# RATE ON COAL

EDMONTON NEWSPAPER ASKS GOV-ERNMENT OF ALBERTA TO MAKE DRIVE FOR REDUCTION TO RUPERT

The Edmonton Journal has an editorial article advocating the building up of coal trade with Vancouver and adds: There seem to be about all the physical conditions present for building up a very large coal trade with Vancouver. What is true regarding that port is also true in measure regarding Prince Rupert, which is very much farther from Nanaimo, its present base of supply.

The article continues to say that while there seems to be nothing doing in response to the efforts to get Alberta coal into Ontario, here is a market right to hand. It urges the government of Alberta to make a drive for such a reduction in freight rates on coal as would land Alberta coal in Vancouver and Prince Rupert at a "selling" price.







#### SPORT CHAT

Along the Kansas-Oklahoma border where straight shooting always has been more or less an accomplishment of the citizenry, live five brothers whose ability to shoot straight has brought them international recognition. Unlike the Dalton boys, the Etchen brothers of Coffeyville, Kansas-Fred, Frank, Charles, Will and Al-acquired their reputation by shooting at clay pigeons. Fred Etchen, a member of the United States Olympic team several years ago, won the International Flyer Championship for the season of 1926. He is both singles and doubles champion of Kansas, the first man to hold both titles at once, and formerly was national doubles champion. Frank, Will, Charles, and Al Etchen also have numerous trapshooting titles tucked away to their credit, and as a team with Fred they have brought hundreds of prizes to Coffeyville. Fred Etchen is a southpaw gunner.

Every time an automobile racer beats the previous speed record on the Cleveland-Akron speedway at North Hampton, Ohio, he establishes a world record, because the speedway is said to be the only half mile wooden bowl in the world. The speedway is so small in circumference, that on the curves it stands up at a 45-degree angle. On the straight-aways, its angle is 231/2 degrees. 





### FORMER LOCAL MEN RESCUED FAMOUS ACTOR

CAPT. BABINGTON AND NORMAN BROADHURST FISHED MATHESON LANG OUT OF CHILLY WATERS.

The following item published recently in a southern exchange told how two former well known Prince Rupert tug boat men figured in the rescue of Matheson Lang, a famous actor, from a cold, wet, real-life melodrama of a sudden immersion in the chilly waters of Erentwood Arm near Victoria:
