Just recently there was an amateur play put on at the Westholme which illustrated that failing to tell the truth is not always wrong. Now it is aimed to show that stealing is not always wrong. The following verses by Wain Mason are stolen but theft is in the public interest and everyone is agreed that the verse is so good that it is itself a justification for the crime:

In Shabbytown
In Shabbytown they do not care if things look seedy everywhere. They have no pep, they've lost their grip, they simply sit around and yip in envy's tones of Glossyville, the shining village on the hill. Oh, Shabbytown is punk and gray, and it shows symptoms of decay, and strangers passing through remark, "It surely dates back to the Ark." Clean up, plant up, paint up makes men frown along the streets of Shabbytown. A can of paint makes no appeal to this bum village down at heel; the people think there is no sense in going to so much expense; so things are always going down, and getting worse in Shabbytown. It always gives my soul a thrill when I arrive in Glossyville. The town looks like a blooming parade; the people take a hearty pride in making things look clean and bright, and in their lazar take delight. They're lavish with the helpful paint, selecting colors chaste or quaint, and decorating every shack; thus warding off decay's attack, and making all the buildings look like buildings read in the book. And strangers when they see the town say, "Here we'll come and settle down, and raise us nineteen kids apiece, and live and die as slick as grease," while Shabbytown is prone and dead.

Fifty Mill Tax Rate Was Set Last Night but No Definite Agreement Reached with the Railway Company

Secret meeting of city council deals with large amount of public business, including change in sewer plans

Just before midnight last night, which statute set as the limit of time by which its decision must be made, the city council settled on 50 mills as the tax rate for the year 1927. The fixing of the mill rate was contingent on the nature of the taxation agreement with the Canadian National Railways and it was 10.50 before the final offer of the company was received by wire from Winnipeg. There was considerable discussion on the matters in question which the mayor flatly refused to have heard in public, threatening to adjourn the meeting to his private office before the single representative of the press, who was in attendance, retired from the chamber.

WERE TRAPPED INSIDE WHEN BOILER BURST

HALIFAX, May 17.—Four workmen were trapped inside the boiler room of the Canadian Government steamer Canadian Carrier by the explosion of a boiler followed by a fire. They struggled to safety through a manhole but were terribly burned and are in a serious condition.

NAVIGATION OPENS YUKON TERRITORY

Navigation has opened in the rivers of Yukon territory, according to the Government Telegraphs report. The first boat left lower Le Barge last night and passed down the Big Salmon River this morning.

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EIGHT DEATHS ARE RESULT OF PANIC

BELGRADE, May 17.—Eight deaths were reported today from the provinces in panics resulting from some earth tremors experienced in Jugoslavina during the past two days.

FORMER BRITISH PREMIER MENTIONS U.S. PROHIBITION

NEW YORK, May 17.—J. Ramsay MacDonald, former premier of Great Britain who has been touring the United States, stated today that he resents his fellow countrymen sneering at American effort at prohibition. He said that the law was an effort to keep the people decent.

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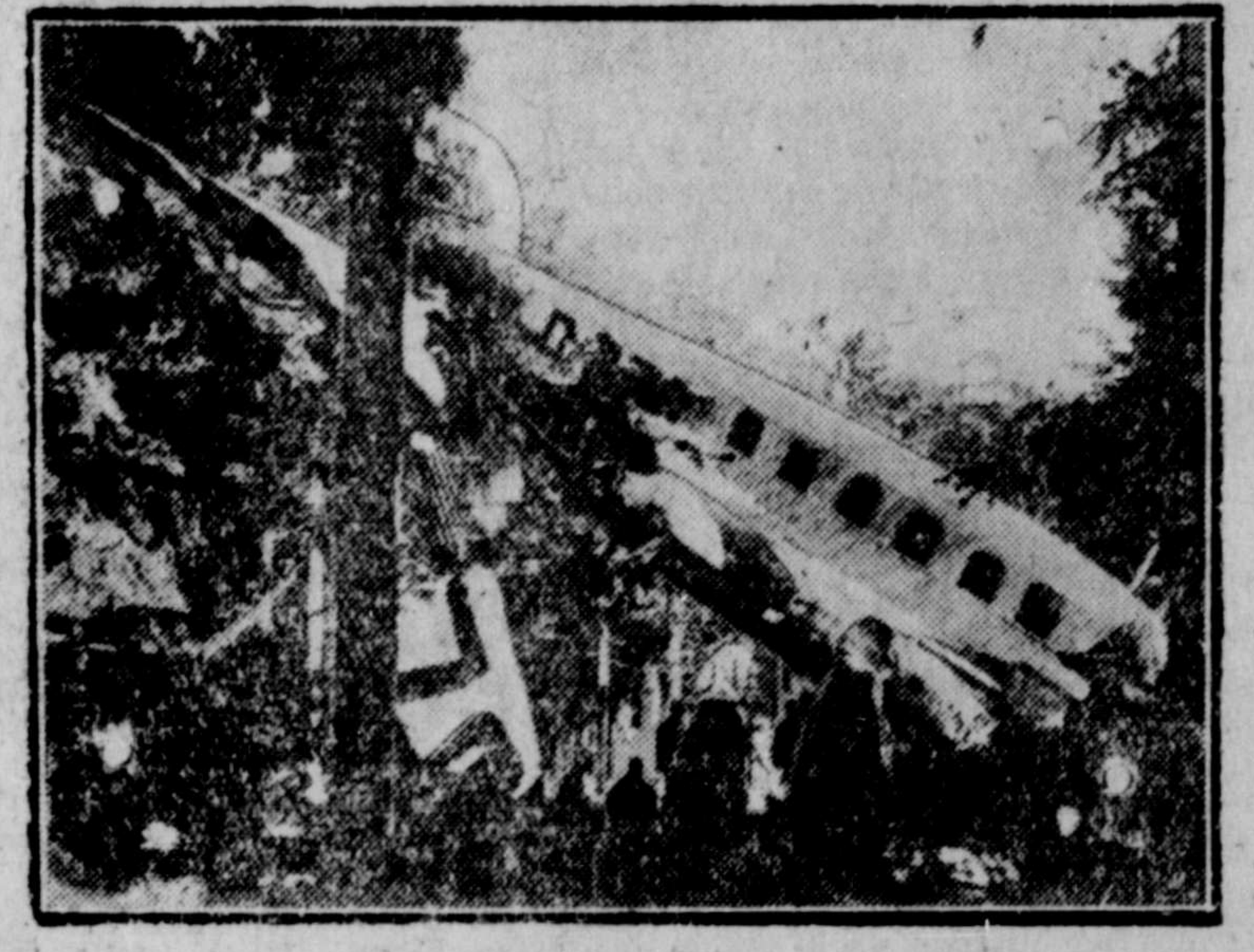
VICTORIA, May 17.—Twelve Chinese were arrested here during a raid on a gaming house following a running fight with the police. Eighteen escaped.

MOSCOW, May 17.—A note from the Soviet Government protesting against the raid on Soviet House in London has been sent to the British Government by acting foreign minister Litvinoff.

Liberals Sweep Quebec at Provincial Election

GOVERNMENT SECURES ABOUT 72 SEATS WITH CONSERVATIVES HOLDING ONLY TEN IN THE NEW HOUSE

MONTREAL, May 17.—Gaining at least eight seats the Liberals were returned to power at yesterday's election in Quebec by an overwhelming majority. The probable standing of the new Legislature will be: Liberals 72, Independent Liberals 2, Conservatives 10. Premier Taschereau and his entire cabinet are re-elected. The election in Gaspe riding on May 23 may possibly add another seat to the Liberal quota.

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AN AFTERMATH OF PRINCE RUPERT CASE

VANCOUVER, May 17.—Following a judgment of Mr. Justice Gregory which reduced the assessment of the Canadian National Railways property in the city of Prince Rupert the company's counsel asked the judge to specify the parcels in question.

French President is Guest of King George in England Today; Mutual Expressions of Regard

LONDON, May 17.—King George received President Doumergue of France and Foreign Minister Briand who are paying him a four-day visit, with all the pomp of pre-war days. The first day of the visit was a busy one, culminating with attendance in the evening at a brilliant state banquet in their honor. Toasts were exchanged in French.

OPERATION ON JOSEPH SANKEY

VANCOUVER, May 17.—Suffering from tubercular glands in the throat, Joseph Sankey, convicted murderer of Miss Loreta Chisholm, whose case is under appeal to the supreme court of Canada, has been removed from Okalla prison to the General Hospital where he will undergo an operation. His condition is reported to be serious.

TRAPPING DISPUTE AIYANSH INDIANS EASILY ADJUSTED

AIYANSH, Naas River, May 17.—Local Indians have had a dispute among themselves as to trapping rights and Dominion Constable G. Newham was sent from Kinloch to adjust matters. White trappers were not involved in the dispute, their trap lines being located well away from those of the natives.

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TWO PROMISING INTERIOR MINES

SUNRISE AND SILVER CUP SHOWING UP WELL STATES W. S. HARRIS WHO IS IN TOWN

The steady continuation of work on the Silver Cup and Sunrise silver mines on the Nine Mile Mountain results in the general appearance of the properties increasing in promise according to W. S. ("Duke") Harris, pioneer Hazelton mining man, who is a business visitor in town for a couple of days from the interior.

TWENTY LOST IN BIG FLOOD

NEW ORLEANS, May 17.—Relief workers in the inundated areas of Big Bend and Bayou des Glaises section report approximately a total of twenty dead in the Louisiana flood. The main levee of the Atchafalaya River broke close to Melville this morning and within fifteen minutes there was five feet of water in town.

SMELTER TOWN IS DESCRIBED

MORE TO SEE IN ANYOX THAN ON SURFACE WHICH PRESENTS LITTLE FOR PLEASANT REFLECTION

There is more to see in Anyox than appears on the surface writes J. A. Shank's in the Vancouver Sunday Province. In fact, the surface to a great extent offers very little for pleasant reflection. Vegetation is seriously hindered by the smelter fumes, which really precludes Anyox from ever being known as a "beauty spot." But the town, on the other hand, looks shrewd and strong; brown and rugged like the huge mountains of ore that yearly pass through the smelter's fiery portals.

Let me attempt to describe this little city way up on Observatory Inlet, where the Granby Company is turning the raw products of nature into the metals that go to build battleships and key rings, automobiles and dish-pans. The fires of the smelter, I am told, are never permitted to go out. That alone is an interesting feature.

Anyox rises from the waterfront like many other towns on this western coast. The streets are paved with four inch plank. They are wide enough for two autos to pass and still leave room for pedestrians. The homes except very few, look much alike in design and color. They are small cottages built of undressed lumber, stained brown and finished with white trimmings. Even the more pretentious mansions favor the same colors in exterior painting, which indicates there must be a reason. The most substan-

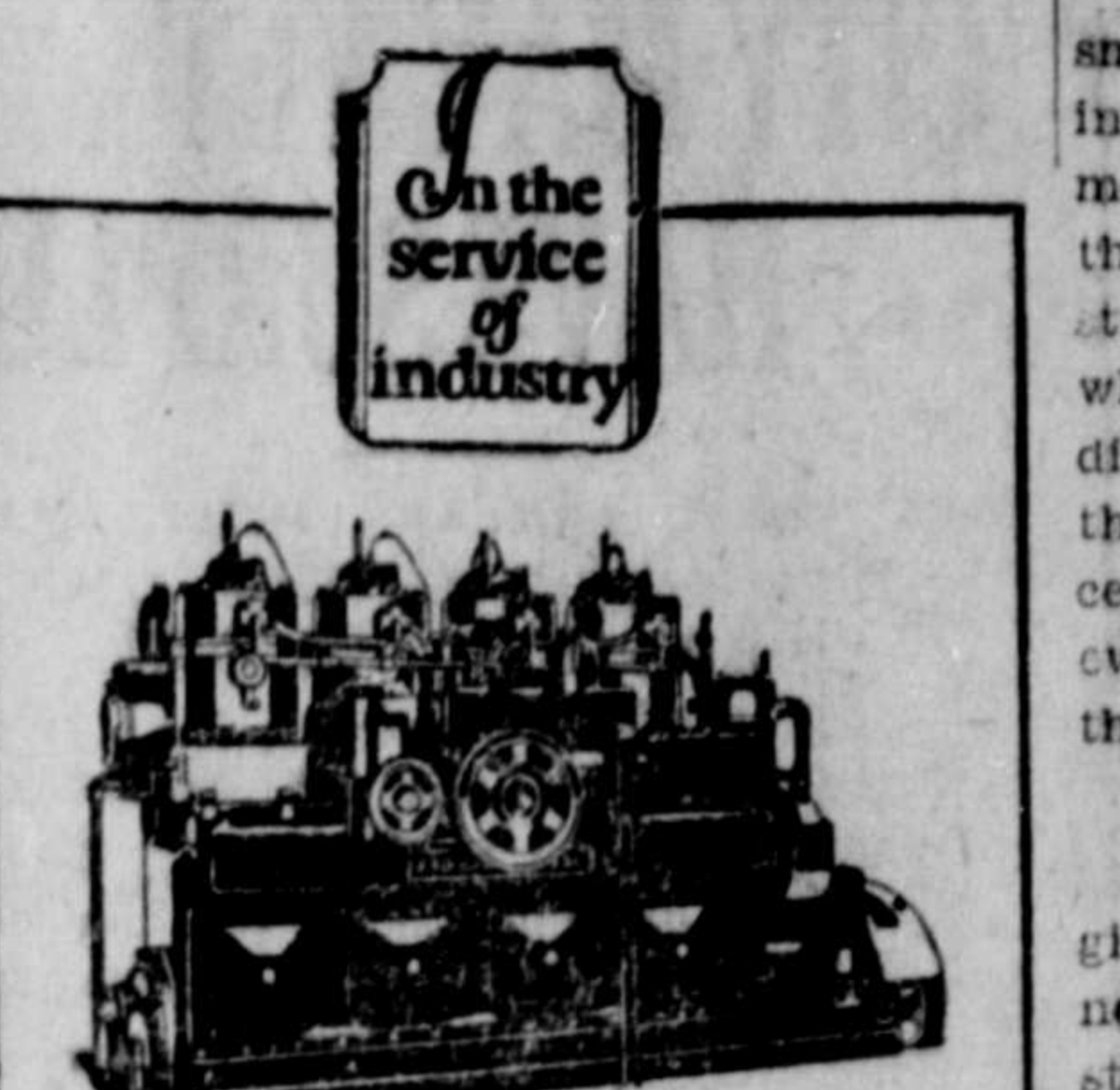

The business section such as the company's office, the company's store, police headquarters and the government liquor store, are located at the wharf.

Anyox is what is known as a "company town"; all the enterprises in it are controlled by the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co., Ltd.

Hundreds of these small cottages, as described, fill the several streets that climb up from the wharf. The houses are company property and are rented to the various workers who keep the gigantic enterprises of mine and smelter in constant operation. smelter, with its huge pots and vats into which rushes the liquid fire of molten metal. The fumes that come through the open furnace doors are stifling to a newcomer, though men who work on the job don't seem to be disturbed by the all-pervading odor that tickles one's nostrils. A few exceptional positions in the smelter, however, call for masks to be worn over the mouth and nose.

PROCESS OF OPERATION

In the process of operation, the original ore after going through the furnace comes out in two separate red-hot streams. One is called the "matte," which means the metal; the other stream is named "slag," being the discard or refuse. Slag, up to date, has been found of little value. It is predicted, however, that slag will some day be a useful commodity, possibly along the lines of road building.

The "matte" goes on into converters and eventually is piled up in great slabs of about 500 pounds each, ready to be shipped to Tacoma or New York for the final process of extracting the gold and silver from the copper. The "matte" is carefully weighed, and the accuracy of the weighing machine is worthy of note. The scales are controlled by electricity, and even a postage stamp, the smelter men claim, can be accurately weighed on it.

Anyox is situated about ninety-five miles north of Prince Rupert on Observatory Inlet, a waterway that branches off from the Portland Canal at the point where the Naas River meets salt water.

CONTINUOUS FLOW

Hidden Creek mine, the source that feeds the blazing appetite of the smelter furnaces, is also owned and operated by the Granby Company and is near Anyox. This property is reputed to be the largest producing copper mine in the British Empire. Official records give the following story of mine and smelter:

The original claims of the Hidden Creek mine were located by Naas River Indians. The first real attempt to work them on a commercial basis was made by the late W. K. Rodgers and his associates. In 1910 the claims were purchased by the Granby Company; work was commenced immediately and has continued practically ever since. There have been 109,805 feet or nineteen and one-half miles of diamond drilling done on the claims, and at the present time there are approximately nine miles of underground workings. The mine has a shipping capacity of 3,000 tons per day, and has shipped in the first seven years 5,269,811 tons of ore, with an average copper content of 2.04 per cent, and a few cents per ton precious metal content.

Work was commenced on the erection of a smelter in 1912. It was completed and in operation on March 16, 1914, and with the exception of two short periods, the molten metal from the furnaces has flowed continuously to this date. There are four furnaces, each thirty feet long, and five converters. During seven years' operation, that is 1914 to 1921, there has been treated 5,185,348 tons of ore, which produced 183,66,681 pounds of copper.

Transportation is provided by means of six miles of railroad, equipped with seven locomotives and seventy-five cars; 9,000,000 tons of ore and other material was hauled between March, 1914, and June, 1921.

Power is produced in two power stations, one water and one steam, the two plants have a combined production of 16,000 horsepower.

MINE AND SMELTER

There are two towns, one at the mine and one at the smelter; all the buildings are modern in every respect, having accommodation for a population of 2,500. The general store carries an up-to-date stock, which is sold as near cost as possible. The company hospital contains eighteen beds and a staff consisting of two doctors, a surgical nurse, three graduate nurses, orderly, cook and janitor. The operating-room and equipment is equal to any in the country.

At the present time there are about 1200 employed, making a payroll of \$180,000 per month. Supplies purchased each month amount to about \$135,000. Operations for some time past have been conducted with a minimum crew, but the foregoing data gives some idea of the money distributed for wages and supplies of the Granby Company, and also a faint outline of brown-tinted, but mighty industries, Anyox.

One enthusiastic local poet once wrote:
The site is grand, one wants no more



CITY MAY YET HAVE SURPLUS

DRY DOCK ARREARS WILL MAKE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN GAIN OR DEFICIT THIS YEAR

Fifty mills on the total assessment of \$5,062,239 with a special levy on the assessment of \$293,260 on the dry dock for debenture debt will yield \$259,075.95 according to figures compiled at the city treasurer's office today following the setting of the mill rate by the city council last night. Adding to the estimated revenue from general account for the year of \$68,200 from trade licenses, poll taxes, police court fines, liquor and pari-mucuel profits, motor licenses, government school grants, etc., the total revenue will be \$327,275.95 while expenditures for the year are estimated at \$336,125.33. This would leave a deficit of \$8,849.38 but the council is claiming over \$10,000 in arrears of taxes from the dry dock which, if received, would more than balance the budget on the right side of the ledger.
