LONDON, June 4.—There is talk of a possible attempt at mending the differences between Lord Oxford and Lloyd George arising from the recent general strike and the correspondence between Lord Oxford and his followers, in which George was practically read out of the Liberal party. ### SPEND \$25,000 ISLAND ROAD

Delegation Waited on Minister at Victoria Recently and Assured Work to go on

COMPLETION NEXT YEAR

Not Yet Decided in What Manner Work Will be Carried Out But Start Soon

A delegation representing the Prince Rupert Board of Trade and consisting of Olof Hanson, F. G. Dawson, David Thomson and M. P. McCaffery, interviewed Hon. T. D. Pattullo, member for Prince Rupert, on the matter of the road from the city limits to Galloway Rapids and was informed that \$25,000 was now available for continuation of the work, reports Olof Hanson, president of the board, who returned to the city yesterday afternoon following a ten-day business trip to Vancouver, Victoria, Spokane and Smithers.

Mr. Pattullo told the delegation that plans as to the manner in which the work would be carried out had not yet been definitely settled upon but that it was expected to start work shortly. Mr. Pattullo further stated that it was intended to have the road completed in 1927.

### TWENTY STORES IN BIG MERGER

Ontario Retailers Join to Modernize Their Businesses and Secure Economy

TORONTO, June 4.—A merger of 20 department stores located in as many cities and towns in Ontario is announced today, the transaction involving a total of \$9,000,000. The objects of the merger are to effect economies in buying, to furnish new capital to modernize the stores and to enforce modern advertising and merchandizing methods.

### HEAVY RAINFALL IS RECORDED HERE IN PERIOD OF 36 HOURS

One of the heaviest rainfalls for this time of the year was recorded at the Dominion meteorological station for the 36 hours up to 5 o'clock this morning during which period the precipitation totalled 2.46 inches. From 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon to 5 o'clock Thursday morning there was .36 inches; from 5 o'clock yesterday morning to 5 o'clock in the evening, 1.20 inches, and from 5 o'clock last night to 5 o'clock this morning, .90 inches. Early yesterday morning, the heavy rain was accompanied by a 50-mile gale.

### Russia Has Contributed Two Million Dollars to British Miners' Strike

Action sharply criticized as being forced levy on wages of poorly paid Russian workers

LONDON, June 4.—Secretary Cook of the miners' federation is peeved that the coal owners' association passed him up when they asked President Smith to attend a conference. During a speech last night Cook exclaimed "Thank God for Russia," in announcing that Russian labor unions sent nearly two million dollars to aid the British miners.

The press here continues to sharply criticize these contributions, saying that the Russian unions did not possess funds for this purpose and that the money was really a propaganda subsidy of the Soviet, obtained by a forced levy on the wages of the poorly paid Russian workers.

### Enormous Quantities of Cotton Goods Smuggled into Quebec Shown in Evidence at Ottawa

OTTAWA, June 4.—Evidence regarding the workings of customs officials on the Quebec-Vermont boundary was given at yesterday's sittings of the customs probe. The inference from the auditor's report presented shows that enormous quantities of cotton goods, some probably prison made, are pouring into the small towns on the border, finding their way into Canada without payment of duty.

The auditors found that the total of such goods recorded by freight and express companies in the past three years was valued at \$1,400,000. Allowing for goods reshipped to United States points or cleared through the Canadian customs, it was found that a total quantity worth not less than \$800,000 could not be accounted for.

### American Who Refused Evidence in Customs Probe Was Arrested Today for Being Party to Fraud

OTTAWA, June 4.—S. B. Telford of Rock Island, Quebec, who was threatened last night with incarceration in the tower of the parliament buildings for refusing to accede to the wishes of the federal customs probe committee, was arrested early this morning.

The warrant charged that Telford did commit an indictable offense in that he did knowingly conceal, purchase and sell goods unlawfully imported into Canada, said goods being dutiable and whereon duties lawfully payable had not been paid. Bail was refused.

Telford gave his address as Derby Lane, Vermont. He owns a warehouse just across the border in Derby Lane and refused to open the warehouse for inspection to accountants representing the customs probe committee on the ground of the warehouse being on foreign territory, taking the stand on the advice of his attorney.

C. Mercer warned him that if he still declined to obey the order, recommendation would be made that he be committed to the tower during the pleasure of Parliament.

Telford appeared in court this morning and was remanded for one day.

VANCOUVER, June 4.—Canadian Government steamer Givenchy operated under the department of fisheries, is busy killing sea lions at the entrance to Rivers Inlet, where these creatures prey on the salmon which come there at this time of year to spawn. Throughout the season the lions lie in wait for the fish and disport themselves on the small exposed rocks, and there it is the steamer is pouring shot into them today.

### DRILL MARBLE VANCOUVER ISL.

Outfit to go From Stewart When Season Over to Malahat District Near Victoria

VICTORIA, June 4.—When diamond drilling in the Stewart district slackens next autumn an outfit will be brought to Vancouver Island to drive test holes in a reputed marble bed discovered in the Malahat district north of here.

D. A. Grogan, speaking on behalf of the Hemmingsen Logging Co., on whose property the deposit was found, said the sum of \$3,000 would be spent in drilling tests, several holes being sunk to a depth of 100 feet each.

### NEW EFFORT END STRIKE

LONDON, June 4.—With the approval of the government, Evan Williams, chairman of the Mining Association, today sent a personal letter to Herbert Smith, vice-president of the Mine Workers' Federation, suggesting a conference be held by a small committee representing the two sides to discuss means of ending the strike.

### GRAIN STEAMER HITS ICEBERG

Arrives Safely at St. John's Newfoundland After Having Injured Bows

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, June 4.—The British steamer Innerton arrived here safely after colliding with an iceberg off Cape Race. The bows of the vessel were slightly stove in but no one was injured.

The Innerton was bound for British ports with a cargo of grain from Montreal.

### MODIFICATION U.S. DRY LAWS IS POSTPONED

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Indefinite postponement of all proposals for modification of the dry laws and a national prohibition referendum was recommended yesterday by the Senate prohibition committee. This action is subject to approval of the judiciary committee which is expected to concur.

#### Thanking King For Proclamation.

A lot of people here are puzzled over why the British Parliament should thank the King for a proclamation recently issued. It is a matter of form. The King issued the proclamation on the advice of his ministers and they are responsible. If there is anyone wrong they are the ones to blame. By thanking the King for issuing the proclamation Parliament endorsed the action of the Government of Premier Baldwin, on whose initiative the action was taken.

#### Scenic Attractions Of Prince Rupert.

We have so often spoken of the scenic attractions of Prince Rupert that we have no intention of repeating it here. All we wish to do is to draw attention to the report which appeared yesterday of a speech made by Archdeacon Rix before the Rotary Club. He saw possibilities of a wonderful sunken garden on the old hotel site and the idea is a splendid one. It has all the makings of a delightful garden which would be a thing of beauty for the city. Even if it were kept up by some private person it would be almost equally useful as it can be seen from the walk above and enjoyed almost as much as if it were open to the public.

#### Fighting Shadows Common Amusement.

Yesterday a story was published about a Spokane man who fought his own shadow and landed up in the police court. He is like so many of his fellows, who are constantly fighting shadows. They get very much exercised over the wrongs committed by a political party, or a civic group or a neighbor but eventually it is discovered that he is just fighting his own shadow. His imagination has conjured up something which did not really exist.

#### Uniforms For Boys' Band.

The decision to raise money for the boys' band was a step in the right direction. If the boys are to be kept together they should have uniforms in order to make them look smart. They will take more interest in their work if they are encouraged and the provision of uniforms is one of the first necessities. It is to be hoped the people of Prince Rupert will be liberal in providing for them. The sum of \$750 is needed.

#### Unusual Rain For Time Of Year.

The past few days have been very unusual. The almost continuous rains interfered with the normal activities of the people and were particularly hard on business. Happily everything comes to those who wait and the end of the rain, for the time being, came with a burst of sunshine this morning.

The difficulty with a rainy spell such as that of this week is that it seems to cast a gloom over the place. People imagine it will never cease and get low spirited and moody. Those who can be cheerful under such circumstances are benefactors to the community.

## Birth and Life of British Gazette Published During General Strike in Britain

A copy of The British Gazette is just to hand, part of the final edition of that short lived paper which kept the British public informed on strike events and the news of the day during the recent general strike. It is an interesting four page paper gotten up in English style and one of the features is a story of its own career extending just a little over a week. Here is the story as told by itself:

At last the moment has come to tell the story of one of the most signal exploits and adventures in the annals of English journalism—the foundation in a day and a night of a daily newspaper, The British Gazette, and the multiplication of its issue within a week to the stupendous total of over 2,000,000.

Nothing like it has been done before, the world over. If the exceptional occasion provided the inspiration and the opportunity, it also imposed the severest disabilities. What was done represented a triumph of resource and determination over what might well have seemed insuperable difficulties. It is a triumph of which all who had part in it have a right to be proud, and one which has served equally well two great causes.

#### Attempt Defeated

It has defeated the attempt to keep the country in the dark during a formidable crisis in its affairs, and it has vindicated the Press against a new conspiracy to muzzle its freedom.

Let us tell the story, which opens on Monday, May 3, under the shadow of a general strike to be declared at midnight—a strike of which the master-stroke was to be the shutting down of the newspapers.

It was impossible to acquiesce in the prospect of a nation exposed to the interruption of the whole of its social and industrial economy, and at the same time deprived of its news, and of the one medium through which public opinion might find and express itself.

But what was to be done?

#### A Famous Letter

The government were alert to emergency, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer called to the Treasury on Monday the representatives of the Newspaper Proprietors' Association (representing the London Press) and of the Newspaper Society (representing the Provincial Press). But he obtained from the conference little comfort or encouragement. Its members were unable to agree to the suggestion that they should co-operate in the production of a common emergency news-sheet, and the conference broke up indecisively.

At this juncture, the editor of the Morning Post wrote to J. C. Davidson, M.P., the Deputy Civil Commissioner for London, saying that with the co-operation of the Government, he would undertake to produce a four-page bulletin paper, to the number of 100,000 daily, and suggesting that if there were any difficulty, the Government should commandeer some big newspaper office (that of the Morning Post or another), and order so many papers to be produced.

Meanwhile, the work of producing what promised to be the last issue of the Morning Post for an indefinite time proceeded. An emergency edition was sent out at 9 o'clock, and, as the mechanical staff did not strike until they had completed the regular shift, it was possible to produce at midnight a 20-page edition of the Morning Post, though its distribution was limited by the cessation of the train services.

The seed that had been sown by the editor's letter was germinating, and was to spring up presently with the swiftness of Jonah's gourd.


#### Must Play Part

At a hastily-snatched dinner on the Monday evening, the editor, the general manager and the managing editor agreed that the Morning Post must somehow play its part in the crisis that was approaching, and they drafted a formal memorandum for presentation to the Government, outlining a definite scheme of co-operation with the Government. It offered, if adequate protection were given, at first 100,000 copies of a news-sheet a night, and to raise the output to 400,000 copies by the end of the week. It placed the staff of the Morning Post at the service of the Government, to work under its direction and authority.

#### Government Arrives

That night important visitors to the editor were announced.




