GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED BY 10 MAJORITY

PRINCE RUPERT CITY BONDS FETCHED GOOD PRICE WHEN SOLD YESTERDAY

Liberal Government is Sustained by Majority of 10 in Second Vote

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—By a majority of ten the House of Commons last night defeated the Conservative amendment to the government motion on the address in reply to the speech from the throne, which followed party lines so far as the Conservatives and Liberals were concerned and in which the government was supported by all the members of the Progressive, Labor and Independent groups. The vote stood 125 to 115.

The amendment submitted by Hon. Arthur Meighen, which was in the nature of a want of confidence motion, called upon the House to express regret that the speech from the throne gives no indication of a policy designed to enlarge the volume of employment and particularly to give to producers of farm products, coal and primary products the advantage they are, under present world conditions, entitled to enjoy in the markets of the country.

The debate lasted two weeks. Donald Sutherland, Conservative, moved the adjournment of the debate as he wanted to say a few words on the main motion. It is understood he will move another amendment advocating protection for the dairy industry.

\$260,000 IN STAMPS STOLEN

Armed Robbers Raided Central Post Office at Pawtucket and Got Away

PAWTUCKET, Mass., Feb. 2.—Armed robbers who raided the central post office early yesterday secured \$250,000 worth of stamps. This is said to be the largest robbery ever suffered by the postal department in New England.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 2.—The British steamer Ryburn, which it was feared had been lost, reached port this morning from Rotterdam 19 days overdue.

ORE STRIKE AT LA ROSE MINE

Striking of Shoot Gives Stopping Distance of 140 Feet of Rich Silver

(Special to Daily News)
ALICE ARM, Feb. 2.—The best news that the camp has had for some time was the word brought down from the La Rose property this week that the ore shoot had been struck at depth. And when it is considered that this breaking into the ore gives a stopping distance of 140 feet to the ore shoot exposed in the shaft, and from which ore shoot a shipment of ten tons gave smelter returns of 355 ozs. silver, it can be seen that this strike is of no mean importance to the camp.

This getting the ore at depth on the La Rose property is naturally very pleasing to the management, whose faith and efforts have been rewarded. Work on the La Rose was started last July, since which time some six hundred feet of tunnelling has been done. It is the intention of the management to extend a raise, following the ore body through to the surface.

The La Rose property lies seven miles from the water, and three fourth miles from the D.V. railroad. It is a stock company with its head office and principal owners located in Prince Rupert.

BUILD TANKER AT VANCOUVER

Burrard Drydock Company's Plant Has Contract for New Vessel

NORTH VANCOUVER, Feb. 2.—Construction will begin immediately at the Burrard Drydock Company's plant here of a tanker for the Imperial Oil Company, which is expected will be used on the Tacoma Skagway run, according to the announcement of Clarence Wallace today. The vessel will probably be completed in four and a half months and the cost will be \$80,000.

NO PASTOR IS YET APPOINTED

Presbyterian Congregation Fail to Choose Successor to Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant

At the fourth meeting of the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church called last night for the purpose of extending a call to fill the vacancy caused by the departure of Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, again no progress was made. By a vote of 64 to 36, the proposal to extend a call to a United Church minister located on the prairies was rejected. There will likely be another congregational meeting in two weeks' time. Thomas McClymont presided at last night's meeting.

CHARLES STREET DIED IN HOSPITAL

The death occurred this morning in the hospital of Charles Street of this city. Mr. Street was 63 years of age, born in Oregon. By profession he was a miner and by religion a Baptist. He had been in the hospital since November 30.

General Jail Delivery to Follow Hunter Judgment on Judge McGill's Cases

(Special to Daily News)
VANCOUVER, Feb. 2.—A jail delivery of an unknown number of prisoners in Okalla prison cannot be averted. This was admitted today by Hon. A. M. Manson, Attorney General of British Columbia, referring to a Supreme Court judgment here yesterday which declared that juvenile judge Helen Gregory McGill's sentences during her entire term of office were without force.

It is revealed that when the woman judge was appointed by the B.C. Government the officials neglected to get the official affirmative of the Canadian government at Ottawa. Yesterday James Sinn, who was given eighteen months for an offense against a girl, secured his freedom on a habeas corpus application. Lawyers for other offenders against juveniles behind the bars are preparing to secure the release of their clients.

The Attorney General has wired Ottawa to get Judge McGill's appointment ratified, but the adjustment will not legalize the convictions already made by her.

Consolidated Exporters Fined \$2,500 Today for Illegal Sale of Liquor

Magistrate McClymont finds defendant guilty and prosecuting counsel asks for extreme penalty of \$4,000 this morning

Finding that the sale of liquor to E. Audahl on November 16, around which the case was centred, had not been made in good faith in the knowledge that Audahl was an American and that the liquor was for export, Magistrate McClymont in the city police court this morning convicted the Consolidated Exporters Corporation Ltd. on a charge of unlawfully selling intoxicating liquor in violation of the Government Liquor Act and imposed a fine of \$2,500. Thus was disposed of the first of a series of charges against the Consolidated Company. There is one further charge of unlawful selling and several involving alleged falsification of records. The second of the selling cases is proceeding this afternoon, having been called at 2:30.

High Price Obtained for Prince Rupert City Bonds when Tenders were Opened Yesterday Afternoon

The city's credit has improved considerably during the past year it was indicated at the special meeting of the council yesterday afternoon when seven tenders were submitted for an issue of \$89,650 worth of 5% per cent ten year local improvement debentures. The highest offer, 97.51 from A. E. Ames & Co. of Victoria through Col. J. W. Nicholls, the company's local agent, was accepted. This figure was almost as high as was made a few months ago by the Royal Financial Corporation of Vancouver in buying an issue of six per cent bonds.

Those present at the meeting of the council were Mayor Newton, Ald. Casey, Ald. Jos. Greer, Ald. McKechnie, Ald. Larsen, Ald. W. J. Greer and Col. J. W. Nicholls. Acceptance of the Ames' offer was moved by Ald. Casey and seconded by Ald. Jos. Greer. It was reported by the mayor that the city had agreed to sell the Cemetery Road \$18,500 issue at the rate offered last year. The concern had previously bid on this and would have had it last year had it not been for a technicality which made a revote at the last election necessary. There was some discussion as to whether this lower rate would prejudice the issue now being sold to Ames & Co. but Col. Nicholls felt that, since the sale had been subsequently agreed to, nothing could be done about it. If the Royal Financial Corporation wanted the bonds still, the city would have to take the loss. If it so happened, however, that the city should decide not to take the Royal Financial figure he felt that Ames & Co. would be ready to take that issue as well at the figure now quoted.

Monied Interests of East are Trying to Control Government States Premier Mackenzie King

Liberal Party Stands for Unity of all Canadians Declares Leader at Luncheon in His Honor at Prince Albert

PRINCE ALBERT, Feb. 2.—Premier Mackenzie King opened his campaign here last night with a speech in which he charged that the monied interests of Eastern Canada were endeavoring to get control of the Government of the country. He referred to Mr. Meighen's tariff policy, saying: "Back of this protectionist thought lies the desire of a few men of great wealth to get political control of the country. That the topic of real interest in Canada today was whether a few men who are very wealthy and who have who reside for the most part in Eastern Canada and in Montreal more than anywhere else, whether these few men are going to succeed in getting political control in this country so that they can make the policies of Canada over to their monied interests and their selfish purposes."

PREMIER MINE LOSES APPEAL

Coastwise Steamship Company Not Liable for Loss of Cargo of Ore

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—The supreme court this morning dismissed with costs the appeal of the Premier Gold Mining Company against the Coastwise Steamship Company. The question involved the liability of the steamship company for the loss of the cargo of ore which involved a sum of \$17,500. The trial judge held that the loss was due to perils at sea and this view was upheld by the B.C. Court of Appeal.

FORMER M.P. DIED AT HOME

Was Charged With Theft and Forgery and Trial to Take Place Tomorrow

TORONTO, Feb. 2.—J. A. M. Armstrong, former member of Parliament for North York, who was awaiting trial on several charges of theft and forgery and obtaining money under false pretences, died at his home in Lloydtown this morning. He was out on bail for \$50,000 after the case had been remanded until tomorrow.

NEGRO TO HANG

Troops Guard Court as Man is Convicted in Sixteen Minutes

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 2.—Ed Harris, a negro, who pleaded guilty to attacking a woman and murdering her husband and two children, was convicted in sixteen minutes this morning and will hang on March 5. A thousand state troopers guarded the court.

BOYS WINNER AT BILLIARDS

Gets Step Nearer Championship by Defeating Manitoba Player Yesterday

WINNIPEG, Feb. 2.—Sid Boys of Vancouver won the western Canada English billiard title, defeating Tom Brownlie, the Manitoba champion, in the final playoff by 4,000 to 3,566 points.





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RUN OF HERRING ON VANCOUVER ISLAND IS PHENOMENAL THIS YEAR

VANCOUVER, Feb. 2.—Due to phenomenal runs on the east coast of Vancouver Island from Salt Spring Island to Nanoose Bay the herring catch for the province is running far above average reports today said. The catch up to January 23 was more than half again the figures up to January 23, 1925.

Last year's catch was 30,353 tons. To January 23 of this year the catch was 46,749 tons. The latter figure is made up of 30,428 tons from the east shore and 15,291 from the west coast of the island.

MAKING COURSES FOR GOLF IN SMALL CITIES

Example of Swift Current is Being Followed in United States

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 2.—Golfers of the United States are working night and day to provide facilities for the tremendous increase of players of all ages, and the example of Swift Current, Sask., in building an eighteen-hole course is cited as an example of how the dearth of golf links in small towns can be overcome.

The Associated Press in a recent dispatch has this to say about Swift Current golf course: "Three citizens, who got a taste of golf while abroad as soldiers, obtained permission to use a piece of prairie, invested five dollars in shovels and picks, donned overalls and began to dig out a links for themselves. They made three holes and, induced some fellow townsmen to try their luck over the rugged fairways from the earthen tees

to the sanded greens.

"No western town was ever greater than that of the Swift Current Golf Club, for within a few weeks there were a hundred members, all willing workers. They kept delving in the virgin prairie until eighteen holes were completed, and then they chipped in and bought the land, some 400 acres. Using a farm house for a club house they began to improve the links with bunkers, a watering plant and a rustic gateway."

Municipal links and fee courses have partly made a place for the golfer of modest means but the demand has not been half supplied. Another aim is to get the price of golfing paraphernalia down to bargain prices.

There is still a dearth of golf links in small towns, but these places are rapidly getting courses. Golf is particularly cheap in several cities, because land can be obtained for a small sum, transportation is without cost and there is no social side to require large funds.

U.S. INVADED BY CANADIANS

Honors in Several Lines of Sport go to Athletes from this Country

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—The invasion of the United States by Canadian athletes continues at a record pace. The dominion stepped off on her right foot at the opening of the winter sport season by introducing professional hockey to New York and Pittsburgh. Boston was a member of the National Hockey League in 1924-25; next came an army of puck chasers from the senior intercollegiate league for a series of games with the leading eastern universities of the United States; Charles Gorman, the Saint John, N.B., speed skater, has made his 1926 debut in quest of more laurels; Canadian students have given a favorable account of themselves in skiing and snow shoe meets; and now comes word of an invasion of track men from Canada who intend to compete in the indoor meets in this district in the near future, against the top-notchers of the United States.

Gilbert Holland, a big colored boy who has been wearing the colors of the Y.M.C.A. at Hamilton, Ontario, checked into New York the other day and announced his intention of competing in many of the Metropolitan games. Holland is a six-footer, built along the lines of Bob Simpson, the University of Missouri athlete who was the first man to beat 45 seconds for the 120-yard high hurdles. The Hamilton "limber-topper" too, has been credited with the time of 14 1-5 for that event and track followers are looking for the keenest of skill and speed from the Canuck when he runs next month. The colored flyer has already filed entries for the Wileo Athletic Association and the Crescent Athletic Club track games to be held in this city and he will then have an opportunity to compete against such well known hurdlers as Carl Christensen, Herbie Myers and Ray Wolf.

The Dominion will also have a representative at the Millrose A.C. meet in this city. Allen T. Christie, the University of Toronto middle-distance star is to come down for those famous games. Christie is expected to start in a special 600 yard event, a feature of the games, while he will also have a place on the Canadian team that will compete in the international one mile relay race.

CONSOLIDATED EXPORTERS FINED \$2,500 TODAY FOR ILLEGAL SALE OF LIQUOR.

(continued from page 1)

that the sale to Audahl had not been made in good faith and, therefore, he found the accused guilty.

L. W. Patmore, prosecution counsel, asked to be heard on the matter of a penalty. He read the act providing for a minimum fine of \$1,000 and a maximum of \$3,000 in the case of a first offence as this was being treated.

Notorious Company

"I ask that you submit the extreme penalty of \$3,000," submitted Mr. Patmore. "You have the right to inquire into the record of this company and ascertain its record just as a judge would do in sentencing a criminal. It must be known to Your Worship that this corporation has been notorious in the way it has carried on the smuggling of liquor into the United States. It has been continually before the courts in the United States, its ships have been seized, its officers indicted and even Mr. Besner has not the right to enter the United States. The activities of the company have made the fair name of Canada stench in the ears of the decent people of the United States. In fact, the situation became so bad that a treaty was entered into between the United States and Canada in order to suppress smuggling and put down the selling of liquor in such a manner to the citizens of the United States. Under the circumstances, it is my contention that you would not be doing your duty if you did not impose the extreme penalty."

Defense Plea

In meeting Mr. Patmore's contention as to penalty, Milton Gonzales, counsel for the defence, pointed out that this was the first offence recorded against the company and there was no evidence of any other criminal offence in Canada. There was no law, as far as Canada was concerned, to prevent the shipping of liquor into the United States. It made no difference what the United States might or might not have done as far as this company was concerned. It was up to the United States and not to Canada to administer the laws of the United States.

Speaking of the treaty referred to by Mr. Patmore, Mr. Gonzales declared that the federal government did not attempt to say that liquor could not be sold in the United States. All the federal government had done was to give the United States access to the records. There was no evidence before the court of a bad record as far as the Consolidated Exporters Corporation was concerned. The only evidence was what might have been seen in the newspapers. There was no evidence but that this was the first violation and, therefore, there was no reason but for the imposition of a minimum fine.

Not Influenced

Passing the penalty, Magistrate McClymont stated that what the corporation might or might not have done in other places had nothing to do with the one case that was before the court.

"What might have been done in other countries has nothing to do with me and I would like to make it clear to all that no outside reports have had anything to do with the decision now made. It is not my habit to impose the full penalties in the case of first offences. Neither do I propose to impose the minimum in this case. I fine the accused \$2,500." Court then adjourned until 2.30 this afternoon, after counsel had agreed to proceed with the second selling charge which is to be tried separately and in which evidence of a similar nature to that in the first case will be offered anew by the crown. Mr. Gonzales offered to accept the evidence of the first case for the second but Mr. Patmore felt it would be advisable to proceed separately.

Yesterday's Evidence

The first witness at the afternoon session yesterday was F. G. Pyle who was recalled by Mr. Patmore. He said that it had not been usual for him to fill orders as the fishermen generally came in late in the afternoon after he had left the place. If they came in the morning, however, he sometimes assisted the warehouseman. Answering a question by Mr. Gonzales, Mr. Pyle said he had turned over to the Liquor Board officers all the books of the company relating to imports and exports of liquor.

Besner on Stand

Officer Besner, manager of the Consolidated Export Corporation Ltd., was then called to the stand. He confirmed Mr. Pyle's evidence as to the system of handling liquor at the establishment. Different government inspectors had been aware of the custom of lumping orders under one invoice which had been followed for three or four years. The records had always been placed on the table for the inspectors. Witness said that he was present at the time of the particular sale to Audahl. It was customary for his firm to ascertain that the customers were really Americans and to warn them that the liquor was not to be consumed within the province. The sale had been made in good faith. It was known that Audahl was an American and would be leaving on the Resolute, an American boat. It was the custom for the company to send the orders to the boats as a precaution and to facilitate the deliveries.

Mr. Besner said he always believed that it was permissible to conduct the business in that way. Mr. Patmore, when he was his lawyer, had told him so.

Cross Examination

Under cross examination, Mr. Besner was asked by Mr. Patmore how long it was since he (Besner) had received legal advice from him (Patmore). Mr. Besner replied four or five years ago. Mr. Besner stated that he did not know that the present regulations had only been framed two years ago.

"Since Mr. Manson has been attorney general have I ever advised you on any subject?" asked Mr. Patmore.

"No," answered Mr. Besner.

Mr. Patmore asked Mr. Besner if he believed an American tourist could come off a boat here and buy liquor from him. Mr. Besner replied that he believed he could provided the boat was pulling out for an American port.

It was brought out in evidence that Mr. Besner had bailed Audahl out of jail after he had been arrested.

Mr. Besner agreed that the bunching in the invoices and returns to the government was a mistake although it did not necessarily follow that the intention was thereby to deceive the government.

Selling in Town

"When you make a sale to some one living in town, how would you cover it up in the records?" asked Mr. Patmore. There was some objection to this question both by Mr. Besner and his counsel but it was finally answered by Mr. Besner stating that he no longer sold liquor to people in the city, having discontinued that practice some two years ago. His warehousemen were instructed not to sell liquor to people in the city and he could swear that he knew of no such sale in the last year. Mr. Besner admitted, however, that it would be easy to cover up illegal sales by bunching the individual transactions in the reports.

Answering another question by Mr. Gonzales, Mr. Besner said he would not permit sales, knowing that the liquor was not destined for outside the province.

Both Constables Grant and Harrison were recalled in rebuttal and it developed that they had actually accompanied one shipment from the warehouse to the schooner Kanaga. This shipment had tallied with the invoice and government return but a curious point was drawn out in that the shipment had been sent to the boat C.O.D. after one Ness had already paid for it at the warehouse in the presence of the detectives. Mr. Pyle, again called in this connection, said that an error had been made in sending it to the boat C.O.D. This completed the evidence.

Argument of Counsel

Mr. Gonzales submitted that decision in the case could depend on only one point—whether or not the defendant in making the sale to Audahl had acted in good faith in selling for export. It was decided that Mr. Pyle had been deliberately attempting to deceive then "I am licked before I start," Mr. Gonzales conceded. If it was decided that Mr. Pyle had acted in good faith then there remained nothing but the point of law. Mr. Gonzales, therefore, asked the magistrate for a finding on fact. Because Americans went to the warehouse and were able to get a bottle, the impression had gone abroad that there was protection. "As far as we are concerned," said Mr. Gonzales, "this is a test case." He asked that the issue be not beclouded with Mr. Patmore's charges of irregularities. The defence might have to admit blunders in that connection but, if returns had been made care-

lessly, it was because Mr. Pyle had been so shown by Mr. Walsh, the government inspector. Then it was only a technical violation committed in good faith and one thousand such irregularities would not affect the case of selling. These irregularities were being drawn as a red herring across the trail by Mr. Patmore whereas, Mr. Gonzales contended, in some instances they only served to further establish the good faith of the defendant company and its officials. There was no justification for a conclusion that any attempt had been made to deceive. The Liquor Board had always been given all the information it required from the company, and it was always aware of what was going on and the system that had been followed.

Ridicules Evidence

After pointing out that it was unusual to first ask for a finding of fact in a police court case, Mr. Patmore paid his respects to the evidence of Mr. Walsh, the inspector, who had "outpiled Pyle" and had gone so far as to say that he had told Mr. Pyle that he could even bunch shipments to various boats in the government returns. Could one believe the evidence of an ex-inspector who had so flouted the law? Would not such a check as Mr. Walsh had accepted offer "a beautiful way to carry on blind-pigging?" Mr. Patmore submitted that the magistrate would be justified in disbelieving every thing Mr. Walsh said.

The records went to show, Mr. Patmore argued, that a certain routine had been followed in connection with the making of sales and deliveries. Shipments had usually been given to the Hyde Transfer for delivery but not so in this case. Mr. Patmore suggested that the taxi driver had been paid \$1 the next day in this transaction so as to make it

CHARGES WOMAN STOLE HUSBAND

Ketchikan Case Before Courts of Alienation of Affection Brought by Wife

KETCHIKAN, Feb. 2.—Said to be the first suit of its kind ever to be recorded in the courts of the Territory, Mrs. Imogene Levy filed a complaint against Irene Lanahan alleging alienation of affections. The plaintiff alleges that the defendant has wilfully, wickedly and maliciously induced W. I. Levy to leave her, and has caused her damage of body, mind and estate in the amount of \$30,000.

Married 18 Years

In her complaint, Mrs. Levy alleges "that she has for 18 years been the lawful wife of W. I. Levy; that on or about the month of June 1925, and prior to that date, while she, Mrs. Imogene Levy, was absent from her residence in Ketchikan and visiting in Pasadena, California, with her father, and enjoying the support, protection, affection and respect of W. I. Levy, Irene Lanahan well knowing W. I. Levy was the husband of the plaintiff and wrongfully intending to injure the plaintiff and deprive her of her husband's society, protection, aid and support, wilfully, wickedly and maliciously gained his affection and induced him to have carnal intercourse and did entice him, by offer of money and otherwise and to leave the plaintiff without support and go to San Diego, California, and other places; that thereafter and at various times between the month of June 1925 and January 26, 1926, the defendant continued unlawful and wrongful intercourse with W. I. Levy and on or about June 18, 1925, induced and unlawfully and maliciously enticed W. I. Levy to desert Mrs. Imogene Levy and leave her without means of support and did go to San Diego, California, and other places with him, returning finally to Ketchikan; and that Irene Lanahan and W. I. Levy now continue to live unlawfully as man and wife where the defendant harbors and detains W. I. Levy against the will of the plaintiff and has wilfully debauched him; and Mrs. Imogene Levy further declares that her husband had become estranged from her and that she has been deprived of the society, protection, comfort, happiness and benefits W. I. Levy previously extended to her, and that she has suffered distress of body, mind and estate to her damage in the amount of \$30,000 and judgment against Irene Lanahan in the sum of \$30,000 and the costs of the suit are demanded.

OPEN BARGAINING FOR PROGRESSIVE AND LABOR SUPPORT

Candidus, Ottawa Press Gallery correspondent of the New Outlook, introducing his weekly review of the political situation says in part:

"There has been a good deal of hysterical writing in some of the political papers about what is described as an 'orgy' of bargaining between the groups in the House of Commons. Now there is no doubt whatever that there has been—and it is likely to continue to be—a great deal of bargaining between the two old parties and the independent groups.
