ARMAMENT REDUCTION IS PROPOSED

MARSHALL CHANG TO FIGHT UNTIL REDS EXTERMINATED

Reduction in Size of Ships and Armament Proposed by British Representative at Conference

GENEVA, June 20.—The reduction in the size of battleships of the future from the present limit of 35,000 tons to under 30,000 tons is recommended by First Lord of the Admiralty Bridgman, Great Britain's representative at the tripartite naval conference, which opened here today, at which Great Britain, United States and Japan are represented.

Mr. Bridgman also proposed a reduction in the main armament cruisers from sixteen inch to 13.5 guns and a reduction in the size of aircraft carriers from 27,000 tons to 25,000 tons and their armament from eight inch to six inch guns.

Finally the British minister proposed reductions in future cruisers from 10,000 tons to 7,500 tons with armament of six inch instead of eight inch guns.

CHICAGO NEAR TOP OF LEAGUE

CUBS STILL THREATENING SUPREMACY OF PIRATES IN NATIONAL

NEW YORK, June 20.—Though they lost on Saturday to Philadelphia, the Chicago Cubs are pressing forward more confidently today in the duel with Pittsburgh Pirates for the National League supremacy. The standing is unchanged, as each team suffered a victory and a defeat at the week-end. In winning the opening game of a series on Sunday, the Cubs outdid the Pirates and are now only the fraction of more than one game behind the Pirates.

TORNADO NEAR SASKATOON

ONE LIFE LOST AND NUMBER INJURED WHILE TREES AND POLES BLOWN DOWN

SASKATOON, June 20.—Cutting a quarter of a mile swath through Elfron District east of here a tornado wrecked the farmhouse of G. F. Gudmundson, injuring eight of the residents. Mrs. Gudmundson later dying. An overturned stove started a fire but Ingi Gudmundson, despite a broken leg, succeeded in getting the other inmates of the house, all unconscious, to safety.

MURDER LAID TO STRANGLER

BUFFALO POLICE IDENTIFY NELSON AS SLAYER OF MRS. RANDOLPH OF THAT CITY

BUFFALO, June 20.—Earl Nelson, charged with the murder of Mrs. Patterson and Lola Cowan of Winnipeg, has been identified by the police here as the man who on May 30 murdered Mrs. Jennie Randolph, a rooming-house keeper. He was known here as Charles Harrison and in other places as Adrian Harris. Identification was made upon receipt of Nelson's photo and Bertillon measurements from Winnipeg.

ARMS SEIZED SAN FRANCISCO

SAN PEDRO, June 20.—It is rumored that a plot to ship millions of dollars of war munitions to some southern country has been frustrated by the seizure at San Francisco of \$50,000 worth of arms and munitions.

SOCKEYE FISHING OPENED MIDNIGHT
Sockeye fishing started in District No. 2 at midnight last night and a season, which is expected to be as intensive as one as the industry has ever experienced, is now well under way. Practically every cannery on the Naas and Skeena Rivers is in operation, the number on the Mainland being 38 in addition to six on the Queen Charlotte Islands which will start on fall fish. Reports on initial fishing today will not be available for a day or so.

MAN, WHO WAS BURNED AT KETCHIKAN IN GAS EXPLOSION, IS HOME

Charles M. Nickerson, well known local fisherman, who sustained burns about the face, neck and chest in an explosion aboard the American halibut boat Wabash while that vessel was taking on gasoline at the Standard Oil Co.'s fuel station in Ketchikan last week, returned to the city aboard the Princess Charlotte Saturday afternoon. Mr. Nickerson had his neck and chest swathed with bandages but he was able to walk off the steamer and greet his wife and friends. He is now at his home at 105 Fifth Avenue West where the burns are rapidly healing.

Marshall Chang Will Fight Reds Until They Are All Exterminated Declares in Speech at Shanghai

SHANGHAI, June 20.—Marshal Chang Tso-lin, who is installed at Peking as dictator of Northern China, made a speech in which he stated that the northern forces totalled between five and six thousand men determined to fight against the reds until they had exterminated them.

VANCOUVER, June 20.—General Frank Sutton, here from the Orient, where he was right hand man to the Chinese war lord, Chang Tso-Lin for the past five years, and is going gold hunting in northern B.C., is of the opinion that the essential western powers should be aroused to the seriousness of the red menace in China and the necessity of making a definite stand. "The next five years in China," he said, "will be momentous and the powers in general should be behind Chang in his fight with Bolshevism."

OLD TIMER OF CITY DROWNED

WILLIAM ROTHWELL LOST HIS LIFE LAST NIGHT AT DRYDOCK—INQUEST ORDERED
William Rothwell, aged 70, father of William Rothwell, local transferman, lost his life by drowning about 10 o'clock last night when he fell overboard from the snagscow Bobolink, on which he was employed, when that vessel was moored at the drydock. Coroner Norman A. Watt has ordered an inquest which will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

It was at 10.10 last night that the police received a message from Capt. J. D. Watson, master of the Bobolink, stating that Rothwell had fallen overboard. The son was also notified and he and Constable Kench arrived at the scene about the same time. They pulled deceased out of the water where he was clinging to the cross-piece of a pile with the back of his head and shoulders out of water and his face and lower part of his body submerged. Artificial respiration was attempted by Dr. L. W. Kergin but life was extinct.

It seems that deceased first fell from the upper to the lower deck of the boat and then reeled into the water. There was a pool of blood on the lower deck. Deceased was an old timer of the city and a member of the Prince Rupert Pioneer's Association. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

Woman Professes to be Wife of Strangler Held in Prison at Winnipeg

MAN ESCAPED FROM ASYLUM FOR INSANE FOLLOWING ATTACK ON WOMAN IN 1923

PALO, Alto, June 20.—Mrs. Mary Ferrell, employed in a private school here, identified herself as the wife of Earle Nelson, the man who is held at Winnipeg as the "dark strangler." The woman identified the accused man from photographs, asserting she had not been living with him for six years and had not seem him since last October.

Mrs. Ferrell said the idea of publicly acknowledging him as her husband was for the purpose of aiding the defense. She stated: "Not all these horrible crimes they are laying up against Earle can be true. I can prove that on dates on which he is charged with killing two people he was with me."

Investigation has not determined how Mrs. Ferrell obtained her present name while claiming to be married to Nelson. The strangler, it is said, escaped from the Napa state hospital for the insane where he was sent following arrest in San Francisco for attacking a woman here in 1923.

HOPE TO FLOAT VESSEL SUNDAY

MOTORSHIP CHALLAMBA, STRANDED DOWN COAST, TURNED OVER TO PRINCE RUPERT BOAT HOUSE

The American motorship Challamba, fast on the rocks of White Cliff Island, some twenty miles south of here, has been turned over by the master, Capt. J. B. Edwards, to the Prince Rupert Boat House for salvage and Capt. Alfred Swanson, head of that concern, stated this morning that he hoped to take the vessel off on the high tide next Sunday afternoon. The ship will be brought here and placed on the dry dock for examination.

Since Saturday the powerboat Azurite, "28" and Anna S. have been engaged in lightening the vessel and yesterday two scowloads of perishable goods such as fruit and vegetables were brought into port and disposed of to local dealers at a salvage sale held by the customs. The vessel, which was bound from Seattle to Ketchikan at the time of the accident, had a large cargo of provisions on board as well as twenty-six 4,000 gallon oil tanks on deck.

Criminals when they become very daring are apt to invade Canada but they often make a mistake in doing so. This has been proved in numerous cases. MORE FREQUENT MAIL SERVICE

It is not a mail car but a baggage car service that is needed at first in order to give Prince Rupert a daily mail service to and from the East. If everything east of Edmonton is put into sacks and locked and a sack is put in at every important point enroute such as Jasper, McBride, Prince George, Vanderhoof, Telkwa, Smithers, Hazelton and Terrace, that will be a beginning and will add very little to the present expense. As a visitor to the city remarked, it is ridiculous to think that from Friday afternoon there will be no more mail arrive until Monday afternoon.

If the mail arrived every day it would be much easier than at present for the post office staff as the work would be more daily equalized.

A village is a place where the mail arrives only three times a week. Why remain a village?

CONDITION OF NORTH COAST NATIVES

The condition of the natives on this coast is an excellent one and they are not demoralized by having any handout from the government. They take their places in a great many respects as citizens of British Columbia except that they usually live on reserves and do not vote. They might vote if they left the reserves.

The natives are steadily improving their condition and earning the respect of the white population. They take a prominent part in the fishing and trapping and also engage in logging. Those are their chief occupations. Many of them are excellent carpenters, building their own boats and houses and as mechanics they run their own gas engines. Now the interior Indian are going in for autos.

The advice given to the Negroes of the south by Booker Washington applies also to the natives on this coast. He advised them to make a stake in the community, to be industrious, to purchase real estate or other property and carry on as decent self-respecting citizens and they would soon earn the respect of everyone and be looked up to instead of being looked down upon.

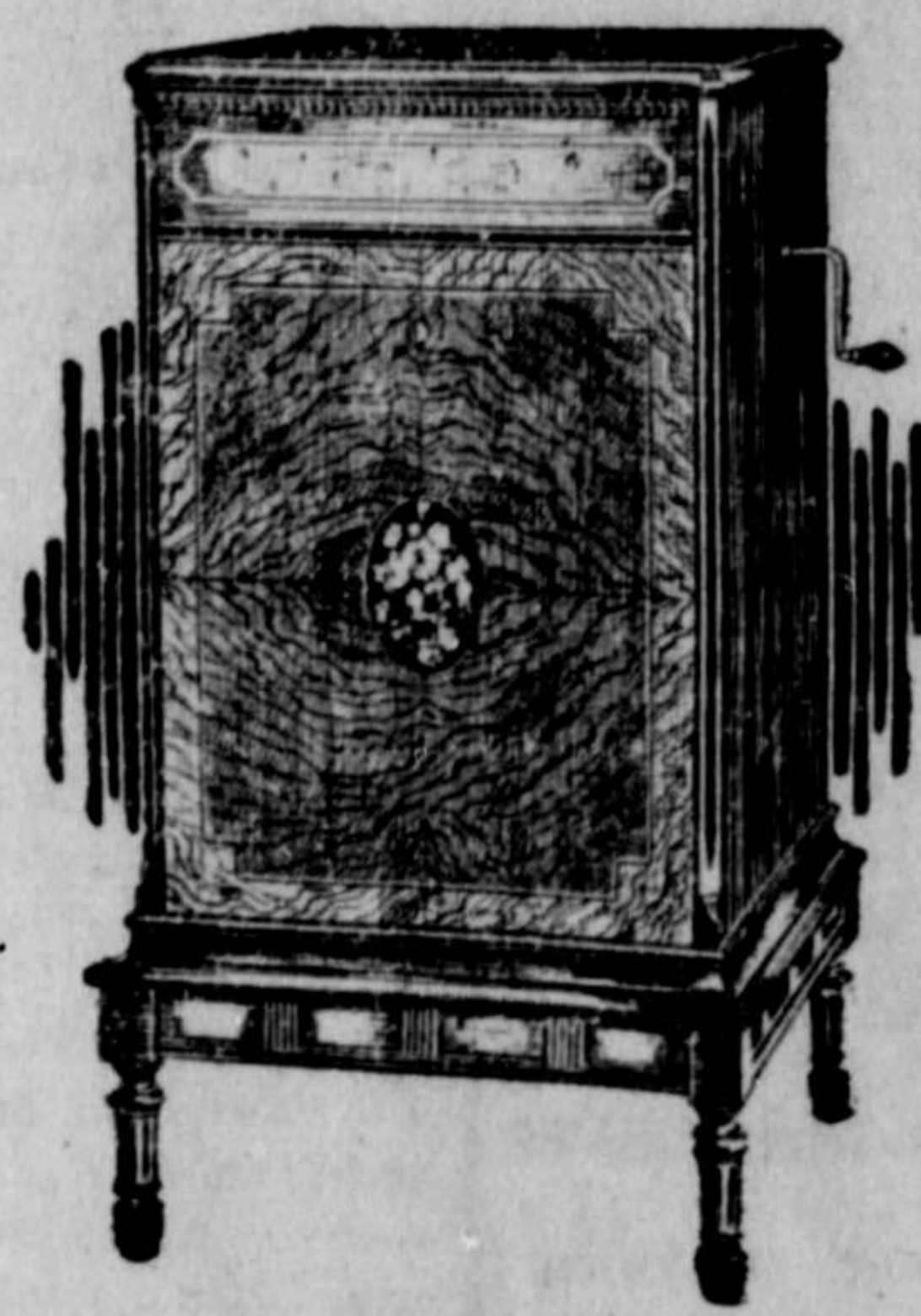

GENERAL CROP REPORT GOOD

PRAIRIES MAKING UP FOR LOST TIME BUT QUEBEC DELAYED BY RAIN AND COLD

Weather and soil conditions are favorable in Prairie. Provinces and growth for grain crops satisfactory says the Bank of Montreal report. In Alberta the wheat crop has almost overcome the handicap of late seeding and is now progressing rapidly with ample moisture and no damage from hail or pests. Good headway is being made by crops in other provinces. Now that the wheat seeding has been completed, the estimate is that the acreage is less by from 10 per cent to 15 per cent as compared with last year, but there has been an increase in acreage sown to coarse grains. In the Province of Quebec constant rains and cool weather have retarded farm operations and offset to some extent the early opening of work on the land afforded by prematurely warm weather in April and

In the Maritime Province average conditions prevail, except in New Brunswick where rain and cold have kept the season late. In British Columbia where the season was late, ideal weather now prevails and crop prospects are much improved.

ALBERTA

Western Area.—Conditions favorable, growth rapid, almost too much moisture. North eastern area—Conditions ideal. Growth generally up to average. Prospects excellent. South eastern area—Prospects very fair.

SASKATCHEWAN

Northern area—Wheat plants are all rooted and healthy; there is no decrease in acreage. Seeding of coarse grains nearly completed. Good supply of moisture in soil. Southern area—Wheat all in and seeding of coarse grains 75 per cent completed. Decrease in wheat acreage largest in the North. There will be increase in acreage sown to coarse grains. In general, the wheat acreage is probably 10 per cent below normal for the Province but larger than usual percentage has been sown on the summer fallow.

MANITOBA

Wheat seeding completed, acreage about 20 per cent below last year. Growth satisfactory. Weather and soil conditions favorable. Acreage of coarse grains increased and sowing nearly completed.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional on the obtaining of residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partly free permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

CAMP-FIRE PERMITS

This year it is necessary to have a permit from some Forest Officer before any camp-fire may be set in any forest or woodland
