The development of our farms in the interior is of vital interest to Prince Rupert. If they progress, our city benefits. The farmers of Central British Columbia are straining every effort to make it a successful farming country and it behoves every person in Prince Rupert to extend to them all possible support.

TIMBER INDUSTRY

Our timber industry and forest products have had a satisfactory year. Considering that the lumber market the world over has been dull, we have held our own in spite of adverse trade conditions.

The destruction by fire of the mill at Seal Cove and the Canadian Products Mill at Usk have been serious blows to our output of manufactured materials but these losses have been offset to a great extent by the re-opening of the mill at Port Clements and also the resumption of operations at Lakelse Mills, Amesbury, and the opening of the local industry at Seal Cove for the manufacture of shingles and cedar lumber. Steps are now being taken to rebuild the two mills destroyed by fire. The mills at Queen Charlotte City and Georgetown have as usual run continuously during the whole year.

The prospect for this industry is bright in view of the fact that many grain vessels will be lined here creating an opportunity for the disposal of materials for that purpose and also an opportunity to export direct to the world's markets.

MINING OUTPUT

The mining output for 1926 in this district has been a record one. The northwest portion of B.C. has, during the year, produced in value twelve million dollars worth of materials-principally gold, silver, copper and lesser quantities of lead and zinc. Out of this money, \$10,400,000 has been left in British Columbia in the form of wages and supplies and one third of the dividends has been paid to B.C. shareholders.

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

on the manner in which the work of the board had been despatched during the past year, Mr. Munro declared that in the twelve months there had been quite a change of feeling for the better on the part of the interior farmers toward the City of Prince Rupert. There was still, however, a great deal to be done in order to establish the right feeling between the producers of the district and the dealers of the city and give each a fair show. There was still discrimination which worked to the disadvantage of both particularly in the matter of prices. To remedy this, by ose copoperation, a fixed basis might be established for produce coming to the city. If the Board of Trade estabhed a marketing committee or bureau it would be possible to set market prices. Then the farmers would know what they were going to get and price cutting would be largely eliminated in the city. Such a bureau would provide reliable information for both producers and dealers so that they might deal on proper grounds. This would go a long way toward removing misunderstandings between the people of the city and the country. Mr. Munro also expreseed the belief that produce should be bought on grade instead of haphazard as in the past. This would be satisfactory to the producers and the consumers would be permitted to buy according to value.

Mr. Munro felt that the proposed Associated Board of Trade for Central British Columbia would be of great assistance to the district generally. He urged the Prince Rupert Board, however. to plan its visits to take place at times. when the interior people would not be

Approving the idea of a marketing bureau, President Fulton wondered if it would not be possible to publish wholesale produce prices here as was done in Vancouver.

FEELS THAT PRINCE RUPERT HAS NO REASON TO COMPLAIN OF PRESENT SCALE OF FARES FROM EASTERN CANADA

That Prince Rupert has reason to be satisfied with the present summer excursion fares from Eastern Canada and that further agitation on this matter may lead to a more adve se rather than a more favorable scale was the opinion submitted by Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, in a letter read before the Board of Trade last night.

Sir Henry gave assurance that it was

his desire in every way possible to contribute to the growth and development of Prince Rupert as a trade and travelling centre but he had gone into this matter pretty thoroughly and he could not see where anything was to be gained by pursuing the subject further. The Canadian National was unable to dictate to United States railways in connection with the agreement on these rates. Already the same rates were offered to Prince Rupert over the transcontinental from the East as to Vancouver and Seattle and special inducements were made to have tourists take the water voyages north and south of Prince Rupert. The "Triangle Tour" was becoming increasingly popular and was drawing the attention of tourists to Prince Rupert. Sir Henry felt that the present rates were to the best advantage of the city.







PLACED 591 MEN IN PERMANENT EMPLOYMENT LAST YEAR, OTHER STATISTICS

The local branch of the Employment Service of Canada under the superintendence of J. M. Campbell, was responsible for placing 591 men last year in regular positions and providing 45 men with casual labor according to gures given out today. The year, on the whole, campared favorably with the previous one and this winter there has been a greater demand for men due to activity at the elevator and the dry dock. However, there is still a large surplus of unemployed in the city as a result of many being drawn here by the announcement that there was plenty of work available due to the

shipping of grain. During the entire year, 1524 new paplications were received at the local office for employment as well as 5,257 re-applications. That the employers in northerly direction the district make use of the facilities northeasterly 11 chains provided here is evidenced by the 1157 water mark 18 chains; thence southwest orders which have been received by the erly 11/2 chains, more local office to supply their wants, which acres, more or less. cover a very large variety of requests for various kinds of both skilled and unskilled labor. In some instances, reuests come in for a certain class of labor which was not available on the local market. Such a request is then turned over to some other agency to fill if possible.

The camps along the line between here and Prince George and other employers in that district took a large number of men at various times and 56 transportation certificates were isued to men to fill these needs. The harvest excursion took only about half he number of men from this district this past year as compared with the previous year, a total of 317 men and 12 women taking advantage of facilities provided by the cheap rates to assist in gathering the prairie harvest.
