

CITY TAX RATE HARD NUT TO CRACK

The payment of a fifty mill rate is going to be a hard nut for some people to crack, but it seems as if it has to be done this year. Happily there is promise of better times ahead when some of the outstanding bonds are retired. It is to be hoped that fifty mills is the peak in local taxation and that from now on there will be a gradual reduction. There is a limit to everything and the local tax rate has certainly got there today. However, we today have roads where we formerly had none and our city looks all the better for the work done.

THE REAL ISSUE IN CHINA

A great many people have been anxious for some time past to learn what is the real issue in China. A little booklet sent out from Shanghai called the Constitutionalist aims to give the issue as follows:

The many minor aspects of the Chinese problem are of such cent conference with the Dominion great personal interest to those who live in China that the one outhorities by Premier Brownlee. large and important issue involved has, by many, been entirely overlooked. The less important events may be summed up in a few sentences. Some hundreds of peaceful foreign residents of China have been forcibly driven from their homes, their property destroyed and themselves compelled to flee for their lives. For every foreigner who has suffered, a thousand Chinese have suffered. Certain legally es- do so, suggesting that a trip into the Fifty tablishd foreign concessions have been overrun by mobs and forcibly seized. In a few days the orderly government of these areas was destroyed and replaced by no adequate substitute. While only a few spots controlled by foreigner have been affected, there ar hundreds of Chinese cities, towns and villages which for centuries prospered under their own smi-autonomous government which today find themselves under a rule alien and hateful. Many foreign firms which in the conduct of their business have contributed to the industrial development of China, given employment to thousands no ground for believing that there of Chinese and have raised the standards of living are now facing ruin-and an even greater number of Chinese firms are facing ruin as complete and inevitable. It is almost unbelievable that so complete a wreck of established things could be brought about so quickly

But these are really trivial matters. This is the front battle line of the conflict between communism and world civilization. If communism wins here, the battle line moves forward with new resources, greater courage and enhanced prestige to aid the enemy. Defeat communism here and the battle front moves back with the enemy defeated and a world struggle possibly averted.

We have been wondering how Canada got along all these years without having a jubilee celebration. No wonder she is only a second class nation.

ANGLICAN CATHEDRAL IS NOW BEING BUILT AT THE B.C. CAPITAL

VICTORIA. May 17.—The new Anglithe contract was let a few days ago to Parfitt Brothers and work has already commenced. Under this contract the nave without the western towers, will be built at a cost of approximately \$300,-

The nave will be constructed of concrete, reinforced and faced with local sandstone. Practically the only woodwork in the building will be the mas-

sive oak doors and furnishings. When this work is completed the 1.000. A temporary chancel will be crected at the east end until the remainder of the building is completed When the cathedral is finished the nave will have a seating capacity of 1,400.

The towers at the west end of the cathedral will not be constructed until funds are available: the central tower, transepts and east end of the church will be built after the necessary money has been raised.

The drydock is already in use, several vessels having already been docked there



smelter, with its huge pots and vats into which rushes the liquid fire of molten metal. The fumes that come through the open furnace doors are tifling to a newcomer, though men who work on the job don't seem to be disturbed by the all-pervading odor that tickles one's nostrils. A few exceptional positions in the smelter, however, call for masks to be worn over the mouth and nose.

PROCESS OF OPERATION

In the process of operation, the original ore after going through the furnece comes out in two separate red-hot streams. One is called the "matte," which means the metal; the other is named "slag," being the discard or refuse. Slag, up to date. has been found of little value. It is predicted, however, that slag will some day be a useful commodity, possibly along the lines of road building.

The "matte" goes on into convertors and eventually is piled up in great slabs of about 500 pounds each, ready to be shipped to Tacoma or New York for the final process of extracting the gold and silver from the copper. The "matte" is carefully weighed, and the accuracy of the weighing machine is worthy of note. The scales are controlled by electricity, and even a postage stamp, the smelter men claim, can be accurately weighed on it.

Anyox is situated about ninety-five miles north of Prince Rupert on Observatory Inlet, a waterway that branches off from the Portland Canal at the point where the Naas River meets salt



DRY DOCK ARREARS WILL MAKE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN GAIN OR DEFICIT THIS YEAR

Fifty mills on the total assessment of \$5,062,239 with a special levy on the assessment of \$293,200 on the dry dock for debenture debt will yield \$259,075.95 according to figures compiled at the city treasurer's office today following the setting of the mill rate by the city council last night. Adding to the estimated revenue from general account for the year of \$68,200 from trade licenses poll taxes, police court fines, liquor and pari-mucuel profits, motor licenses. government school grants, etc., the total revenue will be \$327,275.95 while expenditures for the year are estimated at \$336,125.33. This would leave a deficit of \$8,849.38 but the council is claiming over \$10,000 in arrears of taxes from the dry dock which, received, would more than balance the pudget on the right side of the ledger. The estimated city expenditure for the year is classified as follows:
