## FISHERMEN'S HARROWING EXPERIENCE

### FOG BLANKETS NEW ENGLAND COAST; SHIPS IN TROUBLE

#### Thick Fog Blanketing Coast of New England; Vessels Are in Trouble

BOSTON, July 21.—One of the heaviest fogs in years is blanketing the coast of the New England states today and a number of vessels are reported to be in trouble as a result.

The four-masted Orleans and the fishing sloop Ruth are ashore at Cape Cod and both are in grave danger of breaking up. An unidentified craft went ashore but got off, apparently undamaged.

At Plymouth the British freighter Hazel Park from Yucatan grounded and was refloated.

In Boston harbor there was panic on the excursion boat Mayflower when that vessel crashed into the United Fruit vessel Limon. She had 125 passengers aboard but none were injured.

Another excursion craft, the Dorothy Bradford, with 400 people aboard, was forced to spend the night in the harbor as the fog was too thick to allow of her moving.

#### CHANGE AGAIN BALL LEADERS

Giants Win Against Chicago But Pittsburgh Drops One to Philadelphia

NEW YORK, July 21.—For the third time in as many days the leadership of the National League changed when Pittsburgh divided a double-header with Philadelphia while the Giants beat Chicago in a ninth inning rally. The Cubs lost four out of six games to the Giants.

Cy Williams made his twentieth home run in the game between the Pirates and Philadelphia.

The winner of this series will have the right to meet the other western provincial champion team at Winnipeg in the semi-finals on July 27 and 29 and the finals will be pulled off at Winnipeg August 1 and 3.

#### LIMITING SIZE AND NUMBER OF WAR CRUISERS

Tentative Agreement Reached Between Powers at Tripartite Conference Reported

#### BRITAIN COMES DOWN

American Navy Not Built Against Her Close Friend is Assurance Given

GENEVA, July 21.—Twelve 10,000-ton cruisers for the United States, 12 for Great Britain, and 8 for Japan—such is the tentative agreement reported to have been reached at a private meeting of the chief delegates to the tripartite naval conference.

Now that Great Britain has come down "handsomely," as one observer put it, in total tonnage figures and met the American views in this respect, the outstanding problem to be solved is the size of the smaller cruisers and the size of the guns to be mounted on these.

The British spokesman said last night that it would be exceedingly difficult for Great Britain to obtain even the reduced number of cruisers as now proposed unless the Americans and Japanese agreed to lessen the displacement in the second category of cruisers and restrict the guns to six inches. But the Americans may even ask the right to have the maximum of the second category placed at 8,000 tons instead of keeping it at 7,500, which represents the indefinite tonnage of the Omaha class of cruisers.

The British tendency is to restrict the size to 6,000 tons and to keep eight-inch guns of the seas unless they are installed on 10,000 ton cruisers.

The American delegates apparently are aiming to convince the British that the American navy, whatever guns are carried, is not built against Great Britain, and that because of close Anglo-American friendship there can be no jurisdiction for apprehension.

#### FOX RANCHER GOES INTO MINK RAISING ON ALASKAN ISLAND

Alex Cameron, fox rancher of Snipe Island, Thorne Arm, is going upon the theory that mink may prove a profitable venture says the Ketchikan Chronicle.

He has several pair of pen-bred, Yukon territory mink, and they seem to be right at home and enjoying themselves. There are several young ones among the bunch. The first pair were shipped to him from Carcross, Y.T. and the others are increases from these two. He also has one South-eastern Alaska mink. The color of the Yukon mink is a shining black, while that of the Southeastern Alaska mink is much lighter.

Mr. Cameron says he is having better success with the mink than with the foxes and plans on raising more of them. He believes the fur industry in Alaska is still in its infancy.

"The trouble is," said he, "that most everyone has gone into the fox business while there are lots of other fur animals which may be successfully raised in Southeastern Alaska. It is a matter of selection, breeding and feeding, with proper home environments, of course, and naturally a lot of hard work."

Mr. Cameron is an old-timer in the north, having been in Dawson in the early days.

#### INVESTIGATING GAS EXPLOSIONS

Officials of Standard Oil Company in Ketchikan Where Three Accidents Occurred

#### CARELESS CONSTRUCTION

Blowing up of Iowa is Somewhat of Mystery But Other Two Easily Explained

KETCHIKAN, July 21.—E. J. Timmons, district engineer for the Standard Oil Company, is here on a periodical tour of inspection and to determine, if possible, the cause of recent gasboat explosions at the company's plant.

Three gasboats, during the past month, were destroyed while refueling. The first two accidents are admittedly the result of fire aboard the vessel while gas was being poured, but the third, when the powerboat Iowa exploded, is still somewhat of a mystery to both veteran seamen and oil officials.

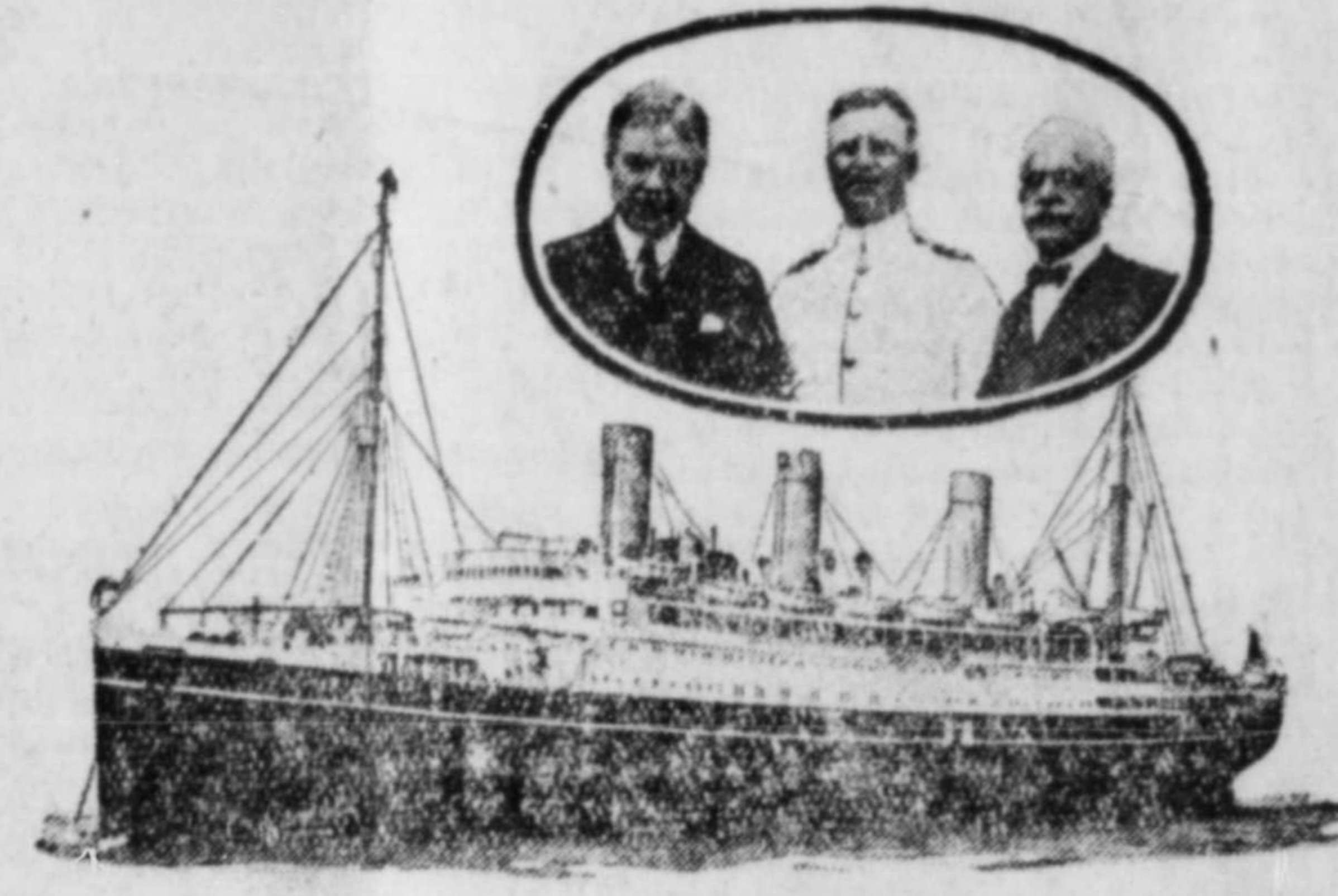
"A definite check-up of our refuel equipment has been made," Mr. Timmons said, "and we are convinced that the fires could not have been caused by defective equipment. No gasboat will be safe while refueling as long as boatbuilders continue to place the tanks in such precarious positions as they do."

Mr. Timmons was accompanied by W. T. Billingsley, construction engineer, and who has been working in this territory for several months. Mr. Billingsley joined the district engineer in Vancouver.

Mr. Timmons plans to leave Ketchikan within the next few days, following further investigation of the recent accidents.

The dock and equipment damaged during the Iowa accident is being repaired and will soon be in service again, it was announced.

Big Men on a Big Ship

E. W. Beatty, Chairman of Canadian Pacific Steamships, Ltd., Commander R. G. Latta, of the Empress of Australia, and W. R. MacInnes, Vice-President, C.P.R., in charge of traffic, on board the Empress of Australia on her first trip on her changed run across the Atlantic. To fetter her arrival an unusually distinguished gathering met on board at a banquet at which were present: His Excellency the Governor-General of Canada, the Prime Minister of the Dominion, the Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec and Ontario, members of the federal and provincial parliaments and many others prominent in Canadian business, industrial, financial and professional circles.

Mr. Beatty took the opportunity to draw the attention of the gathering to the exceptional nature of the occasion which "means more than a simple addition to a large fleet of ocean steamers of one vessel of particular fitness for the service in which she will be engaged."

It was also evidence of the gradual upbuilding of ocean transportation services under the aegis of a Canadian company and another step in the development of the St. Lawrence route. In 25 years the Canadian Pacific had built up a fleet of 510,000 tons in which third-class accommodation was better to-day than the first-class had been in the days of its inception. Four passenger and five freight vessels were building at the present time, said Mr. Beatty, which would add 120,000 tons to the fleet's total. "The policies which dictated these plans are based upon the conviction that the St. Lawrence route has many advantages which may well be exploited in the interests of the Dominion."

The Empress of Australia will be the ship that will carry the Prince of Wales and Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Prime Minister of Great Britain, across the Atlantic and down the St. Lawrence when they visit Canada in connection with the Confederation celebrations at the end of July.

#### Norwegian Steamer is Victim of Pirates Travelling on Her as Passengers and Loot Taken

HONG KONG, July 21.—The Norwegian steamer Solviken was attacked by pirates who boarded the ship at Hong Kong as passengers. They wounded the officers and steered the ship to Bias Bay and looted her of \$20,000 in gold bars and belongings of the passengers. They also carried off a Chinese steward and a boy.

This is the latest method of pirates in adapting themselves to modern conditions, the vessel being one of many which have been similarly looted by pirates travelling as passengers.

#### WOOD TO FLY LONDON, ENG.

DETROIT, Michigan, July 21.—Hill Wood, brother of Gar Wood, well-known speedboat pilot, has ordered a Stinson monoplane for a non-stop flight. He will start from Windsor, Ontario, and his objective is London, England. The flight is backed by the business men of Windsor, Ontario. Edmund Odette, member for East Essex, and George member for East Sussex, and George Schiller, Canadian Government air pilot, will accompany Wood on his flight.

#### CANADIAN BOAT RACE WINNER

#### SALMON CATCHES ARE LOW IN ALASKA BUT FISH SEEN OUTSIDE

KETCHIKAN, July 21.—With the salmon run considerably behind that of last year the canneries are encouraged by reports of immense schools of fish seen outside by halibut vessels.

Traps near the ocean reported better catches yesterday.

#### SALMON CATCH IS VERY SMALL

Reports Received From Various Districts Indicate it is Only Half Last Season

**FISH LATE ARRIVING**

Redeeming Feature is Excellent Run of Springs off Queen Charlotte Islands

Reports received from all parts of this fisheries district indicate that the sockeye catch this year is only about half what it was last year at the same time. It is hoped, however, that it is because the season is late and not because the fish are not coming.

During the past few days there has been a great improvement in the run, especially on the Skeena and Naas rivers and the boats are still fishing outside the rivers, an indication that the fish are still coming.

Seining areas are the worst hit of all this season, the fish being very scarce there. It would seem as if some of the smaller streams have been fished too hard and not salmon enough allowed to reach the spawning grounds.

The redeeming feature of the season's operations so far has been the excellent run of spring salmon at the trolling grounds, particularly off the west coast of Queen Charlotte Islands where the fishing has so far been consistently good.

In 1870 the value of goods made in Canada was only \$221 millions—in 1925 this figure reached \$2,948 millions. The number of employees engaged in Canadian factories has risen from 188,000 to 544,000 since Protection was adopted.

Indications point to Canada now entering an era of unprecedented mining prosperity.

#### YUKON PIONEER BLEW HEAD OFF

Phillip Hattiger's Body Found in Lonely Roadhouse Hands Clasp Rifle

DAWSON, July 21.—Phillip Hattiger, 65 years of age, member of the Yukon Order of Pioneers, shot himself to death at a desolate roadhouse twelve miles from Gold Run. The body was found yesterday with the head practically blown off and hands clasping the rifle. It is reported that Hattiger was despondent on account of ill health. He was a native of Alsace Lorraine.

#### Fishermen Eleven Days Out on Ocean Without Water When Picked Up From an Iceberg

Were Fishing From Dory When Cut off From Schooner by Fog and had Harrowing Experiences

GRAVESEND, England, July 21.—Rescued from an iceberg after drifting eleven days in the open Atlantic without drinking water, two Newfoundland fishermen are recuperating in the hospital today following their terrifying experiences.

George May and Charles Williams of the crew of the fishing schooner Donald A. Creaser were out in a dory fishing when they were cut off from the schooner and from their fellows by fog which came down suddenly. When the fog lifted the schooner was gone and they were left with food only sufficient for one day and with no water. Three of their oars were washed away the first day and on the second the fourth and last also went adrift. On the fifth day they bumped into an iceberg and stayed there six days when they were picked up by the cutter Albion and landed at Gravesend yesterday in an emaciated condition.

#### SAMOA TROUBLE IS PUNISHED

Natives Wish to be Transferred From New Zealand Control to Britain

WELLINGTON, July 21.—Trouble which has been brewing in Samoa since 1921 and the leading chiefs are of opinion that King praying for a mandate to be transferred from New Zealand to Great Britain is considered to have reached serious proportions.

The agitation, according to Premier Coates, is due to a small body of natives and the leading chiefs are of opinion that dissatisfaction of the whites with prohibition is partly responsible.

Punishment has been meted out to offenders. One chief has been deprived of his title, two were sentenced to six months' imprisonment, and another to four months.

#### ODDS TODAY ON SHARKEY

Dempsey Said to be Slower Than Formerly but Supporters Say He Will Win

NEW YORK, July 21.—More than eighty thousand people will see the Dempsey-Sharkey fight at the Yankee's stadium tonight. Good weather is predicted.

Betting is variously quoted at from two to one to even worse odds, with Sharkey as favorite. Dempsey money is reported short.

Most of the experts say at Toledo that Dempsey will dispose of Sharkey easily but Dempsey is much older now and somewhat slower than he was and it is doubted if he can hit as hard as he did formerly.

Sharkey's supporters feel sure of him.

#### NEW KING IS BOY OF FIVE

Oath of Allegiance Taken to Flaxen Haired Lad in Rumania Today

BUCHAREST, July 21.—The whole nation mourned today as the body of Ferdinand lay in the castle of Sinaia.

The new king, Michael I., a flaxen-haired boy of five, was installed yesterday and the regency council was sworn in at the same time while all parties took the oath of allegiance.

The country is calm and it is not believed that Prince Carol will attempt to come to Bucharest.

#### KEARNS WILL SUE DEMPSEY

NEW YORK, July 21.—Jack Kearns, former manager of Jack Dempsey, returned from Europe yesterday and declared that while he "does not expect to make any move to block the Dempsey-Sharkey fight he will take immediate legal steps to recover what the champion owes him.

**PRODUCING MINES AT STEWART**

Stewart district has four producing mines according to H. W. Rolston, the owner of the Portland Canal News, who has been visiting in Vancouver. The Premier is taking out 800 tons a day, Dunwell 125, Outsider 100, and Riverside 50. There are also a great many good looking prospects that will become mines, according to the same authority and this means that outside capital is willing to take a chance on developing some of them.

Much has been written about the Portland Canal mining district but it is only recently that publications outside the province are beginning to give it the publicity that it deserves. Now that it is established, more will be heard of its mines and its possibilities and the result will be that outside people will be attracted.

Between baseball games, football games, swimming, picnicking and boating, there seems to be plenty of outdoor amusement here considering that there are scarcely nine thousand people in the city.

**OPTIMISM OF BANKERS**

Bankers have recently become very optimistic. Here is what the Royal Bank says in its report:

Within the past three years, good crops have been sold at prices which have enabled the farmer to liquidate a large portion of the debt incurred during the post-war agricultural deflation. Farm prices and industrial wages are high, ensuring well distributed buying power. Employment throughout industry is at new high levels and immigration shows improvement. Recent finds in the mining areas of Northern Ontario and Quebec and the encouraging discoveries of oil in the west give promise that the most interesting developments of the immediate future will take place in the mining industry. All basic indices point to the present as a time of sound development and suggest that during the next few years Canadian industry will pass through new stages which will make a comparison between conditions at the time of the One Hundredth Anniversary and those of 1927 at least as interesting as the contrast between the present and the time of Confederation.

**THE MOVIES IN VICTORIA**

If Victoria the Queen is looking down from her place in heaven upon Victoria the city—we suppose we shall not be considered either impious or disloyal if we suggest that it must be a special place in heaven—she must be shaking her celestial head rather sadly this morning, says the Vancouver Province. For Victoria the city, our own capital city of British Columbia, is going into the movies. Not only that, but Victoria is prepared to pay the piper in advance of calling the tune. The people of Victoria have voted, 2137 to 663, to approve a by-law, by which the city will guarantee the securities, to the extent of \$200,000, of a film corporation, with Victoria as its headquarters and the place of its studios.

It has not been accomplished without a great deal of heart-burning, this notable decision of Victoria to challenge the artistic pretensions of Hollywood. There have been public meetings, with the mayor and the city council united against one lone alderman who was "agin" it. There have been letters in the Victoria newspapers—a form of public activity in which Victoria has always been miles ahead of any other city in the British Empire. The issue was complicated by a collateral proposal to finance a municipal cold storage plant. But the civic pride of Victoria was aroused. Its blood was up. It makes nothing of those adventures when it makes up its mind. So it made up its mind at last—and now Victoria is to have both its cold storage plant and its film studio.

**EXPERIMENT IN TRAINING BOYS FOR DOMINIONS**

Authorities Get Together on New Scheme of Preparing Boys for Overseas Farms

LONDON, July 21.—(Canadian Press).—Lord Lovat, Parliamentary Under-Secretary for the Dominions recently launched a project of considerable importance on Newcastle-on-Tyne when he opened a hostel for training lads in agricultural work. The training schemes which are now being carried on under the direction of the Ministry of Labor have already achieved considerable success, but hitherto, in the schemes of training youths for work overseas, it has been found necessary to take the youths away from their own towns and to put them on training farms in another part of the country. Under the new scheme the training is to be given actually in the towns where the youths live.

Unemployment on Tyneside is particularly acute through the long-continued depression in shipbuilding, coal, and iron. In late years it has become increasingly difficult to find work of any kind whatever for lads leaving school. It is to deal with this problem that the Newcastle work has been started. The city authorities have handed over a building which has been converted into a training hostel to hold 50 lads at time.

**TAUGHT FARMING**

Boys between 14 and 17 for Canada and between 15 and 19 for Australia will be taken who are of good character and healthy. They will receive a preliminary training in agriculture through the National Farmers' Union, whose members have arranged to take them daily on farms adjacent to the city. They will travel free of cost to their work daily on the city tramway services. In the hostel itself they will be taught preliminary milking, carpentry, bootmending, harness repairing and physical training. Lectures will be given on elementary agricultural subjects. The period of training will be normally three months and 200 lads a year will be trained.

It is claimed for this training that it can be carried out at the minimum of cost; that lads will learn farming on farms which are run as economical concerns; and that the farmers can give individual help, since not more than three lads will go to any one farm. It will thus be possible at an early date to eliminate any who are unlikely to become suited for the life they will require to lead in the Dominions. It is believed that by means of good food, regular work, and supervision, lads, often underfed and ill-fed, through the severe conditions of unemployment, can be made into young men ready to take the chance in life which the Dominions have to offer to all who are ready to take the chance on the land.

**CO-OPERATIVE WORK**

The scheme has the help of the government through the Overseas Settlement Committee and represents the co-operation of the city council, the National Farmers' Union, the Guardians of the Poor, and the education authorities of the city.

The Overseas Settlement Committee are paying half the costs of the scheme. The city council, the guardians, and private citizens are contributing to the costs.

**OXFORD LIMITATION ON WOMEN STUDENTS SO FAR UNNECESSARY**

Although Few and not Generally Prominent There are Female Shining Lights at University.

OXFORD, Eng., July 21.—Since the Congregation of Oxford University decided to limit the enrollment of women to one for every four male students, much comment, derisive or humorous, has been indulged in. One thing would seem certain, and that is that the "female peril" is by no means so great as to justify the action for some time to come.

Women are hardly stronger at Oxford than at Cambridge. At Cambridge, in the recent examinations, their most ardent advocate could hardly say they were shining lights. The time when women could beat the men would seem to have passed. Even in modern and medieval languages, in which the women used to do better than men so far as numbers were concerned, the women this year were left far behind.

The only Tripos in which the fair sex even held their own, was the recently introduced Geographical Tripos. In the second part of this Tripos one woman and one man share premier honors, while in the first part first-class honors are divided between five men and three women. Among the three women was Miss G. P. Smuts, daughter of General Jan C. Smuts.

However, the co-eds, as they would be called in Canada, may take heart from the remarkable success of Miss Gertrude E. Trevelyan, who is the first woman to win the Newdigate prize for English verse at Oxford. Miss Trevelyan declares she sent in the prize poem "for a joke" and that she had written very little verse before she attempted to win the prize. The winning effort was 250 lines of blank verse on the prescribed subject, "Julia, daughter, of Claudius." Miss Newdigate is at Lady Margaret College, and her fellow-students were extremely gratified at her success.

**MENNONITES COMING BACK**

Find Law in Paraguay Useless and Ask Funds to Enable Them to Return

ROSTHERN, July 21.—(By Canadian Press).—The Mennonites who left Canada for Paraguay, South America, last winter are greatly dissatisfied with the hardships and the treatment they have received. The majority of them are now without funds and complain that the land they have purchased in trade for their Canadian farms is an unsurveyed, waterless wilderness, and absolutely useless for farming. They are appealing to relatives and friends in Canada for sufficient funds to enable them to return to the Dominion and have informed a few Rosthern residents that the land purchased by them is occupied by Indians who have had possession for many years.

This large group of Mennonites from Manitoba and Saskatchewan sold their land in Canada for \$7 per acre cash, and the balance in trade in Paraguay and to the number of one thousand, including women and children, journeyed to Porto Casadi, leaving their relatives and friends in hopes of bettering their fortune. Over fifty people have died in about six months, the majority of them children.

**RICE PUDDING**  
 1/2 cup rice  
 1/2 cup Eagle Brand Condensed Milk  
 1/2 cups water  
 Rinse off one-half lemon thinly sliced

Wash rice thoroughly, cover with cold water, soak one hour, drain. Dilute milk with cold water, stirring well to blend. 

**FIRE AT TORONTO DESTROYED BUILDING FURNITURE COMPANY**

TORONTO, July 21.—The five storey warehouse of the Canada Furniture Company was destroyed and nearby buildings damaged in a fire yesterday which is declared to be the fiercest here in years. The loss is estimated at \$150,000.

**LARGE PROFIT FROM EDMONTON UTILITIES**

EDMONTON, July 21.—City utilities for the first half of 1927 show a surplus of \$222,512, a betterment of \$9,340 over the same period last year, according to a summary issued by the city commissioners today. Figures for the month of June alone are individually much same as last year except that the street railway, which closes June as its bad month, shows a deficit of \$6,107 which is \$1,653 greater than a year ago.

Surpluses for the six months' period are: Electric light, \$85,345; power plant, \$61,363; telephone, \$54,850; water, \$29,495; deficit on street railway, \$9,541.

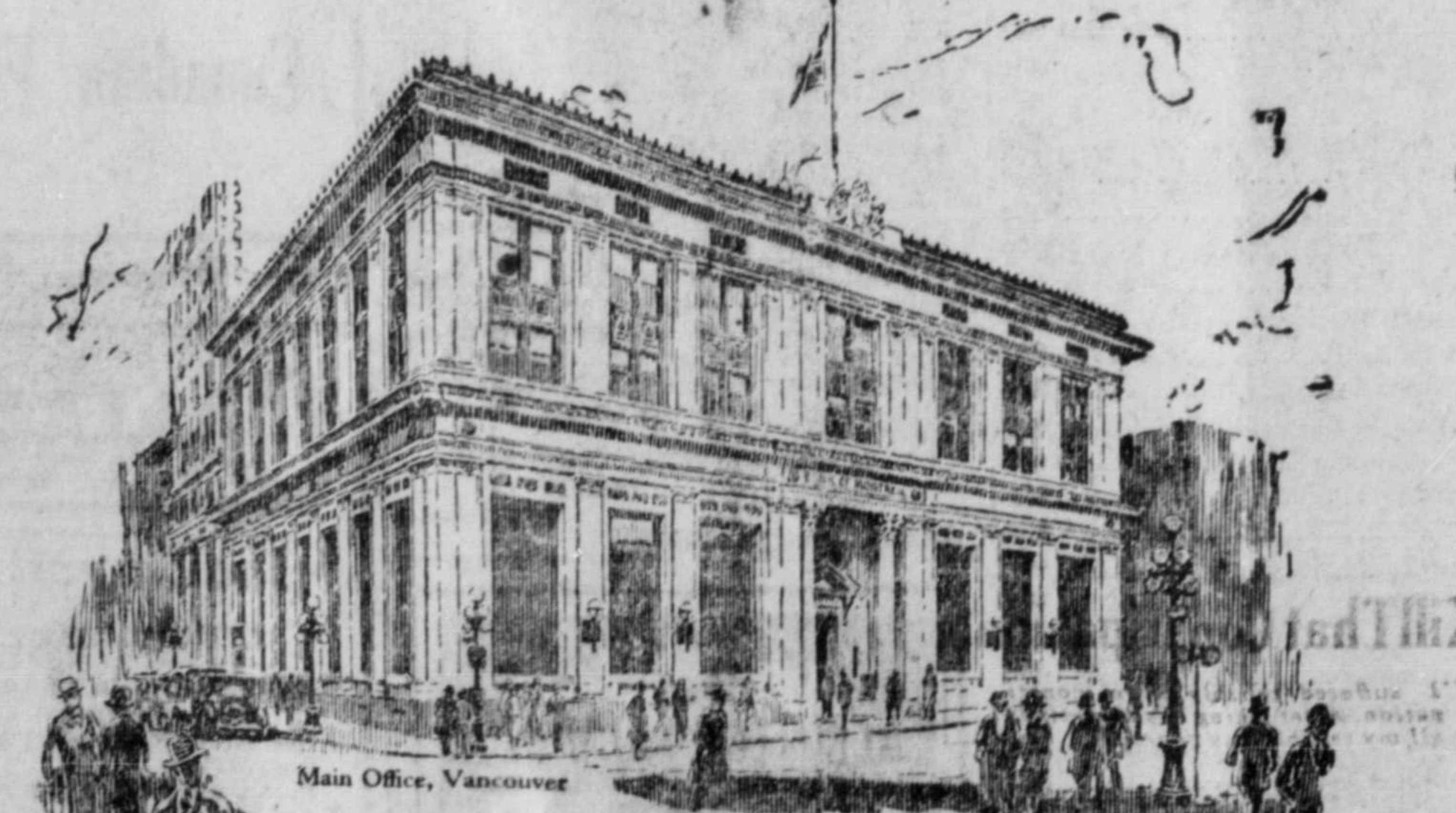

### ELEVEN FARMS ONE FAMILY

Railway Company Places Family in Block of 1760 Acres

WINNIPEG, July 21.—One of the most unique chapters in the history of land settlement in the west has just been rounded off in the consummation of negotiations between a farmer of Norwegian birth and the colonization department of the Canadian National railways P. N. Loberg and his ten sons are now settling down on eleven farms—a spread of 1,760 acres—in the Peace River country. Last April Mr. Loberg, who was then living at Daysland, Alberta, called on H. B. Gibson and N. S. McGuire of the Canadian National Railways colonization department, requesting direction to a fertile spot on which he and his ten sons could take up homestead land. A rapid survey of the territory available resulted in the taking out of the necessary papers for the eleven farms which are in the Saskatoon mountain area, south of Valhalla and northwest of Wembley and Grande Prairie. The farms join one another and the family will be settled in one big block of territory.

Mr. Loberg who is 62 years of age migrated from Trondhjem, Norway in 1912 to Seattle, where he remained for a year, after which he settled at Daysland. Prior to leaving Norway, he was a newspaperman and author and was a leading member of the lay body of the Norwegian Lutheran Church. In addition to 10 sons he has three daughters.

Each swimmer was escorted by coaches, Gillman Dow rowing for Miller and Arnold Swanson and George Winters watching Mrs. Empens.

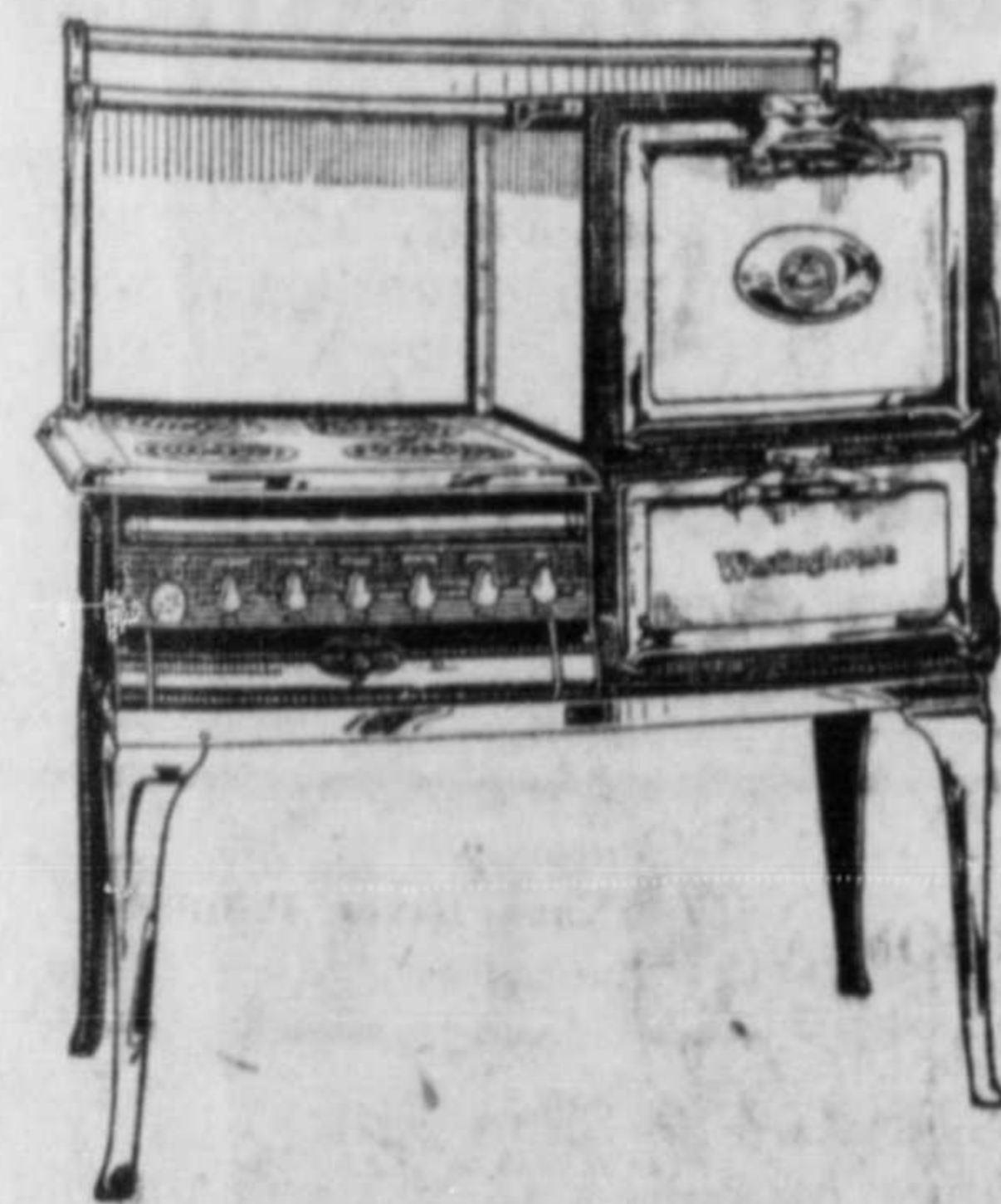

A Winnipeg aviator, flying at a height of from 20 to 30 feet, spread a solution of sulphur over the grain on the Sanderson farm. The aviator travelled at a rate of 100 miles an hour. The chemical solution, so far, has shown favorable results.

the conference dinner of the Royal Institute of British Architects. Architecture, he declared, was one of the greatest influences on everyday life.
