KING OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN IN MARITIMES

IMPORTANT CIVIC QUESTIONS DISCUSSED AT CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Cry of Disloyalty and Annexation Responsible For Condition of Trade

Mackenzie King Flays Tories at New Brunswick Town When Opening His Campaign in Maritimes

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Aug. 25.—"Had reciprocity carried, I venture to say that you would not have any maritime rights problem as at present," said Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King at first meeting in the maritime provinces last night. "There is a great natural market at your door which you would have had but for the old false Tory cry of disloyalty and annexation." King has worked to the great detriment of the country at large, no part suffered more than the maritime provinces, he said. "Far reaching measures of reform affecting these provinces, predicted by the Liberal leader, referring to two commissions now considering maritime problems. To the railway commission the last government assigned the task of revising the freight rates with special instructions to consider the claims of the maritime provinces. The intercolonial railway commission on maritime rights had been appointed by the Liberal government and when these two commissions concluded their work, measures of reform might be expected."

DISCUSS MANY B. C. PROBLEMS

Union of B. C. Municipalities Deal With Number of Resolutions at Convention.

VERNON, Aug. 25.—The annual convention of the union of B. C. municipalities opened on Tuesday with a large number of resolutions were sent up by the municipalities to be considered, among them a recommendation from Burnaby that poor indigents should not become a charge on municipalities after six months' residence but that the place from which they came should be responsible. It was in the meantime approved with the addition of a recommendation to be sent to the union of Canadian municipalities that that body be asked to promote inter-provincial legislation to meet the case of removal from one province to another. Another resolution endorsed was that an effort be made to induce the federal government to pay taxes on land reverting to the soldiers' settlement board.

LOYALTY CRY IS DEPLORABLE

W. DeB. Farris Says Conservatives Use It to Get Into Office


VANCOUVER, Aug. 25.—"I know of nothing so deplorable in our public life as that we can have an election without Conservatives trying to get into office by questioning the loyalty of practically fifty per cent of our Canadians," declared J. W. DeB. Farris, former attorney general of B. C., in replying to a speech of Hon. H. H. Stevens at the Liberal rally in the Hotel Vancouver last night.

Dealing with the customs issue, Mr. Farris accused Mr. Stevens of failing to recite certain material facts and endeavoring to justify the recitation of disgusting details by placing the responsibility on the King government.

Shakeup in the Department of Utilities Suggested Following Report of Council Last Night

The city council last night accepted a report from the board of works recommending the appropriation of \$5,000 for the repairing of the 35-inch water main leading from Woodworth Lake dam to the Shawatans power house. The report was backed up with recommendations from the city engineer and superintendent of utilities and there was considerable discussion in the course of which Ald. Perry, chairman of the board of works, charged members of the utilities with "lying down on the job" in allowing the situation to come to such a pass and the officials with misrepresentation. He threatened to present a motion at the next meeting which would bring the matter to a "showdown" by proposing a change.

TIGER SHARK SOOKE TRAPS

Huge Man-Eater Weighed 1,000 Pounds.—First Caught Off Vancouver Island.

VICTORIA, Aug. 25.—While hauling in their catch at the Sooke salmon traps yesterday, a number of salmon fishermen were surprised to see a large shark, believed to be of the man-eating variety, which they succeeded in landing after a stiff fight.

The appearance of the tiger shark was entirely unexpected and before he was subdued he pulled a score of his captors into the water. The creature measured eight feet two inches from the tip of his nose to the end of his tail and weighed approximately a thousand pounds. Some observers stated it was the first tiger shark caught off the coast of Vancouver Island.

LOCAL MAN MARRIED AT CHRIST CHURCH

A quiet wedding took place on Monday, August 23, at Christ Church, Vancouver, when Miss Clara Francis Gwyn, daughter of the late Gerald Gwyn and Mrs. Gwyn, of Dundas, Ontario, to John Gwendraeth Johns, of Prince Rupert, Rev. Canon Smith officiating. Fred Clark was the best man.

Following the wedding, a reception was held at the home of General Arthur Clark, Nelson St., Vancouver. Mr. and Mrs. Johns arrived here this morning on the Prince George and will make their home on Sixth Avenue.

Proposal to Purchase Electric Plant of City by International Utilities Company Been Made

That E. W. Bowness, consulting engineer of Edmonton, who recently visited the city, took preliminary steps at that time on behalf of the International Utilities Co., which he represents, with a view to opening negotiations for the taking over of the municipal electric light plant was made public at last night's council meeting when Ald. Jos. Greer inquired if anything further had been heard from Mr. Bowness since his conference with the finance committee when the matter was first taken up. Ald. Greer explained that Mr. Bowness' company had already taken over the power plants at Nanaimo and Duncan and that it was interested in supplying power for a pulp and paper project at Prince George. He had asked the finance committee if the city would consider an offer to take over the local plant and operate it. He had been told that a conference with the city council would be arranged when he returned from Prince George, where he now was.

PITTSBURG IS IN THE LEAD

Defeats St. Louis by Score of Ten to One.—Chicago Wins Double Header.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Pittsburg returned to the top of the National League yesterday by subduing Brooklyn ten runs to one, while St. Louis was splitting a double header with Boston. St. Louis and Cincinnati are now tied for second place. Chicago batted Philadelphia hard and won a double header. Hack Wilson scored his nineteenth homer of the season in the second game, while Catcher Hartnett knocked the ball over the fence twice in the second inning of the first game. In the American League all games were stopped by rain except that between Washington and St. Louis.

KING EXPECTING TO GAIN EIGHT SEATS ONTARIO PROVINCE

OTTAWA, Aug. 24.—With the landslide in favor of Liberal policies and Liberal candidates growing more pronounced daily in the east, Mackenzie King is assured of a minimum gain of eight seats in Ontario, these gains being conceded even by Tory organizers. This would make 20 Liberal seats in Ontario instead of 12 by Conservative reckoning, and those behind the Liberal organization declare that if they can get 20 seats they can as easily get 25.

In the Maritimes, another minimum gain of five Liberal seats is looked for, two in Nova Scotia, one in Prince Edward Island and two in New Brunswick, so that with 11 supporters from the Maritimes, 63 from Quebec, 20 from Ontario and more gains west of the Great Lakes the return of Mackenzie King to power will be assured.

BOMBER IS COMING HERE ON FRIDAY

Will Share Platform With J. C. Brady at Conservative Meeting That Evening

Hon. W. J. Bowser, former premier of British Columbia, will arrive in the city from Vancouver on Friday of this week and that evening will share the platform with J. C. Brady at a public meeting in support of the Conservative candidate's campaign in Skeena riding.

BOMB EXPLODES IN SAVINGS BANK

Bomber and Special Policeman Killed and Others Were Injured.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 25.—An unidentified man of foreign appearance entered the Farmers' Deposit Savings Bank late yesterday and presented a demand for two thousand dollars to the teller with the threat: "I'll blow up the bank." When the special policeman, George Ortmann, approached to arrest him the man placed a satchel on the floor and gave it a kick. A violent explosion followed, the bomber being instantly killed and Ortmann fatally injured while a score of persons in the bank received minor injuries. The explosion created consternation in the business district, many patrons of the theatres rushing to the streets.

MEIGHEN AND HUDSON BAY

Pledges Himself to Complete Railway, But If Cost Too High, Will Go Slowly.

TALKS AMALGAMATION Says Falsehoods Revamped To Steal Votes of Employees of Canadian National.

MELVILLE, Sask., Aug. 25.—Premier Meighen yesterday afternoon reviewed his pledge to complete the Hudson Bay Railway on the grounds that "we owe it to the settlers interested in that portion of our country. Having spent millions of dollars on it, we have to go on and finish it and give it a fair test," he added; "however, if we find it is going to take a colossal sum in the neighborhood of fifty million dollars, this country in its present shape just has to be patient because this country cannot afford that much money at the present time." The premier declared that everywhere along the Canadian National line he found the untold falsehoods revamped, warmed up again that "he intended to amalgamate the system with that of the Canadian Pacific, the idea being to steal the votes of the National employees, making them afraid for their position or seniority."

Regina Meeting

REGINA, Aug. 25.—Mr. Meighen's speech last night here followed the speeches of four other places earlier in the day. The premier spoke in passing of the war time elections and turned particularly to statements made in this connection by Hon. C. A. Dunning. "I was a member of the government which passed the act," Mr. Meighen said, "and I always took my full share of responsibility, have done so before audiences in this city and will do so again."

Mr. Meighen received an enthusiastic greeting but there was a running fire of comment from the crowd. The meeting at one point halted for several minutes while one interrupter wanted to put questions. The Premier declared it his intention to introduce a new soldiers' settlers revaluation bill if returned. "There will be a judicial revaluation and not a political revaluation," he said.

Useless Efforts of Some Politicians.

Some local politicians have been trying their best to discredit the Mackenzie King Government by making insinuations and innuendoes which cannot be backed up by statement of fact. They have been blaming the Government for building the Hudson Bay Railway, yet Mr. Meighen has also definitely promised to do the same work.

How futile it is for people to try to forward the interests of a party by that kind of talk. They just make themselves ridiculous in the eyes of thinking people.

How much better it would have been in this constituency if the Conservatives had acknowledged that Stork, having been the only representative who got anything worth while for the port, should have been sent back to Ottawa by acclamation. Even yet it is not too late. Seeing there is absolutely no hope of electing Brady, why not make our protest against past Conservative treatment emphatic and all back one man. Everyone knows he is the only person who can do the work effectively.

King Reigns in Eastern Canada.

A curious anomaly has arisen in the affairs of Canada. Mackenzie King, leader of the Government which recently resigned, again and again came out in favor of a strong western policy. He insisted that railway rates to the Pacific should be equalized with those going East and in many smaller matters he took the part of the west as against the east. Yet he is the idol of the east. The despatches yesterday told of how the people of Sherbrooke county refused to let him pass in his car without addressing them. So much was he delayed by the concourse of people at different points that he was three hours late in arriving at his destination.

Mackenzie King is not only King by name but reigns in the hearts of the people down there.

Curb the Power of Canadian Senate.

The Mackenzie King group, if sent back to administer the affairs of the country, as seems likely to happen, will curb the powers of the Canadian Senate. Their proposal is to bring it into line with the British House of Lords, which has had its claws trimmed on several occasions. It had to submit in order to save its own life.

If the country should happen to vote Conservative on the present occasion it would mean a setback of many years in the reform of the Upper House. By the way the old Senators are dying off it seems as if within a year or two Liberals, if returned now, will have a majority there pledged to reform. Should they be defeated now, however, the Senate will be filled with Tory Senators who will refuse for another decade or two to submit to any change in the constitution in this regard.

Any person wavering in regard to the matter of voting should consider this a good and proper reason for voting Liberal on the present occasion.

Big Majority for King is the Thing.

What is needed now is a big majority for Mackenzie King. Let us have stable government, but not of the Tory kind. We do not want Tory stability. What we want is a free government for a free people. We want no autocratic senate, no encroachments from the Governor, no rule of the wealthy. Give us today a real Canadian Government for a free Canadian people. Mackenzie King's grandfather fought for freedom and today we reap the benefit. His grandson is again entering the lists in the same sacred cause. It is ours to support him and elect a man who will back him up in his policies. The only man who is in sight who will do that is Fred Stork.


WOODSWORTH TELLS WHAT HE MEANT BY EDMONTON SPEECH

WINNIPEG, Aug. 25. — J. S. Woodsworth, Labor nominee for Winnipeg North Centre, who returned from the western provinces, in explanation of a statement he is reported to have made at a meeting in Edmonton, to the effect that the Liberal government had submitted proposed legislation to Wall Street before bringing it before parliament, said that he had been referring to international relationships. He had attempted to show that some people feared the dominance of Downing Street. "I was of the opinion the we were more likely in Canada to be dominated by Wall Street," he said.

At this particular meeting, Mr. Woodsworth stated that someone in the audience had asked him if the submission of legislation to the financier was any worse than a man having to consult his bankers. "I replied, 'No, it is precisely the same thing,'" said Mr. Woodsworth. "That's the point I want to drive home—governments are not independent of national and international capitalists."

EFFORT MADE DISFRANCHISE MANY VOTERS

Edmonton Newspaper Tells of Wholesale Move to Strike Liberals Off List

The Edmonton Bulletin of recent date says: Disgraceful conditions under which the election machinery in East and West Edmonton is being handled, resulting in the disfranchising of hundreds of voters, many of whom have been resident in their ridings for from five to fifteen years, and in one case for more than 20 years, came to light Wednesday evening when Liberal committee rooms were rushed with old time residents and supporters who had received notice that they had been struck off the lists.

Hi-Jacking Work
The "hi-jacking" of the election lists has evidently been conducted in a wholesale manner and with an organized and systematic plan according to H. H. Parlee, K.C., Frank McMillan, J. D. O. Mothersill and other Liberal workers who were flooded with requests on Wednesday night by indignant voters who asked them to take legal action against the men who swore to the false affidavits by which they were taken off the lists. Here is one case which came to the Blatchford campaign headquarters. Theo. George, merchant, who has conducted the Rustic confectionery at 9718 Jasper Avenue for the past 11

years and who has resided in the Rudyk block for the past three years, this block being just across the way from his store, has been illegally struck off the list on the grounds that he was not qualified because he was not a resident of the electoral district on May 21, 1926.

An Example
"I've been in the district for over 11 years and I've been in the Rudyk block over three years. I never saw anyone regarding my name being left off the list and no one saw me. As far as I know I don't know the man who swore he knows I was not a resident on May 21, 1926," said George last night. "I was there, so he swore to a lie."

More in Mails
The man whose affidavit deprived him of his vote signed the declaration as John Camil Landry, and gave his occupation as a lawyer, and his address as the Alberta Hotel. He swore in the body of the affidavit that George is a machinist, and George says he never followed this occupation at any time.

Different Handwriting
Four different handwritings are shown on the face of the affidavit, and apparently the form was filled in wholesale at some office and the maker of the affidavit came along later and signed it. On the face of it the affidavit looks as if the parties making it out did not know who was to swear to it when it was being filled in. All the affidavits turned into the Blatchford headquarters on Wednesday night are in the same handwriting as far as the body of the affidavit is concerned, but they have been sworn to by different men and before different registrars.

BRANCH OF GRAHAM AVENUE GETS WATER

Report of Board of Works Was
Adopted by City Council Last

To give water connection to

the street was graded, however,
put the matter in a different
light and the report was adopted
with the understanding that a
larger pipe than one-inch be
put in if available.

COOK BADLY USED BY MEN

Barrage of Flour and Rotten Eggs Grooms Secretary of Miners' Union

A special despatch to the Winnipeg Free Press from London, England, says: A. J. Cook, secretary to the Miners' Federation, was mobbed at the Chelmsford railway station Wednesday night. He was subjected to a barrage of flour and rotten eggs, but escaped unhurt, although one of his companions, R. B. Walker, of the Agricultural Workers' Union, had a tooth knocked out. Cook has always been disliked by the moderate element among the miners and he has now incurred the hostility of the extremists. All his promises as leader have been falsified and it will not be surprising if a demand is made for his resignation but it must be remembered that the majority of the members of the federation executive are in the same boat as Cook, and the miners are wonderfully loyal to their leaders.

Frank Hodges, who was Cook's predecessor as federation secretary, said Wednesday that there was nothing to show for fifteen weeks of struggle except the poverty and debt of the miners' families and the loss of the export markets and the disorganization of the national economic life. These words are only too true, and it will be some consolation, however, if the settlement is made for a long term, say three years. This will give the industry a chance to recover, and it will set an example of stability to other British trades. A miner member of the House of Commons predicted the other day that Cook would turn out to be a second Jim Thomas. He meant that Cook would switch from the left wing to the right wing, and that he would co-operate with the owners in trusting the coal industry so that the community generally would have to pay higher prices for coal and thus make possible higher wages for the miners. Many of the young miners have recently enlisted in the army.

BACKS LABOR VERSUS SENATE

Mining and Industrial Record Declares House Has Degenerated

A staid institution which has been steadily degenerating is the Senate, and there is much to be said for the plank in the Labor party's platform which calls for its abolition, says the Mining and Industrial World.

As originally constituted this was designed to be a non-partisan Upper House, composed of men of little experience in State affairs.

It has degenerated through the constant appointment of men who had proven themselves poor members of the Lower House. During the last session one appointment was made of an ex-minister whom the Premier had found it necessary to remove from his cabinet. In the past appointments have been made of men whose conduct in executive positions had made it essential that they be removed. A Senate composed of men appointed for party service, failures in some instances, cannot be deemed a body fitted to hold authority, especially when such men are appointed for life to positions in which they are not answerable to anyone.

Active Interference


Added to this is the active interference in party politics, contrary to all intent of the British North America Act. There should not be Liberal and Conservative senators. Senators should not be in any cabinet. The Senate should function as does the Judiciary, untrammelled by partisanship.

We have at least one glaring example in British Columbia of a Senator lowering himself to stand on a party platform and indulge in tirades of mud-slinging and innuendo, in the mistaken idea that he thereby helps his party.

The Senators themselves are responsible for the demand for Senate reform. The Senate can be reformed most easily from within by amending its rules and it has that remedy in its own hands.

TORIES SORRY TOOK OFFICE

Political Correspondent of Ottawa Citizen Sees Liberal Victory at Election

IS NOT GOING WELL

How it Was a Brought About is Described by Newspaperman at Headquarters

Conservatives throughout the country this year do not display the spirit that they did last fall. As a matter of fact, they are sorry they took office, says the Ottawa Citizen political correspondent. They feel that their chances would have been infinitely better if Mr. King, instead of Mr. Meighen, had been given dissolution. What, apparently, influenced their decision to seize the ship and attempt to navigate it was the assurance of the bolting Progressives that they could be relied on and the supposed readiness of other Progressives to co-operate. It was figured that the Western party would want to get through its legislation and there was open-faced trafficking to bring that about conditional upon Liberals being ousted. The Conservative majority in the Senate was prepared to pass the Campbell Grain Act although in doing so they would slaughter their friends of the Winnipeg grain trade. Likewise the Rural Credits Bill would have gone through and the vote for the Hudson Bay Railway.

Met Waterloo

The plan worked well for a couple of days and then Liberals attacked the constitutionality of a prime minister carrying on without being in parliament himself or, what was more important, without a sworn-in cabinet. The Alberta wing decided that they would sooner temporarily stand off the pending legislation than be parties to the contravention of all constitutional precedent. And so, two days after Mr. King resigned, Mr. Meighen went down. Even then, had he followed the usual course, Mr. Meighen could have advised his Excellency to send for Mr. King and give him dissolution. But he didn't do so. His council of war, advised that, being at the wheel, he should stay there and bring on the election with the rather questionable advantage of controlling the machinery. If any advantage, really lies, in such control, it now appears to be more than neutralized by the circumstances which have developed. The Liberals have been handed a very large issue and that it is taking hold is evident from the later tactics of the government party.

A Very Grave Error

These consist of imputing disloyalty to those who question the propriety of Mr. Meighen attempting to carry on government single-handed and outside of parliament. Conservatives now think a very grave error was committed and admit that it may cost them the election. The campaign has not gone at all well and it has been injured by the "breaks" that have occurred in an unerring succession. A. J. Doucet and G. B. Nicholson divide honors for the booby prize.

The election campaigns are considered too long. An issue needs to be very deeply rooted to last for two months and a half. A supposed scandal is usually ephemeral in its effect, particularly when things happen to explode many of its vital features. The fiasco over the "Margaret" affair reacts on the whole business and instils in the public mind doubt as to whether any of the other charges are true.

Completely Disproved

The "log" of the Margaret re-

cently produced at Quebec, but not yet made public, is known to completely disprove Doucet's allegations against Hon. Ernest Lapointe and to justify the admission of counsel before the commission that there was not an "atom" of evidence to support the charge. When the "log" is made public it will show that, even at Charlottetown, Mr. Lapointe simply went aboard the ship for a cup of tea. The little sail he took around the harbor was not on the vessel but on her launch. Government counsel knew what they were about when they admitted that Doucet's allegations, repeated all over the Maritimes from the prime minister's platform, was utterly devoid of fact.

The Fight of Fights

The fight of fights is in Center Vancouver between Stevens and Donaghy. A story came over the wires on Saturday about Liberals attempting to strike thousands of Conservative names off the list, but it is not clear how that could be done with Conservatives controlling the machinery and with the election now being only at the stage where names can be put on and not stricken off. The Liberal leader has also replied to Mr. Stevens' attack upon his grandfather who has been in his grave seventy-five years. The utterances of the minister of customs appear to indicate a peculiarly bad temper and are explained by some of his friends as due to his highly nervous condition. The condition is likely to be accentuated before Mr. Stevens gets through his fight in Center Vancouver.

Preachers of Virtue

In the hectic nights that featured the close of the session, there were hints from the Liberal side that the Conservatives were not tactically placed to preach political virtue. "Don't fear," said Mr. Lucien Cannon at the time, "I am not going to mention any names," and he didn't, whereat some people seemed relieved. Speaking here Friday night, however, Mr. Cannon talked out. He recalled the cases of W. E. Garland, De Witt Foster, Hon. J. D. Chaplin, J. K. Flemming, Hon. G. B. Jones and R. B. Hanson, all Conservative members, who, with the exception of Mr. Hanson, are charged with being involved in wartime scandals. Mr. Hanson has simply been departed from the New Brunswick courts. Mr. Cannon's argument, which, doubtless will promptly be picked up by others, is that the Conservative party is in no position to preach purity when these men stand up in their councils.

The Winning Party

The political party that carries the West will be carried into office. There will be changes in the East but to the Liberal column. Conservatives last October reached the maximum. Liberals expect to win the Prairie provinces. In Manitoba there is only one three-cornered fight in prospect and that may be eliminated. In such seats as Selkirk, Springfield, Neepawa, Dauphin, Marquette, Souris, Provancher, Nelson, MacDonald, Lisgar and Brandon, fusion of Liberals and Progressives is complete. Of all things, the West stands for a moderate tariff, while Mr. Meighen is frankly for protection. It is considered to

his credit that he goes out there and tells them so, but it is not calculated to heighten his chances. In Alberta, Liberals are supporting Jeliff and Speakman, Progressives, and it is doubtful if they oppose Gardiner, Spencer or Garland. Their own men—Hon. Charles Stewart, C. W. Cross, S. G. Tobin and Dr. Gershaw are considered safe while they expect to carry East Edmonton. From Saskatchewan, a message received Saturday stated that Liberals would carry eighteen seats and elect two Progressives—Miller and Evans—whom they are supporting. If the West is the deciding point, the West is apparently going Liberal.

SPORT CHAT

The sports and attractions committee of the Fair Board is to hold a meeting this week for the purpose of advancing arrangements for the sports program at the Fair, the opening of which is now less than three weeks hence. Present plans are to bring a baseball team from Ketchikan for a series here during the week, negotiations having been opened with that end in view. As for football, it is expected there will be no competition imported this year. Instead, it is being arranged to have the final for the Gilhuly Cup take place during the week.

President Adams of the Boston National Hockey League is determined to put a winner in the "Hut." He has been angling for the services of Western Canada league stars, and it is understood that he has purchased the services of Boucher of Vancouver, Briden of Calgary; Shore, the great Edmonton defenseman, and Fredericks and Oliver of Victoria. These players would make Boston a powerful factor in the race, but the Boston owners may have difficulty in getting them to report. The Western Canada League seems to have collapsed, and many of the players do not admit that their services can be sold. There may be a few interesting announcements in the next week or two. The option held on the Saskatoon team by Chicago interests has expired, and the Saskatoon owners may decide to sell their players to the highest bidders, in defiance of any ruling by the league head. The Chicago Club, which holds a franchise in the league, has been spending money lavishly, and has signed twenty players. In Detroit, however, the situation is different. One group has the franchise, and the other claims to have purchased the whole Victoria team.

DIRTY METHOD CAMPAIGNING

Ottawa Journalist Joins Out Kind of People Premier Meighen is With

(By R. J. Deachman) A man is known by the company he keeps. During his Maritime campaign the Right Hon. Arthur Meighen had as his travelling companion and associate upon the public platform, one A. J. Doucet, late member of parliament for the constituency of Kent, New Brunswick. During the course of this series of meetings, Mr. Doucet explained every night, how the late Minister of Justice, Mr. Ernest Lapointe, and a number of boon companions, had travelled on a wild joy-ride on a government boat down the St. Lawrence during the past summer. Nicholson was summoned to the aid of his distinguished leader. I have had the pleasure of watching from the Press Gallery to performances of parliament for an entire session. THREE MINES LOOK LIKELY

Kitsault River Properties Showing Much Promise Under Recent Development.

The LeRoy and Silver Cord properties, situated on the north-east fork of the Kitsault River, and the Eagle near the LaRose, which are being developed by the Kitsault Eagle Mines Ltd., of Vancouver, promise to become real producing mines in the near future, says the Alice Arm Herald.

W. S. Bacon, mining engineer, who recently examined the three properties, took out a large number of ore samples for assaying. The samples from the LeRoy gave returns of 104 ozs. silver per ton. The vein from which these samples were taken is about 4 feet wide and has been traced on the surface for about 1500 feet, states A. McGuire, who is in charge of operations. Several other veins are located on the property which should eventually develop a big tonnage.

Silver Cord Returns

Samples taken by Mr. Bacon from the Silver Cord gave returns of from \$16 to \$45 lb gold and silver. The vein on this property is about 50 feet wide and has been traced on the surface 3000 feet.

Present work on the LeRoy consists of driving surface cross-cuts on the ore body, in order to obtain an idea of its persistence, and to gain definite knowledge as to the location of a tunnel when underground work commences. It is expected that work will be continued until the snow flies.

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SHAKEUP IN THE DEPARTMENT OF UTILITIES SUGGESTED FOLLOWING REPORT TO COUNCIL LAST NIGHT.

In the power house. This was only one instance proving that a showdown as far as the staff was concerned was needed. Officials had lied to the council and even the newspapers had given false reports. What had been called slides and washouts were really blowouts in the line due to the neglect of the line. In view of all the circumstances, Ald. Perry announced that he intended at the next meeting of the council bringing in a motion providing for a change.

Defends Staff

Defending the power house staff, Ald. Brown said he was present at the time and Ald. Perry had been told that part of the valve was going to be sent to the dry dock—not that it was already there.

Ald. Perry insisted that he had been told the valve was at the dry dock.

Ald. Brown stated further that the superintendent had been paying down expenses as he had been instructed to do and he should not be condemned for that. The first break in the line last year had been caused by a tree falling on the line. The second break might have been a blowout.

Ald. Perry insisted that the first break was a blowout. The officials were "not faithful and had lied to us." It was time the city got somebody who was responsible.

Serious Situation

Mayor Newton told of events leading up to the inspection of the line by the engineer and the superintendent. It had been Ald. Perry who had first brought the seriousness of the matter to the attention of the committee. To finance the work \$1,700 could be obtained from the estimate of the city engineer's administration, there was the utilities estimate of \$1,800 for maintenance and \$1,500 additional would be needed.

Discussion followed as to who should be held responsible for the pipe line and the work to be done on it. Ald. Perry said his notice of motion would take care of all that but, in view of the notice of motion not coming up for a week, other aldermen were not satisfied.

Ald. Perry insisted that the city engineer should be in charge of the work and, addressing the members of the utilities committee, said if they had taken care of their jobs the matter would never have come up. "You lied down on your job," he accused.
