Premier Mackenzie King Guest at White House Meets Officials of U.S.

WASHINGTON, November 24.-Premier Mackenzie King was the guest of honor at the White House yesterday at luncheon given by President Coolidge and with Secretary of State Kellogg, Hon. Vincent Massey, Secretary for War Davies, and Secretary of Commerce Hoover present.

The Premier spent the morning at the Canadian legation. In the afternoon he met fashionable Washington at the British Embassy and later dined at the Canadian legation with Hon. and Mrs. Massey, who had invited a party of thirty representatives of the official life of Washington to meet him.

The newspapers gave a kind, friendly and flattering welcome to Premier King, commenting on the steady growth of cordiality existing between Canada and the United States.

Sankey Case Discussed in Court View to a Possible Change of Venue and Then Is Adjourned

J. Edward Bird, counsel for Joseph Sankey, charged with and once convicted of the murder of Miss Loretta Chishoim, pretty young school teacher, at Port Essington on May 23, 1926, renewed his efforts at the session of the Supreme Court Assizes here yesterday afternoon to have the trial removed to a venue other than this one. He based his application on the grounds of prejudice prevailing here against accused, citing in support of his claim newspaper reports pertaining to the case which he held were prejudicial, unfair, and, in some cases, incorrect. His Lordship, after hearing consid-

MORE EVIDENCE WHITEWASH CASE
