slow at first and then rapidly. For centuries, the Indian was essentially a hunter. He was and to a large extent still is today, a meat eater. Only in the last few years has he developed a taste for vegetables.

Changed Home Life

With this general progression, Mr. Graham declares, the Indian has changed his home life. Less than a decade ago he did not look favorably upon farming as an avocation. Today there are many Indian farms, which rank among the best in the West. The Indian successes at the various

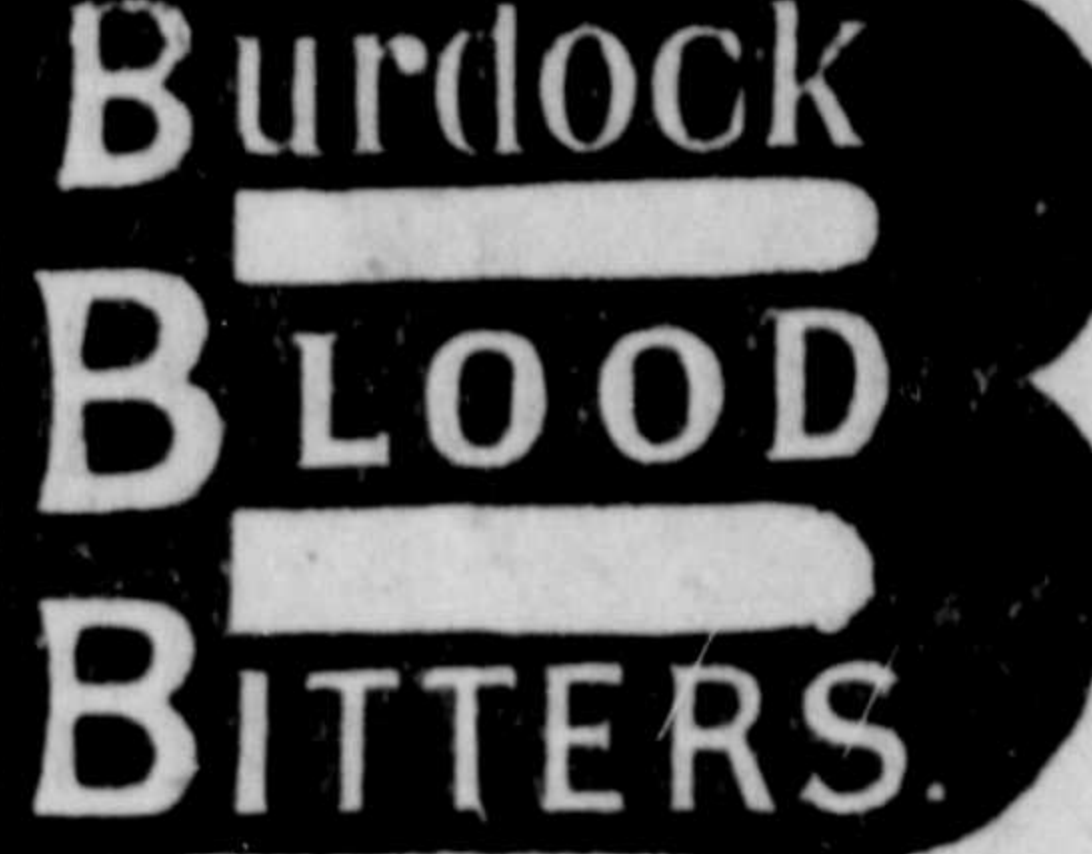

KEEPING NOISE FROM THE RADIO RECEIVER

New Non-Inductive High Resistance Filament is Effective Mounted in Glass

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 3.—Another step forward in eliminating unwanted noise in radio receiving sets is reported by research workers in the University of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Harold Pender, dean of the Moore School of Electrical Engineering, said that in collaboration with Dr. J. H. Muller, assistant professor of chemistry, he had perfected a new non-inductive, high-resistance filament to take the place of impregnated paper used widely in a grid leak.

These filaments are mounted in glass tubes. A coating of metal a thousandth of an inch thick upon a glass core gives a grid leak of uniform resistance which does not vary with weather conditions, whereas the impregnated grid leak varies as much as 100 per cent, throwing the receiving set out of perfect adjustment.

A well adjusted grid leak prevents the tubes from "spilling over" draining off the static charge gradually and without noise.
