WATERLOO BRIDGE TO BE SAVED-NEW ONE AT CHARING CROSS

LONDON, April 14.—(Canadian Press Despatch) .-- The government's proposals for carrying out the report of the Royal Commission on London's cross-river traffic, outlined by the Prime Minister, indicate that Waterloo Bridge will be saved. The present structure is to be reconstructed and not demolished. The commission estimates the cost at £860,-

A double-deck road-and-rail bridge at Charing Cross is a probability, at an estimated cost of seven and a half millions, and the Victoria Dock road scheme costing three millions will be carried out. In addition the proposed Ludgate Bridge at a cost of three millions, is a possibility.

The government will give the city financial aid to the extent of 75 per cent for the Charing Cross and Waterloo schemes, drawn from the road fund. Expenditure will be limited to an average of a million a year.

The government, the prime minister. said is inviting the London County Council and the Southern Railway to join with them in appointing engineers to examine the scheme for a double decker road and railway bridge put forward by the commission.
