NATIVE SONS URGE CAUSE OF CANADIANISM

MACKENZIE KING LIKELY TO BE INVITED TO CONTEST A VANCOUVER SEAT

Subordinate Party Sentiment to Cause of Canadianism in Election Say the Native Sons

VANCOUVER, July 10.—A challenge to the people of the dominion to subordinate party sentiment to the "greater cause of Canadianism" in the approaching elections was delivered by several speakers at the banquet last night to delegates attending the Native Sons of Canada convention.

"No living person can tell what is to be the future of the British Commonwealth, but whatever happens Canada must go on," declared G. F. Jamieson, of Lethbridge, in appealing for a sincere genuine national spirit. "We must build Canada into a composite whole," he said, and advocated compulsory naturalization of all newcomers to this country.

GEOFFREY E. McCROSSAN, of Vancouver, scored the colonial imperialists declaring that if they could only realize the aspirations of the Native Sons of Canada they would back the movement heart and soul to develop a Canadian national consciousness. "If it is not developed Canada faces disintegration," he said. "Canada could be a nation and still belong to the British Commonwealth," he added.

**TWO KILLED
BY LIGHTNING**

Father and Son Lose Their Lives, While Those Between Were Uninjured.

BELLEVILLE, Ont., July 10.—Wellington Bowers, his son Harold, 23, of Rossmore, Ont., were killed and five others seriously injured when lightning struck the Orange Hall at Redinersville, five miles from here last night. Deafening work was going on in the hall at the time, young Bowers having just been initiated when killed.

Thirty men were in the room at the time when a terrific crash was followed by a burst of flames. The father and son were standing 25 feet apart when they were killed, while others between escaped.

RUTH SCORES 27TH HOMER

Yankees Keep Pace With Philadelphia Athletics By Winning Yesterday.

NEW YORK, July 10.—The Yankees kept up with the fast coming Philadelphia Athletics yesterday by defeating Cleveland, while the Athletics were beating Chicago in ten innings. Babe Ruth piled out his 27th homer, while his team mate, Paschal, also hit four bases.

St. Louis batted five Washington pitchers hard before winning out by a score of four to three. New York Giants crept a little closer to the top of the National League by taking a double header from the leading Cincinnati Reds.

ATTEMPT TO CLIMB ALASKAN MOUNTAIN

McCarthy Expedition Fails to Reach Top of Mt. Fairweather, Near Cordova.

CORDOVA, July 10.—An attempt to climb 13,292 feet to the top of Mount Fairweather, an unscaled peak east of here failed, Andrew Taylor, guide of the McCarthy party, upon reaching here announced. He and Captain McCarthy, of Summit, N. J., Allan Carp, of New York, and Dr. Ladd, a Canadian, were blocked in their efforts to scale the mountain when they encountered a canyon 3,000 feet up the mountain.

CONFIDENCE VOTE FRENCH GOVERNMENT

Mackenzie King May Contest Vancouver Centre Constituency Against Stevens in Election

VANCOUVER, July 10.—The Vancouver Sun of last evening states that prominent Liberals are striving to have a unanimous nomination tendered to former Premier King to contest Vancouver Centre against Hon. H. H. Stevens and that if these two men have their way Mr. Mackenzie King will be given the opportunity of accepting or refusing after the meeting of the Liberal executive on Tuesday next.

It is pointed out by local logical seat for Mackenzie King to return to Parliament from and that Mr. Stevens, who was responsible for the Liberal chairman's resignation, will have to fight for the seat should the ex-premier accept the nomination.

VANCOUVER MAN IS NEW SUPERINTENDENT PRINCE GEORGE POWER

PRINCE GEORGE, July 10.—From out of a list of sixty-one applications from all parts of the province, David G. Sutherland of Vancouver has been appointed by the city council as superintendent of the local power plant. A. D. Birrell of Vanderhoof was named as second choice. Among the applicants was Alex Nash, former superintendent, who resigned a month ago. He wanted \$25 a month more salary.

ONTARIO SUFFERS BIG THUNDERSTORM

Buildings Blown Down and Wire Service Interfered With—No Casualties Reported.

LONDON, Ont., July 10.—Western Ontario was visited last night with severe electric storms, accompanied by heavy rain and a strong wind. Barns were unearthened, buildings were blown down and wire service is crippled in many sections. Near Waterloo the storm reached cyclonic proportions. No casualties are reported.

WONDERFUL SCORING IN THIRD TEST MATCH AUSTRALIAN CRICKET

LEEDS, Eng., July 10.—Australia scored 334 runs for three wickets in the first inning of the third test match with England today. McCartney and Woodful, of Australia, made 150 and 118 respectively.

WON CHAMPIONSHIP ON FOUL IN FOURTH

NEW YORK, July 10.—Pete Latso, of Scranton, was offered the world's welterweight championship when he was declared victor on a foul over Georgie Levine, of New York, in the fourth of a fifteen round match.

"BILLY" MCINNES IS BACK IN VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, July 10.—W. W. McInnes, former county judge here and at one time Governor of the Yukon, who has been in Ottawa for the past five years practicing as Parliamentary agent, has returned to Vancouver to resume his law practice.

SMITHERS MAN LOST HIS LIFE

A. McNaught Fell From Bridge Over Bulkley River and Was Drowned Yesterday.

SMITHERS, July 10.—Andrew McNaught, a member of the crew of men replacing the bridge over the Bulkley River close to town lost his life yesterday when he fell backwards into the river and was drowned. He tried his best to reach shore but his heavy clothing hampered his movements and he gave up before help could reach him.

A search was made for the body farther down stream but the current is strong and doubt is expressed if it will be found for some time.

Mr. McNaught was a member of the Native Sons of Canada and also an Oddfellow. He had lived in the district for many years, but his relatives are unknown here and are believed not to live in Canada.

The scene of yesterday's accident was the same as where Thos. Dunlop, district road engineer, lost his life by drowning two years ago.

FIRST GUN IN POLITICAL WAR

Hon. W. R. Motherwell Reviews Government's Action and Stevens Customs Charges.

WINNIPEG, July 10.—Hon. W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture in the late Liberal Government, fired the first gun in the federal election campaign in Manitoba in an address before the Liberal executive and other prominent Liberals yesterday. He devoted his address to an extensive review of the action of the King Government in connection with the customs irregularities and charged that H. H. Stevens, whose action in the House precipitated the customs probe, secured 90 per cent of his information from the King Government special investigator and that Stevens had in some manner secured access to the Duncan report before that report reached the minister of customs.

HUDSON BAY LINE IS NOT A FACTOR IN THE ELECTION

OTTAWA, July 10.—The likelihood of the Hudson Bay line being used as a factor in the present campaign is set aside by the statement that both sides pledged themselves to its construction. During the last election Hon. Arthur Meighen promised to set aside three million dollars in the estimates to carry on the work and that was exactly the sum voted by the House at the last session.

Must Live Together.

With little notice and without any desire on our part, we have once more been plunged into an election contest. We have to take sides. The man who does not do so is not usually respected. He must have opinions in regard to the Government of his country although he need not necessarily express them.

Today we in Prince Rupert are dividing on political lines, but it is well to remember that the election campaign is of but short duration and that we all have to live together after it is over. In other words, while we should have the courage of our convictions, we do not need to make ourselves objectionable to our neighbors by trying to thrust those opinions down their throats.

Prince Rupert people have of late learned to respect each other's opinions and to be just as friendly with those from whom they differ as with those with whom they side politically. Let us try to elect our man but do it good-naturedly. Let us not take the matter too seriously, for after all, the world will keep revolving on its axis no matter which petty political party parades its plumes at Ottawa.

Give One Side
a Clear Majority.

"Let us give one side a clear majority and end this system of allowing a third party to dictate," says the wise citizen in discussing the present situation. If the speaker is a Conservative, he means "let us elect the Conservatives," and if he is a Liberal he means to say: "Send the Liberals back and we'll show you how to govern."

It is difficult to see how there is going to be much change unless it is in the direction of Liberalism.

Beginning to Feel
Result of Activity.

Business conditions in Prince Rupert are improving. This is due largely to the activity of the neighborhood surrounding the city. The Queen Charlotte Islands are reported to be particularly busy and the fishermen are all making catches of varying size and value.

Ganneries of the district are spending more money in the city than ever before and this is being appreciated by local merchants who feel that they have a claim to a share of the business.

The prospect of grain shipping this fall adds to the feeling of optimism and the result should be an increasing confidence in the future of the port.

Which Steamship
Line Will Come?

It is pretty certain that before long some steamship line will commence to operate vessels regularly out of this port to the Orient. With grain and lumber cargoes offering, it ought to be possible to take out cargoes and bring back general Oriental merchandise which is being shipped through to Eastern points. The wonder is that no steps have been taken ere this to organize such a business.

From time to time there are rumors that Japanese lines are planning to come here and other lines have been mentioned including the Canadian Government Merchant Marine. Which will be the pioneer?





WATERFRONT WHIFFS

New boats will be built for halibut fleet—salmon fishing improves considerably—fishermen's contest at Ketchikan

Between now and the opening of the 1927 halibut fishing season it is expected that several new schooners will be added to the Canadian fleet operating out of this port. This will, no doubt, be one of the effects of the present successful season which is proving profitable and encouraging to all the boats engaged in fishing. Even some American fishermen are said to be talking of building boats here and operating them under Canadian registry.

One local boatbuilder reported this week that he had been approached by no less than seven persons who contemplated building new halibut boats. Within the next five years it is predicted that the present Canadian halibut fleet may be tripled in size. This will mean a great deal of boatbuilding activity here and the coming winter may quite possibly see even greater work along this line undertaken than in the past nine months during which time, according to estimates that have been made, boatbuilding to a total value of over \$100,000 was done inside Cow Bay.

The new seine boat and packer built by N. M. McLean for J. Field was launched last Saturday night, and early next week will be completed and ready for engine installation. The vessel, which is being named the "Northern Exchange," has already been chartered to the B. C. Packers and will be operated out of that company's new Skidegate Inlet cannery during the coming season.

The forestry boat Red Cedar was in port from the Queen Charlotte Islands during the past week for engine and electrical repairs.

Bill the Diver, of Kelpie fame, has been busy this week giving Stan Taylor's palatial rowboat a party of eleven, including, beside Dr. and Mrs. Rich, Dr. Charles Baker, celebrated American lecturer, and two other medical men and their ladies. The vessel left Friday morning for Ketchikan.

Salmon Fishing Improves
There has been a great improvement during the past week in salmon fishing on the Skeena River. The average jumped from 8 sockeye to the boat to 56 and, according to latest reports, the run was still further improving. The spring fishing picked up toward the end of last week, but is reported to have fallen off again.
