ATLANTIC STORMS PLAY HAVOC WITH SHIPS

AURORA BOREALIS PLAYS HAVOC WITH TELEGRAPHS EVERYWHERE TODAY

Fierce Storms on Atlantic Are Playing Havoc with Shipping; Two Big Freighters in Trouble

Leviathan will be two days late in arriving at port; was held by heavy seas when steaming at full speed

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—One of the worst storms experienced on the Atlantic coast in some time has been playing havoc with shipping during the past two days. Heavy winds accompanied by driving snow and fog have been delaying the liners Aquitania and Leviathan and as a result the former will be two days late in reaching port.

Steamer President Roosevelt wireless last night that two seamen were drowned in an attempt to rescue 22 men, the crew of the British freighter Antiope Sunday night. No further trace of the big vessel, which disappeared in the fog and snow, has been found.

At one time the Leviathan and Aquitania under full steam were unable to make any progress against the heavy seas which buffeted them.

The British freighter Lariston is calling by wireless for help but her position has not been located so far.

VICTORIA GETS POOL BUSINESS

Arrangements Made, it is Said to Handle Grain for Saskatchewan Co-op.

VICTORIA, Jan. 26.—It is announced here that the Panama Pacific Grain Terminals Ltd., the concern that is to erect a grain elevator at this port, has made arrangements with the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool, to handle part of their output.

Plans for the new structure are being completed by C. D. Howe & Co. of Port Arthur, and it is expected it will be completed in time to handle the crop this coming autumn.

The elevator is to be located on the Ogden Point dock, owned by the Canadian National Railway.

The fact that there are no port charges here gives Victoria an advantage over Vancouver, and the fact that a large number of vessels bound out from Puget Sound ports call there give opportunity to make parcel shipments.

WAS A WOMAN ALL THE TIME

PRINCE JOHN MAY GET TOW

Not Likely that Propeller Will be Sent to Crippled Vessel at Q.C. City

As a result of the mishap at Queen Charlotte City on Monday morning when the steamer Prince John lost her propeller, there will probably be a disruption in the service to the islands. It is not likely that a propeller will be sent to the vessel for it would not be practicable to put it on at Queen Charlotte City. The job could hardly be done without drydocking. It is probable, however, that a tug will be sent to the Prince John and that she will be brought to dry dock here. The Prince Charles, now in dock here, may be sent into service to relieve the crippled vessel. No definite instructions as to what is to be done have been received in the city.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 26.—In the Western Hockey League series last night two games were played on the coast and the B.C. teams won in each case. Vancouver secured a decided victory over Calgary by a score of 5 to 1 on the rink here and Victoria beat Portland 3 goals to 2 at the Portland arena.

Aurora Borealis Interferes with Telegraphic Despatches Far South as San Francisco

A heavy borealis last night and this morning nearly put the telegraph wires out of business, apparently almost throughout the continent. Here they were at their worst this morning when it was almost impossible to get through on some of the wires up to ten o'clock. The effect on the wires is very curious. Sometimes the power is increased very greatly and then again all power seems to go out of the wire and the telegraphic action is practically stopped. Tariff Commission to Be Appointed Within Few Days Announced

Hon. Charles Stewart does not favor duty on coal but will alleviate suffering in Cape Breton area

OTTAWA, Jan. 26.—The proposed national tariff advisory board will be named within a few days, according to an announcement in the House of Commons by Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, during a debate on the Cape Breton situation.

The tariff commission, added Mr. Stewart, will be charged with the duty of investigating the conditions in Canadian industry and of advising the government and parliament as to what duties should be imposed.

The statement came after Mr. Stewart had said the government "does not propose to increase duties on coal at the present time." The government stands prepared to co-operate with the government of Nova Scotia to alleviate distress in the mining fields of Cape Breton.

"If the people in distress are starving, the government stands ready to supplement the action which should and must be taken by the local government," announced Mr. Stewart. The government, he said, would assist in bringing to consummation an order for 120,000 tons of coal for the Canadian National Railways.

FIFTH AVENUE HOUSE ROBBED

Thief Enters Residence of H. A. Breen and Takes Case Containing Jewelry

Some time between Friday night and last evening the residence of H. A. Breen, 625 Sixth Avenue East, was visited by a thief or thieves and a jewel case containing among other things two ladies' rings, one a wedding ring, a cameo pendant and a stick-pin was removed. Mr. and Mrs. Breen have not been staying at home since last Wednesday and the robbery was discovered last night by Mr. Breen when visiting the house. A dresser was ransacked and other traces were found leading to the belief that money was the object of the thief. Entry was made through a rear window of the house which was unlocked and large footprints were discovered. Neighbors stated that they thought they heard somebody in the house both on Saturday and Sunday night but, believing it was Mr. Breen, they did not think anything about it.

ACCEPT AWARD OF WAGES BOARD IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Jan. 26.—A general British railway strike was narrowly averted yesterday when a conference of union leaders voted by a small majority not to call out the men Friday but to accept the award of the National Wages Board.

MENNONITES BADLY TREATED

Group of Forty Return From Mexico Where They Went to Get Away From Canadian Laws

WINNIPEG, Jan. 26.—With only condemnation for the treatment received during the year spent in Mexico, a group of 41 Mennonites arrived in Winnipeg yesterday on their return trek to farms in Western Canada. Some of the members of the group lost as much as \$5,000, they said. The Mennonites left Canada because they considered they were oppressed by the laws which compelled them to educate their children after the Canadian fashion.

CLAM DIGGERS AT CORDOVA MISSING

CORDOVA, Jan. 26.—Missing for ten days and seen last when they left the clam-digging camp on Mummy Island near here on January 15, Joe Seymour and Andrew Morrison, veteran clam diggers, are believed to have been drowned.

Union steamer Chilkoot, Capt. C. B. Smith, arrived from the south at 4 o'clock this morning and after discharging a quantity of general freight at the G.T.P. wharf, cleared at 10:30 for Surf Inlet where she will take on ore from the Belmont Mine.

Ottawa Interest Will Be Retained.

Interest in the proceedings of Parliament is likely to be maintained this year as a result of the closeness, numerically, of the two parties and the consequent danger of the Government at any time being defeated by a wavering Progressive majority. The situation will make the opposition more active than usual and will tend to create a general alertness and attention to the duties of the hour that has not been seen for many a day.

In the reminiscences of Lord Grey, that British statesman tells of being under secretary of state for foreign affairs and having to be in his seat all the time owing to the close attention to business of the Irish members. At that time they were kept on the qui vive although they had a majority of something like forty. With less than ten of a majority, the present Government will have to watch its step all the time.

Contract Let For Biological Station.

The contract for the biological station has been let and the new building will be commenced just as soon as the work on the substructure is completed. For the past year or more this building has been planned and at one time was ordered to be commenced but the plans were changed and now, after asking for tenders, the contract is let and there can be no more backing down. The station will become an accomplished fact and will attract to the city many scientists of note and workers in marine biology that will add a new tone to the life of Prince Rupert. Thus step by step we are securing a place in the sun.

Immigration And This Province.

Immigration to British Columbia is rather a different thing to immigration to the prairies. It is an easy matter to go to the prairies and with a team of horses or oxen turn over the sod and raise a crop of wheat. One man with four horses can easily cultivate a quarter section as long as help is secured for the harvest. Indeed one good skilled man can cultivate nearer half a section than a quarter, if the conditions are right. Most of the wheat land is plowed in the autumn and is ready for the seed directly the snow is off the ground. In British Columbia things are very different. Here mixed farming is the only kind possible. Dairying is the most profitable occupation and there is always plenty of demand for milk or milk products. However, that involves much labor and means the expenditure of much money.

Big Move Toward Canada Is Indicated.

There seems likely to be a big movement toward Canada this year. All indications point that way. The British Government is now coming to a realization of the fact that the British Islands are over-populated and that something has to be done to solve the unemployment problem. That something they realize will have to be emigration. Canada needs population and Britain has a surplus. The situation should not be a difficult one to relieve. Transportation rates have been lowered to such an extent that it is possible for almost anyone to get funds enough to migrate. Canada needs population. That is the only solution to the vacant lands problem and eventually also the railway problem.

LABOR LEADER TALKS ABOUT LOCARNO PACT

J. Ramsay MacDonald Says Must Keep Spirit as Well as Letter of Agreement

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Great Britain had no business putting its signature to the Locarno pact "unless we intend to carry out the spirit we communicated to the people who initiated it," J. Ramsay MacDonald, former prime minister and foreign minister, says in a foreword to a book "From Dawes to Locarno," written by George Glasgow, noted journalist.

"We must remember that we led them to expect, not the ways open to us, in accordance with the imperfect letter, to get out of our responsibilities," Mr. MacDonald declares in the book, which Harper and Brothers soon will publish. "Our people have undertaken a tremendous responsibility. They have taken risks which are actually greater although they appear less or paper, than they were willing to take under the Protocol.

"We have handed over the British army and navy to other powers under Locarno, if we did it under the Protocol. The Rhineland must be subject to a new agreement. We must strive to make the disarmament conference a success.

War Not Impossible

Mr. MacDonald says that from one point of view the Locarno treaties, by settling the Rhine frontier, dealt with something "that never could become a prime cause of a European war, and adds, "If anybody thinks that by getting agreement on the Rhine frontier we have made European war impossible, he should think again."

"There were three things about the Locarno pact, however, which gave Europe new hope. Locarno offers a magnificent opportunity that will be fruitful for peace only insofar as that opportunity is taken."

HOSPITAL AUXILIARY FACING DISBANDMENT

So Few Were in Attendance Yesterday Afternoon that Annual Meeting Had to be Postponed

The annual meeting of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Prince Rupert General Hospital was to have been held yesterday afternoon but there was such a small attendance that it was necessary to postpone such business as the election of officers and receiving of annual reports. Matters of a routine nature were dealt with. Stating this morning that another special meeting would be called in the near future, Mrs. Frank Dibb, president of the Auxiliary, said that if better support for the Auxiliary is not forthcoming there will be nothing else to do but disband. The Auxiliary has a membership of about thirty but during the past year some half a dozen women have been carrying on the work. Such a state of affairs cannot continue, declares Mrs. Dibb.

The strong reproof which H. W. MANY IOWANS BARRED UNFIT FOR MARRIAGE

Said Will Number 100,000 Who Are Not Allowed to Undertake Family Duties

DES MOINES, Iowa, Jan. 26.—Obeying a new statute designed to raise the standard of Iowa's children, state officials are compiling a list of Iowans unfit to marry and rear families.

The list, which may contain as many as 100,000 names, will be arranged in alphabetical order and placed in the hands of county clerks who will be instructed to decline to issue marriage licenses to any persons whose names are included.

Inmates of state institutions who may be released, persons who are or have been dependent on the country for financial help are among the first to be listed. Persons who are known to have social diseases will be added.

TURKISH WOMEN ARE WORKING IN FACTORIES

Within Four Years New Movement Has Sprung up Which is Changing Country

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 26.—There was not one Turkish woman among the industrial workers of this city four years ago but now there are more than 20,000. A Turkish tobacco concern, the Douhan Society, inaugurated women into industry when it opened a factory in 1921 with an employment of 850 Turkish girls.

Turkish women have proved so adept at the sorting and grading of tobacco leaves that now this society employs 6,000 women. Other companies have sprung up and increased female employment, comfort and health of the workers has been insured.

COST OF ESTABLISHING MOVIE STUDIO IN B.C.

Mayor of Victoria Investigates Matter Which Will be Further Dealt With

VICTORIA, Jan. 26.—Construction of a moving picture studio in Victoria would involve an outlay of at least \$350,000, Mayor Pendray declared yesterday after his return from a well-earned holiday spent in California.

He and Mrs. Pendray had been received by Douglas Fairbanks and had been taken on a tour of the extensive Fairbanks studio. A similar tour of inspection had been made of Mary Pickford's studio, adjoining that of her famous husband.

One of the high executive officials of the Pickford studio was and old Victoria, Mayor Pendray said. Discussing the project of starting the movie industry here, this official had informed the mayor that the construction of a studio, costing at least \$350,000, would be necessary. In the light of his knowledge of conditions here, he told the mayor he knew that the "shooting" of outdoor scenes in Winter would not be possible every day, and that provision would, therefore, have to be made for elaborate studio operations.

This official proposed to study the situation here in detail. Mayor Pendray said, when opportunity offered, being enthusiastic about the natural scenery and the possibilities for sea pictures in the vicinity of Victoria.

VACUUM PROCESS FOR SEASONING LUMBER

Swedish Engineer Invents Scheme for Doing Work in One Day

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 26.—By a high vacuum process, invented by a Swedish engineer, fresh cut lumber is now "seasoned" in a day or less, sufficiently for the carpenter's bench.

Thus green birch boards become ready for the finest furniture in 20 hours; spruce and pine in thirty, and oak in forty. Such artificially "cured" lumber, moreover, is free from cracks, warps and "blue" spots.

On sliding rollers the planks are put inside the long, air-tight chambers, where they are first heated by steam coils and then pumped dry by the vacuum process which is 99.9 per cent perfect. This procedure is repeated according to the nature of the wood.

MISNER CASE WAS ON TWO HOURS IN THE POLICE COURT

The case against Henry Misner, charged with a statutory offence involving two girls, 14 and 13 years of age, proceeded for two hours before Magistrate McLymont in the police court this morning and was adjourned until tomorrow morning for transcription of stenographer's notes. It appears that accused was a neighbor occupying a house which he rented from one of the girl's mothers. The girls were in the habit of playing about his premises where he had resided for six years.

E. F. Jones is prosecuting with Milton Gonzales appearing for Misner. The stenographer was Constable Smith of the provincial police force.

CRIME ETHICS ARE DISCUSSED

J. C. Brady of Local High School Has Interesting Letter in Paper

SAYS FAKED HEROISM
Principal Blames Journals for Publishing Last Words of Two Criminals

The following letter by J. C. Brady, principal of the Prince Rupert High School, dealing with the Baker and Sowash hanging and the publicity given it was published in a recent number of the Vancouver Province:

Will you permit me space in the columns of your paper to protest in the name of public decency, as well as on behalf of our thousands of growing boys and girls, against the undue publicity given in the daily press of this province to the circumstances surrounding the last moment of the two notorious criminals who recently paid the just penalty of a foul crime—the murder of a father and his son.

False Philosophy
A false and insidious philosophy of life regarding right conduct, on the part of those who should know better, flaunted before our astonished gaze the last message and actions of two cowardly and cold-blooded murderers, and the youth of our land read in the words "Step on it, kid," a spirit of reckless bravado and an indifference to death and its final consequences most pernicious in its teaching on a world which is losing its grip on things eternal. Men who robbed, murdered and in their deliberately planned project showed no regard for property, personal rights or even life itself, are presented to the gaze of the world for its admiration, and, in the last message of one of these murderers some papers feign to see the solution of our social evils. Seeking truth from such an evil source only shows how far we have departed from sane and righteous thinking.

What is this flaunting before the eyes of the public of the words and last acts of two notorious criminals, but teaching in a dramatic form flaming and irresponsible youth that freewill is a myth and responsibility for one's act a metaphysical impossibility.

Teach Respect
We spend hundreds of thousands of dollars on the education of our youth each year; we employ thousands of teachers, working assiduously, day after day, to instill into the minds of the young respect for property and the rights of individuals. We make laws for the suppression of crime and vice, and yet we drag the words and bravado of two deliberately evil men into the limelight, for the youth of our land to pay reverence to, and applaud the faked heroism and wisdom of two men whose concept of right and wrong was a crime even to entertain.

The whole affair is a crying scandal and a deplorable incident. The crime of the boy who takes, without the owner's permission, another's bicycle from the basement of his school, or the youth who steals an automobile for a joyride, or the young man who waylays a pedestrian on some unfrequented street and snatches his purse, is but a few removes from the man who nonchalantly takes a human life.

Why Crime Flourishes
And we ask why crime

flourishes! False sentimentality towards criminals of the Baker and Sowash type, together with a sad departure from well-established ethical standards, play a big part in teaching our youth to have a disregard for the rights of others, which regard is the basis of all law and order.

MAKING CHANGE ENFORCEMENT OF GAME LAWS

Warden to be Located Here Soon Under Reorganization Plan of Colonel McMullin

Owing to the absence of a game warden in this district for the past year or two, no special attention has been paid to game protection and the result has been that hunting has been going on all the year round, and the sanctuaries, such as that on Kaien Island have not been respected. Now all that is to be changed. Colonel McMullin has undertaken the task of reorganizing the game department. The Game Board will have nothing to do with this but will be simply an advisory body. The new game department will be under the head of Chief Game Inspector Montague Ferber.

The Province will be divided into districts of which Prince Rupert will be one and there will be a game warden appointed to have charge of the law enforcement here.

Hon. A. M. Manson has been working on the new scheme in conjunction with Colonel McMullin and Colonel Ferber and before long this district may expect to see a change in administration of the local game laws. It is claimed by many that the game is getting scarcer every year. Geese and ducks especially are being killed off and deer are being driven back into the more inaccessible districts. On Kaien Island, where deer should be tame and should come right down to the edge of the townsite secure from depredations of any kind, illicit hunting it is claimed has been going on and has practically cleaned them up. The new game warden, when he comes it is suggested should make it his special work to make Kaien Island a tight reserve.

BADMINTON IS PREMIER SPORT

Number of Courts Here Doing Business and New Adherents to Game Almost Daily

Almost every day sees some new enthusiast taking up the sport of badminton. There are now a number of courts in the city and plenty of opportunities for those who wish to play. The first club established in the city, the Prince Rupert Badminton Club, has two courts in the De Luxe Hall. The next in order is that of the First B.C. Regiment, a single court. There are two good courts in the Elks Hall, one in the Cathedral Hall and one in the L.O.E.E. hall.

The idea that badminton is just a game for girls is exploded. The spectators who watched the tournament in the Cathedral Hall Saturday night and who saw Charlie Youngman and others panting for wind in the strenuous games, began to realize what it meant.

One man who played his first game on the Elks courts within the week was so stiff next morning he could scarcely walk. Dealers report a big run on badminton material and everything points to a general increase of interest in what has come to be the premier winter sport of Prince Rupert.

GOOD TORONTO IS DENOUNCED

Preacher Assails "New Year Disgrace" and Speaks Plainly of Shameless Exhibition

INDECENCY AND VULGARITY

Fair Name of City Besmirched and Its Respectable Citizens in Sackcloth and Ashes

Alleged irregularities at celebrations on New Year's Eve were vehemently denounced from the pulpit of Bond Street United Church by Rev. W. R. MacKay, according to the Toronto Globe. The subject of Mr. MacKay's address was "Toronto's New Year Disgrace." He approached his subject by considering and comparing the world of godliness and the world of godlessness, and proceeded to indicate how these two sections of the people observed the advent of 1926. The former greeted the new year with thoughtfulness and in friendly gatherings. But the latter held "New Year's parties with feasting, gluttony in the night, dancing and carousing."

Not Poorer Classes
The underworld, he said, was found in varying degrees in all cities, and had its palaces as well as its hovels. There was in Toronto a class of people constituting this underworld of which "we had a shocking exhibition on New Year's." The speaker referred to reports of improprieties committed at certain gatherings, which reports, he declared, had shocked the good people of Toronto. He referred to rumors of women who were too intoxicated to walk and of "shameless practices that we dare not even mention in this mixed audience, according to reports." It had not been the poorer class that had indulged in these objectionable festivities.

Civilization, he said, demanded a certain wall of reserve and rules of propriety between the sexes, but "from these reports, apparently, these walls suffered severely in welcoming in the new year. There were instances of gross indecency and vulgarity that it is a shame even to think

of." He stated that, according to reports, police officers were shocked by what they had witnessed, and added that it was not easy to shock a policeman.

Compared With Beasts

Perhaps the most extreme expression of disapproval occurred when the speaker made a passing reference to evolution. Whatever there might be in that theory, he said, such conduct as was reported to have occurred on New Year's Eve had shown that some people had not risen from the beasts, but had descended below the level of the beasts. Monkeys would be disgraced at the suggestion that humans were a higher form of life, could they have seen these New Year's activities.

Apart from the breaking of human law, there was the unescapable justice and retribution of Divine law for these transgressors to face.
Immodesty
The fair name of Toronto was besmirched and its respectable citizens were in sackcloth and ashes over this disgrace, he continued. Canada was looking for wives and mothers who would make it a great nation. Such wives and mothers, however, would not be found in these New Year's parties. "We may well be alarmed when women display boldness, immodesty, brazenness and intoxication," he declared. The New Year's celebration had cast a dark shadow over Toronto homes. He wondered if they were an indication of the breakdown of the old Anglo-Saxon homes. It was a reflection on the parents "when our boys and girls have parties which must be supervised by the police—which are broken into by policemen with clubs and closed up."

Issues Warning

The red light should be swung across the dangerous paths when such conditions are found, he thought. This dangerous path led to that underworld where there were the "adders of excess," the "serpents of shamelessness" and the "cultures of vice." Excavation at Pompeii, he went on, had shown symbols of unbridled vice, which strewed the path that led to the fate of Sodom and Gomorrah.
Mr. MacKay finished his address with a reference to the sterling Puritan qualities of the pioneer, of this continent, whose ideals should still be held. He thought that "that debauchery staining with shame the portals of the new year," gave warning that the people were losing their consciousness of sin.
He said that, whether the reports he spoke of would be fully verified or not, "something must have happened," and concluded with the warning, "Toronto take heed."

INSPECTION BY MEDICAL MAN WHEN MARRYING

Alberta is Considering Proposal and Doctors Asked to Make Recommendation

EDMONTON, Jan. 26.—Formation of a provincial medical inspection board to deal with applicants for marriage licenses may be considered shortly at a special meeting of the city board of health. This step was suggested at a meeting of the board but it was decided that the three medical members, Doctors Leitch, Orr, and Whitelaw should obtain information on the subject and this will be considered at a later session.

Discussion of the subject of a clean bill of health before marriage was brought up as a result of the action taken by the United Farm Women, now in convention at Calgary, who have expressed favor for this requirement. The board endorsed the views of the Farm Women in this regard and they will be advised accordingly.

While there is a feeling on the part of the board that something more should be done in regard to health certificates before marriage, there is some doubt that any broad change in the present legislation would be practicable. However, the question will be fully discussed later on before any definite representations are made as to a change in the provincial act.

ATHEISTS ARE TO BE ACTIVE

President of Organization Says They are Against All Religions

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Aroused by the Papal Bull proclaiming 1926 a holy year throughout the world, the newly incorporated American Association for the Advancement of Atheism, Inc., will take measures to overcome the effects of this action, it is announced by Charles Smith, president of the organization. Efforts will be made to increase the nation-wide membership of the association which has branches in New York, Washington, Chicago, Los Angeles and other large cities, he said. New chapters will be formed wherever the registration in a particular city warrants it until a branch has been established in every state of the union.

In discussing the matter Smith said: "It is frankly our purpose to use every means at our command to destroy the influence of the church, including all creeds, now enjoys. We regard that influence as harmful and prejudicial to the truth and shall do everything within our power to eradicate it. We acknowledge the right of the Pope to issue any commands he desires to his followers. But we reserve for ourselves the right to attack and destroy the strength of such an announcement whenever possible. Our sole aim is to bring about the destruction of religion and free mankind from the chains of the blind, dumb reverence of worship. We see no difference between religion as it is today and the heathen worship of a totem pole. Between the clergyman of today and the medicine man of the childhood of our race there is no difference other than time," he concluded.

NO PRESENT PROSPECT OF EXPORT WHEAT TAX DECLARES NEWSPAPER

(Edmonton Bulletin)
Most people in Alberta will share H. W. Wood's view that it would be a "crime" to put an export tax on wheat. But not many of them will share the apprehension he seems to have that the thing is likely, or liable, to be done.

CITY MANAGER IS DISCUSSED

Arguments For and Against System of Civic Government Set Forth by Newspaper

In a recent number the Manitoba Free Press discusses editorially the city manager plan of civic government as follows:

Increasing cost of city government and increasing pressure of taxation in recent years have brought the city manager plan more into vogue. There are sixteen cities in Canada that have adopted it, and the city of Quebec may be added very soon. For the businessmen recently met to discuss the municipal situation which had become unsatisfactory and they appointed a committee to study the city manager plan. Westmount, a suburb of Montreal, is the largest Canadian city which has adopted it.

353 in U.S.
In the United States there are 353 city managers, the largest city being Cleveland with a population of between 800,000 and 900,000, while the latest city to appoint a city manager is Cincinnati with something over 400,000. In the latter case the change came as a result of a long period of scandal and corruption in civic affairs.

There is an impression in some quarters that the appointing of a city manager means placing the civic government largely in his hands, relieving the citizens of responsibility for it and inclining them to take less interest in civic affairs. This idea is refuted by C. H. R. Fuller, city manager of Chatham, Ont., who says:

Secret of Success
"The whole secret of success of the management plan is that the people do not lose control over their own business. The manager is a hired employee of the council, and all he does is to administer the policies decided upon by the council, these policies being administered without interference by politicians and others, who affect the efficiency of the city government in many cases."

One can see that a man of good executive ability, who did not need to seek re-election every year or two and who was freer on that account, might increase the efficiency of the departments and also render good service as a co-ordinating agency. Even if all the heads of the departments are efficient and conscientious there is need for co-ordination.

Too Many Loose Ends
It is the general belief that public administration is never subject to the close supervision and control which is known to count for so much in private business, and that there are too many loose ends and consequent lack of economy. It is this belief that influences those who favor the city manager plan. On the other hand, there are people in various cities who do not favor it because they think that it is not necessary, that the civic administration is fairly efficient and that the appointment of another highly paid official and a staff would not be justified by the results. Dr. Horace L. Brittain, director of the Citizens' Research Institute, appears to favor the adoption of the city manager plan in Toronto, but it is probably a matter for each city to decide for itself according to the character of administration it has been having and the room for improvement that is believed to be possible.

Efficiency Required
One thing is certain, that with the millions of dollars that are spent annually by every large city and with the ramifications of civic business, the highest efficiency in executive management is required and should be obtained by whatever is believed to be the best means.

SUPPORT UNIVERSITY KINGDOM OF KOREA
TOKYO, Jan. 26.—Despatches from Korea state a movement has been started by American missionaries there for establishment of a new university at Seoul. Considerable funds have been raised and it is hoped construction can be begun this year. The new university would be devoted to higher education for Koreans.

RESURRECTION OF CHRIST IN ALASKAN SETTING

SEWARD, Alaska, Jan. 26.—The resurrection of Christ receives an Alaskan setting in a painting by Jan Van Empel, on the veranda of Saint Peter's Protestant Episcopal Church here. The painting was done at the request of Bishop Peter T. Rowe of the Alaska Diocese, who met Van Empel when the latter was touring the north land in search of inspiration.

The upper portion of the work shows the figure of the risen Christ surrounded by ministering angels. Views of the mountains and of the waters of Resurrection Bay, on which Seward is situated, form the horizon. In the lower foreground on either side of the opened tomb are grouped representative characters of Alaska's population.

"Alaska is full of inspiration for the painter," declared Van Empel. "The country is rough and harsh, the characters rugged. It is Nature in a frowning mood."

BUOY IS ADRIFT.
Captain F. T. Saunders, agent of marine, has been informed that the eas and whistling buoy maintained off Overfall Shoal, Rose Spit, Graham Island, Queen Charlottes, has gone adrift. He says it will be replaced as soon as possible.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 3,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

PURCHASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

HOMESITE LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
