MATTER DISCUSSED BY WRITER IN ENGLISH NEWSPAPER SHOWING CURIOUS CUSTOMS OF EAST

The English are, after all, not singular in taking it for granted that their equally sure that the relations between the sexes are conducted on a far more decent and sensible basis in India than in any Western country. This was amusingly illustrated by a letter published last month by Mr. Gandhi in his weekly "Young India." The letter was from a Hindu of position, who felt called upon to remonstrate with Mr. Gandhi because he has taken the or portunity presented by a shocking case of the murder or suicide of a child-wife to denounce the practice of child-marriage, arguing more suo (a) that the Hindu Scriptures give no sanction to the custom, and (b) that even if they do so they are wrong. The writer of the letter relied chiefly on the argument that since the Hindu social system is notoriously more successful than the European in producing virtue and happiness, therefore child-marriage must be a good arrangement.

POSITION OF GANDHI

Mr. Gandhi, as he was to be expected of a man of his humanity, declined to enter into odious comparisons between Europe and India in respect of sexual morality. But even he let it appear that he regards "courtship" as an evil or at least as a danger which a wellregulated society should render unnecessary. Like his correspondent, he does not appear to recognize any special injustice in compelling the boy or girl to take the consequences of the parents errors of judgment, and like his correspondent he seems to regard it as probable that the average parent will choose more wisely than the children.

Perhaps Mr. Gandhi is right. A lawyer might not care to defend the validity of the reasons for which boys and girls choose each other. But then perhaps the will to make a success of an experiment for which they are themselves responsible should count for something. And do the parents choose so wisely? Relationship, the horoscope, wealth, and education, viewed principally, but not entirely, as a means towards securing income, are the considerations by which the Hindu parents' choice is usually guided, and the tendency to treat matchmaking as an occasion for hard bargaining is very marked. The parents of the girl are often placed at a cruel disadvantage by the fact that the girl must be married before she first attains maturity, wretchedness of hosts of little girls while a boy's marriage can be postponed indefinitely. How the system works in practice may be understood from the following case.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural land, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made en printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Free, or partly free permits are available for settlers campers and travellers, up to ten
