## SIX THOUSAND BRITISH MINERS WORKING

### CHARGE OF MISREPRESENTATION MADE AGAINST CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE

#### Campaign of Slander Designed to Injure the Reputation Honest Men

#### Says Mackenzie King of Statements Being Promulgated by Premier Meighen and His Followers in Election Campaign

NORTH BAY, Aug. 23.—The Tory campaign of slander is so much a smoke screen to hide the main issue as it is obvious gas intended to injure the reputation of honorable and to poison the minds of the electors with untrue allegations and vile insinuations, declared Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King here Saturday night.

The Tory campaign had failed and now the party is raising a cry of annexation to the United States to influence the electors to a false appeal to patriotic feelings, he said.

#### MURDERER IS WRITING BOOK

Publish Account of His 1710  
Crimes While in Prison,  
He Says.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 23.—Tom  
Johnson, confessed murderer and  
perpetrator of 1710 crimes dur-  
ing the past 20 years, told his  
story that he is writing his life  
story.

Johnson, who is charged with  
first degree murder for the slaying  
of Leonard Randall, of Min-  
neapolis, since his arrest has  
been compiling notes of his career  
crime, which he says he plans  
to put into book form.

His father is reported in des-  
patches from Salmon Arm as say-  
ing he believes the man is men-  
tally deranged.

L. Longbrake, the public de-  
fender, has written Johnson sen-  
tencing him to come here to  
decide what to do about the  
later charge, for the defense of  
which no definite plan has been  
formulated.

#### VOLUNTEER IS A TOTAL LOSS

Fishing Vessel Went Ashore on  
Rose Spit Last Friday  
Morning.

The local halibut boat Volun-  
teer, owned and skippered by John  
Siek, ran aground on Rose Spit  
about 2 o'clock last Friday morn-  
ing and is a total loss, having  
been dashed to pieces by the ele-  
ments. Capt. Orvik, Axel Morgan  
and John Taylor, the members of  
the crew, reached the city yester-  
day on the steamer Prince John.  
They had been picked up at Rose  
Spit and taken to Massett by  
Capt. Henry Edenshaw. When  
their boat went aground it was  
suggested for them to make shore on  
the dry spit but they remained  
there a couple of days before be-  
ing picked up by Capt. Edenshaw.  
The Volunteer was a 50 foot  
boat and was powered with a 20  
hp. Union engine. With the ves-  
sel was lost her 10,000 catch of  
halibut with which she was re-  
turning to port when the accident  
occurred.

#### OPTIONS TAKEN PRINCE RUPERT

Vancouver Paper Says Ships  
Chartered View to Loading  
at This Port

The Vancouver Province on its  
shipping page says: There is a  
sort of subdued expectancy  
among grain men, as the begin-  
ning of the annual export wheat  
movement commences. Okana-  
gan wheat is coming in to Har-  
bor Board elevators, and a few  
cars of new crop wheat have ar-  
rived from Southern Alberta.

Though there are said to be  
various ships en route under  
charter to load at this port,  
there have been no definite an-  
nouncements of September load-  
ings here. Charters are now  
made for North Pacific, Van-  
couver range, leaving free the pos-  
sibility of sending them to  
Portland, Seattle, Vancouver, or  
Prince Rupert.

Four ships have been char-  
tered, September-October, with  
Prince Rupert option, it is said.  
There have been several re-  
ported fixed North Pacific for  
October-November. Among them  
is ss. Sithonia, United Kingdom-  
Continent, October - November,  
31-3.

In addition there has been a  
certain amount of liner space  
fixed for early fall. Grain men  
state they do not anticipate any  
delays from lack of shipping.

#### NANAIMO DEFEATED PLAN TO COMPLETE ITS NEW HOSPITAL

NANAIMO, Aug. 23.—Voting on  
a proposal to raise a civic loan  
of \$35,000 to complete the new

mately \$100,000 has already been  
spent, the Nanaimo ratepayers  
Saturday turned down the plan  
by a majority of 76.

#### JAPAN CHANGES HER MIGRATION OWN COLONIES

Will Not Send Her People to  
Places Where They Are  
Not Wanted She Says


TOKYO, Aug. 23.—Henceforth  
Japan intends to colonize Hok-  
kaido, Formosa and other pos-  
sessions and does not intend to  
sponsor emigration to Canada,  
Australia and other countries,  
realizing that the previous policy  
caused much trouble and ill-  
feeling, the foreign office  
spokesman announced today.

The spokesman declared that  
Japan had reversed her entire  
emigration policy and after dis-  
covering her folly in efforts to  
send out excess population to  
places where it was not wanted,  
the present policy was to in-  
crease trade with those coun-  
tries, especially those of the  
south Pacific with all the efforts  
of the manufacturers and indus-  
trialists concentrated on low  
costs in order to build up ex-  
ports. It was announced that  
the South Pacific trade confer-  
ence would be held in Tokio on  
December 2.

#### FREIGHT TRAIN WAS WRECKED

WYANET, Ill., Aug. 23.—Grind-  
ing down hill, the eastbound  
freight train on the Chicago, Bur-  
lington and Quincy Railway piled  
up at Heart Town Sunday, killing  
eight persons and injuring four  
others.

The killed and injured were  
tramps riding on the car where a  
broken archbar, connecting a  
truck with the car is believed to  
have caused the wreck.

#### Voters Warned to Beware Conservative Half Truths Present Election Campaign

Fred Stork, who returned last night from Ocean Falls,  
Bella Coola and Hagensborg, where he addressed large meet-  
ings, asks the Daily News to warn the electors against half-  
truths of Conservatives. He says he found that at the points  
he visited in the south, the Conservative candidate, J. G.  
Brady, by means of a half-truth promulgated a slander  
against him which might have proved effective had he not  
fortunately followed the speaker and disabused the minds  
of the electors and shown up the type of campaign that was  
being waged against him.

According to the electors who attended the meetings,  
Mr. Brady told of a painful duty he had to perform, and  
then he read a copy of a telegram Mr. Stork had sent in  
1925, leaving the impression that it was a recent telegram.  
It read:

"June 21, 1925.  
Hon. P. J. Cardin, Ottawa.  
Under circumstances described in your telegram 23rd,  
I am willing that licenses be issued with conditions and pro-  
visions stated in your telegram.  
FRED STORK."

This telegram, Mr. Stork says, was sent in June of  
last year in answer to the following:  
"Fred Stork, M.P.,  
Prince Rupert, B. C.

In view of intimation given to applicants for trap li-  
censes as far back as December last, withholding of licenses  
now creates most awkward situation for Government. Suggest  
for your serious consideration that such applicants as  
have been advised that licenses would issue, receive licenses  
for this year with a pronouncement on behalf of the Govern-  
ment that after this year no licenses will issue.  
P. J. ARTHUR CARDIN."

#### Coal is Being Shipped From English Midlands First Time in 17 Weeks

LONDON, Aug. 23.—For the first time in seventeen weeks  
coal is scheduled to be shipped from the Midlands area fol-  
lowing the return to work today of six thousand miners in the  
Nottingham and Derbyshire coal fields. The owners expressed  
satisfaction at the situation and at the number of men returning  
considering the extensive campaign of union leaders to prevent  
a break.

Union pickets, including many women, persuaded hundreds  
of men who arrived at the mines not to go to work.

#### Premier Meighen Deals With Railway Rate Problem in an Address Given at Lethbridge

LETHBRIDGE, Aug. 23.—"I don't propose to take any step  
to increase the railway rates either east or west," said Hon.  
Arthur Meighen in a speech here Saturday night, adding that  
he did not intend to "take any step which would result in in-  
creasing the burdens on the West, anyway."

The Premier said the Maritimes now felt they were dis-  
criminated against. "If you lived there," he asked, "would you  
want Parliament to take action in regard to one part of the  
country and not do it for the maritimes? You would want the  
same principle adopted every-  
where, wouldn't you?" He said  
he did propose to take steps to  
pay a portion of the rates as-  
sessed by the railway commis-  
sion in favor of the east and west  
for the reason that those portions  
of our country far distant from  
the thickly populated centres  
where certain parts of their pro-  
ducts should be sold.

FERNIE, Aug. 23.—For the  
first time in the campaign Pre-  
mier Meighen discussed the po-  
sition of the Home Bank deposi-  
tors here Saturday. He reviewed  
legislation giving relief and  
promised "sympathetic consid-  
eration" to further hardship not  
covered by the bill. He declared  
his intention to have the tariff  
commission investigate the pec-  
uliar conditions of the coal in-  
dustry in B.C. along with the  
rest and felt sure a way would  
be found to extend the area of  
consumption of B.C. coal.

#### ORIGINAL SHIEK OF MOVIES DEAD

Rudolph Valentino Succumbed to  
Pleurisy Following Recent  
Operation.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—Rudolph  
Valentino, the original "shiek" of  
the movies, darling of millions of  
female movie fans, died here to-  
day at noon in a hospital.

Recently Valentino underwent  
an operation for appendicitis but  
did not rally as he should. Pleu-  
risy developed Sunday night and  
took a sharp turn for the worse  
this morning with fatal results.

#### PROSECUTION UNABLE PROCEED VANCOUVER VOTERS LIST CASE

VANCOUVER, Aug. 23.—The  
case against Amos G. Ferguson,  
Liberal campaign worker, charg-  
ed with perjury in connection  
with an effort to clean up the  
lists of voters by cutting off three  
thousand names in Vancouver  
Centre, was remanded until Wed-  
nesday, the prosecution being  
unable to proceed.

#### MISS CLARE BARRETT FAILED SWIM CHANNEL

DOVER, Aug. 23.—Miss Clare  
Barrett, of New Rochelle, New  
York, was forced to abandon her second attempt  
to swim the English Channel to-  
day after nearly four hours of  
swimming. She was taken from  
the water seriously ill.

#### INVESTIGATOR IN GAINES CASE IS MURDERED

Body Held By Coroner on As-  
sumption That Foul Play  
Caused His Death.

SEATTLE, Aug. 23.—Acting on  
the theory that Robert Glanville,  
secret investigator for the state  
in connection with the slaying of  
Sylvia Gaines, was murdered,  
Coroner Willis Corson, of King  
County, is holding Glanville's body  
for investigation.

The body was found in a gas-  
filled room here Tuesday while  
Wallace Gaines, the girl's father,  
was convicted Thursday of mur-  
dering her and the penalty fixed  
at death by hanging.

A note found near Glanville's  
body said: "Goodbye, I am kind  
of disappointed." Investigators  
declared the handwriting on the  
note did not appear to be Glan-  
ville's.

That he was a detective work-  
ing in connection with the Gaines  
case was not revealed until after  
his death, although officials said  
he played an important part in  
uncovering the links in the chain  
of evidence by which the state ob-  
tained the Gaines conviction.

#### LEADER GOES TO MARITIMES

Will Make Tour of Two Weeks  
Before Returning to  
Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Aug. 23.—Mackenzie  
King arrived here Sunday after  
completing a tour of Western Can-  
ada. The former premier spent  
Sunday in seclusion at his sum-  
mer home and left today for the  
maritime provinces. He will stop  
off at Sherbrooke this afternoon  
to address a meeting and then  
continue to New Brunswick to  
spend two weeks in the maritimes  
and lower Quebec, returning here  
about September 6.

**Prairie Crops  
And This Port.**

With the establishment of this port as a grain export centre, we all become particularly interested in the condition of the crops on the prairies and in the interior of British Columbia, and this paper has tried its best to keep readers in touch with conditions as they arise from time to time, just as has been done in connection with the fish business.

The latest news, coming through on the wire Saturday, was that the prairie crop was likely to be as large, or very nearly as large as last year. This does not mean that the yield per acre will be as large, but that the total crop will be almost as large, the difference being made up by increased acreage, particularly in the western part of the prairie country.

This, of course, means much to this port. The indications are that in the territory from which we should expect to draw, the gross amount of grain offering for export is just as large, if not larger, than last year.

**Balanced Budget and  
Tax Reductions.**

The Government of Mackenzie King had two financial acts to its credit during its term of office. It changed an annual deficit to a balanced budget and also reduced taxes. One of these reductions came on the income tax and another as a reduction of duty on motor cars. Of course there were others, but these have been mentioned as outstanding examples.

The reduction of the auto tax does not mean any change in production and the manufacturers seem about as prosperous as ever. Yet they would like the Meighen Government to go back so that they might make some extra profits.

**Late Repentance in  
Fish Trap Licenses.**

Last year the Liberal member for this district promised the fishermen that he would see that no fish trap licenses were issued in this territory and he stuck to his word. Directly the Meighen Government came into power, the licenses were granted and the wishes of the fishermen in that respect flouted. Then Mr. Meighen found it impossible to expect any support here if he stuck to his position, so he struck his colors, pulled down his flag temporarily and ordered the licenses cancelled.

One of his lieutenants, speaking at the Westholme Theatre, declared that fishing would stop last Monday. It did not. Fishing was kept up as long as there were any fish to catch and then the order was given to stop. So next year, if Brady is elected, it may be expected that traps will be allowed again, further investigation that is promised having demonstrated by that time that traps should be used.

The fishermen have been clear on this matter. There is no need for further investigation. But they are only fishermen. The officials of the Conservative administration knew this condition exactly and it is no excuse for Mr. Meighen to say he did not know. The party knew, and their first act was to grant the licenses.

**Get on List of  
Voters This Week.**

It is announced that during this week people eligible to vote at the forthcoming election, but who are not yet registered may yet get their names on the list by applying in person to the revising officer, Norman Watt. Also any members of the family may be put on the list by any other member of the family.

By this time it should be known to most people whether they are registered or not. The political committees have both been working faithfully and if any are left off now it is their own fault. We strongly urge that every person eligible ascertain definitely if his or her name is on the list.

## CUSTOMS GRAFT AND LIBERALS

Action Was Taken by Mackenzie King Declares Manitoba Newspaper

The dates which have been given from the customs debate, taken from Hansard, show two things says the Manitoba Free Press. First, that from the fall of 1924, the King government, upon the request of citizens who considered themselves aggrieved, took a series of progressive steps toward the suppression of smuggling through the Port of Montreal. And second, that until the end of the year 1925, the Conservative opposition displayed no interest in the condition of corruption alleged to exist in the administration of the customs department.

From the fall of 1924 until the 10th of December, 1925, the King government took steps against smuggling which produced the following consequences:

- (1) Reform of the laws against smuggling.
- (2) Messages of appreciation of the government's efforts against smuggling sent to the government by commercial associations in eastern Canada.
- (3) The dismissal of J. E. Bisailion, of the Port of Montreal.
- (4) The obtaining by the King government of evidence which would enable them to make a thorough clean-out of the corruption existing in the administration of the customs laws.

The record of the King government's interest in having smuggling suppressed goes back, therefore, to 1924. The record of Mr. Stevens' interest in smuggling, the record of the Conservative party's interest in smuggling, begins officially on January 20, 1926, January of this year. Unofficially it begins a few weeks earlier, about December 5, 1925.

On January 20, 1926, Mr. Stevens placed a motion on the order paper of the House of Commons calling for an investigation into the prevention of smuggling. On December 5, 1925, public notice had been given in the newspapers that this motion was coming forward.

On November 27, 1925, Mr. Bovin, minister of customs, sent Detective Duncan to get evidence against Bisailion, the preventive office at Montreal; the evidence on which Bisailion was dismissed.

When Mr. Stevens gave notice of his motion on January 20, 1926, he asked for the production of the report made by Detective Duncan to Mr. Bovin, and request was so framed that it betrayed the fact that Mr. Stevens already knew the contents of that report.

Thus it was partly upon evidence secured by the King government's efforts and employees that Mr. Stevens based his attack upon the King government; and on George Bovin.

The gentleman who asked the King government to investigate smuggling in 1924 was a Mr. Sparks. In co-operation with the government Mr. Sparks became possessed of quantities of evidence regarding smuggling; and this evidence Mr. Stevens admits was passed on to him by Mr. Sparks.

When Mr. Sparks rose in the House on February 2, 1926, and denounced the King government, and denounced George Bovin, of the grossest misconduct in the customs administration, he did so on the strength of evidence which the King government itself, in its exertions against smuggling had been the principal party in obtaining; and in obtaining for the express purpose of renovating the conditions existing at the Port of Montreal. That is where Mr. Harry Stevens comes out when the record is examined. He is shown as a receiver of evidence gathered by the King government; he is shown making use of that evidence in a tremendous attack on the King government for the express purpose of bringing that government down and destroying the political career of George H. Bovin. He is shown making an attack which he could not have made had the King government not been engaged for more than a year in collecting evidence that would enable them to put smuggling down.

That is what the record shows—and the plain inference that is left with the reader is that it

### VICTIMS TELL OF EXPLOSION

Men Who Were Burned When Captain Fotland Lost Life Give Evidence

Their faces completely masked with bandages covering the burns they sustained in the explosion aboard the American halibut schooner Lincoln, Louis Tweeten and Hens Berg, members of the crew of the ill-fated vessel, gave their evidence this morning at the inquest in session before Coroner Dr. W. Sager of Port Simpson into the death of Capt. Martin Fotland, master of the boat. Other witnesses were Dr. J. P. Gade, Sgt. Hannah, John Fenness of the Imperial Oil Co. staff and A. M. Prince, forestry engineer. More witnesses are to be heard and shortly before 1 o'clock the inquest was adjourned until 2.30. In attendance at the inquest are G. A. Woodland, manager of the Imperial Oil Co. at whose dock the accident occurred, and L. W. Patmore, counsel for the company.

Dr. Gade stated that death was due to monoxide poisoning or suffocation and it had been almost instantaneous. The doctor described a number of burns on the body but stated they had not been the direct cause of death.

Louis Tweeten told of loading oil on the day in question about noon. One of the tanks had overflowed. Witness told of Capt. Fotland being overcome in the engine room and being removed therefrom and brought to. About half an hour later, the captain went down again to start the engine. Witness saw him priming the engine but could not see him throw in the switch. The flywheel had just been turned over slightly when the explosion occurred. The explosion, witness said, seemed to be in the fo'c'sle. He (witness) was about fifteen feet away from the engine room on the deck but he could see into the engine room. He was thrown on to the fish in the hatch from which he crawled, going up the ladder on to the wharf.

#### Overflow of Gas

Under examination by Mr. Patmore, Tweeten stated the boat was fast to the dock. It was not customary to loosen the lines until the engine was started. The engine room was located forward on the boat with the tanks around. The overflow of gasoline had been in the engine room and not on deck. It was quite a common occurrence, witness said, for the tanks to overflow when gas was being taken on. The valves feeding the oil into the tanks were controlled by the men on the boat, and they were responsible if there was an overflow. There were ventilators on the boat, one of these going out through a mast. The ventilators usually worked effectively. There was no fire in the cook stove which was aft on the boat nor was there a fire anywhere else. Witness said he had spoken to the captain after he had been overcome the first time. Fotland had mentioned "a funny taste in his mouth," but had not said anything about gasoline fumes nor had he said that he was afraid to go down into the engine room again. The boat sunk almost at once after the explosion.

The evidence of Hans Berg was largely similar to that of Tweeten.

### REV. E. G. TURNER ASKED TO REMAIN

At the regular Sunday evening service held in the Baptist Church yesterday, J. Harvey, as chairman of the board of deacons, presented a petition to the pastor, Rev. E. G. Turner, extensively signed by members of the church and congregation.

The petition expressed high appreciation of the work and leadership of the pastor, and the confidence and esteem in which he is held by all, and sincerely regretted his resignation as pastor of the church, and urged him to reconsider his action and if at all possible to continue his work and ministry in Prince Rupert.

Mr. Harvey in a few well chosen words voiced the feeling of the people toward the pastor which gave birth to the petition.

In receiving the petition Mr. Turner accepted it in the kindly feeling in which it was presented and promised it would receive his earnest consideration. The church will await his decision with hopeful anticipation.

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## BUMPER CROP PEACE RIVER

Seven Million Bushels Expected to be Shipped from District This Season.

The Peace River Record anticipates a seven million bushel crop of wheat in the north-westerly districts, with yields of from forty to fifty bushels per acre in some localities, says the Edmonton Bulletin.

That does not sound like a crop report from a country whose farmers had moved out and left their holdings to the jack rabbits and the tax-collectors.

The Peace River area lost population a few years ago. But the bulk of the farmers stayed, and they are being reinforced by a steady, if moderate, inflow of new settlers.

The inward movement is bound to increase with the years. So vast and fertile a region cannot be left with only a handful of homesteaders while population in other parts of the continent is congested to the point of making farming a doubtfully paying proposition.

Sir Henry Thornton set a deadline of ten million bushels of wheat, or the equivalent tonnage, as necessary before a direct railway line from Peace River to the Pacific would be economically feasible. That minimum may be reached sooner than he thought.

## THREE CORNER SEATS PUT MEIGHEN IN POWER

(Edmonton Bulletin). Liberals and Progressives in Manitoba and Saskatchewan have gathered wisdom from experience, and are refusing, in a very general way, to stage three-cornered contests for the benefit of their common enemy.

Of ten Conservatives who sat in Western seats in the late Parliament, three were elected by a majority of the votes polled in their ridings.

The other seven were presented with seats when and because the low tariff voters divided their strength and in trying to elect two rivals in each constituency could elect neither.

Had those seven seats been occupied by Liberals, or by Progressives who would stand true to their principles, the Mackenzie King Government would be still in power, and the continuance of the low tariff policy would not now be staked on the uncertain chances of a general election.

## MANITOBA AUDIENCES WERE BEWILDERED AND STUNNED BY MEIGHEN

(Manitoba Free Press)

Not much that was constructive marked Mr. Meighen's campaign speeches in Manitoba. He engaged himself promptly to so remodel the tariff as to permit the complete application of the protective principle, which was his tactful way of saying that he intended to increase it from fifty to one hundred per cent. Mr. Meighen's treatment of the tariff issue in his Manitoba speeches was not notable for its candor. He tried to make his hearers believe that his new model tariff would not be more protective than the existing tariff and that at the same time it would be much more protective. The present tariff—which averages around 24 per cent on dutiable imports—is not adequate; it must be replaced by a tariff as fully embodying "the protective principle" as does the United States tariff, which has an average rate of over 37 per cent; yet it is slander to say that he is in favor of a highly protectionist tariff; he is no more in favor of such a tariff than the Liberals are; they are just as protectionist as he is. Thus Mr. Meighen, to his Manitoba audiences, day after day, with increasing emphasis, until he left his hearers bewildered and stunned.

### LABOR MAN'S VIEW

Editor Daily News:

Kindly allow me a little space in co-operation of your effort in the present political battle for the future expansion of the port of Prince Rupert and the prosperity of its citizens. I wish to calmly review the uphill struggle Prince Rupert has encountered since its inception. To say the least Prince Rupert must be substantially founded to stand the strains it has been subjected to since the defeat of reciprocity and the untimely death of Sir Charles Hays. While I do not assume to be an Empire builder, still I think the brain that conceived the idea of opening up the second Canadian Pacific seaport ranked in the above mentioned class, while those that opposed it can only be viewed as party politicians amusing themselves by the thunder of their own voices, as it appears to be the true function of the Dominion Conservatives to loudly oppose in the name of patriotism every effort of Canadian expansion.

### Thundered and Roared

We all remember how the Conservatives thundered and roared against Hon. Wm. Fielding and the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier during the reciprocity campaign of 1914, characterizing them as secessionists and traitors, because a Liberal government of that day arranged a reciprocity pact with the government of United States on the free exchange of the product of the sea and farm, such as fish, meat, spuds, etc. Imagine the position of Prince Rupert under a trade agreement of that kind situated as we are at the doorway of Alaska with a line of steel connecting us with every city in United States and Canada with free access to every market. ## MINIMUM WAGE BILL EFFECTIVE

Annual Report Just Presented Shows Work Done Behalf of Girls

VICTORIA, Aug. 23.—An interesting record of useful work accomplished on behalf of female employees in the province is given in the annual report of the minimum wage board, which has just been presented to Hon. A. M. Manson, Minister of Labor.

The number of female employees coming under the Act is given as 13,899, in the service of 2,804 firms. The average weekly wage of adult and skilled female workers in the province was \$17.38, and for employees who had not completed their training the average was \$10.34.

Although an employer may be permitted to have 35 per cent of his employees classed as inexperienced and paid on a lower scale, this provision was taken advantage of only to the extent of 12.36 per cent of the total number of female employees in the province.

## STORK WRITES TO J. C. BRADY

Put Him Right on Fish Trap Matters in Connection With Misrepresentations in South

The following letter in connection with fish traps has been written by Fred Stork, Liberal candidate to J. C. Brady, Conservative standard bearer in this election:
