# Severe Fighting When United States Marines Attacked by Outlaws

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, October 19 .- After severe fighting with three hundred outlaws who suddenly closed in on them, a patrol of forty United States marines and Nicaraguan constabulary has escaped from irregulars in the Neuva Sergovia department.

The fighting occurred when the patrol tried to penetrate the bandit strongholds in search of two marine aviators last seen running from their wrecked plane near Quilale. One patrol in cutting its way out lost horses, mules and rations. Sixty-seven of the irregulars were killed or wounded and four members of the constabulary were killed.

While we do not know all the questions involved in the proposal of the Nova Scotia Government to abolish the Upper Chamber in that province, it seems on the surface as if the Privy Council has evangelist, and doubtless would have decided that Canada has a right to change her own constitution. With this ever growing demand, good prices and absence of competition, the prospects of starting a fish glue industry on this coast appear excellent. NO RAW MATERIAL


There are, however, one or two obstacles to be overcome. The best fish glues, as we have noted, are made from fish skins, a by-product of the filleting industry. COOKING FISH WASTE To understand clearly the difficulties which would attend this new process we must know the methods now in use. The more or less, to point of commencement, to the point of commencement, and con- fish glue makers of the Atlantic Coast fish waste is collected in scows at the canneries, conveyed to the plant and emptied by means of a bucket line conveyor into cylindrical steam jacketed cookers resembling locomotive boilers. The cookers are heated with steam under pressure for several hours. The mass when thoroughly cooked is transferred to a hydraulic or screw press and the liquid pressed out. The solid matter quality liquid glues have been prepared remaining is dried over steam coils with heated air, ground up and sold as stock or poultry food. The liqour which was pressed out from it is boiled up for few minutes, and separates into layers The upper layer is the fish oil which is extensively used in the tanning industry. The lower layer is a mixture of dissolved proteins and salts, and corresponds to the glue layer in the modified process described above. It does indeed contain a considerable amount of glue, but contaminated with many impurities and permanently weakened by heating under pressure. These defects can be remedied by a careful washing




