UNITED FARMERS MAKE SWEEP IN ALBERTA

ARTHUR MEIGHEN SWORN IN AS NEW PREMIER OF CANADA THIS MORNING

Government of Prairie Province is Sustained with Greater Majority

Early standing of parties today gave U.F.A. 42 seats out of 60--Liberals second

EDMONTON, June 29.—Premier J. E. Brownlee, fighting his first campaign as leader of the United Farmers of Alberta, returned to power yesterday in the general provincial election with an increased majority. Early in the evening it became apparent that the electors had endorsed the record of the United Farmers government during its first term of office and had given a mandate for another five years. Throughout the night, as the returns straggled in, the advantage of the government was increased. The unknown quantity in the election virtually narrowed down early today to the cities of Edmonton and Calgary, where counting of the various choices indicated through the preferential balloting system proceeded slowly. Results in the cities will, it is expected, not be known until tonight and the same situation exists in a number of rural polls.

AIR CHARGED WITH ROBBERY

Shelmeyer and Nellie Bates, Alleged to Have Robbed Mail Sleigh, Laid at Seward.

SEWARD, June 29.—Aboard the government steamer Jeff Davis from Nenana, William Shelmeyer and Nellie Bates, charged with the robbery in December, 1922, at Iditarod, 250 miles southwest of here, of a mail pouch containing \$30,000, have arrived here. The pair were arrested at Flat, north of the Iditarod district. Judge Clegg was also on the vessel, coming here to hold court. Shelmeyer and the Bates woman are said to have divided the money, the man being well outside of Alaska with \$13,000, which he spent during a trip to Mexico, where he was traced and arrested upon his return. The woman is under a \$25,000 bond.

PEPPARD'S BODY FOUND?

Richmond Chief of Police Believes that Remains Found in Fraser River May Be His.

VANCOUVER, June 29.—That an unidentified body found in the north arm of the Fraser River, south of here, in Richmond municipality may be that of Clarence Peppard, the wealthy Minneapolis contractor who disappeared from a local hotel last December, is the opinion expressed by Chief of Police Waddell, of Richmond. An answer to Peppard's disappearance is said to have been seen at Marpole near the place where the body was found on the night Peppard disappeared. Identification of the body may be a difficult matter, said Chief Waddell, owing to the badly decomposed condition of the remains.

CONFIDENCE IN PREMIER BRIAND

Tenth Cabinet Presented Its Program to Parliament Today.

PARIS, June 29.—Premier Briand's tenth cabinet presented its program before parliament today and won a vote of confidence by a majority of 162 on demand from the Premier that interpellations on the financial situation be responded.

NEW CABINET IS LINED UP

House Reassembled this Afternoon With Conservatives in Government Seats

OTTAWA, June 29.—When the House opened this afternoon Sir Henry Drayton occupied the seat formerly held by Premier King, who was in Mr. Meighen's seat. Sir Henry announced that Mr. Meighen had decided, in order to avoid delay in the completion of business, that a temporary cabinet of seven members, without portfolio, would be sworn in to assume responsibility as acting ministers of the several departments.

Hon. R. B. Bennett, of Calgary, was the seventh member of the cabinet. The others are as already announced. Sir Henry Drayton announced that the new government would accept the subject matter introduced by Mr. Fansher to the Stevens' customs committee motion adding that as soon as prorogation takes place Mr. Meighen would address himself to the task of forming a constituted government.

Sir Henry Drayton takes over the finance and railway department; Dr. Manion, health and soldiers re-establishment, post office, immigration and labor departments; Sir George Perley the department of the secretary of state and public works; H. H. Stevens, customs and Indian affairs, mines, interior, agriculture and trade and commerce; Hugh Guthrie, justice and national defence; W. A. Black, marine and fisheries.

Professor W. C. Keirstead, Ph.D., of New Brunswick, will address the Women's Canadian Club at 3 p.m. June 30, in the Boston Hall.

Professor H. Aubrey Pryce, and daughter Audrey, will sail on the Cardena this afternoon on a holiday trip south.

Conservatives Take Over Reins of Government at Ottawa Today; Progressive Support Promised

OTTAWA, June 29.—Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Conservatives, was sworn in this morning as Premier of Canada. He thereby will vacate his seat in the House of Commons until a by-election. It is understood that his first lieutenant, Sir Henry Drayton, former minister of finance, will be the acting government leader in the House. Several ministers will also be appointed to the business through the House. It is understood that Sir Henry Drayton, Hon. H. H. Stevens, Sir George Perley, Hon. Dr. Manion, Hon. Hugh Guthrie and Hon. W. A. Black, of Halifax, have already been sworn in to the cabinet.

After a two-hour caucus this morning, the Liberals maintained a "wait and see" attitude with regard to the new government. "The Farmer Party stands for a complete clean-up of the customs from coast to coast," said Miss Agnes McPhail, the Progressive lady member, this morning, after a caucus of her party. "On the condition that a Dominion wide judicial inquiry is undertaken, the Progressives will be willing to facilitate the winding up of the business of the session by granting the necessary supply and putting through such legislation as remains to be dealt with. If the Conservatives consent to this program, they will not lack support."

Miss McPhail added that an election was not desired at this time by the Progressives.

Local Elevator Fully Capable of Taking Care of Shipments Pool Will Direct Through It

That the local elevator is one of the finest plants he has ever seen and is fully capable of taking care of all the grain shipping business it will be possible to put through it this coming season was the opinion expressed by George Melvor, manager of the Canadian Co-operative Wheat Producers Limited, who, in company with F. G. Danson, made an inspection of the grain plant and shipping facilities yesterday in connection with the taking over of the elevator lease from the government on Aug. 1. Mr. Melvor stated that an experienced grain man, who would have his headquarters at the elevator, would be engaged by the pool to take full charge of the grain shipping business here. Except for one or two thoroughly experienced men other positions with the company would be filled with local men so long as they could fill the bill.

Mr. Melvor, accompanied by Mrs. Melvor, left on this morning's train for Calgary. Mr. Melvor will return to the city later in the fall to supervise the loading and despatch of the first freighter to call at the elevator for grain. He pointed out the importance of seeing that everything went off smoothly with the first

SALMON RUN IS LITTLE BETTER

High Boat on Skeena Took 54 Fish.—Naas and Queen Charlottes.

According to the latest reports, the run of sockeye salmon on the Skeena River for the past week is about much the same as last year and not quite so good as two years ago. The run has continued to improve during the week, but the improvement has been slight. The highest boat took 54 sockeye.

The run on the Naas River for the past week is slightly less than last year, but has improved over the previous week.

The run of salmon on the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands continues to improve.

District Prices
A readjustment of prices has been carried out this year in No. 2 district of B. C., the fishermen using cannery gear, getting 35c apiece for sockeyes, 20c for cohoes and steelheads, 2½c for pinks and 4c for chums.

The independent fishermen, who own their own boats and gear, get 52½ for sockeyes, 30c for cohoes and steelheads, 3½c for pinks and 6c for chums. These prices are in excess of last year's averages.

TO CONTINUE POLAR QUEST

General Noble, Pilot of Norge, Plans Further Exploration Work.

SEATTLE, June 29.—General Umberto Noble, pilot of the Norge expedition over the North Pole, declared yesterday that "when I return to Italy I expect to submit to Premier Mussolini plans I have made tentatively for subsequent polar expeditions. Our flight was simply a beginning and there is much more that must be done and must be continued by future generations."

JOSEPH HEARST GETS 7 YEARS

Former Head of Music Publishing Firm Convicted of Theft of \$385,000.

WINNIPEG, June 29.—Joseph Hearst, former president of the Hearst Music Publishing Co., was sentenced this morning to seven years in the penitentiary following his conviction yesterday on a charge of theft of \$385,000 through making use of forged documents and false pretences.

Purser of Cardena Will Succeed Jack Barnsley as Representative of Union Steamship Co.

Harold Brown, general manager of the Union Steamship Co., Ltd., of British Columbia, announces that Russell M. Election Seems Only Solution.

The Mackenzie King government has resigned and Meighan has been called upon to form an administration at Ottawa. The Progressives, after obtaining all they wanted from the Liberal regime, have bitten the hand that fed them, for it was their defection that brought about the crisis which provoked Mackenzie King to submit the resignation of his government after his request for dissolution had been denied by the Governor General.

Just as the Liberals depended on the support of the Progressives and others to retain control in the House so will the Conservatives have to do if they decide to take over the reins of government. They cannot hope to hold the support of the Progressives any more than the Liberals were able to do. True, they might take over and hold the administration for the time being if the House now prorogued without any further contentious business coming up but, in parliamentary session, they could hardly expect to retain control.

The situation has indeed come to an impasse. Any party to remain in control must continue to pander to the irresponsible group of Progressives. The air must be cleared and, while even an election might not improve the situation, it seems about the only recourse. It is safe to predict that there will be another federal contest within a twelve-month and it is at least to be hoped that, however it may go, either one of the major parties will have a working majority. It is impossible for anyone to carry on under present conditions.

Much Grain to be Shipped Here.

The announcement by George McIvor, general manager of the wheat pool, that it is the intention to ship ten or fifteen million bushels of grain through the Prince Rupert elevator this year is welcome news. That will mean that fifty or so freight vessels will have to come here to pick up cargo. It will be the largest shipping movement in the history of the city. These ships will bring business to the port and, together with the staff of the elevator, will make conditions much improved during the winter. And, at that, it will probably be only the starting of still greater things in commercial development for this port.

Prohibition May Be Presidential Issue.

Politicians of both the great parties in the United States, Republican and Democrat, are worried over the numerous signs that the wet and dry issue is going to have a foremost place in the 1928 presidential campaign. Many of them would like to thrust it aside, but the signs are increasing that it will be impossible to do so.

Should the 1928 campaign resolve itself largely into a wet and dry fight it would be embarrassing to most of the leaders. Raising of this issue will inevitably tend to throw other issues into the eclipse. If the prohibition controversy becomes hot, all the important economic issues are likely to be completely overshadowed.

The fact that Senator Borah of Idaho has lately come out in support of the drys against the idea of a referendum on prohibition is interpreted as meaning he is a presidential aspirant and is playing for the support of the drys, including the Anti-Saloon League and kindred organizations. President Coolidge latterly has taken a course which many believe is intended to solidify himself with the drys.

Governor Al Smith of New York just now is looming up as the man most likely to get the Democratic nomination for President in 1928. He is an avowed wet. Should he be named, a Republican nominee who had the support of the drys throughout the country would be in a strong position to win if the contention of the drys is true that the country on a test would be overwhelmingly for prohibition.

In any event, the manoeuvres of political leaders of both parties, particularly presidential aspirants, on the liquor question from now on are going to be watched with keenness. The liquor question is looming up to a degree that was unknown in 1924 or 1920 or, indeed, in any presidential campaign year heretofore.

Forty or Fifty Will Spend Summer Vacation Near Barkerville



STORK DEFENDS LOCAL ELEVATOR

Replies to Conservative Attack Against Construction of Grain Plant.

"The Prince Rupert elevator never was a political elevator," declared Fred Stork, M.P. for Skeena, in the course of the debate at Ottawa on June 18, when the building of the grain plant here was again attacked by leading Conservatives, including Hon. R. B. Bennett and Sir Henry Drayton.

"Hon. gentlemen opposite always insist that this elevator was built for the purpose of influencing the elections and winning the seat. Let me repeat what I have said several times already in this House, that we never required any such subsidy in order to carry the elections in 1917 when the War Time Elections Act was in effect and was used for the benefit of hon. gentlemen opposite. On the contrary, the people of Skeena stood solidly behind Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy of developing the country to be served by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. And in 1917, without the subsidy on that elevator, they cast their votes in favor of the Liberal candidate, and again in 1921 and in 1925.

"In connection with the construction of this elevator at the end of the Grand Trunk Pacific line, I may point out that the people of Canada have a tremendous investment in that railway. When it was taken over and administered by the Mackenzie and Mann people, who were the natural enemies of the Grand Trunk Pacific, it was natural that it should fall into disuse, and unless the people of Canada are prepared to spend a little more money at the end of the Grand Trunk Pacific and develop some traffic over that line, it will always show a great deficit. This government decided that the piece of railway was worth salvaging, that it was worth spending more money on, and in order to induce traffic over the line they decided to construct an elevator in Prince Rupert. The construction of that elevator will bring this fall a tremendous tonnage over that line. The trade with the Orient is developing and increasing all the time, and Prince Rupert is the logical port.

Vancouver and Prince Rupert

"Stress is laid upon the ill-treatment of Vancouver by the placing of the elevator in Prince Rupert. For the last two years there has been congestion in the port of Vancouver when the wheat movement was on. Hundreds of thousands of cars, sprinkled all along the way from the prairie to Vancouver have been held up because of congestion at Vancouver; because at that port they could not handle the traffic offered. Surely it is a dog in the manger policy for Vancouver and the Vancouver supporters who sit on the other side of the House to claim that even though Vancouver is congested with wheat, even though they are unable to take care of the wheat that is routed there, no other port should get the traffic.

Room For Two Ports

"There is room on the Pacific Coast for two ports. Prince Rupert has many natural advantages as a port and we have great aspirations for its future in that regard. Adjacent as it is to the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, it will meet the needs of a vast wheat growing area which could only be served by the construction of this elevator. "Last year I was up on the shores of Francois Lake and I saw growing there a crop of wheat the equal of any wheat grown in Canada. There are over a million acres of wheat land adjacent to the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway which could use this elevator. Its construction is designed to create traffic over the Grand Trunk Pacific line of railway and to open up and develop a wheat country which otherwise would be developed.
