It has remained for a publication in another land, The New York Herald Tribune, to give answer in a review by an able young English novelist, Frank Swinnerton. The charge laid by this critic is that the Dean is superficial, and that his conclusions are not well He claims that the list of books consulted, as given by the Dean, shows that he has taken shallow and unimportant authorities, whose ideas he has put in less than 300 pages. Mr. Swinnerton is outspoken:

"Dean Inge's 'England' is exactly the kind of book that is not needed in world which cries for understanding between people more loudly than for anything else. It is not a vicious book, and the author is not deliberately a mischievous person; and yet Dean Inge has for some reason been persuaded to do something which can only do harm, because he has set down a picture of his country which is almost as superficial as a picture could be. The author has neither exact knowledge nor imaginative conception. He understands Plotinus better than he understands Dickens. . . . He has attracted attention by his querulousness, his disagreeable manners, and his dislike of all those of his fellow-creatures who cannot read the dead languages. He is therefore unfitted by temperament to write such a book as this one upon the subject of England.




