As several days clapsed between the publication of the article and the member's denial we thought there must have been some foundation for it. Mr. Hinchliffe is an interesting and sometimes entertaining political figure who would be missed by many admirers if he retired from the Legislature. He says the only possibility of his becoming willing to surrender his place in the House lies in the event of his election "being won for him by means of padded registers of voters, or by ballot switching or by manipulation of absente votes."
