REV. MORRIS SLICHTER OF TO-RONTO AND DAUGHTER KILLED BY CHINESE WHILE LEAV-ING COUNTRY

SHANGHAI, April 18-Rev. Morris Slichter, formerly of Toronto, and his eight-year old daughter of the China Inland Mission were killed by Chinese bandits near Yunnanfu. The tragedy occurred while a party of missionaries was trying to make its way to the railroad and safety on the coast. Slichter's wife and five-year old son as well as a Philadelphia nurse, Miss Mary Craig, were taken captive and grave fears are entertained for their safety.

The China Island Mission is a separate evangelical organization and is interdenominational in nature. Yannanfu is the capital of Yunnan province.

TIME LIMITS WILL PROBABLY BE SET FOR COMPLIANCE-STRONG FLEET OF WARSHIPS READY FOR ACTION AT HANKOW

LONDON, April 18.—It is authoritatively stated this afternoon that the new demands on the Cantonese government will be more vigorous in tone and may possibly include time limits for compliance of demands to be made by the five powers which are delivering notes identical to those sent last week as a result of the Nanking disorders. At the present time, a fleet of thirty-six warships is stationed at Hankow, capable of landing 15,000 men should the situation confronting the foreigners there show any further signs of danger. It is expected that the fleet will remain there, pending the delivery of the second set of demands from the powers concerning Nanking.

The speaker pointed out to Their Excellencies that the province of British Columbia formed practically one tenth of the entire Dominion of Canada and the district tributary to the city of Prince Rupert comprised more than half of that tenth. Its area was 300 by 800 miles and it spread from Ocean Falls in the south to the provincial boundary in the north and from the Queen Charlotte Islands in the west to the Alberta border on the

INDUSTRIAL BASE

Undoubtedly Their Excellencies had heard, the Archdeacon said, that Prince Rupert was the base of a tremendous fishing industry on the North Pacific Coast. Prince Rupert Brand fish found its way not only to all parts of Canada but to the United States and the Old Country. Last year no less than one and a quarter million cases of salmon, valued at \$15,500,000, had been produced in the district tributary to Prince Rupert while 27,500,000 pounds of halibut had been landed at the port during the year to an estimated value of \$3,-000,000. "And we have as yet only touched the fringe of it," declared the Archdeacon. "There are many kinds, beside halibut and salmon, capable of development." It was a manly and strenuous industry, declared the speaker. making men of any who engaged in it. Nor did it lack in romance, said the Archdeacon, as he went on to describe a night he himself had spent aboard disabled salmon boat at the mouth of the Skeena River.

The district also had tremendous mineral resources. There was no place throughout the district where one could get 25 miles away from some important showing. There was Atlin and Dease Lake, the great Premier
