## HUM OF AIRPLANE HEARD MONDAY

### MILO EGGERS ACCUSED OF HI-JACKING REACHES CANADA

#### Two Newfoundlanders Heard Hum of Plane on Monday Morning

RESPONSIBLE CITIZENS TESTIFY THAT PLANE PASSED IN THE CLOUDS AT 9.30

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 12.—Testifying before Magistrate John Casey following requests broadcasted for information regarding the possibility of Nungesser and Coli of the airship "Whitebird" having flown over Newfoundland, Patrick O'Brien and Captain John Stapleton, both residents of Harbor Grace, declared yesterday that they heard an airplane overhead at 9.30 Monday morning but it could not be seen owing to heavy clouds.

It is considered possible that this information contained in a report to W. J. Higgins, minister of justice, may have the effect of considerably narrowing the search area for the armless. Both declared they were responsible citizens and knew at the time they heard the machine that the trans-Atlantic flight was in progress but both thought the "hum" was that of a St. John's plane. No plane so far as known, has made a flight to Newfoundland recently.

#### B.C. STUDENTS GET DIPLOMAS

RICHARD PILLSBURY OF THIS CITY AMONG THOSE GRADUATING FROM UNIVERSITY

VANCOUVER, May 12.—More than two hundred university of B.C. students become masters or bachelors of arts, science, or agriculture as a result of the final examinations recently concluded. The annual convocation ceremonies being held here today. Harold D. Smith in arts gets the Governor General's gold medal; H. R. Lyle Strait received honorable mention; W. Kaye Lamb gets the Historical Society gold medal in history and Miss Undine Howay carries off the Alliance Francaise gold medal.

Among the students who graduate is Richard Pillsbury, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Pillsbury of Prince Rupert.

#### CANNERY WINS COURT ACTION

MAGISTRATE DECLARES AGAINST FEDERAL LICENSE AND BEING BEYOND JURISDICTION

VANCOUVER, May 12.—Magistrate Alexander dismissed the action against the Somerville Cannery Company brought by the federal department of fisheries on a charge of operating a cannery without a license.

The cannery contended that the federal government exceeded its jurisdiction in compelling companies to take out a federal license.

The decision of the magistrate, if not upset in a higher court, will affect all the canneries in the province and particularly the use of the floating cannery Laurel Whalen, which the fisheries department have tried to tie down to operation at one place.

#### PENSIONS FOR B.C. PLANNED

VICTORIA, May 12.—The draft regulations under which the new Canadian Old Age Pensions scheme will be administered in British Columbia is now under consideration by the Provincial Government. The system will be established soon and it is possible the scheme may be inaugurated early in July.

#### BRITISH OFFICIAL AT VATICAN IS PERMANENT

LONDON, May 12.—Foreign Secretary Chamberlain announced in the House of Commons today that the maintenance of an official as British representative at the Vatican, established in 1914 can now be regarded as the permanent policy of the Government.

It was generally considered that the 1914 action was taken so as to establish the closest relations with the Holy See in furthering peace overtures by the Pope or other responsible persons.

#### ORGANIZATION TO LOOK AFTER GAME GROUNDS

PERMANENT BODY TO BE FORMED AS A RESULT OF MEETING LAST NIGHT IN CITY HALL

At a meeting last night in the city police courtroom of the committee from the Fair Board and baseball and football associations, which has been dealing with the improvement of the Acropolis Hill grounds, it was decided to form an organization which will be known as the Acropolis Hill Grounds Improvement League. The league shall consist of two representatives from each of the athletic, fraternal and public service bodies in the city. Officers will consist of a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary and the object of the organization will be to raise money, by means of special attractions, amusements, percentage of gate receipts, etc., at the grounds, for the purpose of improving and protecting the field. A committee was named to draw up a constitution and invite the various bodies to participate in the work of the league. R. M. Winslow acted as secretary of the meeting.

The Prince Rupert Players' Club, through George Mitchell, volunteered to stage a repeat performance of the farce, "Nothing But The Truth" for the benefit of athletic ground improvements. A committee was appointed to complete arrangements for the staging of the show, the date of which will be announced shortly.

Another committee consisting of Ben Self, Bert Morgan and Douglas Frizell was delegated to confer with Lieut. R. P. Ponder, officer commanding the local detachment of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, with a view to staging a basketball game next Wednesday night between a local team and another representing H.M.C.S. Patricia which will be here at that time. A number of other means will also be devised to aid the league in the near future.

#### MINISTERS AT EDMONTON ARE VICTIMIZED

TOUCHED BY MAN WHO PROFESSED TO BE UNIVERSITY CLASS-MATE YEARS AGO

EDMONTON, May 12.—Variants on the well-known "confidence game" are many, and a smooth, well-spoken gentleman from Nova Scotia has recently developed a new one—with ministers of the gospel as his victims.

He first looks up the educational record of the intended victim of the "touch," locates the university and class years of the minister, and then pays him a visit. The man from Nova Scotia is an old class-mate of the minister; he names the college and the year, and gives other details.

"Of course, it's so many years ago, you don't remember me," says the pseudo class-mate. "But I remember you perfectly."

Then he gets down to business. He doesn't know anybody in the city but the minister, his old class-mate. He is temporarily short of money—is expending a remittance, etc.—and would like the minister to lend him a few dollars.

Sometimes the minister does—and sometimes he doesn't. Scotch Presbyterians, for instance, proved canny souls who weren't to be imposed upon.

Anyway, the gentleman from Nova Scotia got away with some \$20 or \$30 from trusting Edmonton ministers, and now the city police are anxious to have an interview with the man who was the class-mate to so many confiding brethren of the cloth.

#### NO SHORTAGE SAYS OFFICER

RUMORS ALWAYS CURRENT THAT LIQUOR HAS BEEN TAKEN IN CASES OF SEIZURE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12.—Collector of customs William Hamilton declared that there were no grounds for suspecting a shortage of the Federalship cargo. "These rumors are current in all such cases," he said. "They were current about the Coal Harbor and the Quads but a check showed that more liquor was aboard each vessel than was called for by the manifests, which probably were purposely incorrect. In the case of the Federalship there were guards representing the customs service and coastguard, nine or ten men watching one another as well as the cargo and there was no opportunity to remove any of it."

#### ARBITRATION IS ASKED BY FEDERALSHIP

RUMOR THAT LIQUOR MISSING MADE HER RETURN TO VANCOUVER TO CHECK UP

VANCOUVER, May 12.—To assess damages for her illegal detention in San Francisco, appointment of arbitrators under the United States-Panama treaty will be sought by counsel for the Canadian-Mexican company, charterers of the steamer Federalship which is here still.

Rumors of a shortage in the liquor cargo caused the owners to order the return of the Federal ship to Vancouver. It is rumored that two thousand cases are missing.

It was announced last night that the liquor would be reshipped to Buena Ventura where it was originally consigned.

#### BUDGET FOR CELEBRATION SET AT \$4,000

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE HAD MEETING LAST NIGHT TO PLAN FOR VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS OF BIG EVENT

#### Milo Eggers Taken Out of Cell Under Protest After Guns Were Levelled and Sent Off to B.C.

TACOMA, May 12.—Under heavy guard Milo Eggers left here on the United States coastguard cutter Arcata for Victoria last night to face trial on a charge of shooting Einar Larum during the hi-jacking of the gasboat Hadsel in March, 1924.

When Forbes Cruikshanks and other British Columbia officers and a Tacoma shotgun squad went into the jail yesterday, the visit apparently surprised Eggers, who protested he "did not have to be taken away" and refused to come out of the cell. He picked up a heavy pot and exclaimed: "Come in and I'll knock your head off." The officers levelled their guns and the prisoner shambled out and was shackled by an officer.

VICTORIA, May 12.—Milo Eggers, who for many months successfully resisted extradition to British Columbia to face a charge of murder, arrived here this morning and was landed in jail to await trial.

#### FORTUNE TELLING SOMETIMES TRUE BUT ONLY IN FUN

EDMONTON, May 12.—In a recent case a woman, charged with fortune telling, was found not guilty. A certain husband whose wife came home "raving" after a visit to the fortune teller, laid the charge. The latter, on her own behalf, denied any psychic powers and did not expect people to believe what she said, although "told in fun they sometimes come true." Asked if her callers paid, she answered, "Some don't." Her daughter, a witness, said, "When folks leave money it is not thrown into the street after them." The judge trying the case admonished her in this wise: "Don't tell fortunes lest people believe you."

#### DAMAGES GRANTED INJURIES ON CAR

EDMONTON, May 12.—Damages of \$1,500 and hospital costs of \$496 have been awarded by Mr. Justice Walsh in the supreme court in favor of Mrs. Catharine Barclay, widow of the late L. T. Barclay, for injuries sustained last August by a fall in a moving street car which broke her hip. His Lordship found on the evidence that there had been an unusual jerk which indicated negligence on the part of the motor-man and that the city had not met the onus upon it to show there was proper operation of the car.

#### RESERVE JUDGMENT EXTRADITION CASE

VANCOUVER, May 12.—Decision was reserved by Judge Grant in connection with the proposed extradition of Henry Sereth, president of the bankrupt Southern Alberta Lumber Co. to the United States. Sereth is sought in New York on a charge of larceny and he dishonored a check on a Seattle bank.

#### DRIVE MADE FOR TAXES

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ACTIVITY RESULTS IN INCREASED COLLECTIONS

OTTAWA, May 12.—As a result of more aggressive methods by the department of national revenue, sales tax receipts for the first week in May more than doubled over the corresponding period last year. The total in the week was over two million dollars. The department is taking steps against firms and individuals in arrears. Likewise action is being taken against those whose attempted evasion of excise tax has figured in the customs investigation.

Under the act passed at the recent session, a monthly return of taxable sales is called for and new penalties are provided for failure to comply with the provision.

All collectors are being circularized and the conditions of the statute outlined. Even though a taxpayer in arrears may be unable to pay, the return is called for and failure to make it is subject to a penalty of \$25, for each case while interest is to be added to the amount in arrears.

The increased revenues are attributed partly to the more aggressive campaign and partly to the improved business conditions throughout the country.

#### MUST PAY FOR ILLEGAL ACT

HAD CONTRACTS WITH MUNICIPALITY WHEN COUNCILLOR AND WAS FINED COSTS

VANCOUVER, May 12.—Emmanuel Girard was found guilty of having an interest in contracts with the municipality of Coquitlam while councillor in 1925 and 1926 and was ordered to pay the municipality penalties of \$2,500 and \$1,750, but Mr. Justice Gregory announced that he would relieve Girard of these penalties if the defendant paid the municipality \$300 "and plaintiff's costs."

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**COUNTRY WAS AT FAULT**

A news despatch tell of four hundred Mennonites who left Manitoba recently, their farms being taken over by more recent arrivals from southern Russia, who wish to become Canadian citizens and have their children educated. Those leaving have never become citizens, although in the country fifty years.

It does not speak well for Canada that people could live here for fifty years without wishing to become citizens. The difficulty seems to have been that they were mistakenly allowed too much liberty and it became license.

In British Columbia there was a case where the Doukhobors did not wish to have their children educated in the public schools. The B.C. government was firm with the result that they have changed their attitude.

We do not want any people in this country who are not willing to conform to the ways of the country and to become citizens and educate their children. It would not be tolerated in the United States and we should not allow it here. Firmness in this matter should be insisted on, in order that the younger generation may have a chance. We are better off without any alien people, no matter what country they are from, who will not become Canadian within a reasonable time.

**BOTH IRISH PARTIES LOSE**

Both parties in the Irish Free State have lost their suits for the fund raised in the United States in aid of the establishment of an Irish Republic and the judge has decided that the money shall be returned to the donors. It amounts to about two and a half million dollars. This action puts the quietus to a lot of trouble for if De Valera had secured the money he would have used it to try to unseat the present government and involve the country in more political disturbances. The U.S. judge did a service to the Emerald Isle in acting as he did.

This is a commercial age and after all anything that is not on a commercial basis is not worth very much.

**WERE METHODS WRONG?**

G. G. McGeer on his return from the East told the Vancouver people their methods were wrong in their dealings with the Ottawa government. It is to be supposed he meant that they should have returned Liberals instead of Conservatives. The same might have been said for this constituency. Of course it should not be. It should not be wrong to return a Liberal when a Conservative government is in office and vice versa, but it seems to be looked upon that way. At any rate, however unbiased we may be, we like to do things for our friends better than for those opposed to us. It is human nature. It is to be hoped Prince Rupert will not suffer or that account, although it seems as if she has already suffered in not getting the vote for fishermen's floats, which was in the estimates last year but which this year has been left out.

**The Big Soccer Game Told About by a Former Prince Rupert Resident in London**

(By Sid Webb)

The Cardiff City football team, supported by several thousand of its enthusiastic followers, captured the City of London in the early morning of Saturday, April 23, the day of the great English soccer Cup-tie Final, without the slightest opposition. From early Saturday morning the streets of London were crowded with "Cardiffites," and old men vied with the young men in trying to be original in the way of carrying mascots and dressing themselves in quaint and comic costumes, while even the girls and young women created a lot of interest, a number of them "sporting" the native Welsh costume and looking exceedingly pretty in their high Welsh hats. The visitors amused themselves in a hundred different ways until the kick-off of the great cup final with Arsenal, the London team, at Wembley Stadium, at 3 p.m.

Long before noon the highways leading to the colossal Wembley Stadium were simply choked with motor vehicles carrying the supporters of both teams to the great arena. A number of the more adventurous spirits hired taxi cabs and sat upon the roofs from which they waved colored flags, threw confetti and otherwise gave vent to their excitement much to the amusement of the pedestrians.

The writer was walking along Euston Road on Cup Final day around 1 p.m. where, as far as the eye could see, motor cars, motor cycles, motor coaches, busses, push cycles, etc., were slowly wending their way to the great game. The London police had their hands full controlling the crossroads, and at certain points no less than four policemen were required to keep the traffic moving and thus preventing a "jam."

**HEARD ON RADIO**

It was mighty interesting to hear the play of the Cup Final broadcaster from Wembley over the wireless, which the writer was fortunate in doing. With a map of the field of play spread out in front, and photographs of the players handy, it was possible to follow the play very accurately, and the reception was particularly clear.

When the King arrived upon the scene at 2 p.m. the massed bands of H.M. Guards played The National Anthem, which the crowd of over 95,000 spectators sang with bared heads, this being followed by three mighty cheers for the King. The roar of the crowd was something which had to be heard to be believed. It was simply wonderful, but even this roar was eclipsed when Cardiff secured their one goal. The massed bands led the tremendous assembly in community singing, such old favorites as "Abide With Me," "Land of Hope and Glory," "Keep the Home Fires Burning," "Land of My Fathers," etc., being among the repertoire. This was the biggest performance of community singing ever staged in the history of British sport.

**THE GAME**

As the writer heard the broadcast of the game over the wireless it was very evident that the players on both sides were suffering from "stage fright." The announcer stated this fact very forcibly and repeated several times that the players seemed somewhat upset and were kicking more turf off the field than they were actually kicking the ball. This fact can be easily understood under the circumstances. With so many thousands present, the marching of the massed bands, and the presentation of the players to the King, no doubt all tended to un-nerve the teams. In the first half of the game the play was pretty well equally shared and nothing very exciting occurred. However, in the second half there could be no doubt that the Cardiff club had found its "football feet" and was determined to get busy. Although the Arsenal team attacked the Cardiff stronghold several times it missed opportunities and mostly the Welsh defence proved too strong for it to penetrate with effect.

**CARDIFF'S ONE GOAL**

The one and only goal of the game was scored by Cardiff some 15 minutes before the end of play. As the result of good combination play on the part of Cardiff forwards Ferguson, Cardiff's centre forward, sent in a stinging shot at Lewis, Arsenal's goalie, which took on a lot of twist, and which slipped through Lewis' hands as he tried to save it. While it was quite an accidental goal, it was a goal just the same, and meant that Cardiff had taken the English Cup out of England for the first time in the cup's history. Then it was Cardiff's entire week-end in London, and they proved themselves to be wonderfully good sports, enjoying themselves by making fun for everybody without being too boisterous. Everyone took Cardiff's win in the proper spirit and it would be hard to find a better tempered crowd the world over.

**TWO HEROES**

Just to show what a hold the tit-bit of English soccer has on the regular followers of a particular team, two of the Cardiff supporters walked the entire distance from Cardiff to London, a distance of over 200 miles, to see their team "win the cup." They arrived in London early on Saturday morning, April 23, and then waited for hours outside the Wembley Stadium to get in on the "rush" seats. These two men started out from Cardiff on the Tuesday preceding the date of the Cup Final. This achievement, I think, would take some equaling for real enthusiasts.

**COPIING WITH CRIME**

Of late the number of motor car thefts, jewellery store raids, and crimes committed by bandits with motor cars, has become so large in London and its outskirts that it has become necessary to increase the police. In this connection Scotland Yard has recently put on a new force to assist the outlying districts in coping with this crime wave. This new force includes seventy new inspectors, forty-two station sergeants, and sixty-two additional constables. The police authorities are doubtless determined to do all they can to give adequate protection to residents and traders in the outlying suburbs.

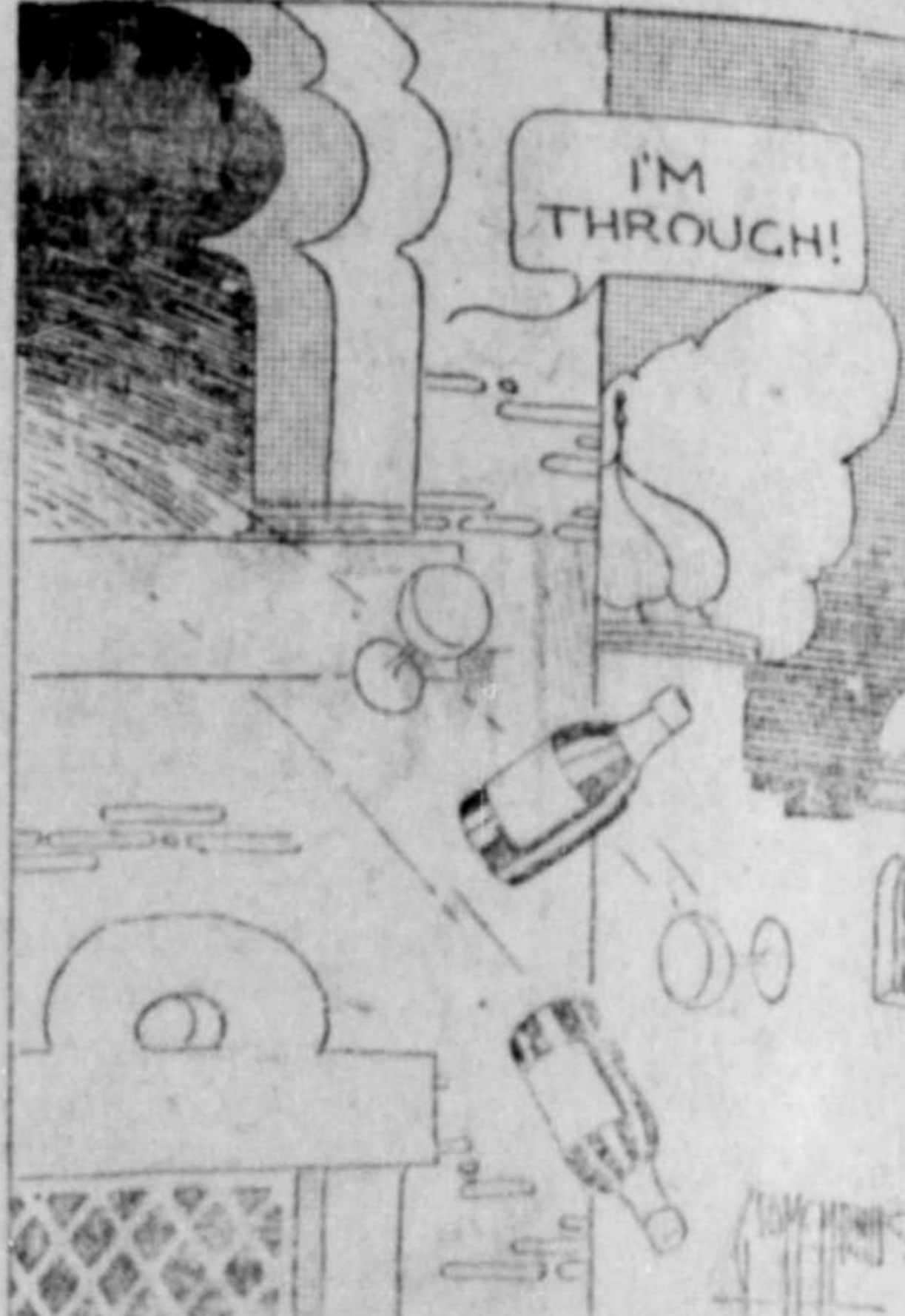
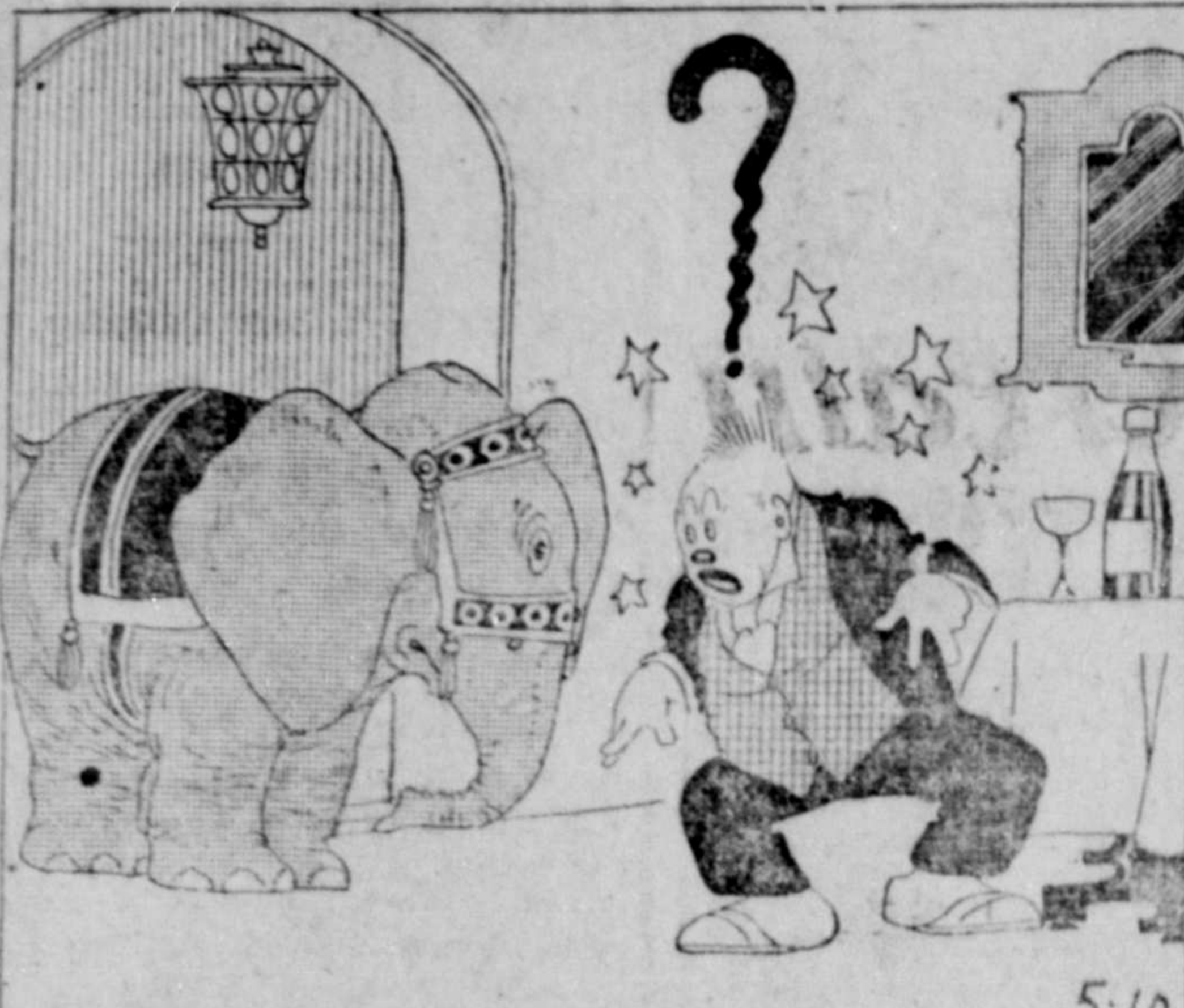
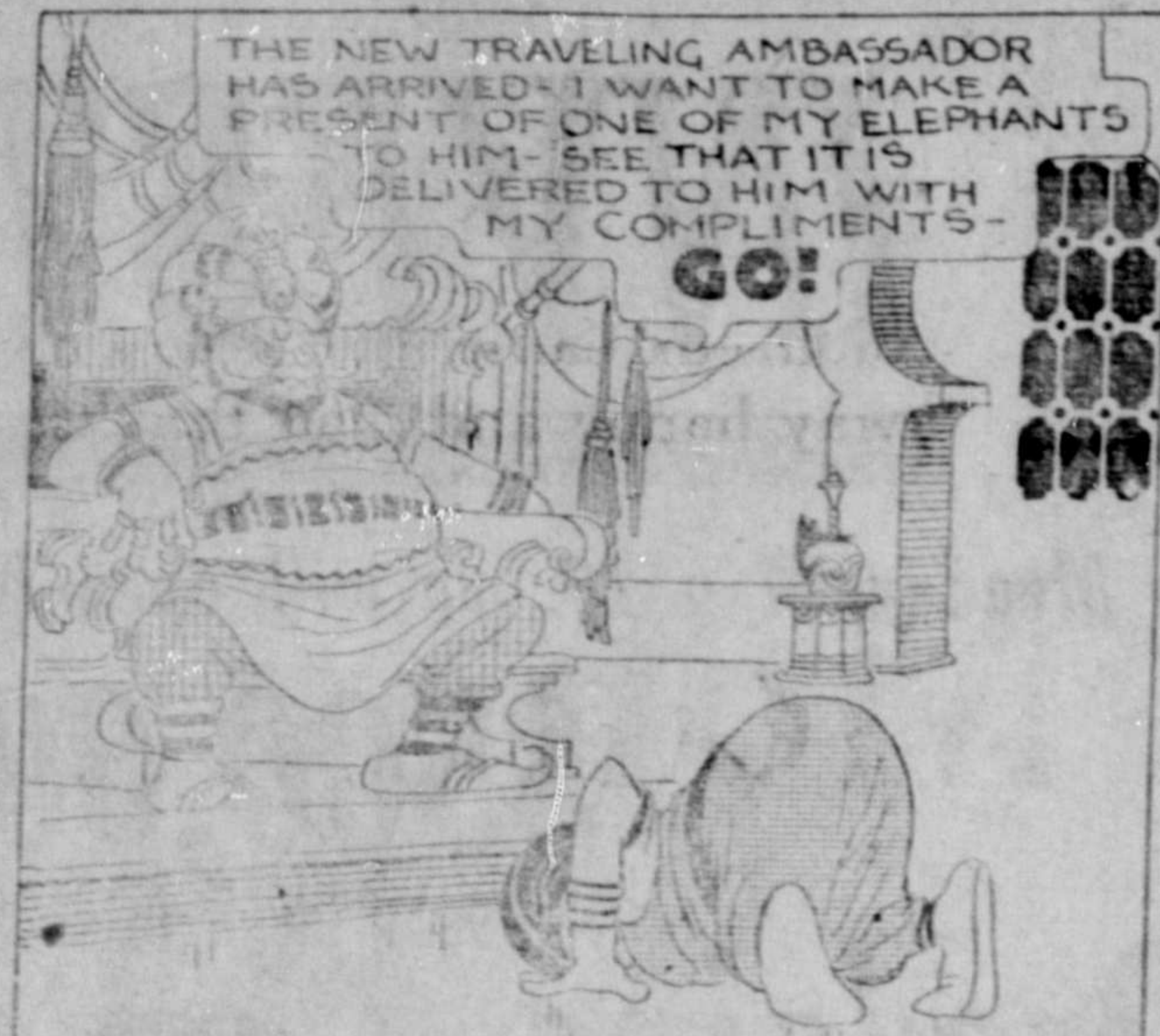

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### MAKING STUDY FRASER RIVER

ANOTHER SURVEY FOR FISHERIES DEPARTMENT TO BE MADE BY COMMISSION OF ENGINEERS

VICTORIA, May 12.—Careful studies of the Fraser River to determine whether salmon spawning in its waters are obstructed at various points will be started immediately by a commission of engineers representing the Federal and Provincial governments. These experts will examine the Fraser at short intervals from now until the end of the salmon season in co-operation with officials of the Federal and Provincial Fisheries Departments. Their investigations will show whether the annual salmon run up the big Fraser system is retarded in any way by natural conditions or by the rock slides which fell off the river during the construction of the Canadian National Railway's main line four years ago.

MEASURE WATER LEVELS Careful measurements of the water level will be made to find its height in the Fraser Canyon from time to time.

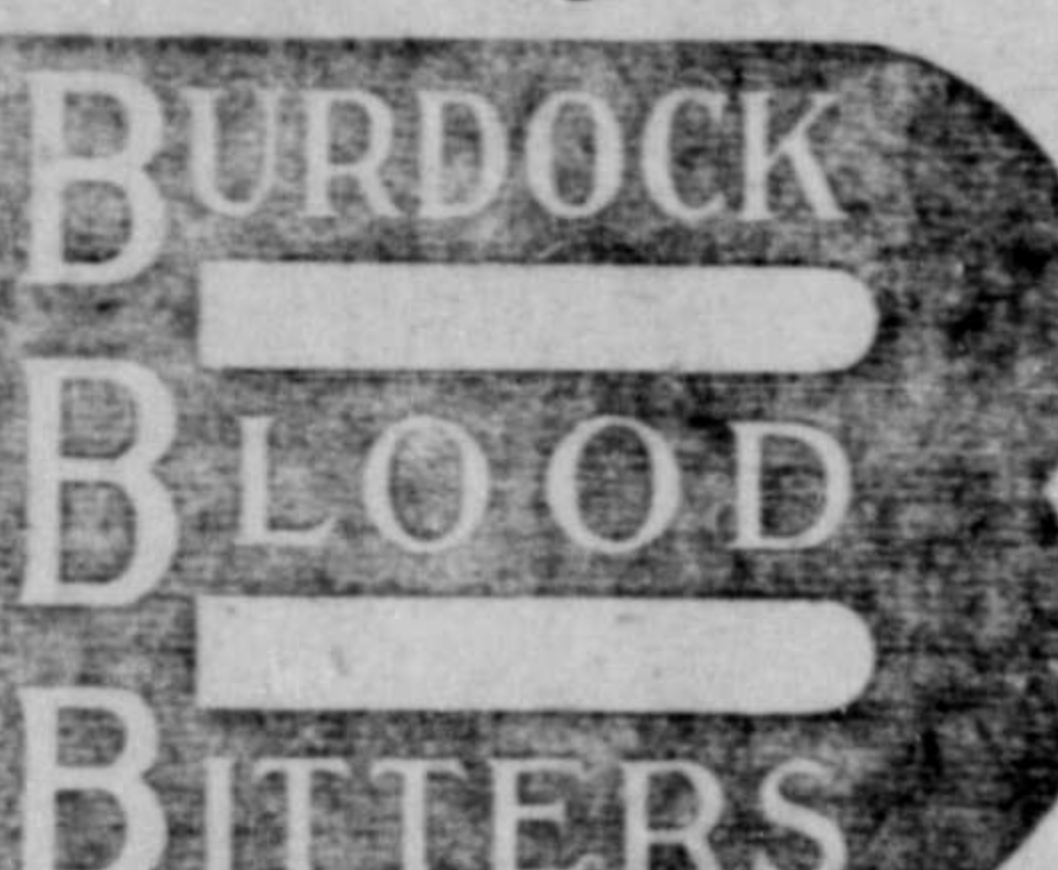

During the salmon spawning season. These will help to show whether sufficient water is available at the proper time for the long journey of the fish from the sea up to their fresh water spawning grounds.

Provincial fisheries officials do not believe that the salmon movement is impeded at any point in its upward journey. The old shids near Hell's Gate were cleared away long ago, and since then the fish have had free access to the higher levels of the river, it is believed here. The unexpectedly large number of fish seen in the upper Fraser last year is cited as an indication of this, and also of the fact that a new race of salmon is developing in the Fraser after many years of depletion.

#### NEW SALMON RUN?

This year's observations of the Fraser salmon may determine whether the great fishing river of former times is really "coming back." Fishery officials are awaiting with interest the annual pilgrimage of the fish to their original homes in the fresh water to see whether the new movement noted last year is growing into something worth while or not. Some experts believe that an entirely new movement of fish has been created in the Fraser, and that it escapes the nets of United States fishermen by swimming to the mainland stream around the north end of Vancouver Island instead of up the Straits of Juan de Fuca.

Years ago fishery officials took eggs from fish which were known to have swum by the all-Canadian route and

### CONSERVATIVES BUSY IN SOUTH

VICTORIA, May 12.—The Conservatives of the Province are taking no chances, evidently, of being caught unprepared should a provincial election be called without much warning this year. There is a general disposition on the part of the various ridings, especially those in which Liberals are representing the constituencies, to hold conventions and select candidates.

This is especially true of Vancouver Island ridings, where already three of the candidates have been formally named. These are the constituencies of Cowichan-Newcastle, The Islands and Nanaimo. In two of these the choice was made of the sitting members, C. F. Davie and Colonel Peck, V.C., respectively. In the other riding, that of Nanaimo, choice was made of John Bennett, the president of the riding association and one of the vice-presidents of the Provincial executive. He is a native son of the city in which he lives and is prominently identified with the Trades Union movement and other local organizations.

The riding of Alberni will hold its convention, it is expected, at an early date, the organization of the district being carried out meanwhile, so that all parts of the constituency may be fully represented at the nominating gathering.

On the Mainland, Golden riding will hold its convention on Tuesday next, when choice will be made of a candidate. R. H. Pooley, M.P.P., House leader of the party, will visit the Golden constituency, and be present at the convention on Tuesday.

The Northern Okanagan election date is awaited by both parties with much interest. Hon. S. F. Tolmie will throw

himself into that contest with his full force, it is expected, and on the other hand the Government will spare nothing to gain the seat.

Dr. Tolmie addresses Conservatives here tonight.

Martin, minister of agriculture for Ontario, who is known as the "White Wyandotte King," and have purchased several settings from Mr. Martin's famous farm at Port Dover, Ontario. The premier has secured the nucleus of a splendid flock from the Ontario minister, and in addition to his adventure in sheep recently announced, will add this famous breed of poultry. Mr. King has most extensive acreage in the Gatineau region, his farm running six miles in depth. In addition to his summer residence, he has a guest house and a home for his farmer-manager.

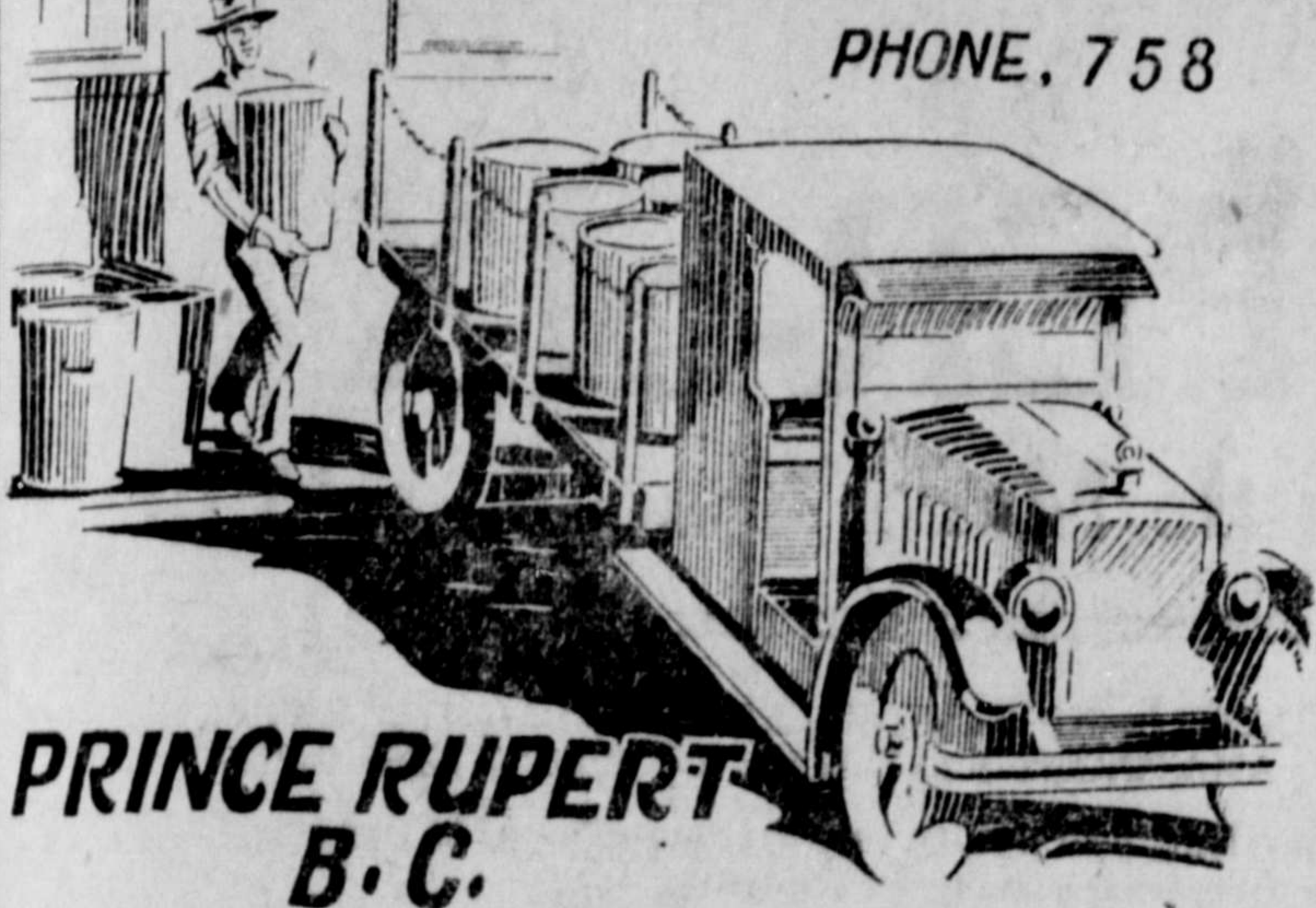

### GOOD REPORTER IS HIGHEST AMBITION

As Millions Read, So Will They Think, Says Associated Press Superintendent

ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 12. — One can have no higher ambition than to be a good reporter, Edward McKernon, eastern superintendent of the Associated Press, said in an address to the second Tri-State Interscholastic Press Conference at St. John's College. "If I may make bold to suggest anything to you who are contemplating journalism as a profession, it is that you concern yourselves first of all with your state of mind. The important thing now is your conception of journalism.

"If by any chance you see in journalism only an opportunity to play upon the human emotions; to try to paint the lily of facts and with scolds and groans and shrieks make salable that which has no essential importance as news; then, I beg of you, renounce this journalism and be content to make an honest living.

"Journalism is the profession of observing and reflecting the facts and significance of current events. That is our mission. The future of society is in our keeping. For as the millions read, so will they think and act. The

### EXPORTING ALBERTA SEEDS TO DENMARK

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., May 12.—The sale of Grimm's alfalfa seed, grown in the Brooks district, and shipped to Denmark is claimed as another "feather" in Alberta's cap.

For some time past, experiments have been carried on in Denmark with this particular seed.

So successful have these been, that the Danish growers purchased two carloads, representing 5,000 pounds. The Danish growers would have taken twice that amount had it been available, but owing to United States growers placing large orders, the local seedmen have not been able to keep up with the demand. Growers of Grimm alfalfa seed have been paid \$40 an acre clear for their product.

The Board of Railway Commissioners has recommended that the government take over the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

Chief Gannon of the provincial police received a wire this morning from Constable Broughton of Bella Coola saying that two Indians had been murdered at Kimsquit. He and J. H. McMullin, coroner, will leave for the scene as soon as possible.

Jim Maher of Khutze Inlet near Swanson Bay put a gun to his mouth and shot himself dead according to information received today by the provincial police. Constable Birchall of Port Essington will go to investigate.

### REMOVAL OF CHICAGO RIVER IS PROPOSED

Stream Now Flows Backward But is Useless as an Appendix

CHICAGO, May 12. — Chicago will some day have to go through another major operation—for the removal of a river. The stream—also named Chicago—is unique among rivers in that it flows backward, but city planners have come to the conclusion that it is as useless as an appendix and should be removed.

Major Rufus W. Putnam, chief engineer of the Chicago harbor plan and former government engineer here suggests that the stream, which virtually makes an island of the "loop," be moved to the far southside where it would be confluent with the Calumet river. This would end the expense of constructing bridges and eliminate loss of time in raising and lowering the
