# FRIGHTFUL TRAIN WRECK NEAR PITTSBURG

## COMMONS DIVIDES ON PEACE RIVER ISSUE AFTER DEBATE LASTING ALL DAY

### Fast Trains Crash and Fifteen Are Killed as Well as Twenty Injured

PITTSBURG, June 17.—Eleven passengers and four men are dead and twenty are seriously injured as a result of two Pullman cars telescoping on the Pennsylvania Railway when struck by the engine of another train at Gray's Station last night.

The wreck was caused when the fast Cincinnati Limited derailed into the rear end of the Washington Express which had stopped to repair a broken air hose. The two locomotives of the Limited and the club car immediately following them as well as two sleepers on the express were badly wrecked, most of the casualties being in the cars.

MONTREAL, June 17.—Unchaining an attack against government control of liquor, Hugh Dobson of Regina declared that violations of the禁酒法 in British Columbia increased 53 per cent; there have been 900 cases of "balling" in which no action had been taken, bootlegging had increased 107 per cent and automobile accidents 46 per cent, all arrests for drunkenness more than doubled.

In his own province of Saskatchewan, Rev. Dobson said family contributed \$30 and every adult \$20 to the government sales of liquor.

Judge Cayley in the County Court here yesterday ordered her to refund the amount to her rejected suitor.

### Government Weathers Another Storm.

The Mackenzie King government has weathered another storm, this time a sudden assault to test its strength. With the exception of two Progressives, all the Progressives, Independents and Labor members in the House voted with the government. With the Liberals in the minority as far as voting strength is concerned, it is undoubtedly more of an expression of confidence in the government that it should win on such a division as yesterday's than if it were just a case of the straight government followers outnumbering the opposition.

With the session expected to close within the next few days, this will probably have been the last serious test made of the government's strength before prorogation. The Mackenzie King government will remain in power until next session and in the meantime it is hard to predict what political developments will take place. It may be expected, however, that another session will not be as arduous and uncertain as the last has been.

### British Strikes And American.

During the nine days of the British industrial upheaval four million men were on strike. Not a shot was fired, not a life was lost. Read that over again, then imagine the carnage under similar circumstances in the good old U.S.A.

Despite the lower level on which the congested population lives, human life is not cheap in England. Private wars are not tolerated on the tight little isle. Here they flourish. Gangsters use machine guns on one another and the public; in labor disputes the bomb and sawed-off shotgun are employed with gusto and impunity. In a dispute between union and non-union molders in the San Francisco district one non-union man has been killed, three crippled for life and ten have been seriously injured by shotguns, with no arrests and convictions. When eight hundred San Francisco union carpenters struck for the closed shop, war began immediately.

We do not have to tolerate private wars; if they continue, it is due to our own apathy and indifference.—July Sunset.

### Removing P.G.E. From Politics.

Removing the control of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway from the political to the commercial atmosphere, the policy recently inaugurated by the provincial minister of railways, is a topic of favorable discussion among businessmen all over the province. The general opinion is now held that it will mean that the problems of the line will be approached in a bolder and more practical fashion than hitherto has been the case. On this question the Victoria Daily Times, which has for long advocated the lifting of the business of the provincial road out of the political atmosphere, has the following to say:

The appointment of three prominent business as directors of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company is a desirable step. The system is now getting nearer a producing stage and ought to be regarded no longer as a political target. Its chief requirement is more passenger business and freight traffic. This can be furnished only by a determination on the part of the general public to put the line to maximum use, by regarding it as a valuable agency in the development of the province; in short, by considering it in the light of an asset instead of a "white elephant." One of the quickest ways to change the prevailing view of the system is to take it out of politics and give it a fair chance in the commercial field. This is what the government has done and its course is a correct one.

The government's plan for the future of the line should command itself to everybody in the province, irrespective of party leanings, and insure new consideration for a subject which for too long has been treated as a political football.

## FARMER FIGHT ON IN ALBERTA

Brownlee Government Appeal to People to be Decided on June 28, Election Day

### ALL UNDER NEW LEADERS

United Farmers Not to Oppose Labor, It is Understood: Many Candidates

EDMONTON, Alta., June 17.—(By Canadian Press) — Just twenty-one years ago Alberta was granted autonomy, and the province will celebrate its coming of age by a general election set for June 28, with nomination ten days earlier. The voting will find four parties—United Farmers of Alberta, Conservatives, Liberals and Labor seeking public support; the first named asking for return to power on its record during the past five years, while Liberals and Conservatives seek to overthrow the government on the grounds that a balanced budget in only one of the past five years shows extravagance. They also contend that dilatory methods were employed in the treatment of the big issues, namely northern railways, natural resources, redistribution and finance.

### Big Majority

When the fifth legislature of Alberta was dissolved some weeks ago, the U.F.A. government enjoyed a big majority in the house, the standing being: U.F.A., 40; Liberals, 12; Labor, 4; Independents, 3; Conservatives, 1.

When nominations take place, it is expected that the old line parties, Liberals and Conservatives will have candidates in all of the 60 ridings, while the U.F.A. and Labor will combine to see that none of the seats go by default, the understanding being that the U.F.A. is not to oppose Labor.

Returning officers are now busily engaged in directing the efforts of 3,000 enumerators and a voting census is being taken of a territory which reaches from the United States border line on the south, to within hailing distance of the Arctic Circle. Among the returning officers is Mrs. W. G. Baker, believed to be the first woman returning officer ever appointed in Canada.

### New Leader

A novel feature of the present campaign is that all three parties enter the fight under new leaders. Hon. J. E. Brownlee, the present premier, was not a candidate in the last election. He entered the cabinet by means of a by-election in Ponoka, after his appointment as attorney-general at a Calgary meeting of successful U.F.A. candidates, following the Liberal defeat in 1921. It was at the same meeting that Hon. Herbert Greenfield, deposed as premier in 1925, was selected. The Liberals have seen three successive leaders depart, viz., Hon. Charles Stewart, called to Ottawa to assume the portfolio of minister of the interior; Hon. J. R. Boyle and Hon. C. R. Mitchell, sworn in as members of the Supreme Court of Alberta. The choice of the recent convention fell to Joseph Shaw, at one time independent member for Calgary in the Dominion house. He was defeated by Hon. R. B. Bennett in the last federal election.

The Conservatives whose representatives dwindled from thirteen in 1916-1920, to one in the fifth Alberta legislature—General J. S. Stewart of Lethbridge—are pinning their hopes on their new leader A. A. McGillivray, Calgary, and have nearly all their candidates ready for nomination day.

The span of twenty-one years has seen many changes in the personnel of the Alberta legislature and it is interesting to note that not one member of the first legislature of 1906, is now in the house. The last of the "old guard" to depart were Hon. J. R. Boyle, now Mr. Justice Boyle, and Hon. C. W. Cross, who successfully contested the federal riding of Athabasca for the Liberals in the last general election. The senior member now in point of years is Hon. George Boadley (Okotoks) minister of agriculture in the Brownlee cabinet.

Equally drastic have been the changes that have taken place in the capitol buildings. In 1906 the legislature convened in a frame rink building which later

was destroyed by fire. A move was then made to the McKay Avenue school in Edmonton, followed by the transfer to the modest "parliament buildings," close to the site of the present parliament buildings, which look proudly down from the banks of the Saskatchewan river, were erected at a cost of several million dollars.

### First Was Liberal

The first administration of Alberta, taking office in 1906, was Liberal, the premier being a Strathcona lawyer, A. C. Rutherford, who resigned in 1910 following a split over the Alberta and Great Waterways railway. Hon. A. C. Cushing and Hon. G. W. Gross also left the cabinet and what appeared to be a crisis was averted through the appointment of Hon. A. L. Sifton, then Chief Justice of Alberta, as premier. Hon. A. L. Sifton held office until he was summoned to Ottawa, to join the newly-formed wartime union government, as secretary of state. His successor was Hon. Charles Stewart, for some time minister of public works in the Sifton cabinet.

It was in 1921 after enjoying power since the province was created, that the Liberal ship of state was "sunk." The Farmers' Party, under the leadership of Henry Wise Wood, the U.F.A. president, sweeping into power with a large majority.

### Farmer Premier

Hon. Herbert Greenfield, a vice-president of the U.F.A. and a farmer at Westlock, was selected as premier and a cabinet with Hon. George Boadley as the only member with previous legislative experience, was named.

Outside of Mr. Greenfield's resignation and the recent appointment of James F. Lymburn, Edmonton barrister, as attorney-general, the personnel has remained unchanged for five years although there have been different changes in portfolios.

### Brownlee Now

The Brownlee government is making its appeal to the voters on its record, which they claim is one of economic administration and constructive policies. The government still adheres to the U.F.A. platform which proved successful in 1921. The premier stoutly adheres to his stand that the natural resources will not be an issue, stating that he refuses to be a party to plunging the province into religious controversy.

Conservatives and Liberals claim that the provincial debt has been increased at the rate of \$6,000,000 annually by the U.F.A. administration and charge that nothing constructive has been done toward the settlement of the question of northern railways, a matter regarded of vital importance by the people of the Peace River and Grande Prairie constituencies. It is in the cities and the North country that they are hopeful of securing the main support, while the U.F.A. supporters maintain they will carry the rural ridings to the same extent as in 1921.





## UNITED CHURCH COLLEGE REPORT

Interesting Document Presented at Montreal Conference

MONTREAL, June 16.—(Canadian Press)—Two universities, three arts faculties, 15 theological colleges or faculties, and 13 other institutions of "higher learning" are included in the educational institutions of the United Church of Canada as reported to the General Council of that church in session here. The report says:

"Several theological colleges anticipate early amalgamation with other United Church colleges, following out the co-operation now obtaining between them. That contact with state or independent universities is becoming closer is reported from several centres, particularly where professors in divinity are providing religious knowledge options as subjects for students in arts."

Colleges reported on number 28, with staff 293 and students about 6,500. Enrollments approximate 500 in theology, 1,500 undergraduates in arts and 4,500 in schools and colleges of higher learning. Unusually good current finances are generally reported.

### Destroyed by Fire

The report says: "Destroyed by fire, Newfoundland Methodist College has united with the Presbyterian College at St. John's, taking over Presbyterian staff. Halifax Ladies' College reports an excellent year in all departments. Large attendance has been maintained at Pine Hill College, Halifax, which will be joined shortly by the theological faculty of Mount Allison University."

Mount Allison University, Sackville, N.B., has broken enrollment records, received \$15,000 to found the Hon. Josian Wood lectures and has doubled summer attendance. The Ladies' College is graduating an increasing percentage of its enrollment. Its new principal is to be Rev. C. W. Ross of Pictou Academy. Mount Allison (boys') Academy closes its 83rd year with a surplus and steady attendance.

"Montreal's three co-operating colleges expect amalgamation shortly to form a triple strand." The Congregational College lost Prof. W. H. Wariner by death after lifetime of service. While retaining almost the whole faculty and student and alumni bodies, the Presbyterian College loses, by legislative action, its charter and building. Maintenance of undergraduate enrollment and strengthening of graduate department mark the year at Wesleyan Theological College.

### Finances and Growth

"Wesleyan College, Stanstead, Que., reports attendance steady at about 300 with residential facilities increased. Rev. A. D. Mackenzie becomes principal. Good finances and healthy growth are the record at Ottawa Ladies' College. Transition from a co-educational to a boys' school in newly completed \$500,000 plant occurs at Albert College, Belleville, next term. Twenty-eight graduations and healthy finances are noted by Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby. Closer affiliation with University of Western Ontario has been effected by Alma Ladies' College, St. Thomas.

"Closer relationships with Bay of Quinte Conference are being formed by Queen's Theological College, Kingston, which regrettably announces the retirement of Prof. W. G. Jordan and resignation of Dr. Dyde as principal. Record graduating class in arts of 120 and record entrant class of nearly 200, with gifts bringing property and endowment values up to \$4,000,000 are noted by Victoria University, Toronto. Knox College reports a happy

### DIET FOR CHILD DURING THE SECOND YEAR

Usually after the twelfth month, the mother should select a diet schedule. Every new article of food should be carefully prepared, and given at first in very small quantities. All meals to be given regularly, with nothing between meals. With many children this expansion of the diet list is attended with considerable difficulty. They are thoroughly satisfied with milk, and refuse all other form of nourishment. In such cases, withhold the milk until the more solid articles of food have been eaten. If both are given at the same time, the child will prefer the milk and when he has finished drinking it he will refuse the solid food. The following diet schedule will permit the mother to select a suitable meal from the foods listed. It is never advisable to make a change in diet during very hot weather.

NOTE: One teaspoonful of EAGLE BRAND CONDENSED MILK added to one ounce of boiled water results in a mixture equivalent in nutritive value to whole milk. Whenever the word milk appears in the following diet, EAGLE BRAND should be diluted accordingly.

### 12th TO 15th MONTH---FIVE MEALS DAILY

### 15th TO 18th MONTH--FOUR MEALS DAILY

### 18th TO 24th MONTH--FOUR MEALS DAILY

7 A.M.—Oatmeal, hominy, cornmeal, each cooked three hours the day before they are used. When the cooking is completed the cereal should be of the consistency of a thin paste. This is strained through a colander, which upon cooling will form a mass of jelly-like consistency. Of this give two or three tablespoonsfuls, served with milk. 8 or 10 ounces of milk as a drink. Toast.

9 A.M.—The juice of one orange.

11 A.M.—Scraped rare beef, one to three tablespoonsfuls, mixed with equal quantity of bread and moistened with beef-juice. Or a soft-boiled egg mixed with stale bread-crumbs; a piece of rusk and 6 or 8 ounces of milk.

3 P.M.—Beef, chicken, or mutton broth, with rice or stale bread broken into the broth. Six ounces of milk, if wanted. Stale bread and butter or rusk and butter. Many children at the above age will take and digest apple-sauce and prune pulp; when these are given, milk should be omitted.

6 P.M.—Two tablespoonsfuls of cereal jelly in 8 ounces of milk; a piece of rusk. Stale bread and butter.

10 P.M.—A tablespoonsful of cereal jelly in 8 ounces of milk.

**The following suggestions have proved to be helpful when properly used with bottle feedings, and they may be used in conjunction with Eagle Brand Condensed Milk.**

Always pour the milk from the can into the spoon—allowing it to level itself but not run over. You can readily understand that by dipping the spoon into the can you get more than a level spoonful, because of the milk that would adhere to the bottom of the spoon. When you have added the milk to the water stir thoroughly. This is important.

After opening, it is safe to leave the milk in the original can. We recommend that you cover the can tightly with an inverted cup, and keep it in a cool, clean place.

### CONSTIPATION

Oatmeal water very often relieves this condition. To make oatmeal water add one heaping tablespoonful of oatmeal to one pint of water, and boil for three hours in a double boiler. This will make a little more than half a pint of thick gruel to which add one pint of water that has been boiled. After straining mixture through fine strainer, you should have a little more than a pint of whitish liquid. This should be used with each feeding instead of the plain boiled water. If you find that this makes bowels too loose, dilute oatmeal water with plain boiled water.

Barley or rice water may be used instead of oatmeal water. If necessary two to three drops of plain codliver oil may be given twice daily added to the morning and night feedings.

### OATMEAL JELLY

When baby is five months old, add one teaspoonful of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. Gradually increase the amount until you are adding three tablespoonsfuls of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. To make oatmeal jelly add four ounces of oatmeal to one pint of water; boil for three hours in a double boiler, and add enough water so when cooking is completed a thin paste will be formed. This hot is forced through a strainer to remove coarser particles. When cold a semi-mass will be formed. Oatmeal jelly may be continued until child is old enough to eat other fruits as well as oranges.

### CLAY WATER

Obtain the very best barley flour. Add one rounded tablespoonful to one pint of water. Boil for thirty minutes, strain, then add enough water to make one pint.

### RICE WATER

Add one tablespoonful of rice to a pint of water. Boil three hours, adding water from time to time so that you will have one pint of rice water at the end of the three hours.

### LIME WATER

It is seldom necessary to use lime water with Eagle Brand Milk but should there be undigested particles of food in the bowel movements (which seem to be otherwise normal) or should there be vomiting of large curds shortly after feeding—or colic—it would be then advisable to try lime water. Obtain freshly prepared lime water at the Druggists, of which add 1 to 2 teaspoonsfuls to each feeding.

### COLIC OR VOMITING

These conditions may be due to over feeding, or constipation. Reduce quantity of food and use constipation formula, or lime water formula, as given above.

## ROSE HOFFMAN IS IN COURT

Witness said he had taken a meal down town on Saturday afternoon at a Chinese restaurant and had coffee and cake between 6 and 7 o'clock in the evening.
