## GAME DEPARTMENT IS BEING REORGANIZED

### J. C. ELLIOTT ACCEPTS POSITION AS MINISTER OF LABOR IN KING CABINET

#### Reorganization of Game Administration is Being Carried Out in District

**Sergeant Van Dyk to have charge for Northern British Columbia with headquarters at Prince Rupert under new game inspector**

The new scheme of game protection as planned by Colonel McMillin is being rapidly worked out and within a few months it is understood that the reorganization of the department under chief game inspector Faber will be an accomplished fact.

For this district, Prince Rupert being the headquarters, Sergeant Van Dyk of Prince George has been appointed in charge of the game administration. His appointment is to date from April 1, when he will report here and will take charge of the game administration of the whole of District B, which is practically the whole of Northern British Columbia north of the Canadian National Railway.

#### LOCAL TIMBER IN HUGE DEAL

Three Billion Feet of Graham Island Spruce Figures in Transaction Now Under Way

Three billion feet of spruce timber in the Massett Inlet district of the Queen Charlotte Islands figures in one of the greatest timber and property deals in the history of the province whereby New York and Florida millionaires are acquiring extensive sawmill and timber holdings in the province, mostly on the southern mainland. The deal also includes a shingle mill site on Coal Harbor near Vancouver and a mill site on Lulu Island opposite New Westminster and sundry other assets of the old British Timber Corporation of this province. One of the first developments following the deal, it is stated, will be the construction of a sawmill on the Fraser River site.

#### BRING EGGERS CANADA SOON

Complaint Already Laid as Part of Formal Proceedings Against Illegal Hi-Jacker

TACOMA, March 9.—Proceedings for the extradition to Canada of Milo Eggers to stand trial for alleged liquor hi-jacking offenses against the British Columbia government started with the filing of a complete complaint against Eggers by Bert Ross of Seattle, acting for the Canadian authorities.

#### BODY FOUND IN A CELLAR

Yukon Wood Chopper Missing Since February 12 is Discovered

DAWSON, March 9.—The body of Charles Smith, a wood chopper, missing here since February 12, was found hidden in the cellar of Henry Davis, 68 miles below Fort Selkirk, it is learned here.

Davis has been charged with murder and taken to Fort Selkirk where an inquest will be held, probably on Saturday.

#### LOCAL CHURCH EXTENDS CALL

Rev. Phillip Duncan, B.A. of Dauphin, Manitoba, is Invited to Come Here.

Members of the First Presbyterian Church at a congregational meeting in the church last night decided unanimously to extend a call to Rev. Phillip Duncan, B.A., pastor of the Union Church in Dauphin, Manitoba, to fill the vacancy in the local pastorate caused by the resignation some months ago of Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant who went to Fort William. The motion to this effect was proposed by D. G. Stewart and seconded by S. K. Campbell. Besides the mover and seconder, F. G. Dawson also spoke in favor of the motion. Rev. H. C. Fraser acted as moderator of the meeting and D. C. McRae was secretary.

Mr. Duncan, who is being communicated with at once by wire and from whom a reply is expected shortly, has been highly recommended to the local congregation from various sources, one so recommending him being Rev. Prof. F. W. Kerr, formerly pastor of the local church and now pastor of Knox Presbyterian Church in Winnipeg.

#### BOXER MAY BE FLOATED OFF

Attempt Will be Made to Move Her from Rocks Tomorrow Morning on High Tide

TO BE BROUGHT HERE.

Deckload of Ties Being Removed in Order to Lighten Her Before Attempt Made

The United States government auxiliary schooner Boxer, which went ashore on a reef of White Cliff Island Saturday morning, was still fast there this afternoon but it is hoped that she may be taken off tomorrow morning about 10 o'clock on the high tide. A southeast wind is now rising and, in order to avoid further damage, no time is being lost in the attempt to free the vessel. The United States government ships Unalga and Cygan are still standing by and the local tug M.T.3 with scow is lightening the vessel of her deckload of ties for the Alaska railroad. The Boxer, whose forefoot is known to be damaged, will probably be brought here for inspection as soon as she is freed. Capt. Whitlam is the master of the vessel.

#### Huge British Columbia Fruit and Vegetable Packing Merger Tentatively Arranged in South

VICTORIA, March 9.—The Victoria Times says: "Tentative plans for one of the largest mergers of British Columbia fruit and vegetable packing interests ever attempted is under way today. If negotiations now under way are pushed to a successful conclusion, upwards of ten canning and packing firms from Ashcroft through the Okanagan Valley to the coast and including possibly two Vancouver Island concerns will merge their executive and finances for a joint sales deal in the markets of the world."

#### REALTY DEALS CONSUMMATED

Atkins House on Fourth Ave. Sold to Dr. Cade and Bannister House to Donald McLeod

An important realty deal was recently closed through the office of M. M. Stephens & Co. Ltd., whereby Dr. J. P. Cade became the owner of the Atkins residence at the corner of Fourth Avenue and Dunsmuir Street. It is understood that a figure in the neighborhood of \$8,000 was involved in the deal which was a cash transaction. The new owner will take possession in the fall, J. S. Rogers at present having a lease on the property until September.

#### TOWERS WIN HOCKEY GAME

Amateur Champions of B.C. Take First Game from Alberta Champs.

KIMBERLEY ALSO WINS

VANCOUVER, Mar. 9.—In the first of two games in the Allan Cup elimination series the Vancouver Towers, the senior B.C. amateur hockey champions defeated Camrose, holders of the Alberta title, four goals to two. The next game takes place Wednesday.

In the first game to decide the intermediate championship of British Columbia Kimberley defeated Vancouver Seaforths, nine goals to four.

#### MINE EXPLOSION ENTOMBS TWENTY NINE KNOWN DEAD

EGGLES, Wya., March 9.—Nine miners are known to be dead as the result of an explosion in a coal mine near here last night. Twenty others are entombed.

#### Elliott Joins Government of W. L. Mackenzie King at Ottawa as Labor Minister

OTTAWA, March 9.—John Campbell Elliott, K.C., member for West Middlesex, is appointed a privy councillor and minister of labor in the government of Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King. He was sworn in before the Governor-General in the presence of Premier King at Government House last night.

Writs have been issued for the by-election in West Middlesex, nominations to take place on March 22 and polling a week later.

Hon. Mr. Elliott returned to his home in London, Ontario, to prepare for the campaign for his election should he be opposed.

#### FAIR TO OPEN SEPTEMBER 14

Date Selected at Meeting of Exhibition Board Last Night—Appointment of Secretary Deferred

September 14 to 18 inclusive were selected dates for the Prince Rupert Exhibition by the Fair Board at a meeting last evening.

The appointment of a managing secretary which was to have been decided upon last night was deferred for a week. There are four applications for the position, the applicants being J. O. Williamson, W. W. Wright, David Thompson and R. E. Grieve, all of Prince Rupert.

A committee was appointed by the board to confer with the Gyro Club on the matter of a hayseed ball which it was planned to hold early next month. The Gyros have announced that they will hold a hoe-down dance on April 9 and the idea is to reach a compromise which will separate the dates of the two affairs.

#### JEALOUS FOR ALASKA HONOR

Grand Jury at Cordova Deprecates Political Attacks on Citizens of Territory

CORDOVA, March 9.—The federal grand jury at the closing of their term here yesterday recommended the stationing of a coast-guard cutter in Prince William Sound to help prevent wrecks.

The jury also deplored as "untruthful and unwarranted" attacks lately made in Washington upon Alaskan officials. The charges were branded as "malicious falsehoods made only to gain political ends or to get rid of political opponents." The report further declared the moral character of Alaskans in respect to law enforcement was excellent.

#### PREMIER MINE PAYING AGAIN

Quarterly Dividend of \$400,000 Declared as Result of Operation of Rich Local Property

Another \$400,000 quarterly dividend has been declared for shareholders in the Premier Gold Mining Co. Ltd. which operates the famous Premier mine in the Portland Canal district. This dividend amounts to 8c per \$1 share and means an annual dividend of 32 per cent. It brings the total dividends paid by the mine since its operation started of nearly \$9,000,000.

### Liquor Smuggling Seems To Be Less.

Judging from reports received, it would seem as if the liquor smuggling into the United States is becoming less. A despatch published yesterday tells of means taken by the United States to cope with the traffic and of the wonderful decrease in business off the Atlantic coast. Similar means have been taken in the Pacific and the result has been that business has not been brisk in export trade from ports which ship to the south, such as Vancouver and Victoria.

With the increasing difficulty of importing liquor, the amount of strong stuff sold in the United States must decrease. Much of that peddled now is synthetic mixture which is deadly in its effects. So bad has it become that people who think anything of the care of their bodies refuse to use any of it.

### Whipping Boys For Stealing Cars.

Edmonton juvenile court ordered the whipping of two boys convicted of stealing cars for the purpose of joy riding. The offense was a double one, that of stealing a car and also of endangering the public. A few sentences of that kind and the tendency to treat the property of others lightly would disappear.

### League Of Nations Again In Session.

The League of Nations is again in session and is attracting more than the usual amount of interest. The request of the British Dominions for representation on the council and the admission of Germany all tend to draw the eyes of the world to that important body. The adoption by the United States of the World Court idea and the tendency of that country to favor extension of the international movement all lends importance to the greatest of international bodies. Step by step the League of Nations seems to be winning its way to popular world favor. If it is conducted wisely it may yet come to be the great international arbiter.

### Stealing Rides From The Railway.

A greater effort is to be made by the railway to prevent the stealing of rides on the trains. People who have plenty of money in their pockets and who can well afford to pay are being picked up in box cars and on the buffers. The carrying of these people free is depriving the company of income which is rightly theirs, it is making it more difficult to operate the line so that employees have to be laid off, and it is dangerous to the people who take chances of meeting with accidents.

It is also announced that the pilfering on the line has to stop and special men have on hand the work of checking it. All this will make for greater efficiency.

### Hard To Replace Art Products.

Every now and then we hear of a fire which has consumed valuable art products. For the property value destroyed which money can replace, there is no particular regret, but the art collections cannot be replaced. They are a product that cannot be manufactured at will. Art works of the great masters have a value far beyond that set by the art dealers. When they are lost the loss is irreplaceable.

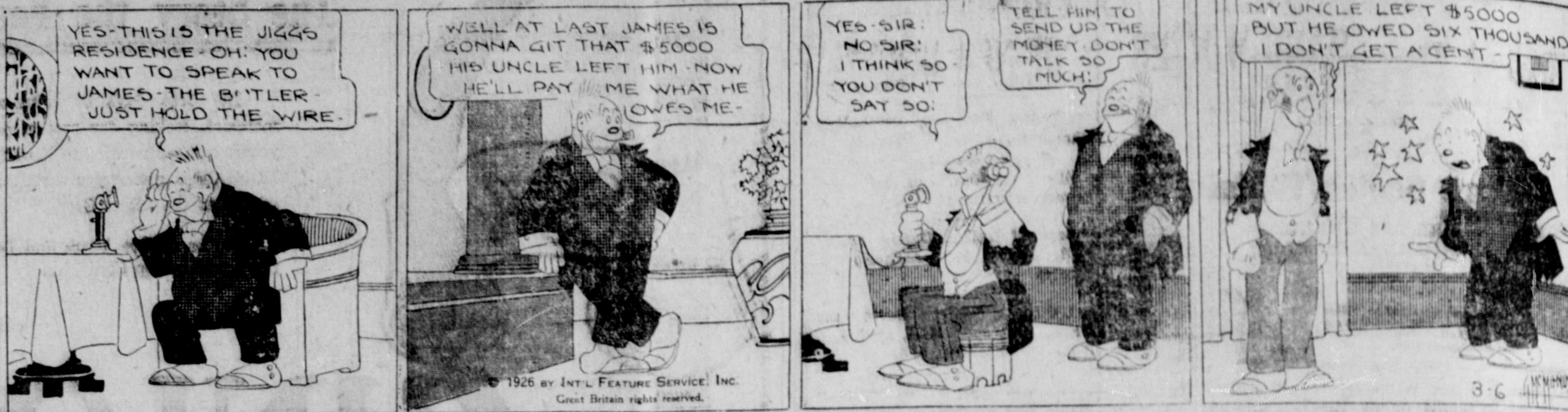

RUSH BUILDINGS FOR HEBRIDEANS

Go up Vermilion District of Alberta at Rate of Six a Day

EDMONTON, March 6.—With April set for the completion of the farm buildings being constructed for Hebridean settlers in the Vermilion district, the Slave-Loch Sino Company, with which the contract rests, is preparing for a phenomenal building feat. There are a hundred houses, each with a barn, to be erected. By the end of this week it is expected that they will be going up at the rate of six, and perhaps eight a day.

J. H. Bluechel, manager of the company, states that this will be an unrivalled accomplishment in the field of construction. Not a nail will be used in the work, the rapid setting up of the buildings being possible because of the locking staves which render the process of their erection merely one of laying these staves together, one on top of the other. Ordinarily, it is said, one to two days is considered a short time in which to place a house together.

Four on Each House

Four men will be employed on each house, the entire crew that will eventually be on the ground numbering about 60 men. Before this final building can be inaugurated it will be necessary to have all the material at hand, and it is with this task that the men are at present occupied.

There will be about a million feet of lumber used, all of which has to be hauled by wagon distances varying from eight to fifteen miles, entailing the services of 40 teams. 600,000 shingles alone are called for, along with a full car of roofing materials. In addition an entire car load of staves leaves the Clarke factory, daily, for Vermilion.

The total cost of the houses and barns will be \$700,000; each house and barn having, therefore, a combined cost of \$700. All of the houses consist of four rooms apiece.

INDIANS HAD HARD WINTER

Mounted Police Brought Back Word From Barren Islands of Plight of Caribou Eaters

FORT SMITH, N.W.T., March 9.—After a five-day journey into the heart of the wind-swept Barren Lands, a Mounted Police patrol arrived back in Fort Smith with two half-starved Indian women from the camps of the Caribou Eater tribe in the unknown terrain to the east of the Slave River.

The Mounties made the trip to the hunters' tepees, but found that the main body of the starving tribe were much further out than stated in the casual reports of other Indians. Therefore, they were forced to return for more provisions for both men and dogs, bringing the women found in the first camp with them.

Accompanied by two half-breeds, Corporal Blake left again with dog teams loaded with provisions for the Caribou Eaters, on a hike which is expected to last twenty days. The sun is blinding in March and therefore the mushers are equipped with colored glasses to prevent snow blindness.

It is reported here that the caribou herds in migrating further south swung away east of the Caribou Eaters' hunting grounds. Starvation resulted for the Indians. All their dogs were either killed for food or died off, but they hung to their camps, hoping that the caribou might turn their way, or that the "mocassin" telegraph would carry word of their plight to the settlements.

## NIBBLES FOR P.G.E. LINE

Premier Says no Concrete Offer Received as Yet. Would Confer with Ottawa

VICTORIA, Mar. 9. — "I have received what I might call nibbles so far," Premier Oliver said yesterday of reports that capitalists are now angling for the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and concomitant land subsidies.

While no concrete proposals have been laid before the Government as yet, representatives of several groups of capitalists have waited upon the Premier recently to discuss with him the prospect of taking over the railroad, it is understood.

For the second time, Premier Oliver telegraphed to Ottawa to ask for a definite appointment with the Federal Government to discuss British Columbia's requests for the return of the Peace River block to Provincial control for use in subsidizing the construction of a railway into the Peace River district.

This action followed the arrival of a telegram from Hon. Charles Stewart, Federal Minister of the Interior, suggesting that the Premier postpone his visit because the present recess is an unsatisfactory time in which to take up the land question.

The Premier intends to meet the Government at the earliest possible date and is eager to secure an appointment without delay after the House reassembles.
