TER RIGHTS ARE CANCELLED

Dell River Power to be Open to Anyone Wishing to Utilize It

TORIA, March 25.—Hon. T. Pattullo, minister of lands, announced today that the water of Campbell River on Vancouver Island would be available to any company prepared to lease them to secure electric power, a decision having been made to place a reserve upon water after April 1.

Pattullo explained that the government considers it inequitable to allow water rights controlled by a legal syndicate since they are to be held by one concern such a long time without giving it.

ACHINE GUNS IN POSSESSION

Had Ammunition Destined For Shipment to China

ANCOUVER, Mar. 25.—Three machine guns and ammunition, allegedly destined for shipment to China, were estimated to have a value of \$1,000 having been paid in his suit, Edward Neal, indicted guilty in the police court yesterday to a charge of having smuggled goods in his possession and was sentenced to a year's imprisonment.

TRAIN OF FORD CARS ARRIVES VANCOUVER

Makes Journey Across Continent by C.N.R. in Five and Half Days

VANCOUVER, March 25.—Fully half a mile in length, a special Canadian National train of 61 cars, carrying the largest shipment of motor cars ever borne by one train through Canada, recently arrived here from Ford, Ontario, after making the journey in five days, 10 hours and 15 minutes actual running time. This constituted a record run, the previous record having been made by a similar but somewhat smaller train which, two years ago, made the journey in a little over seven days.

PRINCE RUPERT IS MENTIONED

Question of Oriental Shipments Through This Port is Again Discussed

MATTER OF SPEED

Encouragement Needed to Make Success of Enterprise it is Stated

VANCOUVER, March 25.—The amalgamation of the big Japanese steamship lines under the control of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, which is now in process and will be completed in a few months, brings up again the suggestion that the big Japanese line would, with a little government and railway encouragement, put on some of their fast liners to operate a service between Yokohama and New York via Prince Rupert and the Canadian National Railways.

It is pointed out here that by that route at least a day could be gained in the delivery of silk at the eastern market and possibly a day and a half if the railway line out of Prince Rupert were put in good shape. Bonded goods could be sent through from the East and this would help provide return freights on the grain trains that will be shipping through the northern port soon.

The Tenyo Maru is the first ship transferred to the big company under the new arrangement and each ship as it arrives in Yokohama is transferred to the new management.

The Diet is now considering granting a subsidy to the big company, which will include the building of four big motorships of 17,000 tons each making a speed of 19 knots. These ships operating through Prince Rupert could beat anything put on by any other company by any other route.

BOAT LOST ON AMAZON RIVER

Steamer Destroyed and Many People Lost Their Lives

VANCOUVER, March 25.—Latest details state that the loss of life as a result of the steamer Paes de Carvalho being destroyed 4,200 miles up the Amazon River in tropical and crocodile infested waters is from 38 to 83 persons, mostly passengers.

HAUL OF NARCOTICS FROM BIG STEAMER

Customs Officers Seized \$10,000 Worth on Empress of Asia Last Night

VANCOUVER, March 25.—Ten thousand dollars worth of narcotics were seized late Wednesday night by customs officers searching the liner Empress of Asia, from the Orient.

COUNCIL OF WOMEN MEETS IN VANCOUVER

OTTAWA, March 25.—The thirty-third annual meeting of the Canadian National Council of Women will be held in Vancouver commencing June 9, the national executive decided.

Soviet Government Doubles Output of Vodka but Still Is Unable to Meet Demand

MOSCOW, March 25.—During the past six months, the government has doubled the output of vodka but is unable to meet the demand. For the coming year 500,000,000 quarts will be produced yielding enough money to make up one-tenth of the nation's entire budget requirements.

The vodka now manufactured has a strength of 40 per cent alcohol and sells at 90c per quart. Many distilleries which were destroyed during the war and otherwise put out of business when the ban was placed on vodka are now being rehabilitated.

MINISTERS TO VISIT THE MINING DISTRICTS OF VANCOUVER ISLAND

Sloan and Sutherland to Investigate Unemployment at Coal Mines View to Mitigation

VICTORIA, March 25.—Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, and Hon. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works, will go to Nanaimo this week to investigate employment conditions at the mines where 300 men are out of employment.

The unemployment condition obtains at all the mines on Vancouver Island, the demand for coal having dropped off to such an extent that production has been materially decreased. The ministers will consider whether the provincial government might take any steps to mitigate the situation.

PRINCESS ROYAL IS COMING THIS WEEK

Steamer is Relieving the Princess Beatrice on C.P.R. Coast Service

VICTORIA, March 25.—After being laid up all winter at the Evans Coleman & Evans docks in the Inner Harbor the C.P.R. steamship Princess Royal cleared Tuesday for Vancouver to relieve the Princess Beatrice on her northern trip while the latter gets her overhaul.

The Beatrice will be hauled out and painted and her engines overhauled before she goes on to run to Prince Rupert and way ports.

The purpose of the issue is to provide the money with which to make additions to the present plant and to finance the acquisition of additional property."

MILLION DOLLAR PLANT SINGED

Olympic Refinery Had Close Call When Adjoining Warehouse Destroyed

SEATTLE, March 25.—Fire destroyed the big abandoned warehouse last night and threatened the million dollar plant of the Olympic Refining Company where more than 250,000 barrels of crude oil and gasoline is stored.

The entire fire brigade fought the flames to prevent them reaching the plant.

IS ARRESTED AT VANCOUVER

Use Of Closure In Parliament.

That there is too much talking and that speeches are much too long in parliament is evident to anyone who has studied the situation ever so carelessly. There should be a limit to the time one person may occupy in discussion of any subject. A person can say a lot in half an hour and probably a quarter of an hour would be sufficient for most members. Condensation in speech is an art that many politicians could practice without danger to anyone and with much profit to themselves and the country.

While it is desirable that free expression of opinion should be carefully preserved, there is a limit to the time that should be taken in doing it.

Income Tax Is Being Discussed.

The income tax is being discussed in Canada both at Ottawa and at the provincial capitals, there being considerable agitation going on against its imposition. Yet there is a large body of public opinion in favor of it as the most just method of raising taxes. As long as it is enforced against everyone without fear or favor, there is no objection to it. The man who has an income pays and the person who has no income does not have to pay.

The difference between the income tax and the personal property tax is so marked as to be worthy of comment and even of protest. The property tax is levied against a plant whether profit is made from its operation or not. It is also a charge on all the stock a merchant carries, thus tending to make him economize in laying up a choice of goods for the customer.

If a manufacturing plant loses twenty thousand dollars and then the government comes along and takes another thousand for property tax, the manufacturer feels sore, and with justification. If on the other hand he makes a profit of twenty thousand and he does not mind so much having to pay a thousand or even more. The personal property tax is one that should be abolished but the income tax if well enforced against everyone should be continued as part of the settled policy of the country.

Equalizing Business Throughout The Year.


The difficulty in Prince Rupert in the past has been that business has been good in the summer and autumn and very quiet in the winter and spring. The closed season for halibut, the lack of other varieties of fishing and the closing down of other work has usually caused a nasty gap during which businessmen find it difficult to carry on and when they lose the surplus they make in the prosperous parts of the year.

If the elevator is operated next fall, as is confidently expected it will, the gap should be bridged and there should be no dull season. Just when the fishing drops off the grain business should commence and the result should be very beneficial for the business interests of the city. It will be a welcome change.

Is There Really A Sea Serpent?

A great many people are sceptical as to the reality of there being such a thing as a sea serpent. Captain G. J. House, who recently was here and who told of seeing one at Wright Sound, is a man of standing and he is repeating in Vancouver what he said here. Undoubtedly the great creature was real to him. The only possible alternative is that it might have been an optical illusion. Such things have been known.

When visitors to India are shown a man who throws a rope in the air and climbs it and they see him come down one limb at a time and eventually the limbs come together and he is as if nothing happened, it is undoubtedly an optical illusion caused doubtless by hypnotism. Apparently there was no hypnotic influence in the neighborhood of Captain House, so the probability is that he really saw a sea serpent.

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FISH TRAPS AT WALES ISLAND

Cause of Canners Taken up by
Vancouver Newspaper which
Explains Situation

REPUDIATION CHARGED

Petition Sent in to Ottawa It Is
Claimed Misrepresented
Case as it Stood

The Vancouver Morning Star has taken up the cause of the canners in the fish trap controversy in regard to Wales Island sites. In a recent number just to hand it publishes the following editorial article under the heading "Good Fish and Poor Politics":

The Fisheries Department of Canada, through varying administrations for over fifty years, has wisely adhered to a policy of not allowing our sources of fish supply in waters under our control to be exhausted by ruthless exploitation. Because of this policy the lobster fisheries of the Maritime provinces are in better condition than ever, while the Americans have long since practically depleted their lobster grounds along the adjacent New England coast, which must now be restocked artificially.

On U.S. Border

But where the coasts of Canada and the United States are facing each other across narrow reaches of sea, as along the southern and northern parts of British Columbia, and the Americans do not refrain from destructive methods of fishing, then our policy ought to be wisely varied; we should then give the same license to Canadian fishermen as the American government gives to American fishermen. But those in control of our Fisheries Department do not follow such a policy. It is a case just brought to light, and which occurred within the past two years, serious damage has been done one of our leading fishing companies. There has been direct repudiation by the Department of Marine and Fisheries of a written assurance; with resulting loss of over \$60,000 to those who placed reliance thereon.

Salmon are caught by gill nets, by seines, by trolling and by traps. But traps are only allowed in areas facing the international boundary. In the Wales Island Fishing District of British Columbia, close to Alaska at Portland Inlet, there are over a dozen salmon traps being operated on the American side of the narrow dividing strip of sea. Traps were operated likewise on the Canadian side from 1913 to 1919 by M. DesBrisay and Company, previous owners of the Wales Island Cannery, and by the A.B.C. Packing Company. The largest proportion of salmon caught in these traps were pinks and chums. But in 1920 there was no profitable market for these cheaper varieties of salmon, and so the Canadian traps were no longer operated there. By 1924, however, the market for pinks and chums had revived.

Canadian Fishing Co.
Then the Canadian Fishing Company Ltd. negotiated for the purchase of the disused DesBrisay plant; having first consulted W. A. Found, chief inspector for the fisheries department at Ottawa. From Mr. Found assurance was given that there would be no question but that trap licenses for that area would be issued on demand, such as were formerly issued to DesBrisay and Company and the A.B.C. Company. On this assurance the plant was purchased. It was necessary to build a new trap. In November 1924, application for a trap license was formally made to the Department of Marine and Fisheries, and written assurance was received that the license would be issued to operate a trap at the point selected at Winter Harbor, Pearse Canal, Wales Island District. But in December, 1924, the Company was officially informed that no license would be actually issued until proof of intention to operate was given by building the trap. On this the Company proceeded to build the trap and appurtenances at a cost of between \$60,000 and \$70,000. All was complete and ready for operation by June, 1925. Then notification was given by the Company to the Department that all their require-

ments had been complied and request was made for issuance of the license. A telegram was received from the Department refusing to issue the license, saying the policy had been changed.

Signed by 300

The explanation given is that the men engaged in salmon trolling opposed any salmon trap being operated on Wales Island opposite to where the Americans are operating salmon traps without hindrance; catching the fish which otherwise would be at least partly caught by Canadian traps. A petition, signed by over three hundred of those engaged in salmon trolling on the northern coasts of British Columbia, was sent from Prince Rupert to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in August, 1925, asking him to forbid the further use of salmon traps. This petition was based upon a deliberate misrepresentation. It said that the American traps were no longer operating, and that for the same reason the Canadian traps should not be allowed to operate. The American traps were only closed for the annual ten days; and when the ten days elapsed they resume operations, as it must have been known they would by the originators of the petition, and as must have been known by the officials of the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa.

It would seem that under political pressure the Government of Canada has repudiated its own written word, resulting in a direct loss of over \$60,000 to a British Columbia company. One of two things; either full compensation should be made to the defrauded company or the license promised should be issued.



DEBATE SCHOOL SYSTEM SOUTH

Victoria School Trustees to Have Proposed Change Under Consideration

VICTORIA, Mar. 25.—Whether or not the junior high school or middle school system of education, recommended for adoption in British Columbia by the recent Educational Survey Commission, will be introduced into Victoria, will be decided by the City School Trustees. Chairman George Jay has called a special session of the School Board for this evening, when consideration will be given to the proposed Oaklands School annex. The possibility of the suggested annex being obviated through the adoption of the junior high school system here has been raised, and undoubtedly this phase of the situation will receive the Board's attention.

Members of the School Board and Municipal Inspector George Deane, believe that the recommendations contained in the report of the Survey Commission should be carefully dealt with by the trustees, with a view to seeing whether or not some of the proposals should be adopted here.

Studying Proposed System

Inspector Deane has been giving careful study to the junior high school system, and will present a report of his investigations to the trustees.

Weir's Proposal

That many of the faults of the present system could be avoided by the introduction of the six-three-three system, that is, six years in the junior schools, three in a middle or intermediate division and three in a finishing school, was the view expressed by Dr. G. M. Weir, Professor of Education at the University of British Columbia, and a member of the Educational Survey, in a recent address on the Mainland.

"This is the system in use in England. This system must be controlled by a vocational guidance bureau which will know in a general way what subject each boy and girl is adapted for, and what is more important, what subjects they are not adapted for," Dr. Weir stated.

Motor Bus Competition in Scottish City Responsible For Present Condition

PROTECTION ADVOCATED

\$100,000 a Year is Now Being Sunk on Operation of Municipal Service

Motor-bus competition is causing a loss of revenue to the Glasgow Corporation Tramways which the general manager, James Dalrymple, in a memorandum to the Town Council recently estimates at £100,000 per annum.

In the course of his memorandum Mr. Dalrymple states that if stage carriage licences, as asked by the bus proprietors, were granted this loss of revenue could easily be doubled or trebled. Under these conditions the tramway undertaking could not exist.

He knew of no place in the whole kingdom where there was such wild, unrestricted competition as there was in and around Glasgow. The motor-bus could not cope with the traffic conditions in Glasgow. The tramcar was the only vehicle capable of doing this.

Asks Protection

The tramcar, if it was to carry on, must have adequate protection. This protection could not be given if buses operating as stage carriages were to be allowed to compete with tramways within the five mile limit.

Many people said the tramcar was too slow. The Ministry of Transport granted the tramcar maximum speeds up to 20 miles per hour. With this maximum speed Glasgow attained an average speed of about nine and ten miles per hour. This was almost the highest in the kingdom. The legal maximum speed for the motor-bus was twelve miles per hour. Their schedule time was 17 miles per hour or over, which meant, of course,

VINEGAR USEFUL IN MAKING SYNTHETIC ALCOHOL IS LATEST

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 25.—Vinegar, an article hitherto used exclusively by housekeepers is now being used in large quantities by bootleggers in the manufacture of synthetic alcohol, according to John Whitehead, an agent of the Internal Revenue Bureau. Mr. Whitehead says the "new" alcohol is made of vinegar, combined with two chemicals. These chemicals he adds, are obtainable at any drug store and with them and the vinegar, alcohol may be made as cheap as 50 cents a gallon. No still is required for the process and, the agent says, there is no way to prevent the manufacture unless the bootlegger is caught with the alcohol in his possession.

ULTRA X-RAYS PROBABLY ARE FROM OUTSIDE

Coincide with Formation of New Worlds and May be Evidence of Birth of Matter

Some interesting experiments have recently been made by a German professor, Dr. Kohlhorster with "Ultra X-Rays." These are the same as have been described by the American Physicist, Dr. Millikan.

The rays are "harder," that is to say of higher frequency, or, in other words, of shorter wave-length—and therefore of greater penetrating power than any rays previously known. They were recorded by Dr. Millikan's instruments 45 feet below the surface of Lake Muir. The atmosphere above the lake, which lies 11,800 feet above sea-level, was equivalent in absorbing power to 23 feet of water, so that the rays could penetrate a total of 68 feet of water, or the equivalent of six feet of lead. The "hardest" rays previously known—the so-called "Gamma rays," which are part of the x-rays emitted by the

heaviest known substance—are absorbed before they can pass through half an inch of lead.

Origin of Rays

The "Ultra X-Rays" have a wave-length which is about one-fifth that of the "Gamma rays" and about one-tenth-millionth that of ordinary light; they must be produced by nuclear transformations far more energetic than those taking place in any known radioactive changes. Their "frequency" would correspond with the energy of the nuclear change involved in the formation of helium out of hydrogen and in the "simple capture of an electron by a positive nucleus." Dr. Millikan thinks it possible that this phenomenon is going on everywhere in space, and is the probable origin of these rays, which, according to his observations, come to earth with equal intensity throughout the day and night.

The mystery of these rays has attracted many scientists, and Dr. Millikan has not been alone in his quest after a solution. The German physicist Dr. Kohlhorster has now come to conclusions which partly corroborate Dr. Millikan's and partly supersede them. They have been formulated amongst only a limited number of scientists, and their author has just been recommended for this year's Nobel Prize as a result.

Variable Intensity

Dr. Kohlhorster began his observations some fifteen years ago in the gondola of a balloon more than five miles above sea-level. Since the war he has worked by a different method. His instrument was a thick-walled metal cylinder, empty of

CATAPULT AIRPLANES FROM DECK OF SHIP

Stride Made in Development of Device for Giving Craft Start in Flight

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.—Another stride in development of catapult devices to shoot naval aircraft directly into the air from the deck of fighting ships was made here recently when a three-seated amphibian plane was successfully launched in the face of a stiff wind.

Built at the navy gun factory here, the catapult was mounted on a coal barge which was towed into the Potomac river for the test and with engines roaring the plane swept down the catapult track and leaped into the air with hardly a dip before it soared upward. The bark of a three-inch blank cartridge which hurled the air cruiser on its way, sounded like a salute to a new mechanical triumph.

The power catapult type follows sixteen years of development in the United States' army.
