JAP LICENSE COMPLAINT MADE TO OTTAWA

CHINESE SURRENDER TO POWERS' DEMAND TO RESTORE COMMUNICATION

China Gives Way to a Demand for Lifting of Blockade of Tien Tsin

Students demonstrate before government offices in Pekin against giving way and 33 are shot by guards

PEKIN, March 18.—Pressure brought to bear upon China has broken the blockade of Tien Tsin. An ultimatum was sent to the commanders of the Taku forts and to Chinese vessels outside the port demanding that the blockade end and that all impediments to harbor and river traffic be removed by Thursday noon. This ultimatum was accepted by the belligerents and the blockade is at an end.

The ultimatum of the powers regarding the restoration of free communication between Pekin and Tien Tsin and the sea led to an unpleasant fracas here which ended in considerable bloodshed. Seventeen students were killed and sixteen wounded by guards, who fired on a thousand students who were demonstrating before the cabinet offices. The demonstration was in protest against the government's acquiescence to the ultimatum.

Four Powers Interested

The demand for an open port was made by American, British, French and Italian warships, whose commanders held a conference and decided to issue the ultimatum as coming from all four nations interested.

JAPAN PLANS DANCING BAN

TOKIO, Mar. 18.—On the ground that the western style of dancing is demoralizing to the Japanese, a bill was presented to parliament today prohibiting these dances in cafes, hotels and other public places.

VANCOUVER, Mar. 18.—Repairs to the engines of the gasoline schooner Iskum found necessary after she left Seattle for the Aleutian Islands with supplies for the fox farms there having been effected, she today resumed her trip north.


PRESENTATION MADE CONSERVATIVE LEADER

This new device, which is a department secret, fires the plane from the deck of a boat by a highly explosive gunpowder charge. Ordinary scout planes have been launched from various types of catapults, but never one as heavy as this.

IMMIGRANTS IN WINNIPEG TODAY

Thousand Farm Settlers Arrive at Prairie City For Western Distribution

WINNIPEG, March 18.—This city is today the distributing centre for one thousand farm settlers for Western Canada who are arriving by special Canadian National trains. Half this number came in early this morning and the balance follow on the immigration special which is due at 9 o'clock this evening. Colonization officials are busy now arranging for further special trains to leave this city tonight to carry these people to various points on the prairies and in British Columbia where places have been obtained on farms.

This is one of the heaviest immigration movements the railways have experienced for several years, but no time is being lost in getting the laborers to the farmers who have booked their services for the coming season. A dozen nationalities are represented in this morning's arrivals, included among whom are a number of Ukrainian families destined for Northern Alberta, which the husbands settled last year. The fact that these settlers have been able within a year to send home for their families is tangible evidence that they are making good in their new life.

There are also a number of young men from Central European countries who are on their way to relatives already settled on western farms. Colonization agents of the Canadian National Railways from various points are in the city today to conduct parties of immigrants to sections where land has been secured and places prepared for them. By midnight tonight it is expected that practically all of today's arrivals will have left for destinations further west.

GENEVA, March 18.—Major George W. Stephens of Montreal, has been appointed chairman of the Saar governing commission.

Bomb Scares at Irish Dinners Last Night in London When Prince and Premier Present

LONDON, March 18.—Bomb scares were created last night at two St. Patrick's Day dinners, one attended by the Prince of Wales and the other by Premier Baldwin, causing considerable confusion but no damage.

While the Prince of Wales was having dinner at the Irish Club a missile, the contents of which included moistened calcium carbide and a piece of larded rope, was thrown into the entrance to the restaurant. No damage was done.

At the Hotel Cecil Premier Baldwin was rising to speak when a piece of fireworks was flung among the guests by a man in the gallery. Consternation followed but no damage was done. One woman fainted.

The man who was responsible for the scare was arrested.

MANILA, Mar. 18.—Second Lieutenant John S. Thompson of the United States army was hanged this morning for the murder of Audrey Burleigh at Manila on April 5, 1925.

Mail Frauds Charged Against Man Operating from New York and Vancouver in Mining Stock

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The Postmaster-General issued a new fraud order today against Charles Unverzagt of the Lightning Creek Gold, Gravel and Drainage Company Limited and Mines Operating Company at New York and Vancouver for obtaining money through the mails by false pretenses.

It is asserted that Unverzagt admitted that he had taken more than \$1,500,000 from the public while he actually obtained \$150 from the Lightning Creek properties.

Unverzagt is now under two indictments at Buffalo in connection with operations for selling so-called bullion warrants there in 1923 through a Buffalo-Cariboo syndicate and is now a fugitive from justice.

Inequality in Matter of Salmon Fisheries Alleged by Patmore

(Special to Daily News)

OTTAWA, March 18.—Appearing on behalf of certain salmon canners in Skeena district, L. W. Patmore of Prince Rupert has made representations here to the Department of Marine and Fisheries to the effect that distribution of Japanese licenses among the several canners is unequal and that there should be an entire revision of the distribution. Mr. Patmore submitted that when the policy of reducing the number of licenses to others than Indians and whites was undertaken a few years ago, the allocations then made to the canneries were set down as a standard that was not to be departed from unless there were excellent reasons for doing so. It is now alleged that certain cannery men, who had allocations of licenses made to them at that time, have in the meantime discontinued operations at a number of canneries but have been permitted to retain the original number of licenses and these have been transferred to active canneries. This is the main objection and it is contended that instead of transferring licenses from inactive to active canneries, they should have been distributed among the active plants.

The view of the department, which is giving the matter full consideration, is, it is understood, that canneries established since the adoption of the policy of confining the issue of licenses to whites and Indians should not participate in Japanese licenses. St. Patrick's Day Observed With
Entertainment Under Direc-
tion of Charles P.
Balagno

The annual St. Patrick's Day concert held last night in the Westholme Theatre under the direction of Charles P. Balagno was fully appreciated by a large audience. There were many splendid vocal, instrumental and terpsichorean numbers and probably the most pleasing feature of the entertainment was the arrangement of the program in such a manner that youthful performers contributed almost entirely to the first section. Numbers by boys and girls, though they may not always be of such a finished character as those presented by adult artists, are always appreciated.

Boys and Girls

The opening number was a selection "Sounds From Ireland" by the Westholme Orchestra after which there were two choral items, "O Canada" and "A Little Bit of Heaven" by the girls of the Annunciation Church Junior Choir with Mr. Balagno acting as conductor. This was followed by a dumb-bell drill put on by a group of ten boys. Miss Linnea Hanson made her initial appearance on the concert stage singing "Little Town in Old County Down," giving a pleasing lullaby song as an encore. Action songs "There's Nothing Too Good for the Irish," and "The Seventeenth of March, St. Patrick's Day," by a group of ten boys costumed in Irish garb proved tuneful and amusing.

Little Miss Elizabeth McLeod, in a very pretty costume, gave as a vocal solo, "Ireland Must Be Heaven," and her dancing of the Irish Jig proved to be one of the most pleasing hits of the program. The little girl was given most enthusiastic applause and her dancing was indeed well performed. An action song and dance "Grandma Told Me All About It" by a group of ten girls was a very pretty number, the early Victorian age costumes presenting a dainty picture indeed. Mrs. J. J. Muldoon sang "Killarney" in her usual good voice and was given an encore. The closing number of the first part of the program consisted of vocal solos by Miss Adene Advant who appeared to good advantage and elicited much applause. The mines there are certainly doing well and if the forecasts of the mining men are correct and four shipping mines are established this year we shall be likely to hear better things for Stewart and the district which surrounds it.

It is only a few years ago when Stewart was deserted and the few houses there were empty. Now the place is daily becoming more prosperous. There has been a gradual development and that is what the people there want. They know they have the goods and they want to be given a chance to deliver them.

Small Activities Make Neighborhood.

Without pretending to scoff at the big things or at the big prospects ahead, we must remember it is the small activities that make a district. Yesterday we told of a new saw mill about to start cutting lumber at Oona River. It is beginning in a small way but the men who are operating it are enthusiastic and hard working and will probably succeed. Every such small industry means much to Prince Rupert. We want more of them.





PROTECTION FOR WRITERS ASKED AGAINST LIBELS

At Present in Britain Person Can be Sued for Using Another Man's Name Unconsciously

LONDON, Mar. 18.—The Bill that Lord Gorell has introduced in the House of Lords is really a very simple and uncontentious affair, and not only authors, but publishers, magazine editors, and newspaper proprietors should be interested in its being passed.

In regard to libel, the protection asked for is that when a writer of fiction inadvertently uses a real name for a fictional character, it shall be incumbent on the owner of the name to show negligence or intention on the part of the writer before any action for libel is maintainable. There is, of course, provision in the Bill for redressing the effects of what has been a mere accident—such as the publishing of an explanation or an apology, the altering of the name, and so on. As the law stands at present authors and publishers live in constant peril.

The other part of Lord Gorell's Bill is to entitle an author to defend his work when proceedings are being taken against the publisher or bookseller on account of the indecent, seditious, or blasphemous character of the work in question. At present he may be left entirely outside the proceedings.

FIGHTING ORDER WORLD COURT

Political Battle Being Waged to Decide if Peace Shall be Supported

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The fight over the entry, with certain reservations, of the United States into the world court has already started in the Middle West where opponents of the court are out to defeat senators seeking re-election at this year's congressional elections who voted in favor of United States adherence to the court in the senate.

Barely recovered from the turmoil of the special senatorial election of last Fall, Wisconsin is wheeling out its well-oiled political machinery preparatory to another four months of campaigning. Senator Borah, Republican, of Idaho, the leader of the "irreconcilables" to the world court plan, was one of the first in the fight in this state, and intends making another attack on the court when he visits Wisconsin in April. Senator James A. Reed, Democrat, of Missouri, has also been on the hustings urging defeat of those who voted in favor of the world court, especially Senator William R. McKinley, Republican, of Illinois who is seeking renomination. Senator McKinley's opponent for the nomination is Col. Frank L. Smith.

Senator George Wharton Pepper, of Pennsylvania, and Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, are going to reply to attacks made on the world court by Senators Borah and Reed, and incidentally to aid Senator McKinley in his fight for renomination.

Administration Leader

The terms of Senator Lenroot, Republican, of Wisconsin, and Senator McKinley will expire next year and to succeed themselves they must be candidates at this year's primaries. If successful then they must run at the regular elections. Senator Lenroot was the administration leader of the world court fight.

The situation in Wisconsin in the view of political observers does not favor Lenroot.

The coming addresses of Senator Borah, it is accepted, will be aimed at the national and international policies and the home policies of Senator Lenroot. Then for four months Wisconsin will disport itself in a factional party scrap, the La Follette and controlling wing of the Republican party opposing the administration branch.

DISTINCTION BETWEEN USE AND ABUSE DOES NOT EXIST DECLARES SPEAKER

Says Even a Little Alcohol is Injurious to the Person Who Takes It

EDMONTON, March 18.—The trouble with our grandfathers was that they drew a distinction between the abuse and the use of alcohol, said G. R. Jackson, Y. M. C. A. secretary, addressing the congregation of the Grace United Methodist Church on Sunday night on the subject of "Science and Alcohol."

Science had clearly proved that they were wrong in holding this view, continued the speaker, for exhaustive tests had proved that the use and the abuse of alcohol were the same thing. Even the most minute doses taken by a man impaired to some degree the efficiency of his physical and mental powers.

The British government had discovered during the war that the drink evil, considered from its industrial aspect only, was a fertile source of trouble, and experiments carried out on this side showed that one glass of Ontario's 4.4 beer, lessened the drinker's powers 14 per cent.

This meant, pointed out Mr. Jackson, that every driver of a motor car who took a glass of beer before getting into his car, had lost 14 per cent of his skill and ordinary caution as a driver, and he urged his hearers to consider what the effect of further glasses would be.


