EXPRESS TRAIN IN EAST WRECKED

CONSERVATIVES URGED STOP FIGHTING AMONG SELVES

Pooley Charges That Conservatives Are In Pay of The Liberals

Hon. S. F. Tolmie Admits Disagreement in His Own Party and Urges Unity to Defeat the Enemy

VANCOUVER, November 28.—At the annual meeting of the provincial Conservative Association Saturday R. H. Pooley, House leader, reiterated previous statements that there were old-time Conservatives in the pay of Liberals.

His previous statements had been questioned by D. B. Plunkett of Victoria, but he said he had in his possession a photographic copy of a check which he offered as proof of what he said and he warned Conservatives of insidious attempts to create disorder.

The association recommended the appointment of three organizers, expressed alarm at the public debt increase, and endorsed various Winnipeg resolutions in respect to highways, exclusion of Orientals and use of Canadian ports.

Officers of last year were largely re-elected. Hon. S. F. Tolmie, in an address, said the party was shaping up well. He attacked the Liberal party policies, and concluding said there had been disagreement between different "wings" of the party in one or two constituencies.

"The time has come when we must decide whether we are going to fight one another or unite to defeat the enemy."

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CHICAGO'S LIBRARY BOARD that refused to resign at the command of Mayor William Hale Thompson when he ordered them out as part of his anti-British agitation.

STEWART CASE AT ASSIZES

Engineer Collects Withheld Wages But is Criticized by Presiding Judge

Judgment for the plaintiff in the sum of \$174 as money wrongfully deducted from his salary and dismissal of plaintiff's claim for damages as a result of dismissal from the defendant company's service, each side to pay its own costs, was the judgment this morning of Mr. W. A. Macdonald in the action of Ernest Love vs. International Electric Co., the final case at the fall session of the Supreme Court Assizes in Prince Rupert.

L. W. Palmer appeared for the plaintiff and Milton Gonzalez for the defendant company.

Hearing of the case started at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon continuing with a brief dinner adjournment until 11.10 p.m. when examination of ten witnesses—five for the plaintiff and five for the defendant—had been completed.

Court opening again at 9.30 this morning, argument of counsel was heard and deliverance of judgment was completed at 11 o'clock.

The claim of the plaintiff was for recovery of \$211 as the balance of his monthly salary of \$275 for March and for damage on account of dismissal from the service of the company on May 31 of this year.

The period of engagement was for two years commencing December 1, 1925. The deduction of salary of \$211.70 was to cover light and power furnished the plaintiff. His Lordship found that this deduction was unwarranted as a whole and also found that \$37 was due the defendant for power that had been sold by the plaintiff to outside parties in the way of charging batteries.

He therefor found that plaintiff was rightfully due \$174.70.

In the other branch of the case, the judge found that the dismissal by the defendant was justified. There had been wilful disobedience, he found, to the lawful order of E. R. Workman, the managing director. This had, however, been condoned through the fact that defendant had not exercised the right then and there to dismiss plaintiff.

Further justification for the dismissal was, however, found by His Lordship in the subsequent correspondence of the plaintiff to bond houses in the endeavor to undermine the defendant. This attitude was not consistent with the position of a local employee. Hostility had culminated in an assault by plaintiff in May which, His Lordship was not inclined to believe, as had been suggested, was a frame-up on the part of the defendant.

This was an act of insubordination which was followed two days later with the dismissal of plaintiff. His Lordship found that the spirit of the agreement did not call for two months' notice under all circumstances although the agreement called therefor.

Counsel agreed on each side paying its own costs.

Witnesses in the case were: Ernest Love; Mrs. Love; J. P. Hakkinson; Alex. Duncan; and H. D. Rochfort for the plaintiff; John Meneghelli; G. B. Lawrence; Fred Reich; E. R. Workman; and R. W. Kennedy for the defendant company.

Coach Caught Fire When the C.P.R. Express Train Wrecked at Dockerill, Ontario, Sunday

TORONTO, November 28.—A special despatch to the Toronto Star says that six people were killed in yesterday's wreck at Dockerill of whom only Engineer Burnett has been identified. The others are probably foreigners.

The Canadian Pacific official statement says four are dead. Sixteen injured are in the hospital here, four at Smith's Falls, most of them Polish immigrants.

Mrs. Mary Tasharvich, who was in the immigrant car with two little girls said: "The windows were splintered and broken, wood-work rocked from side to side. It was terrible. Directly after the shock the coach caught fire. It was with difficulty I extricated my two children. All about me lay bodies. The injured were moaning and screaming. Everything was covered with blood."

BELLEVILLE, Nov. 28.—Traveling at high speed, the first section of the C.P.R. Montreal-Toronto-Chicago express crashed into a freight at Dockerill siding west of here Sunday afternoon, resulting in the death of W. Burnett, engineer of the passenger train and two unidentified men and a woman listed as foreigners.

Four people were seriously injured and 30 others cut and bruised.

A pretty wedding took place in the James Apartments yesterday afternoon. Rev. Archdeacon Rix officiating, when Miss Geumula Nanaka, recently arrived from Greece, became the bride of George James, one of the proprietors of the Boston Cafe. The bride looked very pretty surrounded by her attendants, these being Miss Mary Manatory, and Mesdames Postulo, Caroff, Margherita Johns, Killas, and Christopher.

Miss Postulo was a sweet flower girl and G. Papadopolus was best man. Miss Nanaka has been in Prince Rupert only two weeks, having come here from Greece for the wedding. The honeymoon trip has been slightly delayed, the couple expecting to leave on Friday for a brief holiday.

SUN ONE OF SMALLEST OF MILLIONS OF STARS

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 28.—Although the stars in the heavens really are countless, the "countless stars" of the ancients actually numbered only about 2,500. Professor Charles E. Rogers of Trinity College told Dean Edward L. Troxell of the same institution in a radio dialogue.

"Were it possible to see at one time all stars that are visible to the unaided eye, the number would be less than 6,000," said Professor Rogers. "Careful estimates indicate that no one individual at any one place is able to see more than 2,500 distinct stars, or points of light."

However, he explained, with the aid of the most powerful telescopes the hazy mass of the "milky way" becomes a galaxy of countless billions of stars, of which the world's sun is one of the smallest.

Police Are Looking for Members Brokerage Firm

Many Vancouver Business and Professional Men Induced to Deposit Checks With New Company Covering Stock Margins

VANCOUVER, November 28.—The police are endeavoring to locate the members of the stock brokerage firm of Stone & Co. whose offices in the Standard Bank Building were raided Friday. The charge is that of obtaining money under false pretences. The firm was established here November 3.

The seized records show that hundreds of telephone calls were made in Vancouver and to Eastern Canada and the United States.

Many business and professional men of Vancouver were induced to deposit checks with the company covering margins on eastern stocks. The police say they expect many thousands of dollars are involved.

TRUST COMPANY LOSES ITS CASE

Irregularities in Administration of Prudential Company of Montreal

MONTREAL, Nov. 28.—Concluding that there had been irregularities in the administration of the affairs of the Prudential Trust Company in past years and that the directors had not tried to protect the interests of the shareholders, that many shareholders had their stock confiscated in 1926 and that the president and manager bought up hundreds of the shares at ridiculous prices and that there was danger of the same thing happening again, Mr. Justice Demers gave judgment today in the superior court in favor of the shareholders who asked for an injunction to prevent the directors of the company from persisting in the sale of the ten per cent capital subscription on outstanding stocks ordered in October last.

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INCLEMENT WEATHER HAMPERING SALVAGE

Attempt May Possibly be Made Tomorrow to Bring Wrecked Union Vessel to an Even Keel

Unfavorable weather has been hampering salvage operations in connection with the steamer Catala, which is stranded on Mist Island, and it was learned this afternoon at the offices of the B.C. Towing & Lightering Co. that, on account of the weather, no attempt could be made until tomorrow to pull the vessel to an even keel or nearly so. The recent squalls have evidently worked no further damage to the Catala.

BOMBS THROWN CANTON CITY

Strikers Arrested Wholesale Following Anti-British Riot in Native Quarter

CANTON, Nov. 28.—A serious riot was staged Sunday in the native quarter by striking anti-British shop workers, following the cutting off of food supplies by the government authorities. Several bombs were thrown by rioters and 20 or more fires started.

Numerous persons were injured because the strikers were curbed by wholesale arrests and confinement by the military guard.

**THE NATURAL PORT**

An article in the Peace River Record speaks of Prince Rupert as the "natural port of the Peace River country" with an option port at Stewart. This is the opinion that prevails here. We are not asking for a diversion of business from some other point but simply that the business which is naturally ours shall come this way.

We suggest that, no matter what is done to the P.G.E., the first railway extension to be built in British Columbia shall be that connecting the Peace River with the Canadian National, so that the farmers of the country shall get the quickest possible relief.

If the railway is built through British Columbia to Fort Fraser, as is suggested by many, it will open up good land and good timber as well as give an opportunity to develop the rich mines of that part of the country. This is in addition to the development of the Peace River country which it is designed to serve.

**DISSENSIONS INDICATE WEAKNESS**

There have been many indications of dissension in the Conservative party, particularly at Victoria, where the late leader does not seem to have been playing the game. While this is often denied and Conservatives often state that there is no dissension except that which originates in the minds of Liberals, there is no doubt but that it exists. Why should the Victoria Conservative organ continually urge unity if there were no cause for such advice.

Conservatives who have visited Victoria of late say there would have been no trouble if Dr. Tolmie had at the earliest possible date tried to secure a seat in the Legislature and take his rightful place as leader. They say the Bowser group object to the policy of directing from the outside. They claim that it is the larger salary of the Federal House which is attractive, and that it was only the assurance that there was a premiership in sight that induced the member for Victoria to give up the position of Conservative organizer for the Dominion and accept the provincial leadership.

Today's report of Saturday's meeting indicates that the trouble has not yet ended. Liberals are still accused of causing trouble within the Conservative ranks. We suggest that if the party expects to win elections it must take the advice of Dr. Tolmie and get rid of dissension in their own ranks. Victory can hardly come to a party divided against itself.

**BRITISH SETTLERS**

(Edmonton Journal)

Mr. Forke's announcement to the provincial premiers that during the coming year his department would give first attention to increasing the flow of British settlers has given great satisfaction. The decision is applauded by practically every newspaper that has commented upon it and the hope is expressed that no halfway measures will be adopted.

It has been suggested every now and then that British immigration has not been more actively sought because of the opposition of Quebec. No evidence has been brought forward in support of this view and now one of the members of the government of that province is out with a statement that is absolutely to the contrary. The minister of colonization, Hon. J. E. Perrault, declared on his return from the Ottawa conference that "Quebec is well pleased with the decision taken and is strongly in favor of the majority of the immigrants to this country being of British stock." At the same time he expressed his gratification that an extensive campaign for the repatriation of Canadians who had gone to the United States was in prospect.

Along both these lines much more can be accomplished than in the recent past. There is apparently no intention of overlooking opportunities of securing the right kind of new citizens elsewhere. Mr. Forke stated that every encouragement would be offered to the people of the Scandinavian and other northwestern countries of Europe to come to Canada, and the other fields cannot be neglected. But the first need undoubtedly is a more extended effort in the British Isles.

Eddie Cantor, the Screen Humorist, is Essentially Himself in This Comedy

Uprarious comedy with a strong flavor of melodrama, blended with a touch of pathos and a keen sense of human psychology. These are the ingredients that Eddie Cantor has used in the creation of "Special Delivery" his second starring vehicle for Paramount which is to be shown here Wednesday and Thursday.

Funnier than the stage play was his screen version of "Kid Boots" but funnier still is his "Special Delivery" with its romance and experiences of a rookie postman. The interesting thing about him, though, is the fact that you always find yourself laughing with and not at him.

That is essentially Cantor. No matter how funny he is, he always enlists your sympathy for the character he portrays. From the very moment that you first see him as the mis-fit mail clerk you can't help feeling a bit sorry for him while at the same time you can't help laughing at the situations and predicaments he gets into; and he gets into plenty.

"Special Delivery" is a picture that you will want to see. It is Cantor at his best and if he follows through in his future pictures along the lines established in this one the screen has found a new type of comedy and a new type of comedian.

**JOHN BARRYMORE AT WEEK-END HERE IN "THE BELOVED ROGUE"**

With three screen appearances on Broadway, John Barrymore is on the way of establishing a record which other stars will find difficulty in duplicating. He has been setting a rather dizzy pace—what with two successes already scored. The new film, "The Beloved Rogue," is a costume drama which goes back to the days of the swaggering, roystering Villon—those days of the fifteenth century—for its story. 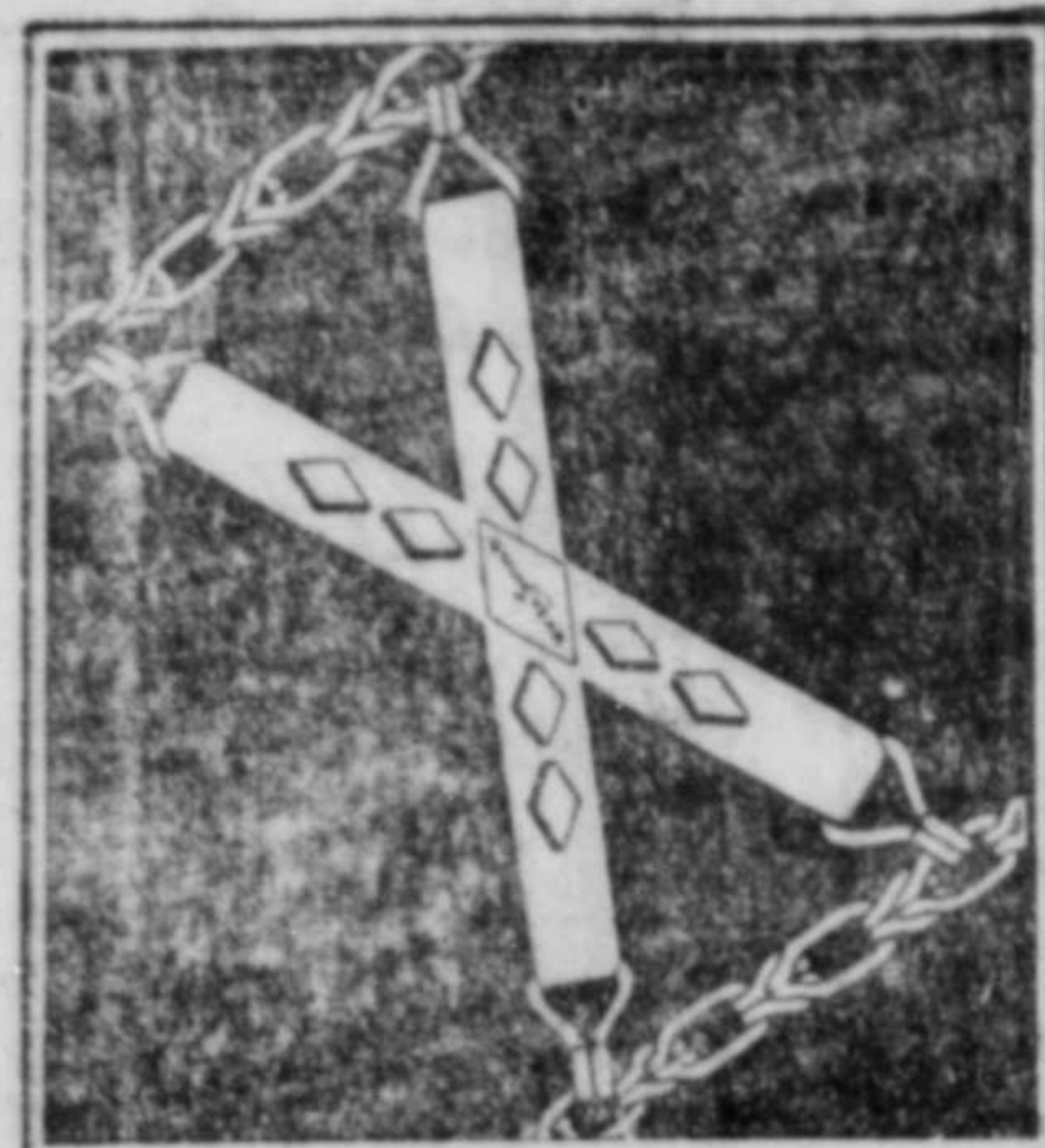

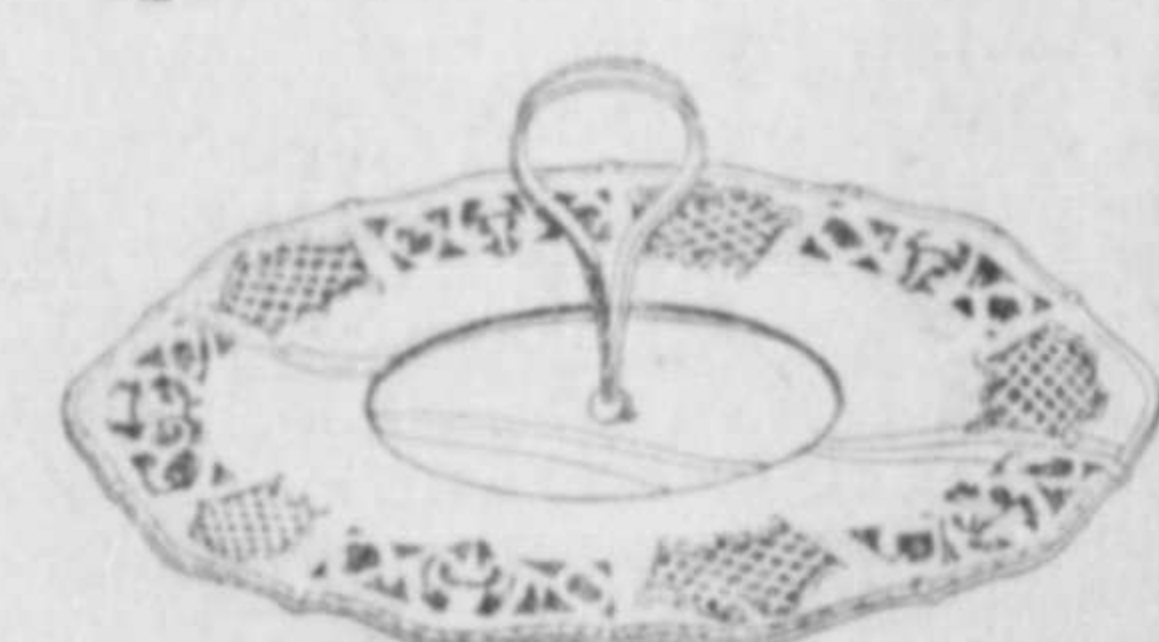

## GO NORTH SAYS T. D. PATTULLO

Minister of Lands Points This Way and Urges Young Men in Southern B.C. to go

VICTORIA, Nov. 28.—It is an insult to the intelligence, initiative, ingenuity and application of the young men of British Columbia to say that they cannot go out and make a living in this province which richly abounds in natural resources," declared Hon. T. D. Pattullo, provincial minister of lands, in speaking to members of the Victoria Kiwanis Club at their weekly luncheon in the Chamber of Commerce auditorium.

Mr. Pattullo said he was entirely at variance with those who believed that there were no longer great opportunities for the young men. He was cognizant of the opportunities awaiting development in the North, and for that reason he had chosen for his theme: "Go North, Young Man."

The speaker said Vancouver Island possessed wonderful possibilities and was an Empire in itself. If this Island were contiguous to Europe, it would have a population of several million people, for it has a diversity of resources that would make it possible. He recalled that Belgium, with less territory than Vancouver Island, had a population of 8,000,000.

While Vancouver Island comprised only one-thirtieth of the whole area of British Columbia, it nevertheless possessed one-third of British Columbia's timber. There was an abundance of fishing, farming and mining on the Island, which also had unsurpassed scenery and a wonderful climate.

Great development could be expected on Vancouver Island in the future, the Minister said, adding that there were industries "in the offing, which in the next few years will be developed and will become permanent, beyond a peradventure of a doubt."

Mr. Pattullo discussed the steady expansion of agriculture, and spoke of the clearing of land incident to logging operations. He said a great distribution of business followed from the establishment and operations of such industries as the Powell River paper plant, and the conversion of logged-off lands to intensive agriculture which is now in process in that territory. With the creation of similar areas, the population will be increased and more agricultural lands will be developed.

**DEVELOPMENTS TRACED**  
 The speaker traced the developments which were taking place in the Fraser Valley, in Lillooet, around Prince George, in the Peace River Country, the Bulkley Valley, the New Hazelton country, Stewart Lake district and Prince Rupert. The mineral and agricultural resources of the northern section of the province were sketched, showing the great opportunity awaiting settlers.

"If the Queen Charlotte Islands were contiguous to Europe, they would have a population of 1,000,000 people," he asserted. The Minister said that if a person wanted to make a colossal fortune he could make it much faster in New York or Chicago than in Victoria, but it didn't say that by living in New York or Chicago he would be any better off than residing right here.

In closing, Mr. Pattullo emphasized that the Northland was a land of vast possibilities and great opportunities. His advice to young men would be, "Go North," he affirmed amid prolonged applause.

President Harold M. Diggon, in conveying thanks of the gathering to the speaker, said that Hon. Mr. Pattullo "has convinced us that opportunities for adventurous and aggressive young men still exist, and if given proper encouragement they will convert the Northland into one of the most progressive regions on earth."

INNOCENT MAN BEING FREED

Sherlock Holmes Character Convicted 18 Years Ago and in Prison Since is Innocent

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 23.—The American counterpart of Dr. Watson, companion character of Sherlock Holmes in the stories of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, has been revealed here as the result of the promised release from a British prison of Oscar Slater, who has served 18 years of a life sentence for the murder in 1909 of Miss Jane Gilchrist, aged spinster of Glasgow, Scotland.

In Slater's case the part of Watson was played by William G. Goodhart, Baltimore lawyer. Sir Arthur himself played the part of Holmes.

Slater, who was Mr. Goodhart's client prior to 1908, was arrested in New York on instructions cabled by Scotland Yard detectives. They had discovered, the cable said, that Slater had pawned a brooch during a trip to Scotland similar to one stolen from Miss Gilchrist.

Mr. Goodhart asserted that as Slater's attorney, he vainly fought his extradition. Slater was extradited, tried in Edinburgh and sentenced to life imprisonment.

A year later the creator of Sherlock Holmes became interested in the case. With Mr. Goodhart, who still believed in his client's innocence, he instituted a careful investigation.

Together they unearthed the fact that Slater had pawned the brooch several months before Miss Gilchrist was murdered. Goodhart asserted. They also learned that it had been the property of another woman and that Slater's visits to the pawnshop after the murder had been made for the purpose of raising more money on the pledge.
