





WELTERVREDEN, Java, Oct. 14-Smiling and playing with bright beads which they had given her, a tiny pigmie girl recently led United States and Dutch scientists of the Stirling expedition into a village of pygmies in the jungles of Dutch New Guinea's mountains. She was the first of a newly discovered race of pygmies to be seen by white men. For four months, the expedition had negotiated the dangerous rapids of Mamberamo River, had climbed the towering Van Rees Mountains and had braved deadly tropical fever in their quest of the pygmies for ethnological study. Their success in finding the dwarf people after other expeditions had been turned back with heavy loss due to disease, was largely achieved by use of an aeroplane which flew over swamps and dense equatorial growth.

Pigmy land was found after five days of climbing of steep mountains, which rose to a height of 15,000 feet. First the party came upon the Rouffear River. which plunged down a deep garge, with high cliffs on both sides. Across the gorge was a rattan suspension bridge.
