WOMAN FORCED TO OPEN BANK SAFE BUT BANDITS FAIL TO GET LOOT

Convention of Workers to be Held at Honolulu to Discuss World Peace

Australian Labor Party convinced next war will take place on or near Pacific Ocean, states delegate at Geneva

GENEVA, May 31.—The Australian Labor Party has decided to convoke a workers' congress at Honolulu to be attended by workers of countries bordering on the Pacific "because of the probability that the next war will take place in the neighborhood of the Pacific," declared J. A. Beasley, delegate representing the Australian Workers' Union at the International conference today.

Beasley criticized the international labor office for doing nothing to prevent wars and said Australia was convinced that meeting of Pacific workers would do much toward maintaining world peace.

RUSSIA TAKES PRESIDENCY

Pilsudski Thinks Not Enough in Office as Head of Poland

WARSAW, May 31.—Marshal Pilsudski, who overthrew the Polish government, created a sensation by refusing to accept the presidency and after being elected by the National Assembly.

Pilsudski in his letter of resignation stated that so many resignations were placed about the office by the present cabinet and there was such lack of confidence against parliament that he was unable to take the responsibility of the office.

PILOT DIES AT VANCOUVER

William Ettershank, 84 Years of Age, Came to Coast in Sailing Ship

VANCOUVER, May 31.—Capt. William Ettershank, 84 years of age, died Sunday. He came here in 1863 as second mate on the clipper passenger ship and proceeded to the gold fields where he spent a year and returned to sea-faring life.

Ettershank was one of three pilots in the position he held until 1920 when he resigned. His 40 years as a pilot was absolutely

MANY ACCIDENTS IN EASTERN STATES ARE FATAL AT WEEK END

Ten Lost in Fires, Seven in Auto Smashes, Three in Explosions and One Drowned

NEW YORK, May 31.—Given an incentive by automobile accidents, fires, explosions and drownings, death took heavy toll in the Eastern States over the week end, no less than 21 lives being snuffed out. Ten persons perished in flames, one was drowned, three were killed in an explosion and seven died as a result of auto smashes. In Brooklyn a hotel fire took toll of seven when Mrs. Thomas Hughes and four of her seven children lost their lives. At Baltimore the home of Dr. Aaron Amber, Egyptologist at Johns Hopkins University, was destroyed by fire his wife, six year old son and maid losing their lives.

LAGRANDE, Ont., May 31.—Fire started last night which threatened to wipe out the town of Imbler, eleven miles from here. It destroyed two warehouses, a grain elevator containing 1,000 bushels causing loss amounting to \$100,000.

SIR HERBERT AMES RESIGNS FROM LEAGUE



REVELSTOKE GOES DRY WHEN VOTE TAKEN SATURDAY

REVELSTOKE, May 31.—In the second plebiscite to determine whether beer parlors would be allowed to open here, voters Saturday rejected their establishment, the majority against being 123.

The vote was held as the result of a wet petition, the first allowed by the provincial authorities in a district which voted dry in the original plebiscite.

HALIBUT SALES ARE HIGHER

A very slight increase in volume of halibut landings at this port during the month of May is recorded in comparison with the same month last year. The landings during the month closing today totalled 2,691,000 pounds as compared with 2,654,000 pounds in May 1925. Of this month's total 1,837,000 was from American vessels and 854,000 from Canadian.

Last April the halibut landings here totalled 3,322,000 pounds. The decrease of this month as compared with last is believed to have been mainly attributable to bad weather which has caused long trips and light catches.

BANK BANDIT MAY NOT LIVE

WINNIPEG, May 31.—William Davis, the bank robber who was captured here Friday, is reported to be very low in the hospital this morning with the chances of recovery from six bullet wounds as slim.

Woman Forced to Open Safe in Bank but Time Lock Saved the Money

YORKTON, May 31.—A daring attempt to hold up the Bank of Toronto at Preeceville, 75 miles northwest of here, was carried out Sunday morning when at least three men went to the home of Miss Emma Lindotum, a block away from the bank, dragged her from her room after beating her and forced her to conduct them to the bank and open the outer door of the safe. This she did but was unable to open the second door owing to the time lock being set for Monday.

The robbers then attempted to blow the safe but set fire to the building and fearing discovery fled without obtaining the loot.

Practically all the bank records have been destroyed by the fire. The police threw out a dragnet for the bandits but owing to the condition of Miss Lindotum, were unable to secure a description of the men.

Much Road Building on Queen Charlotte Islands This Year Keeping Up with Development

By next year two provincial government roads on the Queen Charlotte Islands, one 44 miles long between Queen Charlotte City and Port Clements via Skidegate and Tlell and the other 36 miles long from Massett through Tow Hill to Onda River on the east coast of Graham Island, will be open for auto traffic. Work is being actively continued on these two roads this season by the department of public works with some 75 men employed, 63 on the southern work and a dozen or so on the northern.

It is expected to have the twelve mile Port Clements-Tlell road half completed this year from the Port Clements end. Thirty men leave here tonight to be employed on this work. Work is also being pushed on the new road between Queen Charlotte City and Skidegate. These two roads, both completed next year, will give the 44-mile auto road from Queen Charlotte City to Port Clements.

The 22 miles road between Massett and Tow Hill is now completed and open to auto traffic and work is being proceeded with on the continuation of this road from Tow Hill to Onda River to open up the farming country in that vicinity. From Massett to Onda River the distance is 36 miles.

LAST MONTH OF PARLIAMENT

Session Likely to Prorogue Before Dominion Day It is Planned

OTTAWA, May 31.—This week the House of Commons begins what will probably be the last month of the present session. While there is still plenty to do, progress during the past week has been satisfactory and has been improving. Parliament hopes to prorogue by Dominion Day.

CRUISER CURLEW COMING IN JULY SPEND FIVE DAYS

VICTORIA, May 31.—The British light cruiser Curlew, which is coming from Bermuda to make a two months visit to British Columbia waters this summer, will arrive at Esquimalt July 13, it is announced here.

The war ship will be in Prince Rupert from July 19 to 23.

WORKMEN FOR THE ISLANDS

Forty go to Port Clements For Road Work and Baxter Pole Camp

Some forty men are being sent to Queen Charlotte Islands on the Prince Charles this evening, 30 to work on the road between Port Clements and Tlell and a dozen to the Baxter Pole Company. Small demands from different parts of the district are being met by the local employment bureau, loggers and others going to the small camps.

James Campbell, who has charge of the office here, reports that there is a constant coming and going. Men make this more or less of a centre in looking for work and the result is that while men may not be available today, there may be some here tomorrow. The demand has, however, pretty well cleaned up the present supply.

Jutland Anniversary Is Today.

This is the anniversary of the big battle of Jutland, the greatest naval engagement the world has ever seen. It is just ten years ago that the grand fleet of the Germans emerged from shelter into the North Sea and were met by the British with disastrous results to the Germans.

Nothing in South Like Scenery Here.

There is nothing in the south in the way of scenery like that of this district. On the beaten path one does not get the best of it but just a short distance inland and the mountains rise sheer, glaciers appear and the rugged grandeur of the scenes is unexcelled.

Many places boast of their scenery but there are few that have such surprises as are found here.

Should We Borrow In Foreign Market?

The question of whether Canada should borrow in the foreign money market or float bonds at home is one that is often discussed. The argument for floating at home is that the people retain the interest on the money instead of sending it abroad. On the other side it is stated that if local people are urged to put their money into bonds, there is none left for investment in local industries or in development of businesses to keep pace with the growth of population. Extremes on either side would probably prove injurious to the country.

No Pilot Is Needed For Port.

The captain of the big tramp steamer Monarch came in here without a pilot last week and he says that one is not needed when a person has once been in the harbor. The course is so plain and without bad currents or tides that anyone can bring a ship in or take it out without difficulty. That should be worth a lot to the port and should save a lot of money for the vessels that come here.

National Vessels Beginning To Pay.

The vessels of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine are paying their way. Operating costs were more than cleared during the first five months of this year whereas for a similar period last year there was a loss of over half a million dollars. Sir Henry Thornton, who told the legislators about this last week also said he expected further improvement. Very soon the system should begin to make payments toward the interest on capital cost.

The value to the country of the merchant ships is very great. Before Canada had those vessels she was often unable to secure tonnage to carry her products to world ports. Ships had to be engaged at San Francisco for this coast and the men on the spot got the first chance of the bottoms. Now there is almost always tonnage available and regular services are given on several routes.

The next route for a regular service should be between Prince Rupert and the Orient with possible calls at Vladivostok.

New Police Force Is Taking Charge.

Tomorrow the new provincial police force is taking charge of the city and the officers are already here. They will doubtless receive the co-operation of citizens in their arduous work. It is not expected that the law will become perfect all at once, but it is expected that the law will be enforced here. If the laws are wrong, let us have them abrogated, but if they are right, let us enforce them. There should be no option on the part of the police as to which laws should be enforced or which evaded. It is unfair to those who keep the laws.

POLICE CHANGE IS EFFECTIVE

After Tonight Upholding of Law and Order Here Will be in Provincial Police Hands

After tonight the duty of upholding law and order in the city of Prince Rupert will be in the hands of the provincial police under the recent agreement whereby the policing of the city was transferred from the municipal to provincial authorities. The city detachment of the provincial police, as already announced, will consist of Sergeant James P. M. Hannah, chief constable, and Constables R. MacKinlay, J. Anderson, Fred Markland, Chas. Kench and J. M. Bella, all of whom have now reached the city.

With the passing of the city police force goes Chief W. H. Vickers who, having served in that capacity for fifteen years and three months or ever since the city was incorporated with the exception of a very few months, holds the long record for service with the municipality. Sergeant Bailey has been with the force fourteen years; Sergeant McGlinchey, ten years, and Constable Alex Macdonald over ten years during which time he spent some years on overseas service. Constables Crate and Potterton, the other members of the city police force, are of more recent appointment.

It is understood that arrangements have been made to absorb all the six members of the retiring city force. The four senior members, it is expected, will be transferred to southern posts while Constable Potterton has been recommended for a post at Stewart. Constable Crate has already declined the offer of a post at Telegraph Creek.

GOSSE COMPANY SELLING STOCK

Offering Seven per cent. Preferred on Eastern Market Covering Ten Plants

The Gosse Packing Company, formed with a capital of \$1,500,000 to take over the business of the Gosse Millard Company, is advertising its seven per cent. preferred stock in the East. The statement in the advertisement is that the company will own and operate ten plants together with a large number of fishing vessels with all their necessary equipment. Its business will consist in production, and sale of canned salmon, canned pilchards, dry salt salmon, dry salt herring, fish meal and fish oil. The management remains the same as formerly.

The company has no bank loans or bonded debt and has assets valued at close to two million dollars. The earnings of the company last year amounted to \$405,233.50, more than twice that of the previous year.

Lunch was served by the ladies and ice cream also was provided in abundance and everyone enjoyed the party to the limit.

YEAR OF UNION UP FOR REVIEW

United Church of Canada to Sit in General Council on June 10 at Montreal

MONTREAL, May 31.—One year of union finds the United Church of Canada looking toward the place where the duties of a constitutional convention as well as of a deliberate assembly await 154 Commissioners to her General Council. Sederunts will be held in the American Church of Montreal, an institution known for generations as "the most Canadian Church in Canada," the place of worship for a succession of the nation's honored builders and dreamers. In addition to the former American Presbyterian Church, the facilities of neighboring Emmanuel Congregational Church and of spacious St. James' Methodist Church are being made ready for special uses.

The time is June 10, the first anniversary of the day on which the representatives of the three Churches—Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational—met to realize their union and to celebrate its consummation; to subscribe to its basis and with prayer and prophecy hallow the deed; to receive the acclaim of the sister Churches of many British lands, and, as the first corporate act, partake of the Holy Communion.

Face New Tasks
This time the summons is to make survey of the first year of united life and to draw up forms within which the immense and potent organism may continue to function. For these onerous tasks the election of ex-Moderators of Assemblies and Synods, Conferences and Unions, has been effected by an intensely interested constituency, which recently assembled in 11 electoral colleges throughout Canada and in Newfoundland.

Arrival from Naas Yesterday and Reports Fishing Good Last Week: Hospital Equipment.

The snag scow Bobolink, Captain J. D. Watson, after spending five weeks clearing logs and snags from the fishing grounds at the mouth of the Naas River, returned here yesterday and will now spend the summer on similar work up the Skeena River.

Captain Watson reports that the weather has been very bad of the Naas this year. Fishing has been poor until last week when it picked up. From 75 to 80 boats are fishing for spring salmon in the Naas now and three canneries, Mill Bay, Naas Harbor and Arrandale are canning the fish. None are using the mild curing process.

The Bobolink brought from Port Simpson the equipment for the opening of the United Church hospital at Port Essington. Dr. Sager and some of the nurses came in on the Lilool and the others on the Bobolink.






