# AVIATOR AGAIN HUNTINGSEALS

C. S. Caldwell, Here Two Years Ago. Engages in Flying from New-

C. S. Caldwell, air pilot of Montreal, who was with the aerial prospecting expedition from Prince Rupert to the Cassiar district two years ago, left Montreal recently for St. John's, Newfoundstated that it was a distinc probability that after the completion o the scaling expedition he would fly th plane back to Montreal. This will be about the middle of April.

Two springs already Mr. Caldwell ha accompanied the Newfoundland sealing ilect and made numerous flights unde what he characterizes as the mosbagardous of flying conditions. The plane used on the expedition is mounted on a special aft deck on one of the scalors and flights are made at the command of the captain when difficulty is experienced in finding the seals Take-offs and landings are made on floating ice floes and the use of the plane is generally conceded to have vastly aided the hunting operation while considerably reducing hazards.

As the result of his two seasons' fly ing with the fleet Mr. Caldwell has been able to convince the sealer owners o the greater edvantage and practicability of operating from a land base. Arrange ments for such an establishment ar expected to be completed this spring and in this case Mr. Caldwell will fly back to Montreal in the Avro plane used on the sealing trip, which machine was specially constructed for the Shackleton Arctic expedition but never used. He will spend the summer in purchasing and assembling a plane suitable for land operations under Newfoundland conditions and will try this out in the vicinity of Montreal.

This was due, he told the committee at its recent meeting, to the fact that many of these accidents involved drivers who were financially irresponsible.

Some equitable means, the committee believed, might be found to provide an indemnity fund for such cases, without imposing a burden on the already heavily taxed motorist. Only one governnent has so far adopted a compulsory insurance measure, they pointed out. # CONSTRUCTION WORK AT FLIN FLON MINE PROCEEDS STEADILY

WINNIPEG, March 14.-Construction work at the Flin Flon Mine, in the Central Manitoba mineral belt, is progressing favorably, officials of the company report. About 100 men are employed in the operations at present and it is expected that the new concentration plant being erected on the property will be operating this month.

The early freeze-up last fall held up ransportation of some of the machinery. but the delay has now been made up. The entire plant was conveyed to the ne 160 miles by summer road and 87 miles under winter conditions. A wireless plant has been erected and today the mine is in - daily communication with the outside world.



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
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
