Under the present set-up the city pays the full cost of maintaining the jail and also pays the RCMP for policing the city. Some persons sentenced to small terms are kept in jail here instead of being sent to Oakalla, which is a provincial institution.

//TUUM EST" is the motto of the University of British Columbia, and on Nov. 1 this institution will be able to look back proudly on thirty years of spirited adherence to the words.

"It's up to you" is the free translation, and UBC students have taken it literally. It was just thirty years ago when, tired of living in huts, tents, church basements and attics, they staged a demonstration which culminated in a grant by the provincial government to the university of \$1,500,000.

UBC was reborn, but not yet rebuilt. This the student body accomplished almost by hand, starting on the West Point Grey site in Vancouver that was then more forest than campus. In the next twenty years the determined scholars constructed four of the main buildings as well as the athletic playing fields.

When the war ended they decided to build a provincial memorial to the men and women of B.C. who served in the armed forces. The result was the most modern gymnasium in Canada, valued at more than \$1,000,000.

The whole province is proud of the university and the spirit that produced it. May the inspiration of "Tuum Est" long continue.

Paying Medical Bills

THERE are few of us so well or so immune from the physical hazards of life that we can survive our span without at one time or another requiring the attention of a doctor.

When this time does arrive the first concern of the patient is often not so much what is wrong as how it is going to be paid for. Elimination of this worry is the purpose of the Medical Services Association, an independent non-profit organization which carries out the administrative functions of a prepaid medical service plan.

As extensive use is made of M-S-A throughout the province, a joint announcement just released by this organization and the B.C. division of the Canadian Medical Association is of considerable interest to a large section of the public. The announcement is made as the result of a general misunderstanding about the relationship between M-S-A and doctors of the province.

Observing that the two groups are independent of each other but that the success of the prepaid medical care plan depends upon their absolute cooperation, it clarifies the services to which M-S-A members are entitled and the position of the doctor in general practice who provides such services.

The announcement is well-advised as it contains reassurance for the doubtful that doctors are in no way endeavoring to skirt around M-S-A with extra charges, and at the same time it cautions members on the procedure that must be followed when extra attention is required, such as that involved by calling in a specialist.

In explaining their respective positions and emphasizing their mutual good faith in these positions, the M-S-A and the B.C. division, CMA, have taken a step which is certain to be appreciated by the many in the province who are concerned.



After his partner opened the bidding with one heart, Mr. Abel looked at his hand and properly figured that he was too strong to bid one no-trump and not quite strong enough to bid two no-trump. Therefore he correctly decided to make the waiting bid of two clubs.

This two-over-one call is forcing for one round and possibly Mr. Champion's rebid would clarify the situation. Mr. Champion's rebid was two diamonds and while Mr. Abel would have preferred to hear a two spade bid, he still was justified in making one more try with a bid H-Q 7 2 of two no-trump. Mr. Champion also had little left over and he went on to three.

If Mr. Muzzy had held the South cards his probable first bid would be two no-trump. "I have nothing in my partner's bid and honors in all three of the other suits," would be his reasoning. If he were asked why he didn't respond two clubs he would answer, "I don't want to play clubs. I don't think this is a 'club' hand."

Americans Reap Profit From Canada

OTTAWA (P) -- Many United States investors in Canadian securities are disposing of their holdings to reap big profits through Canada's high-flying dollar, say federal officials.

This has sparked a reversal of the flow of capital through security transactions. Last year the emphasis was on heavy movement into Canada. This year the reverse is true.

International sales of securities, such as stocks and bonds, declined to \$368,000,000 during the first eight months of 1952 from \$372,660,000 last year, while purchases from other countries increased to \$409,900,000 from | \$311,600,000, the Bureau of Stat istics reported.

With securities sales down and purchases up, Canada had a net purchase balance of \$41,900,000 in international transactions for the eight-month period. This compares with a sales balance of \$61,000,000 a year ago. The bulk of Canada's transactions is with

Reason for the reversal, officials said, is that many American investors purchased Canadian bonds and stocks at a time when the Canadian dollar was under par. With the dollar now well above par, they are disposing of their holdings in Canadian markets and turning their Canadian dollars into bigger amounts of American currency.

This means a heavy movement of capital out of Canada. But security transactions form only part of total capital movement. Direct investiment in such Canadian developments as oil drilling, mining and manufacturing is still heavy and officials said is currently running at just below the rate of \$300,000,000 a year net inflow achieved in 1951.







HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Cecil B. DeMille, still leading a vigorous pace at 71, is planning his next Biblical epic to hit the screens in 1955. His next project will be The 10 Commandments."

'About this time next year, I expect to have a crew shooting backgrounds in Egypt," he said. 'We plan to shoot at Mount Sinai and other real locations, and I may go along. The following spring, 1954, I will start the filming of the story here in Hollywood. That will take about six months, and the cutting and scoring takes about a year, That will bring us into late 1955.

"The actual shooting is the easiest part of making a picture. It is here in the production of fice that the picture is really created. A good story is everything. If you have that, the director and the stars do not make much difference. They can help the picture a little or hurt it a little. But they can't make a good script into a bad picture or a bad script into a good pic-




