BRITAIN AMELIORATES HER ATTITUDE TOWARD CHINA

If Maritimes Are Given Better Terms, Six Other Provinces to Demand Consideration---Oliver

VICTORIA, January 29.—If the federal parliament gives effect to the recommendations of the royal commission which last year investigated the claims of the maritime provinces for better treatment, the other six provinces of Canada will immediately demand re-adjustment of the terms upon which they form a part of the Dominion, Premier Oliver predicted when he laid his "better terms" case before the legislature yesterday and appealed to the House to forget politics in a united effort to secure a return of railway lands to provincial control and to "secure this measure of justice to which the province is entitled."

EXPLOSION MADE GHASTLY SCENE

PROVINCIAL POLICE BURN BUILDING NEAR COURTENAY WHERE MAN WAS KILLED WITH DYNAMITE

COURTENAY, Jan. 29.—So ghastly was the scene at a deserted logging camp here where William Shevlock was literally blown to pieces that provincial police officers, who investigated the accident, set fire to the remains of the building in which the explosion occurred. The authorities believe that the victim, who had been carrying a bag of fuses and detonating caps, sat down on a case of dynamite.

Submitting his motion asking the legislature's approval for past endeavors and its support in future efforts, the premier said he believed that, if the British Columbia house passed a resolution, it would have a hastening effect on the Ottawa administration. British Columbia, he said, paid for the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway not only with a pound of flesh but with the drop of blood. The province paid first when it contributed its full quota of land, for the second time in the form of its proportion of \$73,000,000 expended by the Dominion in the aid of construction, and, for the third time, in the form of what he declared to be exorbitant freight rates. "I believe from my past experience that there is lack of interest in the federal capital with regard to British Columbia's interests," Mr. Oliver declared.

The debate was adjourned by Despard Twigg, Victoria, Conservative member, who, it is understood, will offer an amendment to the Premier's motion calling for the appointment by the Dominion government of a royal commission to go into the whole matter of "better terms" in a manner similar to that followed in the Maritime provinces.

GOVERNOR GENERAL'S SECRETARY IS DEAD

OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—General R. B. Osborne, M.C., M.V., who, within the past few months came to Canada as secretary to the Governor General, died last night from double pneumonia. His death was very sudden for up to a few days ago he was at his desk. He was 40 years of age and has been associated with Viscount Willingdon for several years.

TWO HUNDRED MEN RESCUED IN MINE

MORGANTOWN, West Virginia, Jan. 29.—Endangered by fire in Scott's coal mine, two hundred miners were rescued yesterday from a smoke-filled underground tunnel. Harry Sheldon, whose death was due to excitement, is believed to have been the only victim.

Provision of Fishing Fleet Accomodation and Facilities Being Urged Upon Government

Representatives from the various public and semi-public organizations in the city last night met the fisheries committee of the city council and endorsed the building of floats at Cow Bay by the Dominion Government and the conveyance at once of the necessary waterfront by the Canadian National Railway and city to the Dominion government in turn for the city relinquishing its riparian rights in Cow Bay. The meeting was attended by a fair number who freely expressed their viewpoints and listened to a discussion of what action had been taken in the past and the best means of securing action in the future.

British Isles Visited by Severe Storm Which Takes Toll of Life Estimated at Twenty

GLASGOW, January 29.—Seven are reported killed and many injured in the collapse of a number of buildings yesterday during a fierce windstorm which swept Scotland and Northern England. Four lives were lost when two tenement houses were demolished in this city and three men are reported to have been burned to death in the ruins of warehouses. Fifty people were taken to hospitals.

May Drop Concessions Having International Settlements Instead

PEKING, January 29.—Notification has been given both Peking and the Nationalist governments that Britain is disposed to grant a large share of the rights which the Chinese contended are theirs. While nothing official is obtainable concerning the British proposals, it is believed that they have virtually offered to give up the British concessions as such in Hankow and Tientsin and to substitute therefor international settlements in which the Chinese would have a very large voice as to the government of municipalities. The territories would become somewhat like the former German concessions but apparently with safeguards respecting efficient administration and in regard to foreign representation in the councils.

RAILWAY MEN ASK INCREASE

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Shanghai newspapers report that the plans of the Cantonese army have been suddenly changed indicating the abandonment of their intention to advance on Shanghai. A despatch says that all Nationalist troops have left or are about to leave Chikiang through which they have been advancing in the direction of Shanghai.

THORNTON TALKS OF FREIGHT RATE

MONTREAL, Jan. 29.—If freight rates in Canada were on the same scale as freight rates in the United States, the Canadian National Railways would last year have had net earnings of \$72,000,000 instead of \$46,000,000. This was one of the comments made by Sir Henry Thornton in an address before the convention of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association here yesterday.

LOGGER HAD A BAD TIME

SKIDEGATE, Jan. 29.—J. McCullough of Lockport, well known logging man of these parts, left Lockport before Christmas to go out on his gasboat to a point where he was handlogging. Off Lytle Island, his boat caught fire and blew up. The air tank in the bow kept the boat afloat and to this Mr. McCullough hung for eight hours until he drifted ashore on the island. Then he wandered about for twenty-two days living on shell-fish until he was picked up by a boat going into Lockport. His hands and feet were in a terrible condition owing to the exposure in the cold.

THE POWER TO SEE ONE'S SOUL.

There is no condition in life so sad as being deprived of the power to see, travelling through life from the cradle to the grave without seeing any of God's creations. Should the shackles fall suddenly from the blind eye, what a marvellous revelation would it mean to the soul! There is nothing greater in all the world than the soul in the hour when it discovers a great truth.

On the subject I have taken I am anxious that you will discover a great truth—and the great truth is the story of the everlastingness of God's love. So then in the 17th verse of the 15th chapter of St. Luke's Gospel you will find these words: "When he came to himself." Now this chapter contains three parts—and they are three parables of love. They tell of the infinite story of God's love. The one is the story of the wayward life. The other is the story of the coin, and the third is the story of the sorry son. And when you examine these carefully you will feel thrilled with some line there—you will find that God is the world's ruler, that God is the great heart and God is the eternal friend.

STORY OF THE PRODIGAL SON.

We come to that beautiful story—the story of the two sons. A certain man had two sons, and according to the Jewish law the elder son would receive 2/3 and the younger son one portion. The father divides the goods between them and the younger one gathers it together and takes his journey into a far country, where he thinks the fields are green and wastes his substance in riotous living. And then a mighty famine comes. Well, notice as we read the parable further on that he is reduced to such a condition that he would fain have filled himself with the husks that the swine were eating—such a terrible condition was he reduced to—mentally, physically, spiritually, that he would have put his head in the very trough with the swine.

His soul awakened, and, when he came to himself, he said I will arise and go to my father. When he was yet a great way off his father saw him and he had compassion on him and he ran and fell on his neck and he kissed him—when he was yet a great way off his father saw him. And why did his father see him a great way off? He saw him a great way off because he was thinking about him. And he was more than thinking about him—he was expecting him. And that is why he saw him at such a distance. And when he was a great way off he saw him and he had compassion on him and he ran to him—forgetting his wickedness and his waywardness. There comes the boy over the hills. Rough and dirty and torn and exceedingly bad from the smell and odor of the swine as home he came—his father turns. He has compassion on him. He falls on his neck and he not only kisses him but he raineth kisses upon him. What joy—what sensations—what a tingle of delight will sweep over him. Those words—it is the one things that no actor or actors have ever been able to read. I will go to my father. No one has ever been able to read truly the story of the prodigal son. A great way off he saw him. John Ruskin, who writes perhaps the most perfect style in the 19th century, says that his beautiful diction is due to his early training and his life sentiments had to come from the word of God. Daniel Webster said he gathered the inspiration which made him a leader from God's word, and dying, placed the Bible under his pillow.

DEAD IS ALIVE LOST IS FOUND.

Not so very long ago leaders, merchants, statesmen, and professional men were at a great banquet. One of them arose and said the day of great men is past. Oh, that he might stand upon the corner of the street and see Shaftsbury, who after midnight made his way to the houses of the poor by the back ways. To the poor and downtrodden, gathers them up, takes them to places to provide them with food and clothes. One day the great man stood upon the floor of the House of Lords. He said, "My friends, I know I am an old man—I must soon die. What grieves me most is to leave so much sin and misery behind me." When he felt himself sinking, calling for his daughter, he asked her to read that beautiful psalm (the 23rd) and while she still read the shadows of the valley closed around about the great man's soul and passing, he crossed the river to the diamond heights of that place where saints do dwell.

GRATIFYING REPORTS

INSTITUTION HAD NET SURPLUS IN 1926 OF \$2,000—INADEQUACY FORECASTED

James H. Thompson, C. H. Elkins, Aid. G. P. Tinker, Wallace C. Orchard and H. B. Rochester were elected hospital directors at the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association which was held last night in the city police court. In addition to these, the board will be comprised of Aid. W. J. Greer and Aid. W. M. Brown, representing the city council; Mrs. H. F. Glassey, delegate from the Women's Auxiliary, and two members to be appointed by the provincial government and who last year were L. W. Waugh and Government Agent Norman A. Watt. There were seven nominations for the directorship before the meeting last night. S. D. Johnstone, director last year, and J. L. Christie would not permit their names to stand. The scrutineers were Harry Breen and Herbert Collison.

The attendance at the meeting, which received gratifying reports on last year's operation of the hospital the feature of which was net balance of some \$2,000 in receipts over expenditures, was the best in years. The following were present: President J. H. Thompson, who occupied the chair; Managing Secretary H. W. Birch; Miss Jean Harrison, R.N., lady superintendent; Aid. G. P. Tinker, Aid. W. M. Brown, Aid. M. M. Stephens, S. D. Johnstone, C. H. Elkins and Mrs. D. W. Morrissey, directors; Mrs. Frank Dobb and Mrs. R. C. Parsons, representing the Women's Auxiliary; Dr. J. A. West and Dr. J. P. Cade, representing the medical profession; D. G. Stewart and D. C. McRae, past presidents; Geo. Rorie, auditor, and W. C. Orchard, Frank Vickers, Herbert Collison, Robert Blance, G. V. Wilkinson, A. Attree, R. C. Parsons, Arthur Brooksbank, R. E. Benson, J. L. Christie, Walter Smith, Thomas McMeekin, Archdeacon G. A. Rix, and H. A. Breen.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Submitting the report of the president, which office he filled since the departure from the city during the summer of S. K. Campbell, J. H. Thompson reported that it had been a busy year in the hospital. There had been 988 patients treated and hospital days had totalled 16,722 showing an increase over the previous year. Several times every bed in the hospital was occupied and the time appeared to be not far distant when an extension of the institution would be necessary. One hospital bed for every two hundred people being an accepted ratio, with such a large district as this it was possible that the hospital facilities in Prince Rupert would soon be inadequate. The report referred to the value of the X-Ray equipment here.

The hospital, as the financial report would show, Mr. Thompson continued, was in a very fair condition. Several improvements and repairs, the report of the house committee would show, had been effected in the hospital and nurses' home. The training school, under the direction of Miss Jean Harrison, R.N., who had had wide experience and had proven herself thoroughly capable, presented an exceptional opportunity for young women to enter the nursing profession here. The marks that had been obtained by candidates from Prince Rupert hospital in the recent R. N. examinations spoke eloquently for the efficiency and thorough methods of the lady superintendent who gave the students her personal attention and supervision.

In the departure of Mr. Campbell from the city, Mr. Thompson stated, the city had lost an energetic and valuable servant, particularly as far as the hospital was concerned. Mr. Thompson thanked the medical profession for its co-operation extended the board, also the citizens and public and private organizations, the Ladies' Auxiliary, on behalf of which he appealed for more membership, and the members of the board and the managing secretary.

LADY SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT
A survey of hospital activities during 1926, the report of Miss Jean Harrison, R.N., lady superintendent stated, showed that 988 patients had received treatment during the year, this being an increase of 124 over the year previous. The average stay per patient in the hospital was 16.9 days. There had been thirty-two deaths in the institution during the year.

Seven probationers had been received during the year and five had been accepted. Five nurses had graduated. On behalf of the nursing staff, Miss Harrison expressed her desire to thank the members of the board and the managing secretary for assistance and interest during the year.

The report on the work of the Women's Auxiliary for the year as read at the meeting, has already been published.

Reporting for the house committee of which he is chairman, Aid. W. M. Brown told of various improvements and repairs that had been made to the hospital and nurses' home during 1926. A good deal of this new work as a result of which the institution was enhanced both from the point of view of convenience and appearance. Details of the work were published during the year.

adoption of which he moved. Aid. G. P. Tinker referred to a surplus of \$5,123.77 which, when \$900 belonging to the nurses home surplus, \$315 in an outstanding account claim and \$1,850 for December accounts were deducted, left a net cash surplus of \$2,048.73. Several fortuitous circumstances had worked to the benefit of the hospital during the year including an increased number of hospital days, larger appropriation from liquor profits, saving in fuel due to mild weather and use of old planks and increased x-ray operation. It had been unnecessary to ask either the government or the city for special grants. There was only \$2,000 now owing on the nurses' home and Mr. Tinker expressed the hope that this would be paid off during the coming year. A slight decrease in the cost per hospital day had been made from \$3.13 in 1925 to \$3.12 in 1926.

After the election of directors, the meeting re-appointed George Rorie as hospital auditor at a stipend of \$150. Votes of thanks were duly passed to the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, Hill 60 Chapter, particularly Women's Auxiliary, tradesmen who made donations, the press, scrutineers, medical profession and lady superintendent and staff.

PASSAGE FROM NURSES' HOME TO HOSPITAL IS RESOLUTION SUBJECT

That it be recommended to the incoming board of hospital directors that some provision be made for a convenient and sheltered passageway to connect the hospital and nurses' home was the subject of a resolution submitted at the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association last night by Archdeacon G. A. Rix. The present means of going from one place to the other, the Archdeacon said, was entirely inadequate and he felt that something should be done about it. President J. H. Thompson agreed and the motion, which was seconded by D. G. Stewart, was unanimously carried.

INCREASE IN MATRON'S SALARY RECOMMENDED

Hospital Association Asks Incoming Board of Directors to Hold it From \$125 Per Month to at Least \$150

On motion of D. G. Stewart, seconded by W. C. Orchard, the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association recommended last night to the incoming board of directors that the salary of the lady superintendent be raised from \$125 to at least \$150. D. C. McRae thought that even this was inadequate and he submitted an amendment in favor of \$175. This was not seconded, however, and the original motion was unanimously carried.

Waterfront Whiffs

Plenty of herring expected--rigging gear is general now-- activities here and at other ports

While in some quarters there has been slight apprehension because of the fact that no herring has yet been taken and frozen for bait, halibut fishermen generally do not share in the apprehension, many of them pointing out that in past seasons the run of herring has been even later than this winter and still plenty of the small fish were brought in and frozen for bait before the season opened.

The first herring of the season were brought into Ketchikan from Craig on Thursday by the packer Prosperity, owned by Brindle Bros., and the knowledge that the run had started on the west coast relieved what little apprehension was felt as to a possible scarcity of bait.

The Prosperity encountered a severe storm coming around Cape Chacon and was forced to dump 100 barrels of the herring overboard, but eventually docked at Ketchikan with 174 barrels of the fish, which were found to be in excellent condition despite the delay in transit from Craig and were taken over and frozen by the Ketchikan Cold Storage Co.

"Doc" Clapperton is certainly having his tribulations these days but, if the wishes of his friends are answered, they will not last long. Beside having had Mrs. Clapperton in hospital for the past several weeks, Doc was himself indisposed this week.

Lighthouse tender Newington, Capt. Harry Ormiston, set out Monday morning to pay one of her regular visits to Cape St. James lighthouse on the southern tip of the Queen Charlotte Islands but on Thursday morning she was still in shelter at Captain's Cove, being unable to face into the storm that a southeaster usually kicks up on the shallow Hecate Straits. The Newington will, of course, have to get there before she comes back.

It is understood that the stocks of canned salmon and frozen fish at Ketchikan are getting pretty well cleared out. There has been a steady movement south to Seattle and Prince Rupert since the season ended and large quantities have thus been taken to market. There has been none of it come here since the Norco was here some two weeks ago with fifteen carloads.

LUMBER AND OIL

Union freighter Chilkoot, Capt. "Chips" Williams, arrived in port at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon from Vancouver via all the real or imaginary ports between here and there. The vessel spent almost a day here having a large cargo for local delivery including fifty thousand feet of lumber for the Big Bay Lumber Co. and Albert & McCaffery, a lot of which will be used in the reconstruction of the government wharf, which work is now proceeding under the direction of P. W. Anderson. In addition the ship had one thousand cases of oil and sixty drums for the Imperial Oil Co. After discharging here, the Chilkoot left yesterday for Port Simpson and Stewart and will call here again on her way south early in the week.

The old freighter Chilliwack, a well known figure in these waters up to last year when she plied up and down the coast in the Union Steamship Co.'s freight service, has been dismantled at Vancouver and has now moved over to the north shore to be broken up into scrap.

DEATH OF "BILLY" HUGHES

The untimely death early Tuesday morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital of "Billy" Hughes, following a fall the evening previous from the grain ship Seine Maru, came as a distinct shock to the waterfront community where, as a customs officer for several years, he had acquired a wide circle of friends and become deservedly popular. He was a conscientious and courteous official and the many who are regretting his demise will join in sincere sympathy for the bereaved family.

The late Mr. Hughes, a native of Wales, where he attended school with Tom Williams of the Knox Hotel here, came to this coast many years ago and, before the Great War, in which he served as an "Iron Sixth" with the

It is reported that the first of the local halibut boats to leave here this year will leave about February 4. Such boats as do this will proceed to the Westward ports to outfit so they may be on the banks at the opening day or near it.

Waterfront Whiffs

PRE-EMPTIONS Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects conditional upon residence, occupation, or improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, cowboys and travelers, up to 100 head.
