CHATHAM, Ont., Feb. 1.-Launching of Ontario's grain pool, modelled along the lines of western Canadian organi-

zations, took place at a meeting of 300 Kent County farmers here. The Ontario pool will work in conjunction with the three western Canada pools and when it is fully organized it is hoped the greater portion of grain grown from the Ottawa River to the Rocky Mountains will be marketed

through one central organization in the hands of the producers themselves. The form of contract adopted by the Ontario pool is very similar to that of Manitoba wheat pool. The grower who signs up agrees to dispose of all his grain through the pool for a term of five years.

> EDMONTON, Feb. 1 .- Edmonton Public School Board has gone on record as favoring the principal of sterilization of the insane, following a request that they endorse a resolution passed by the U.F.W.A. last week asking that the government arrange for treatment at the

> Objection was taken by some of the board that they should not pass an opinion of the matter, some not agreeing with the methods of procedure outlined in the U.F.W.A. resolution. They refused to endorse the resolution as it stood, but favored the principle. The vote was ananimous.

> A committee comprised of Trustees Dr. Frank Crang, and Mrs. E. T. Bishop, and Dr. D. J. Dunn, medical inspector of city schools, was appointed to wait upon the provincial minister of health.

"There is a certain amount of it (mental derangement or insanity). in the school system," the trustees declared. "and there should be some drastic method to cut it down to a minimum."

DISCRIMINATION IN RATES AGAINST FRENCH-CANADIAN MARRIED WOMEN

MONTREAL, Feb. 1 .- (By Canadian Press.)-A leading Insurance Company been criticised in the French Press of the city for discrimination in ts rates against French Canadian married women. Recently the President of the Company issued a statment relative to this: "In the combined experiences of the American and Canadian companies, covering the entire United States and Canada deaths from this cause are 7.8 per cent. of the total number of deaths among married women. In our experience among French-Canadian women, the ratio is but 8 per cent. It will be seen, therefore that the higher birth rate among French-Canadian women is not the real cause of the extra mortality. "The chief trouble is that our French

Canadian women are hard-working and self-sacrificing to an extreme. Too often the wife of a farmer or artisan does not take sufficient rest after the birth of a child, but is up and about in a very few days, attending to the housework and other duties at a time when she is physically unfit for tasks that are frequently burdensome and

NEARLY SEVEN HUNDRED DIE IN BRITAIN DURING WEEK-BUSINESS DELAYED

LONDON, Feb. 1 .- A wintry spell last week has caused the recent epidemic of influenza which has been prevalent in nany parts of Europe to tighten its grip on Great Britain, 667 deaths being reported in Britain for the week. The official death roll in the county

figures being 72, 122 and 197. The reports from 105 large towns apart from London for the same period of time shows 172, 326 and 470 deaths.

In some of the poorer districts of London people have had to stand in line to obtain death certificates. Hundreds of school teachers are ill

while some small shops in the east end have put up their shutters and placed a notice on the door: "The whole family is ill of influenza, will re-open when better."

Some of the country districts have been badly stricken. Half the schools have been closed in Nottinghamshire. while half the police force in Dorsetshire is sick. There is hardly a household in the villages of Northamptonshire which has escaped. All the public officials at Penmaenmawr, Carnar vonshire, Wales, have been stricken. During the last five weeks there have been 500 more deaths from influenza

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention o become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occapation, and improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning regu-.ations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge ty addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. 
