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UNPRECEDENTED SIGHT IN HARBOR

BRITISH PROPOSALS IN CHINESE TROUBLE MADE KNOWN

Four Big Ocean Carriers Here Today Mark Opening of Epoch in History of Prince Rupert

Japanese freighter, heavy with grain, ready to sail—British ship starting to load and fine motor vessel waiting—fourth boat lining

Prince Rupert put on the aspect of a real port this morning. To have four big ocean carriers in the harbor at once presented a scene of activity unprecedented in the history of a place the progress of which has not always kept pace with the hopes of its citizens. It must have been good for the souls of many people who have long kept up their confidence though conditions often seemed hardly to justify it. Today may go down in the annals of the city as one of great import for truly it marks the opening of an epoch, the end of which cannot be foreseen. The opening of grain shipping through this port had already put new heart into all but today's evidence of what it means intensified that spirit.

POLITICAL BODY IDEA IS BEATEN

PROHIBITIONISTS, BY HEAVY VOTE, DECIDED AT CONVENTION NOT TO ORGANIZE IN THAT MANNER

VANCOUVER, Jan. 28.—There will be no separate political organization of British Columbia prohibitionists it was decided by an overwhelming vote at the provincial convention of prohibitionists which is being held here with representatives from all parts of the province. Rev. W. W. Peck, late secretary of the British Columbia Prohibition Association, in a communication, advised against political organization as did also the secretary of the Alberta Prohibition Association and W. D. Hayley, M.L.A., Winnipeg.

BANDIT ROBS OREGON BANK

UNMASKED MAN DID JOB ALONE AND ESCAPED WITH BETWEEN \$10,000 AND \$12,000 AT FLORENCE

EUGENE, Oregon, Jan. 28.—The Florence State Bank at Florence, Oregon, was robbed late yesterday afternoon by a lone unmasked bandit who took between ten and twelve thousand dollars, Miss Harriet Weatherston, the cashier, who was alone in the bank at the time, was looked in a vault after the robber had taken all the money in sight. She was unable to liberate herself until she had been in the vault nearly an hour.

GREY LIBERALS FORM COUNCIL

WEAKENED BRITISH PARTY SUFFERS NEW SPLIT

LONDON, Jan. 28.—Viscount Grey and his Asquithian colleagues who succeeded from David Lloyd George's Liberal organization, have formed a new "Liberal Council." This council will include all Liberals who refuse to acknowledge Lloyd George's leadership. Lord Grey will be president of the new group, which will maintain its own separate organization. It is declared the movement does not imply formation of a new party. In effect, however, it is another break in the weak Liberal party.

AGREEMENT IN LEGISLATURE ON FUND ENQUIRY

ADJOURNMENT ON QUESTION TAKEN TILL MONDAY — TORIERS AND GRITS MAY UNITE ON LINE OF ACTION

VICTORIA, Jan. 28.—Peaceful agreement between the two sides of the legislature on the form of the proposed investigation into campaign funds was foreshadowed in the House on Thursday when the debate on the subject was adjourned until Monday on the understanding that it would be definitely disposed of that day.

Indication that the discussion of contributions to the funds of political parties was soon to cease came first from George A. Walkem, Provincial member for Richmond-Point Grey, who said he understood some change in proposals was contemplated.

A franker suggestion of similar nature came from Capt. Ian Mackenzie, Liberal member for Vancouver, who moved adjournment. Both sides, Capt. Mackenzie said, were anxious for an enquiry and differed merely on the form it would take. A unanimous decision on Monday would be a wonderful conclusion to the debate he declared.

The original motion placed before the House and moved by F. A. Browne, Labor member for Burnaby, called for the appointment of a Royal Commission to investigate campaign fund contributions. The government, through Attorney General A. M. Manson, offered an amendment suggesting, instead, that a House committee examine the evidence adduced before the customs commission and recommend to the legislature the course it should follow. The amendment also commits the government to the opinion that legislation should be passed this session dealing with the collection of campaign funds by political parties, both provincial and federal, in British Columbia.

EXTEND ROAD TO FRANCOIS

FARMERS' INSTITUTE CONVENTION AT VICTORIA HEARS PROPOSAL FOR RAILWAY

VICTORIA, Jan. 28.—The advisory board of the Farmers' Institute of British Columbia in annual convention here decided to gather data on the request of certain institutes in the Francois and Ouzia Lake areas of Central British Columbia, for a request in Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, for an eight-mile extension from the C.N.R. to the eastern end of Francois Lake, in order to give access to that area direct.

From Prince George came a request for extension of telephone service east of that city.

An effort will be made to extend the creamery businesses at Vanderhoof and Quesnel, operated under provincial management, in order to handle eggs, as is done by some private creamery ventures.

MILL BUILDING AT DUTHIE MINE

IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENT PROJECT IS ALREADY UNDER WAY AT PROMISING HUDSON BAY MOUNTAIN PROPERTY

With all the bright promise of a greatly increased force at the mine itself, and the prospects of other companies being attracted by the enlarged operations J. F. Duthie has backed up his promise of two months ago and a start was made this week in connection with the establishment of a mill at the Duthie mine says the Interior News.

Some of the machinery for the additions has already arrived and all is activity as teams and trucks work on hauling lumber and other supplies necessary for the building and the increased force to be employed.

J. R. Turner left this week for Seattle where he will consult with Mr. Duthie on the plans for the mill site and other details, and until he returns no details will be available. During his last visit to Smithers Mr. Duthie expressed his pleasure with the progress and results achieved at the mine and stated that, provided conditions were maintained until 1927 a mill would be installed.

LATEST PROCESS

It is understood that the latest oil flotation process will be installed and that the first crushing unit will have a capacity of fifty tons per day. Work at the property in recent months has centered at a shaft from which drifts have been run. One of these will break out near the bottom of the hill and at this point the new concentrator will be established.

Canadian Legion Approves of Fishing Licenses Being Given Japanese Who Did War Service

WINNIPEG, January 28.—Sir Percy Lake of Victoria was re-elected by acclamation yesterday as president of the Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League. The executive committee for the ensuing year includes Col. F. Albertson of Victoria, British Columbia's representative.

A resolution was passed requesting the Secretary of State to grant certificates of naturalization to all applicants of Japanese extraction who served in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces while another request was for the amending of the fisheries regulations so that Japanese citizens or other foreigners who served be accorded the same rights as other ex-service men.

CUSTOMS PROBE IS IN CALGARY

ATTORNEY GENERAL OF ALBERTA ASKS THAT CONSOLIDATED EXPORTERS BRANCH AT FERNIE BE CLOSED DOWN

CALGARY, Jan. 28.—R. A. Smith, appearing for the attorney general of Alberta, this morning submitted his province's case at the opening of the customs commission's session here. He requested that the commission forward a recommendation to the minister of customs to close down operations of the Fernie branch of the Consolidated Exporters Corporation in British Columbia as being undesirable from the point of view of the Alberta authorities.

ST. GODDARD WINS DERBY

DID 120 MILES BY DOG SLEIGH IN 11 HOURS AND 27 MINUTES

THE PAS, Jan. 28.—Emil St. Goddard won the annual Dog Derby yesterday when he completed the third and last forty-mile run in three hours and fifty-four minutes, thus performing the one hundred and twenty mile distance in eleven hours and twenty-seven minutes. Earl Brydges, who was second, did the total distance in eleven hours and fifty-six minutes while Leo St. Goddard, who finished second in yesterday's lap, won third place in the total distance which he covered in twelve hours and four minutes. H. Olenky and Shorthy Kussick trailed fourth and fifth.

New Record in Salmon Pack Was Made on This Coast During Past Season, Official Figures Show

VANCOUVER, January 28.—The salmon pack for British Columbia during 1926 established a new record of 2,605,000 cases as compared with the previous records of 1,747,500 cases in 1924 and 1,720,620 in 1925 according to figures issued by the fisheries department.

Concessions Will Be Called For in Parley with Canton Minister

LONDON, January 28.—Proposals that Charge d'Affaires O'Malley has been authorized to make to Foreign Minister Chen at Hankow are understood to embrace terms for the complete surrender, eventually, of British concessions throughout China. It is not known here whether the proposals have actually been handed to Chen yet but it is expected they will be made public soon.

The British have been most careful in the discussions with Chen to state that identical terms will be made with other Chinese authorities, namely the Pekin government, thus preventing the impression that Britain recognizes the Chinese government as the responsible authority in China.

Japan and other interested powers are being kept in touch with the progress of O'Malley's parley with Chen.

CANADA'S PARTICIPATION

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—"Tell me where the rumor came from and I will talk to you about it," remarked Premier King last night with reference to the report that Canada was being secretly sounded out on the question of military participation in Chinese affairs.

It was at the close of a four hour cabinet meeting at which it was stated sessional business was under discussion but about which Mr. King had no statement to make. He dismissed with a smile questions concerning the possibility of Canada being embroiled in the Chinese affair. "Why should we?" he asked. "I really cannot say anything about it because there is nothing to say. It is a civil war between North and South China and to attempt to drag the Canadian government into it is merely mischief making."

MATE OF CHRIS MOELLER GETS SIX MONTHS HARD

VICTORIA, Jan. 28.—Percival Warrington, who pleaded guilty to the charge of theft of liquor from the schooner Chris Moeller of which he was mate during the time last month that the vessel was being held here at the recommendation of the customs commission, was sentenced yesterday to six months' imprisonment with hard labor.

FULL MILITARY FUNERAL TO BE HELD TOMORROW

The funeral of the late William G. Hughes will be held tomorrow afternoon from the Presbyterian church, the service being conducted by Rev. H. C. Fraser, assisted by Rev. Archdeacon Rix. The ceremonies will be of a full military nature, deceased having been a veteran of the Great War. The Northern B.C. Regiment and the Canadian Legion are in charge of arrangements and will have a band composed of members of the Boys' Band and the Regimental Band, as well as a firing party furnished by veterans of the war. Interment will take place in Fairview cemetery.

DRUG HAUL IS MADE AT VANCOUVER FROM BIG EMPRESS VESSEL

VANCOUVER, Jan. 28.—Thirty-four cases of opium, valued at \$7,500, were seized aboard the C.P.O.S. Empress of Asia which arrived from the Orient on Monday.

RISING MARKET CATCHES BEARS

SENSATIONAL RISE IN WHEELING & LAKE ERIE COMMON STOCK WAS DISASTROUS TO STOCK EXCHANGE DEPRESSERS

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Huge losses running into millions of dollars were suffered by "bear" traders on the Stock Market today in what appeared to be a "corner" in common and preferred stocks of the Wheeling & Lake Erie Railway. A sensational jump of 1 1/2 points to 65 1/2, a new high record, and thirty-eight points above last year's low price, occurred this morning in common while preferred jumped three points to 65. Ordinarily, the spread between the two issues is about twenty points in favor of preferred.

PRINCE RUPERT - BRITISH COLUMBIA.

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ELEVATOR EXTENSION HERE NEEDED AT ONCE.

The port of Prince Rupert is already suffering from lack of grain handling facilities. The one elevator here seemingly is not sufficient. Comparatively speaking, not many vessels have been chartered for this port this winter but there has been and is some delay in handling even such as there are. Witness the fact that two big vessels are today lying in the harbor, already lined and waiting to load, but unable to go on berth to start taking on their cargoes because they cannot be handled. One of these boats has already been waiting three days and the other will probably have to wait longer.

It had been at first thought that two boats could be loading grain concurrently at the elevator but such is apparently not the case. If this fine big plant, said to be as modern as any on the continent, cannot handle two boats at a time, then another elevator will have to be obtained.

This port is not going to succeed, much less make an impression, if steamers, whose time is precious, continue to be held up as they are being now, so it begins to look as if Prince Rupert should start agitating for the second elevator as strong as they did for the first. In the meantime, it might be advisable to have but a few grain ships here at regular intervals and handle them with despatch than to have too many and allow them to be delayed.

Perhaps the situation could be remedied with some extensions of the plant already here. The dry dock was soon able to make arrangements to line two ships at a time here when it was at first believed that only one could be done. In view of the fact that there seems to be no more doubt about this being a strategic grain shipping centre, the next thing needed is immediate extension of the loading facilities so that, at the very least, two boats can be loaded here at once.

INVESTIGATION INTO CAMPAIGN FUNDS.

While the opposition talks about it, the provincial government has decided to lay the cards on the table as far as the evidence taken at the customs probe in Vancouver is concerned. Now they will have the bird in their hands so they can see what kind of feathers it wears and who helped to make its nest comfortable. As suggested before in these columns, it will in all likelihood be found to be as much a Tory bird as it is a Grit.

To the outsider, it would seem that the Conservatives would be doing better to support some measure that would bring about a real reform than continuing to hold up their hands in hypocritical horror and playing politics on anything that comes in view. After all, the people are not so much interested in finding out which is the worst of two possibly culpable parties as they are in having both those parties cleaned up. The attorney general's plan for the housecleaning is the only practicable one and the sooner everybody agrees to accept the sooner will the sweeping begin.

WHAT WILL CHINA THINK?

The situation in China is undoubtedly serious but it is questionable whether this great display of armed strength planned by the British government will help matters much. A lot of trouble is being gone to and it is possible that the Chinese may consider it an overt act and become even more disorderly, rather than a mere precaution taken with such supposed lofty motives. The whole trouble in China is that there has been too much interference. Too many older brothers have been trying to help the little boy along. Now he can walk, perhaps it would be advisable to let him step out for himself. He may or may not be frightened into submission but he cannot be permanently conquered.

New Ontario Legislature Opens Wednesday Next---Interest Will Centre in Liquor Control Bill

TORONTO, Jan. 28.—(By Canadian Press)—The new Legislature of Ontario, with a new Speaker, many new members and a new liquor control policy awaiting discussion and adoption, will be opened by a new Lieutenant-Governor, his Honor W. D. Ross, on February 2. Incidentally, there is a new "East Block" of the Legislative Buildings open for occupation and a new and reinforced floor in the Legislative Chamber.

The 17th Legislature sees the Conservative government of Premier G. Howard Ferguson returned with one of the biggest majorities any government ever had in Ontario—a majority of 36 over all other parties, and of 46 on the question of sale of liquor in government control, which is the main issue of the session.

The Liberal-Progressives returned in the elections on December 1 last year have divided themselves between the Liberal and Progressive groups. Including a few United Farmer representatives among the Progressives, the standing of parties as the House assembles is as follows:

NEW SPEAKER

W. D. Black, veteran Conservative member for Addington, who was elected by acclamation last year, will be the new Speaker of the House. He will succeed Hon. Joseph Thompson, who still retains a Toronto seat. The assembly over which Mr. Black will rule is the fifth in which he has taken part.

Major T. Ashmore Kidd, Conservative, Kingston, will signalize his debut in the House by moving the Address in reply to the speech from the Throne. Dr. Paul Poisson, Conservative, Essex North, also a new member, has been named to second the address.

The Progressive members of the Legislature, led by W. E. Raney, former attorney-general, like those of the Liberal group under W. E. N. Sinclair, were elected as opposed to the changes in the Ontario Temperance Act. Both Mr. Raney and Mr. Sinclair will receive the additional emolument granted leaders of parliamentary groups.

The four Independent-Liberals, Messrs. Pinard (Ottawa East), Proulx (Prescott), Belanger (Russell), and Legault (Sturgeon Falls), will sit with the Liberals but will vote with the Conservatives on the Government Control Bill. The sole Labor representative, Karl K. Homuth (Waterloo South), will also vote with the Conservatives on this question.

GOVERNMENT CONTROL PLAN

Premier Ferguson's plan of liquor sale by government control has been widely discussed since the election campaign of last November. Briefly, it is proposed to amend the Ontario Temperance Act to provide for establishment of a commission "who will have the authority to issue to all citizens over 21 years of age who desire to purchase spirituous or malt liquors for their own use, an annual permit upon which shall be entered each purchase and which may be suspended or cancelled at any time for abuse of misconduct." in the Premier's words.

A large portion of the province at the time of the institution of the Ontario Temperance Act in 1916, had already banished the sale of liquor under local option. It has been stressed that these "dry" areas will be respected and no sale of spirituous and malt liquors may be allowed in these areas until the people of these municipalities indicate by vote their desire for a change. The commission, however, may establish at such places as it may select in other portions of the province, dispensaries for the sale of spirituous and malt liquors in sealed packages to persons holding official permits. To the commission, whose personnel has yet to be announced, will likely be entrusted all details of administration of the new system. Expectations are that the system will be in operation by May.

Thus will be added another chapter to the chequered history of the Ontario Temperance Act. Plebiscites in 1919 and 1924 failed to overturn it, although each time the majority in its favor was decreased. In 1925 another amendment allowed sale of the now famous 44 per cent beer, which, however, failed to meet the demands of the "wet" factions while it was opposed by the "dry" side. The popular majority for government control at the last general elections was 241,632 in a total vote of 1,137,878.

OTHER NEW LEGISLATION

The amendment to the O.T.A., while dominant, is not by any means the only piece of legislation to come before the assembly. Upward revisions in the speed limit on the highways of the province, probably to 35 miles an hour, an alteration in the marriage law, and a requirement on the part of all vehicles to carry lights at night, constitute diverse but interesting features of the legislative program. The speed limit will be 10 miles an hour faster than the present 25. The measure to have all vehicles carry lights after dark has been up for discussion a long time, and it is believed the public is now ready to support the regulation, opposition formerly having come from farmers who disliked being forced to carry lights on their horse-drawn wagons. The changes contemplated in the marriage law are a result of the strange situation which arose in Toronto last year, when Rt. Rev. A. F. Winnington-Ingram, Bishop of London, found himself prevented from performing the marriage ceremony for his niece, the law requiring that officiating clergymen be residents of the province.

STILL ENTHUSIASTIC ON FISH CULTURE IS FORMER LAKELSE MAN

James Catt, formerly superintendent of the Lakeelse Lake hatchery, keeps up his enthusiasm for the value of this work on the Atlantic coast when he was moved a few years ago.

Mr. Catt, who is now district inspector of fish hatcheries in the Maritime provinces, delivered an address on fish culture before the monthly meeting of the Natural History Society, at St. John, N.B., recently. During the course of his address he described the origin and objects of fish culture, and traced the work of the federal government in its efforts to stabilize and maintain the supply of fish in the inland waters of Canada. At one time the Dominion government was maintaining 82 hatcheries, but recently the hatcheries in Ontario have been taken over by local control. In the Maritime provinces there are 17 hatcheries, sub-hatcheries and salmon ponds. Mr. Catt stated, and the work in this district is confined to the culture of trout and salmon. Each year about 30,000,000 Atlantic salmon and upwards of 5,000,000 trout are distributed from the hatcheries in the Maritimes, and all of the salmon and as many of the trout as possible are from the hatcheries' brood stock. Until the hatcheries have been considerably expanded the district will have to continue to import yearly

COMPENSATION ACT BENEFICIAL

PROVES WORKERS' BOON—RECENT CHANGES GIVE LARGER ALLOWANCES TO RELATIVES

VICTORIA, Jan. 28.—A comprehensive survey of the operations of the Workmen's Compensation Board shows the British Columbia worker has been reaping a greater advantage from its work with the passing of each year. At the same time the relations between the board and industry have been of an amicable nature.

Although the board has had to wait patiently from time to time for replies from employers upon whom assessments have been levied, no execution has even been made without notice to the delinquent employer. No complaints have ever been filed against the board for arbitrary treatment. All other Canadian provinces have endowed their boards with similar power to insure recovery of money due by employers.

Unlike the payment of ordinary insurance premiums the board does not collect in advance the amount levied against any particular industry but makes assessment as claims arise against the funds applicable to that particular industry from which the assessment is drawn. Final adjustments are made at the close of the year when all returns are compiled.

Every assessment made is therefore simply a deposit on account of accidents occurring in the industry in general. In the past 10 years there have been approximately 500,000 of such calls. The type of insurance handled by the board, assures to the worker a maximum of benefit for the money paid as only \$2.55 out of every \$100 contributed by industry is "wasted," the balance of \$97.45 going to the workman beneficiary under the Act.

Personnel Changed

Whilst there have been changes in the Act governing the Workmen's Compensation Board, there has been no change in the personnel, and no demand for any. Throughout 10 years of service the members have been E. H.

BUCK PRIVATE IS FINE MAN

Memories of First and Last Shot of War Calls Forth Veteran British Commander's Praise

LONDON, Jan. 28.—Although a million British soldiers lost their lives in the war, some of the men who fired the first shots on the first day also fired some of the last shots on the last day—and on the same ground. This astonishing coincidence is recorded by Lieut.-Colonel J. H. Boraston and Captain Cyril E. O. Bax, in their wonderful story of "The Eighth Division in War, 1914-18."

When the armistice came, the 2nd Middlesex, part of the English Division, was three and three-quarter miles north-northeast of Mons. The night before they established posts in the village of Ghlin.

"To the north of the village, it is stated, 'is situated the Chateau de La Verriere, and its owner informed the men of the 2nd Middlesex that in August, 1914, their colleagues of another battalion of the same regiment (the 4th Middlesex) had been billeted there. A remarkable coincidence, but there was one still more extraordinary. For there was a number of men then in the 2nd Middlesex to whom the information was already familiar; for the very good reason that they themselves had actually been serving with the 4th Middlesex in August, 1914."

"These men had, on the morning of August 23, 1914, fired the first shots of the war on the British front; on the 11th November 1918, having survived all from the same spot they fired what may well have been the last."

It is not surprising that General Heiseker, having commanded a division containing such veterans, wrote in his farewell message: "I have come out of the war with one conviction, at all events, and this is that the finest man on God's earth is the British Private Soldier."

OUTLOOK MUCH BRIGHTER NOW

TIMBER AND POLE INDUSTRY IS GAINING GROUND ON LOWER SKEENA

A revival in the lumber and timbering industry of the lower Skeena sections is in prospect after a desultory demand of several years that has sent several mills to the scrap heap and receiver. Prospects at present are bright for all mills along the railway and at Terrace preparations are under way for an active year. Timbers make up the bulk of orders entering into the belief of a prosperous 1927 in the mills on the Skeena River.

At Terrace the George Little mill has on hand two good orders for this material, one being for a large quantity of 40-foot boom sticks to be used in rafting by big pulp mills in Eastern Canada. Another order may reach half a million feet of cedar timbers for culvert work on the Canadian National Railways to be delivered at Obed, Alberta. For the handling of these orders as well as others expected in addition to his general business along the railway in this district, Mr. Little left last week for Edmonton to purchase a carload of horses for use in the bush and hauling logs to the mill.

The pole industry has also stiffened a little and prospects are good for a big year in this material. Last year the absence of snow proved a handicap and many poles were left in the bush with a better season in this respect, these marooned poles are being brought out to the banks of the Skeena, as well as the cut for this year, and with the spring breakup they will be gathered up at various points for loading and shipment to eastern markets.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant unreserved surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made in printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and outcropping at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
