LLOYD GEORGE IS BOSS AGAIN

ABLE TO DIRECT DES-TIMES OF BRITISH LIBERALS AS HE PLEASES

LONDON, Jan. 26. - Lloyd George's ture of the Liberal machine means that in future he will be able to direst its destinies as he pleases, owing to the party's acceptance at a meeting of the Liberal administrative committee of his financial offer and his demand for the resignation of Vivian Phillips,

This is a personal triumph for the former premier, and although he has offered to provide capital to the amount of 300,000 pounds for the next election and an annual income of 40,000 pounds to be paid for the upkeep of Liberal headquarters, he is also considering how to preserve the entire fund so that it may be used to further the party's interests in case anything should happen to himself.

There is some talk around the disappointed followers of Lord Asquith of forming a new separate association but as yet nothing definite has been decided. Naturally Lloyd George is happy at this turn of events, but he has made it clear he will not relinquish control of the capital of his fund, neither will he say how much this capital amounts to, declaring it to be his own personal property.





On the British airways the number of miles flown per fatal accident has leapt from 168,000 in 1919-20 to 1,131,-000 in 1926.
