### Nationalists Recapture Canton City from Communists but Few Hold Out at Police Barracks

Naval vessels rake river front with eighteen NOOTKA RAMMED BY pounders and machine guns and thousands slain

SHANGHAI, December 14.—The Nationalists today recaptured the city of Canton from the Communists who had taken it Sunday and set up a people's council along Soviet lines. It is estimated that three thousand Chinese were killed during the fighting.

The Nationalists, after an enveloping attack last night, regained the city except police headquarters where the Communist forces, aided by Russians, are holding

Most of the missionaries and other inhabitants had left the city before its recapture, they having all taken refuge at Hong Kong, which is easily reached by river steamers. Thousand of Chinese refugees also fled to the friendly protection of the British flag at Hong Kong and Kowloon.

#### FISHERMEN AND NEW REGULATIONS

A great many fishermen do not yet seem to understand the purport of the proposed new fishery regulations. Two points seem to stand out clear. One is that the fishing must be conducted in much a way that sufficient salmon will get to the spawning grounds each year to insure continuation of supply. Another point is that no government can step in and say one Canadian citizen can have a license and another cannot. Then comes the question, how is the fishing to be kept within reasonable bounds without at the same time doing injustice to anyone and so that the best possible use may be

made of the product?

The department has made a proposal. The coast waters will be divided into fishing areas. One of these, let us say, will be the Skeena River including Prince Rupert harbor. Suppose the normal number of gill netting licenses to be one thousand. With that number fishing, the weekly close season will be 48 hours. The moment the number exceeds one thousand, the closed season jumps automatically to 60 hours. That would make fishing less productive to fishermen and canners and the tendency would be to lower the number of fishermen who would operate there. If the fishermen numbered twelve hundred, the close season would again jump to 72 hours. This is prely an imaginary case. Licenses would be issued for Skeena River district only and before another license to fish elsewhere was issued the Skeen River license would have to be cancelled so as to keep track of the number issued.

Under this scheme fish caught in the Skeena area would have to be marketed at one of the canneries in that area unless sold to the Cold Storage for freezing or to anyone shipping them fresh to the market.

The chief idea in the scheme is to reduce the number of fishermen operating in order that the river may not be fished out.

#### CHIEF OBJECTION OF FISHERMEN

The chief objection to the scheme by the fishermen is contained in the clause which prohibits fish being sent from one area to another. That has already developed very clearly. We are not taking any part in the argument except to point out that the clause does not seem essential to the scheme, no matter how desirable it may or may not be. The fishermen think they get a better price with the market open but to that the canners dissent. It will be for the fishermen to lay their views clearly and plainly before the department in this regard forgetting everything that has gone before. If they have a better scheme they should propound it, but it must not be one that will interfere with the rights of a citizen to fish if he so wishes.

#### REGRETS DEPARTURE

Many expressions of regret are heard at the fact that Lieut. R. P. Ponder is leaving the city and on that account is forced to give up his work in connection with the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, which he organized here. He was nost energetic, painstaking and courteous and carried out his onerous duties under difficulties which might have daunted one with less perseverance than he.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Ponder will be missed here. It seems a pity that arrangements could not have been made to keep such good citizens here but the powers that be have ordained otherwise. The good wishes of all will go with them.



# RIGHTS OF CITY

Promises and Agreements Should be Carried Out Here as Well as in Vancouver

The following letter has been received from Theo. Collart in regard to the claims of this city against the Canadian National Railway: Editor, Daily News:

I was very interested in the address of the Hon. T. D. Pattullo to the Rotary Club last week, especially in that part where he showed that "many people had gone into the country served by the P.G.E. and it was unfair to these people to say the line would not be completed," adding that the Dominion government has a "moral obligotion to help finishing the P.G.E."

In your editorial of the 10th inst you aiso point out the necessity of finishing that road, and that has brought back to my mind certain promises made to the people of this city, promises which brought them here as well as these promises which brought people into the country served by the P.G.E. Also certain contract between the G.T.P. and the city of Prince Rupert.

A contract is a contract and the party trying to get out of it is not what one would call acting honestly, the same applies to promises whether they are made by a government or an individual.

VANCOUTER WON The Canadian Northern Railway had an agreement with the city of Vanconver to build an hotel and do certain work at False Creek. Vancouver kept her end of the agreement but the Canadian Northern Railway went into liquidation, being taken over by the Dominion government and afterwards by the Canadian National Railway. They both were forgetting the agreement they had taken over with the assets and liabilities of the defunct Canadian Northern Railway, and Mayor Taylor, on behalf of the city of Vancouver, got a summons served on the Canadian National Railway for non-fulfillment of contract. The result of it was that the railway came to terms and Vancouver won her case out of court.

The G.T.P. had an agreement with the builders of the P.G.E., but the G.T.P. went into liquidation and was taken over by the Dominion government and the Canadian National Railway, a case similar to the above. They have a moral

obligation to help complete that line. All that is only fair and nobody should take exception to it, so that well established, let us look a little nearer home and see about the situation as regard the Dominion government and the Canadian National Railway and this

FIRST PROMISED

At the first auction sale of Prince Rupert lots in 1909 in Vancouver, in order to induce the people to pay big prices for the lots, and to get them to ocate in Prince Rupert, Mr. Miller, the auctioneer, made the statement before the sale that the G.T.P. was going to build a big hotel at Prince Rupert, that certain improvements were going to be made and also that a court house would be built by the provincial government. This we eventually got through the ef forts of Hon. T. D. Pattullo.

In 1910 the G.T.P. made an agreement with the city of Prince Rupert, whereas the G.T.P. was going to build a \$2,000,000 hotel on Second Avenue, a station, roundhouses, machine shops. etc., and the city of Prince Rupert reduced the taxes of the G.T.P. to \$15,000 a year. But the G.T.P. went into liquidation before anything was done as regards the fulfillment of that agreement. The Dominion government took over the G.T. P. and the Canadian National Railway, successor to the G.T.P., never carried out its part of the agree-

Of course I will admit that Sir Henry Thornton in 1924, when confronted with the old G.T.P. agreement, declared before the mayor and aldermen of this city that a two million dollar hotel would be out of place in this city, but that he would build a hotel on the same lines as the Jasper hotel, at the foot of McBride Street and that he would ask the government to build two boats similar to the Prince Rupert to be put on the run between here and Alaskabut he was careful to say that it all depended on the Dominion government -and the trustees of the funds left by the defunct Canadian Northern Railway.

Well, Sir, I would like to know why this difference between the city of Vancouver and the P.G.E. on the one hand and the city of Prince Rupert on the other hand, when it comes to an agreement with a railroad that has gone into liquidation in both cases and taken over by the Dominion government and the Canadian National Railway. Is it because Vancouver is a big city
