# MAN CAUGHT MAY BE WOMAN KILLER

## FINEST PRIVATE YACHT EVER IN HARBOR HERE TODAY

### Man Thought to be "Gorilla Man" Taken and Then Escapes but is Recaptured Near Killarney, Man.

WINNIPEG, June 16.—A man who escaped from Killarney jail last night fifteen minutes after being lodged in a double locked cell on suspicion of being "The Strangler," slayer of women and children, was recaptured early today by a posse of citizens and the police. He was taken in the woods two miles west of Killarney.

A few minutes after his arrest a special train carrying a squad of detective policemen from Winnipeg reached the town, the prisoner being brought here.

Chief Detective George Smith says he is confident the man caught is the "gorilla man" who strangled to death Mrs. Patterson and Lola Cowan a week ago here. He is wanted in a score of cities of the United States and thousands of dollars reward have been offered for his capture, dead or alive.

### KILLING NOT MURDER CLAIM

MAN WHO ASSASSINATED SOVIET  
MINISTER SAYS IT WAS VEN-  
GEANCE FOR BOLSHEVIST  
ACTS

GETS LIFE SENTENCE  
COMMUTATION TO FIFTEEN YEARS  
PENAL SERVITUDE IS RECOM-  
MENDED BY COURT

WARSAW, June 16.—Boris Kowocda, 19 years of age, who assassinated the Russian minister Volkoff, has been sentenced to penal servitude for life with loss of all civil rights.

The court decided to recommend the commutation of the sentence to fifteen years penal servitude. Kowocda admitted the killing but pleaded that he was not guilty of murder but had merely taken vengeance for "what the Bolshevists have done in Russia."

### FOUND GUILTY OF ESPIONAGE

COMMANDER KLEPKOFF IS SEN-  
TENCED TO DEATH BY RUSSIAN  
NAVAL AND MILITARY  
TRIBUNAL

MOSCOW, June 16.—A military and naval tribunal at Kronstadt has sentenced to death Commander Klepkoff who formerly commanded a ship in the Baltic fleet. He was found guilty of espionage on behalf of Great Britain.

### NO CONFIRMATION OF P.G.E. STORY FROM ALBERTA GOVERNMENT

EDMONTON, June 16.—Reports emanating from Vancouver late Saturday to the effect that "The Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway may be taken over by the same United States interests whose representatives are now investigating the Pacific Great Eastern Railway with a view to extending the road into the Peace River country," were not substantiated by Hon. Vernon Smith, minister of railways and telephones.

### GOLD CUP AT ASCOT IS WON BY FOXLAW

ASCOT, June 16.—Bailey's Foxlaw won famous gold cup today's feature of the Royal Ascot racing program. M. Jacques Withouck's Altay was second and Agakan's Dark Japan third. Eight horses ran.

### NORWEGIANS EXPECTED

WINNIPEG, June 16.—A large number of Norwegians are expected to come to Canada next year to settle on the land, according to Eirik Platbo, of Bergen, Norway, colonization agent for the Canadian Pacific Railway, who has spent sometime in western Canada studying conditions.

### CANOE UPSET MAN DROWNED

FRED SMITH OF JASPER MET WITH  
ACCIDENT WHEN FISHING AND  
LOST LIFE

JASPER, June 16.—Fred Smith, local sport enthusiast, plumber and musician was drowned in Caledonia Lake. Mr. Smith went fishing late Saturday afternoon intending to bring home some trout for the Sunday dinner.

Alone in a canoe he caught several fish, according to an elderly man on shore, and being of an excitable nature called enthusiastically to the man on the shore each time he landed a fish.

Becoming used to this the witness, several other occasions did not bother to look and see Smith bring in the fish and then hearing an outcry of alarm saw that Smith had upset his canoe and was hanging on by one arm.

The witness took a boat on shore and being very old was not able to row quickly enough to get to the upset canoe in time and saw Smith sink below. It is assumed that Smith took a cramp and was unable to hold on as the water in this lake is spring fed and extremely cold. The body of the deceased was found early Sunday morning clutching his fishing rod with a fish hooked to the line.

### ACTION IS ABANDONED

EUROPEAN POWERS FEARSOME  
OF MAKING PROTEST AGAINST  
RUSSIA'S ACTIONS

LONDON, June 16.—Fear of the Russian nationalist movement getting to a dangerous point has caused the abandonment of a plan for a concerted warning by European powers against further Communist propaganda abroad and alleged terrorism by the Soviet at home.

Foreign ministers now gathered at Geneva for the League of Nations council stated that it had been concluded that formal collective action of the nature contemplated might create an impression in Moscow that a united front was being formed against the Soviet.

### STORMS IN RUSSIA DEVASTATES DISTRICT

MOSCOW, June 16.—Thirty-nine districts in the United White Russian Republic on the Polish border with an aggregation of 80,000 acres, was devastated by terrific storms. Many people were reported drowned and thousands are homeless.

On her arrival from the south tomorrow morning, C.N.R. steamer Prince George will go on dry dock for repairs to her propeller, damaged recently when she struck a log. The vessel will sail tomorrow night for Stewart, going south from here at 6 p.m. Saturday.

### PIRATES AND CHICAGO WIN

NO CHANGE IN SITUATION AS RE-  
SULT OF GAMES IN NATIONAL  
LEAGUE YESTERDAY

NEW YORK, June 16.—Chicago Cubs continued their struggle yesterday for National League supremacy by defeating Philadelphia for their seventh straight victory but the Pittsburgh Pirates are still one game ahead, having defeated Boston Bruins, Brooklyn Dodgers, defeating Cincinnati Reds 2-1, loomed up as successors to the New York Giants whose fatal losing streak, which a few weeks caused them to drop from first place, now threatens to relegate them to the second division.

In the American League but one game was played, Chicago White Sox further establishing themselves in second place over the Philadelphia Americans whom they beat 6-4.

The White Sox victory over the Athletics was their twelfth win in fourteen starts this season for Ted Lyon who won his own game with a triple in the eighth which broke a 4-4 deadlock.

### Most Pretentious Yacht Ever to Enter Harbor Was Visitor to Prince Rupert Yesterday

Los Angeles Magnate and Party on Boat Which Carried Crew of  
Forty on Way to Alaska

Probably the most pretentious private summer cruising excursion that has ever visited the port of Prince Rupert was that of G. Allen Hancock, Los Angeles multi-millionaire, who arrived here yesterday afternoon shortly after 4 o'clock on the coastal steamer Oaxaca, which he owns and personally commands, in the course of a cruise as far as Alaskan waters. The neat 231 foot vessel with a crew of 40 men, which also has on board Mr. Hancock's wife, members of his family and executive staff, remained overnight here and sailed before noon this morning. She tied up at G.T.P. Shed No. 1

### FINAL RUPERT GRAIN VESSEL LEAVES TODAY

JAPANESE FREIGHTER YOMEI MARU  
SAILS THIS AFTERNOON AFTER  
CLEANING OUT LOCAL  
ELEVATOR

With a cargo of 170,000 bushels, cleaning up the contents of the Alberta Wheat Pool's Prince Rupert elevator, the Japanese steamer Yomei Maru, last vessel to load grain at this port this season, is expected to get away early this evening for Vancouver where she will complete with grain and logs for the Orient.

With the departure of the Yomei Maru, the local grain plant, which has experienced a busier season than even the most optimistic might have expected, will be quiet until next fall when the 1927 crop will commence to move.

### Moscow Remains Quiet but Newspapers Warn People of Possibility of Foreign War

MOSCOW, June 16.—Despite many sensational reports to the contrary, conditions in Moscow remain quiet. The population appears to be pursuing its usual summer vocations and amusements. Foreigners are arriving daily while the newspapers periodically sound warnings that the country is facing the prospect of a foreign war, emphasizing the necessity of preparing for such an eventuality, especially economically. They have been doing so since the beginning of the disturbances with China. The warnings appear to attract little attention and the assassination of Volkoff appeared to elicit less comment than the rupture with England.

### ASSIZE COURT GOING AHEAD

SIX OF EIGHT CASES ON DOCKET  
WERE DISPOSED OF BY MR.  
JUSTICE MURPHY YESTER-  
DAY

Six of the eight cases coming before Mr. Justice Murphy at this session of the Supreme Court Assize were disposed off the slate yesterday. These included three divorces, in each of which cases decrees absolute were granted the petitioners there being no appearance for the respondents, and the certiorari proceedings of Rex vs. Philipson and Rex vs. Richmond, the magistrate's convictions for having pets in possession out of season being both quashed, the crown not opposing.

The way for the civil cases is now clear with the action of Gustave A. Rosenthal vs. F. M. Rattenbury; over an interior land deal, won by defendant. L. S. McGill of Smithers appeared for the plaintiff and W. H. MacLean of Victoria for the defendant. It is expected to bring on the Stewart partnership dissolution case of John Lindsay vs. George B. Lawrence and Ernest R. Workman today. L. W. Patmore is to appear for the plaintiff with Milton Gonzales for the defendant.

Today will probably see the end of the quietest assize session in the history of the city. One of the divorce cases, Bradley vs. Bradley, was adjourned for further evidence.

### CHARTER SHIP TAKE HORSES

FOURTEEN HUNDRED WILL BE PUR-  
CHASED IN BRITISH COLUMBIA  
FOR SOVIET

CALGARY, June 16.—Fourteen hundred of the first shipment of four thousand western Canadian horses ordered by the Soviet government will be purchased in British Columbia and shipped from Quebec on July 15. J. H. McCallum of the department of agriculture announced here today following his arrival from the east with A. Ilyosheev, the Russian representative. If the fourteen hundred cannot be obtained in British Columbia the balance for the first shipment will be taken from Alberta where the rest of the whole order and two other shipments will be bought. A ship has been chartered to take the horses across the Atlantic.

### CHINA CABINET REORGANIZING

DR. WELLINGTON KOO RETAINS FOR-  
EIGN MINISTRY AND PAN FUN  
BECOMES PREMIER

PEKING, June 16.—Reorganization of the cabinet of the government of North China was decided upon at a conference today. Dr. Wellington Koo, foreign minister, is likely to be retained. Pan Fun, minister of finance, will likely be premier.

Nationalists are now entering Shanghai in considerable force.

### WITNESSED BATTLE WITH BLACK BEAR

FORT WILLIAM, June 16.—A large black bear was put to rout after a desperate battle by a bulldog and an airedale, near here recently. The struggle was witnessed by Thomas Stewart, who was unable to aid the dogs because he had no gun. Badly bitten, bruised and exhausted and bruiser that they were unable to pursue.

### WIFE OF CHANCELLOR CHURCHILL IN ACCIDENT

LONDON, June 15.—Mrs. Winston Churchill, wife of the British Chancellor of the Exchequer, was injured in a motor accident in the Kensington district. She is reported to be recovering.

**WHAT IS SO RARE AS A DAY IN JUNE?**

The poet James Russell Lowell wrote a beautiful poem about June and the school authorities took it and mangled it and incorporated it in their readers. They spoiled it by leaving out a few lines at the end. The poem as printed in the readers was something like this:

What is so rare as a day in June?  
 Then, if ever, come perfect days—  
 Then heaven tries the earth if it be in tune,  
 And over it softly her warm ear lays.  
 Whether we look or whether we listen  
 We hear life murmur or see it glisten.  
 That is where the quotation breaks off but the next few lines should be added:

Every clod feels a stir of might,  
 A something within it that reaches and towers  
 And groping blindly above it for light  
 Climbs to a soul in grass and flowers.

Show us the man who has made mistakes and we will show you the man who at any rate is trying to do something.

**MILLS OF JUSTICE ARE GRINDING**

Yesterday the local assize court opened here and again we are reminded of that which we call justice. At the last assize there was a man on trial for his life, an Indian. He was accused of murder and suspicion against him was very strong. After evidence had been submitted the jury retired and declared that he was guilty and the judge with great solemnity commented on the justice of their decision and ordered that he should be hanged by the neck.

It looked as if Joseph Sankey was headed for eternity at a rapid pace, but not so. If he had had neither friends nor money nor sympathies he would have been executed six months ago. However, he found friends. The Indians of the allied tribes took up his cause and the Indian Department of the Dominion Government helped out and the case was appealed. Eventually it came before the supreme court of Canada and on a technicality a new trial was ordered. So Sankey still lives and still has a chance to evade the halter.

We have no intention of commenting on this case, which is now before the courts, only to say that the first court that sat thought it was doing its duty and the order of that court would have been carried out if the money had not been forthcoming to make possible the appeals. Money has kept Sankey alive, for without it he would have been hanged long ago. Whether money will save him eventually is for the future to decide.

If discontent is the first step toward progress, Prince Rupert should excel beyond all expectations.

**DIFFICULT WORK OF COURTS**

Courts of justice are not always courts of justice, but that is not usually the fault of the men who constitute them. It is the result of the frailty of human nature and of the weakness of our laws. Men are taken before the courts and evidence heard and often the evidence is not true, either because the witness is lying or because he did not see what he thought he saw or did not hear what he thought he heard. Men think it is all right to lie to get a friend out of difficulties and others are influenced by their dislikes. Hate plays a great part and love, too, has its effect on the evidence of witnesses.

Many criminals get away because they are able to elude the law by their cleverness or by their ability to engage a clever lawyer. Yet in spite of this, it is probable that in no country is justice more evenly administered than in Canada and there should be a steady improvement as the human race develops, for it is developing, no matter what the pessimists say to the contrary.

Whiskey drinking may be well enough for a rich man who has a right to make his own little private hell, but to a poor man it spells ruin here and now.

prises to crowd his life with problems of commerce, yet Captain Hancock, has had time to play. And the sea is his playground. He loves the sea. He has been fascinated by it since his boyhood days. And during the long years in which he has built up his varied industrial concerns he has found time to qualify as an American master mariner, authorized to command a vessel of any tonnage on any ocean in the world. And thus it is that Captain Hancock was here in command of the Oaxaca.

The Oaxaca herself has had an interesting career. She was originally built as a British "mystery ship" during the Great War, and spent her early days chasing U-boats in the North Sea, armed with masked cannon and equipped with a long steel ram projecting under water from the bow. After the war, she became identified with the Mexican State line and, when that concern went out of business, was acquired by Capt. Hancock.

This versatile captain of industry and of the sea is a middle-aged man with a sturdy, thick-set figure and a manner of quiet assurance. He has calm, grey eyes, deep set in a broad, bronzed face, and he speaks in crisp, quiet, matter-of-fact tones.

His father went to California in the days of the "forty-niners." He was a surveyor and he laid out the city of Los Angeles. Then he became a rancher and on a huge farm of 2,000 acres, Captain Hancock spent his early youth.

When Captain Hancock was twenty-five years old oil was struck on his ranch and soon he had sixty-five wells drilled on the property. In the meantime, Los Angeles was growing fast, so fast, indeed, as to necessitate the subdivision of the ranch property.

"We are still producing a million and half feet of gas a day," Captain Hancock said, "and about 1,000 gallons of gasoline. But the city is growing up around it."

**CAPTAIN OF INDUSTRY**

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**FARM AND RAILROAD**

After the subdivision of his first ranch, Captain Hancock moved to the Santa Maria Valley, where he bought a 900-acre experimental farm and the Santa Maria Valley Railway, which serves the district.

His Santa Maria farm is conducted for the benefit of the ranchers of the district. In charge of it is T. T. Batchelor, formerly farm adviser to Santa Barbara County for six years. Operated along the most modern scientific lines, it is even equipped with a broadcasting station, over which Mr. Batchelor broadcasts his agricultural lectures to the farmers of the district.

Captain Hancock bought the railway two and a half years ago. At that time it hardly carried a car of perishable foodstuffs a year. But so quickly has the district been developed that it now carries more than 2,000 cars of fruit and vegetables each year.

**TEN THOUSAND HENS**

Captain Hancock's ranch experiments in all branches of agricultural and dairying activities. On the chicken section he has 10,000 laying hens.

In the meantime, Captain Hancock branched out into other lines of industry, including the lumber business. He is vice-president of the California Bank of Los Angeles, which has branches in many towns and cities, and resources of \$80,000,000.

Then he became interested in Mexico. He bought a 4,500 acre ranch just north of the Port of Mazatlan. This prospered immensely, but there was no means of getting its products to market because of rebel interference with Mexican railways. Thus Captain Hancock had to enter the shipping business, and thus the Oaxaca was purchased and began her career plying between San Francisco, Los Angeles and Mexico.

This is the off-season in the fruit and vegetable carrying trade. As the Oaxaca was idle when Captain Hancock resolved to cruise the Alaska waters, he decided to use her for the trip. She is travelling with holds empty at present, but on the southward voyage she will pick up a cargo of lumber at Vancouver. She carries 500 tons in her two forward holds.

Captain Hancock has great faith in the potential richness of Mexico. His shipping service has proved a boon to various farming centres along the Mexican and Southern California coast.

**BLAZING TRAIL**

"I am trying to blaze a trail," he said last night. "I am trying to show what can be done in developing the trade of the country."

Already another American shipping company has decided to follow that trail, having announced recently that it would place five ships, capable of carrying perishable produce, in operation along the Mexican and Californian coast.

Captain Hancock said that his own ambition with regard to Mexico had been well summed up by President Coolidge recently when, in speaking of America's policy towards the Latin-American countries, he said: "It is the often-declared and established policy of this Government to use its resources, not to burden them, but to assist them; not to control them, but to cooperate with them."

"It is the source of sound thinking, sound government and sound economics which hold the only hope for real progress, real freedom and real prosperity for the masses of the people, that need the constantly combined efforts of all the enlightened forces of society."

Captain Hancock refuses to resort to bribery, that well-known method of attaining one's ends in Mexico. Recently he had trouble with officials over water rights on his Mazatlan property. But 600 people, dependent for their livelihood on the Hancock interests there, petitioned Mexico City and now, the Captain says, the trouble has vanished.

The Oaxaca sailed at 11 o'clock this morning for Stewart, the next place she will visit.

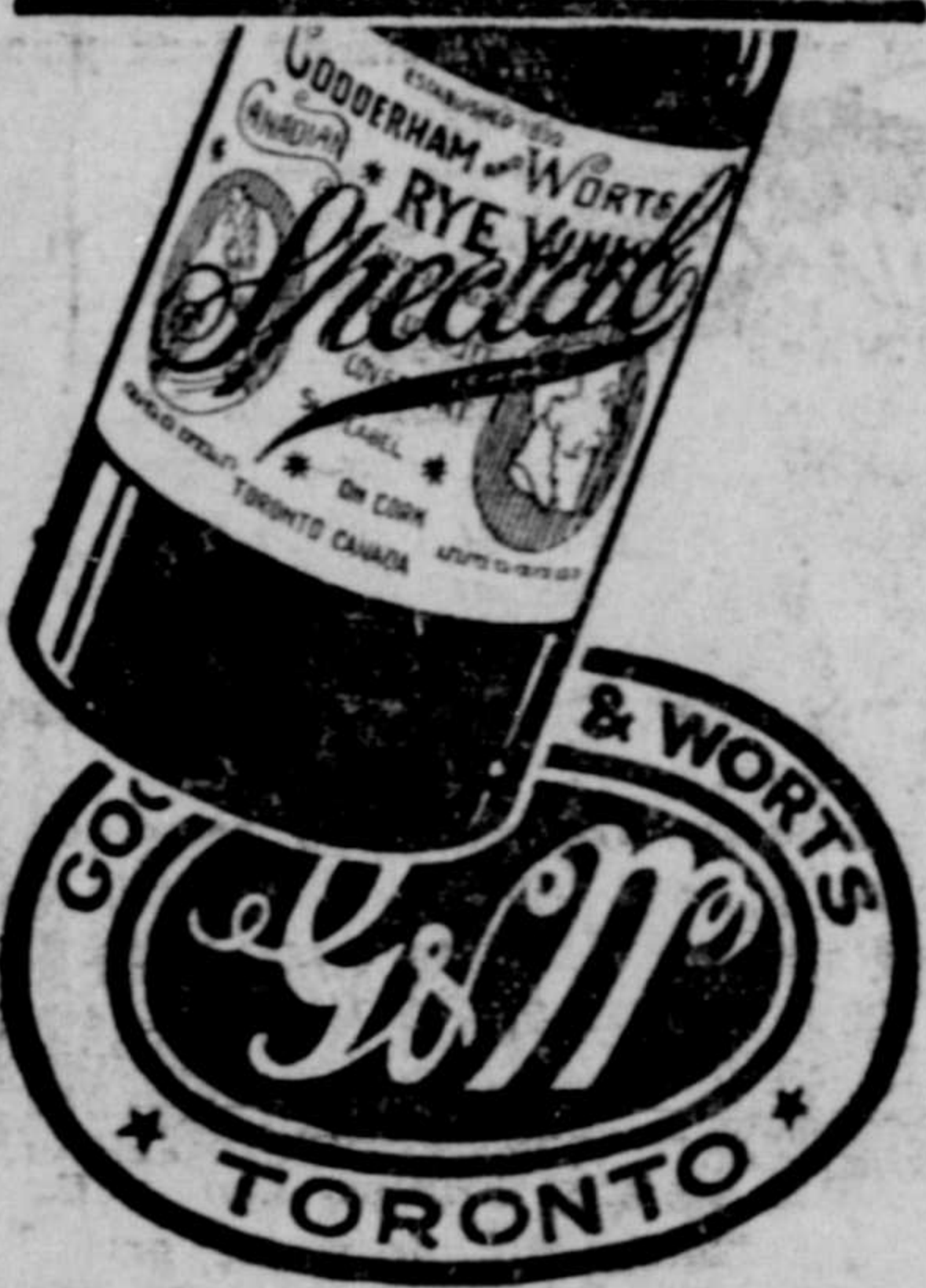
The other members of the touring South African women's lawn tennis team are Mrs. Peacock and Miss E. L. Heine. Miss Heine is only 17 years of age.

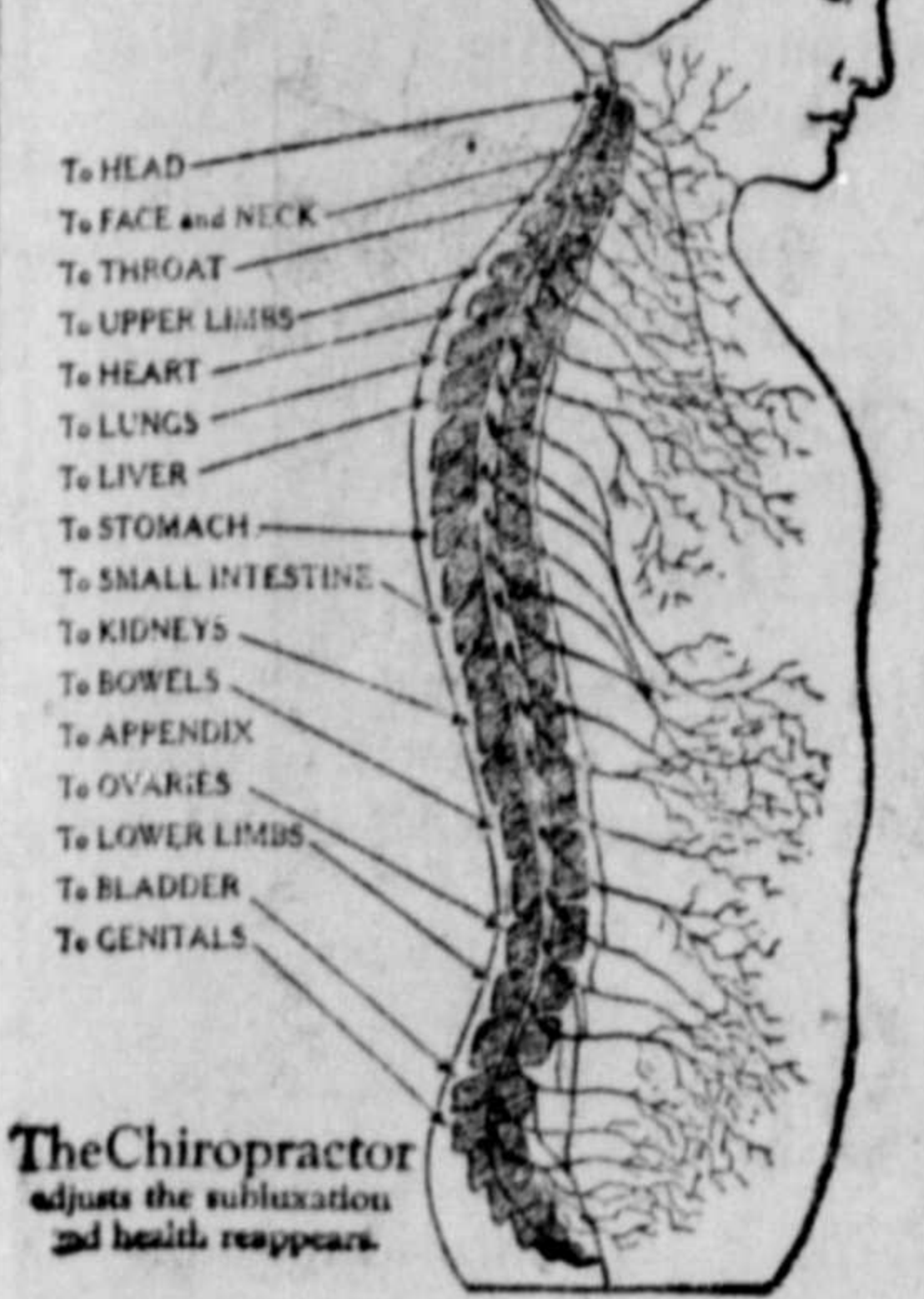

When Prince Rupert was but a name they sold town lots on the site on which the city now stands. That was back in 1909. But the town may really be said to have come into existence with the connecting up of steel on April 7, 1914, and the arrival of the first through train the following day.

For the afternoon a short and interesting boat trip is suggested. From the Prince Rupert boat house, across the harbor by launch, then a quarter of a mile on a good plank walk through the woods, and you are at the Salt Lakes, where excellent salt water bathing may be enjoyed, in water that is surprisingly warm.

SHIPS BUILT Here also is located the Prince Rupert Drydock and Shipyard, operating a twenty thousand ton floating drydock, six hundred feet long. **PROGRESSIVES IN MANITOBA**

HAD MAJORITY OF ONLY ONE IN LEGISLATURE BUT NEVER IN DANGER

WINNIPEG, June 16.—(By Canadian Press)—Elections of Manitoba will go to the polls on June 28 to determine the composition of the eighteenth legislature of the province and incidentally pass upon the record of the Bracken Progressive administration which has been in power for the past five years.

Devoid of any outstanding political issues the campaign has resolved itself into straight party appeals for the confidence of the electors with government candidates asserting that defeat of the Bracken government will bring about group system of government or coalition of two or more minority parties.

At dissolution the government supporters numbered twenty-eight in a house of fifty-five members, a majority of one over all. Progressive control of the legislature, however, has at no time been endangered during the five years of the government's tenure in office and on every important division the Progressives have been sustained by substantial majorities.

The standing of other parties at dissolution was: Liberals 7, Conservatives 6, Labor 4, Independents 8, while two seats were vacant.

**NEW SALVAGE BOAT IS HERE**

SALVAGE PRINCESS ARRIVED IN PORT LAST NIGHT AFTER EASY TRIP UP COAST

IS FINE VESSEL

A craft which will fill a long-felt need at this port and which will be a decidedly comely addition to the ever-increasing local waterfront fleet is the B.C. Towing & Litterage Co.'s brand new and powerful motor tugboat Salvage Princess which arrived in port at 7 o'clock last night from Vancouver with Capt. Paul Armour in command. The vessel tied up overnight at the Prince Rupert Boat House and moved down this morning to the drydock where some final fittings are being effected. She will leave tonight for Lowe Inlet where she will go on a four months' packing charter for the B.C. Packers' cannery after which she will return to Prince Rupert to be permanently stationed to engage in harbor work, salvage and general towing.

Seventy-five feet in length with beam of 18 feet and depth of 8 feet, the Salvage Princess is powered with a 120 h.p. Canadian-Fairbanks full diesel engine. Her equipment includes a 4-inch fire pump, enabling her to be used as a fireboat, and she also has powerful suction pumps such as are required on all salvage boats. She has as well a winch capable of lifting nine tons and is well equipped with towing facilities.

Of attractive though substantial without, the vessel has well appointed living quarters and is fitted with a hot-water heating system from coal-oil burners. With master's quarters, galley, etc., above deck, the boat has a roomy 'fo'c'sle for the crew and in all has eleven berths with springs. The upholstery is of leather.

Both pilot house and engine room has all the latest items of equipment and there is pilot house control for the engine. The vessel is also equipped with a 600-meter radio set and has wireless telephone.

The boat is of extra heavy construction and was built by the Vancouver Dry Dock & Salvage Co. at a cost of \$35,000. The B.C. Towing & Litterage Co., which owns her, was organized with a capitalization of \$100,000 by Vancouver and Victoria capitalists and certain local business men are interested in the concern. Paul Armour is managing director of the company and his experience in marine affairs of this district should serve him in good stead to the responsibilities now bestowed upon him.

**TRIP UP COAST**

Leaving Vancouver at 6 o'clock last Saturday evening with three seine boats in tow, the Salvage Princess made the trip to Lowe Inlet at an average speed of seven knots per hour, covering the distance in 58 hours running time. She dropped two of the seine boats at Lowe Inlet and brought the third to Claxton, then coming on into Prince Rupert harbor. On her decks she brought here a speedboat, Salvagine, which will engage in harbor work and which is now chartered for the summer to the Somerville Cannery Co. The Salvagine is 26 feet long and has a 30 h.p. Kermack gas engine.

Donald Greenwood, secretary of the Vancouver Dry Dock & Salvage Co., which built the Salvage Princess, made the trip up the coast on board. The chief engineer of the vessel is Jimmy Gibson, who has been identified with canneries in these parts for many years and will always be remembered as the man who drove Prince Rupert's first automobile. Mrs. Paul Armour is, for the time being, acting as chef of her husband's vessel. Other members of the crew include Harold Cornwall, wireless operator, and Bert Merrin, deck hand.

**CARPENTERS' UNION OFFICERS NOMINATED**

A special meeting of the Carpenters' Union was held last night for the purpose of receiving nominations for officers. The list will be left open until the second Wednesday in July when the election will take place. Certain amendments to the constitution were also put through.

The meeting, over which J. J. Gillis, president, heard an address from Mr. Cavanaugh, of the Wright Flexible Auto Co., a labor controlled manufacturing concern. One of the cars will arrive here about June 20 and will be placed in the July 1 street parade.

**FINANCES FOR JULY 1 REPORTED UPON**

Total of \$1,250 Has Been Collected so Far—Many Entries For Payment—Mr. Pattullo Invited

It was reported by L. M. Fuller, chairman of the finance committee, at a meeting last night of the executive committee of the Dominion Day celebration that \$1,250 had so far been collected for the fund to cover the cost of the festivities.

R. V. G. LePine, for the floats committee, reported many entries for the different pageant classifications as follows: Commercial, 22; industrial, 4; private cars, 15; fraternal, 8; with promise of six more; taxis, 10.

It was decided to offer two prizes—one for men and one for women—at the costume ball in the evening and it was suggested that the costumes be typical of the Victorian era or the period of Confederation.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo will be invited to give the principal address at the opening of the festivities.
