What is so rare as a day in June? Then, if ever, come perfect days-Then heaven tries the earth if it be in tune, And over it softly her warm ear lays. Whether we look or whether we listen We hear life murmur or see it glisten.

That is where the quotation breaks off but the next few lines should be added:

Every clod feels a stir of might, A something within it that reaches and towers And groping blindly above it for light Climbs to a soul in grass and flowers.

Show us the man who has made mistakes and we will show you the man who at any rate is trying to do something.





HAB BEEN WARNED BUT WERE STILL SPREADING BOLSHEVIST DOCTRINE

(Edmonton Journal)

There has been very little criticism the dominion government's action following the example of Great Britain and cutting off official trade protests have come from Mr. Bourassa, who sees in the incident a return to the doctrines of imperial solidarity which he regards as quite inconsistent with last November's declarations at the London conference. He tells Mr. King that he was not placed in power to serve the interests of the empire under the dictation of the ministry of Great Britain, and that his action does not accord with his election speeches.

STEP JUSTIFIED

But, while it is desirable that in snuch a matter as this the same policy should be pursued at Ottawa as at London, it is quite clear that the Canadian ministers did not proceed wholly on the information that they received from the old country government and that they felt that the step which they adopted was justified by their own experience. Light on the latter is thrown y an article in the Brockville Recorder and Times, published by Hon. George P. Graham up until last year one of Mr. King's leading cabinet colleagues He was acting prime minister at the time the soviet delegation came to Canada and had along with Mr. Robl. the first interview with its members. MADE INVESTIGATION

With all the desire to be friendly to these men who represented the country that appeared to have arrived at the point of sincerity, says the Recorder and Times, neither Mr. Graham nor Mr. Robb could bring himself to the point of entertaining very much confidence in the visitors. When the Russian representatives withdrew, their credentials being formally received by Canada, the Canadian ministers looked at each other for a moment, and almost simultaneously expressed the view that the appearance and conduct of

these gentlemen were not reassuring.

Soon after the delegation commenced its operations, we are informed, complaints began to come in with regard to its propagandist activities. The minister of customs was instructed to make an investigation and in the personal baggage of the trade representatives was found much printed matter "the distribution of which would not tend to the development of Canadian citizenship, to put it mildly." The premier summoned the delegation head to Ottawa and told him he would not be allowed to remain in the country only on a pledge that he and his associatewould confine themselves to trade matters. But it became more apparent all the time that their chief object was to spread bolshevist doctrines.

Under these circumstances, Mr. Graham's newspaper states, there could not be any hesitation in following the lead. Some purchases were made. Jut "Canada had to decide between the beneficial results she would get under the treaty and her honor as a young nation." Her decision was the proper one, for "treachery cannot be condoned by the payment of dollars and cents, and the vast majority of the people of Canada will approve of what the Canadian government have done."
