TUBERCULOSIS AMONG NATIVES

One-fifth of White Plague Deaths in Province Among Indians

VANCOUVER, Sept. 16—While the Indian population of British Columbia is but one-twenty-second of the total, the natives contributed one-fifth of the tuberculosis death in the province last year. It has been known for many years that tuberculosis had quite a hold on the Indians, but to what extent has, up to the present, never been definitely determined.

Realizing that this situation existed, the federal department of public health and Indian affairs did this year set aside certain moneys to carry on health investigation work among the natives. Studies will be made in many sections of Canada with a view to ascertaining the incidence of tuberculosis among the red men. Trachoma will also be studied, as this disease has secured a foothold on the Indian reserves, causing much suffering and blindness, partial and total.

The work in British Columbia was carried on under the direction of Dr. W. H. Hill, professor of public health and nursing at the University of British Columbia, assisted by men who were specialists in these diseases. Investigation was undertaken at the Indian settlement at Bella Bella first and was gradually extended. With such research work being carried on in a number of Indian settlements, the federal authorities hope to secure sufficient reliable data to make future health work amongst the natives very practical and to take it out of the guesswork class.

BERLIN, Sept. 16—Mass participation of women in track and field meets of Germany has produced astonishing records. Even in the mile runs there are scores of competitors.

Fraulein Wally Ligner, 49-year-old Berlin typist, has negotiated 1,000 metres in 3 minutes 15 seconds, beating the world's record by three seconds. Frieda Knies who came in second was clocked at 3:17. Elnore Wittman won the woman's 100 meter dash championship of Berlin, but was forced to run 12 to do it. Charlie Paddock's world's record time for the distance is 19.4.
