RUM RUNNERS TO CHANGE REGISTRY VANCOUVER CITY HALL SUSTAINS \$30,000 FIRE DAMAGE

B.C. Liquor Exporters Devise Means to Evade Customs Investigation

Changing of flags seized upon as plan to keep
booze traders still in business--one
boat already converted

VANCOUVER, January 12.—To save British Columbia liquor exporters from prosecution following recent disclosures at the Vancouver session of the customs commission, it has been decided to operate under a flag other than British. "This action," says the Vancouver Province, "has been suggested as a result of a decision taken by the owners of the motorship Principio, well known liquor carrying vessel, whose registry has been transferred from Canada to Guatemala. It is rumored that the British Columbia exporters are convinced that they will have a better opportunity to continue operations if they use vessels flying the flags of non-treaty nations. A general transfer of the register of vessels on "Rum Row" may follow it is said.

It is the intention of the organizers to start up the mill at Usk as soon as financial arrangements are completed.

The commissioner ruled that the fund raised by the White Sox was not collected or paid to Detroit players for sloughing the series to Chicago but paid because of Detroit's achievement of beating Boston and further that there was no sloughing of games in 1917 or 1919 except possibly by Risberg and Gandil who accused the other players of having played fixed games.

He said that he did not wish the impression to get abroad that he presumed to dictate what Canada's policy should be but, taking the view that "we are all members of the one great family, I take a relative's right to give you my point of view."

Civic Employees Must Shiver in Unheated Rooms for Time; Plan for New Edifice Revived

VANCOUVER, January 12.—Fire which broke out in the furnace room of the city hall yesterday caused damage to the building estimated at \$30,000 before it was extinguished. As a result, civic employees of all departments, including those whose offices were not damaged in the blaze, face the prospect of shivering in unheated rooms until new heating facilities are arranged.

Shortly after the fire, Mayor Taylor announced last night that he would press for the immediate submission to the electors of a \$300,000 money bylaw to provide for the erection of an office building adjacent to the City Hall to serve as civic headquarters until civic centre plans are ready.

The City Hall here is an antique building which has long past outlived its usefulness. Despite the fact that it is the poorest municipal edifice that any city in Canada the size of Vancouver boasts, many past attempts to provide more suitable quarters have for various reasons failed.

SEED PRODUCTION IMPORTANT BRANCH.

Seed production in Canada is rapidly becoming an important and profitable industry states Honourable Mr. Motherwell, Minister of Agriculture, in his latest report. The inherent qualities of winter hardiness and vigor of growth possessed by Canadian grown seeds has brought a great demand for them in foreign markets. The thorough system of grading, strictly enforced by the Dominion Seed Branch, has given foreign and domestic buyers complete confidence in our seeds.

Canada produces an exportable surplus in high class seeds of cereals, forage crops and vegetables. The production of these seeds is continually increasing and they are supplanting imported stocks on our home markets. Especially great progress has been made in the production of seed of alfalfa, malting barley, and browntop or Rhode Island bent grass. Our alfalfa crop increased from 238,000 acres in 1920 to 859,000 acres in 1926, and this remarkable increase has been brought about largely by the development of our own seed supply from varieties which can withstand our severe winters. In Northern Ontario special attention is being given to the growing of barley seed, as malting barley of high quality, which finds a ready market, can be produced in that region. In British Columbia one district alone gave a yield of 70,000 pounds of timothy seed and 6,000 pounds of meadow fescue of the finest quality. Many other examples of our progress in seed growing might be cited, all showing the great possibilities the future holds for this industry.

FOX RANCHING IS GROWING INDUSTRY.

It is quite possible that the great majority of people in Canada who, from time to time, read about the silver fox rarely give that animal a second thought, and, certainly, do not regard fur-ranching in the nature of an industry. But fox and fur ranching has reached that distinction, having spread into every province in Canada from a modest beginning in Prince Edward Island, crossed the border into the United States, while Canadian bred fox have been sent abroad to form the nucleus of ranches in several countries in Europe. The expansion of the fox farming began about 1910 when the knowledge spread that some fortunate individuals had been making handsome profits from the sale of pelts. Then followed a period of speculation caused by the demand for foundation stock during which time the scramble "became a veritable craze." The cost of a pair of foxes rose steadily from \$3,000 a pair in 1910 to \$20,000 a pair in 1913, and during the hey-day of the boom as high as \$35,000 was paid for exception specimens.

A Department of Agriculture booklet, the authority for the foregoing figures, states "The European war brought an end to speculative fox-trading, and a highly speculative venture was changed into a legitimate industry. So far as the fox industry on this continent is concerned, the day of speculation is apparently over, and live foxes are sold for what their pelts would bring or a little more, because breeders recognize that every pair of foxes sold means a competitor." As a result the market value of a pair of live foxes now averages in the neighborhood of \$500.

BANK DECLARES OPTIMISM JUSTIFIED.

The great crops of 1925 and 1926, the flow of wealth from the mines of British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia, the record newspaper production, the improved position of the railroads and the steady expansion of Canadian manufacturing, have combined to produce a sound and pervasive prosperity throughout the country, says the monthly letter of the Royal Bank of Canada. The industrial and financial structure is now on so substantial a basis that enthusiasm concerning the future seems eminently justified.

The financial structure of the country as measured in terms of purchasing power in the hands of the consumer is in a particularly strong position. This general condition is reflected in the large increase in savings in the form of bank deposits and in investment in life insurance and securities. In the case of industry, the number of men employed exceeds the number in the record year of 1920, and the wage scale is proportionately much higher in relation to the cost of living than it was in 1913. Much the same relationship is shown between the price of agricultural products and the general commodity index. The farmer receives about 60 per cent more for his products than in 1913, while he pays only about 50 per cent more for the articles he purchases. Such price relationships give promise of continued activity in wholesale and retail trade in the near future.

Civic Questions Discussed by Mayor and Candidates at Meeting Called Last Night

A fairly good-sized crowd was present last night at the meeting called by Mayor Newton in the Moose Hall. Six of the aldermanic candidates and the mayor spoke on civic issues. A. W. Edge acted as chairman and first called upon the mayor who dealt with the financial position of the city and reviewed the work of the council for the past year. He wanted it distinctly understood that the city was solvent. It had paid its way and did not at the present time owe the bank a dollar.

In reviewing the financial affairs of the city, the mayor said that the revenue for the past year had been \$406,945.15 and the total expense amounted to \$429,899.61 leaving a deficit in the neighborhood of \$22,954.00. In explaining how this had occurred His Worship referred to several items of expenditure which had not been foreseen by the council at the beginning of the year. The cemetery road for which the citizens had passed a bylaw for \$18,500, had exceeded the estimate and cost the city \$35,198.80 or over \$16,698 more than was expected. This had to be met out of general revenue. The Shawatans pipe line was found by the city engineer to be in need of repair and this work had cost in the neighborhood of \$3,882.00 which also had to be provided out of general revenue. It had been also found that no provision had been made for a road to the elevator and this was built at a cost to the city of \$1,085.00. These three items amounted to a little more than the deficit.

The mayor then discussed several works which it had been planned to carry out through the past year including a roadway on Borden Street and one on Summit Avenue. These had not been carried out on the advice of the Inspector of Municipalities who had been advising the city against heavy expenditures for the past three or four years. The speaker then referred to the favorable showing made by the city utilities for the past year, both light and telephone having shown a surplus. The sewerage bylaw was then explained and the mayor said that it was for the people to decide as to whether this would be carried out.

MAYOR'S POLICE VIEWS

Coming to the police question the speaker said he had not changed his opinion on the matter but had rather been more firmly convinced that it was not a good thing. He quoted figures in support of his contention that the amount of fines collected during the seven months in which the provincial police had been in charge of affairs had been less on the average per month than for the first five months of this year under the city police. In the first five months of the year the fines had amounted to \$5,128.50 and in the last seven months the fines had amounted to \$7,047.75. In the year 1925 the mayor said the police department had cost the city \$16,501.00, and in the year 1926 the police had cost the city \$16,508.00 or \$4.00 more for the year just closed than in the preceding year. He paid a compliment to the personnel of the provincial police and said that on two occasions he had gone to the sergeant in charge and no one could have received him more kindly.

Alderman Casey, who spoke next, referred to the improvements made in the city roads during the past three years. He was glad that he had such a plank in his platform three years ago. The city's capital debt was scarcely any greater now than at that time.

Continuing, Alderman Casey said "I know that many citizens have it in for me on account of the garbage tax." As chairman of the finance committee for the past three years he said he had been placed in the difficult position of finding the money and he had believed it the only way to keep the mill rate of the city down. However it had proven an unpopular move and he had been responsible for the repeal of the bylaw and he would not again support such a thing even if it came to the city having to tax improvements. The speaker then launched into a vigorous discussion of the police question and attacked the system of having the police department administered from Victoria. He had nothing to say against the personnel of the local force each of whom he claimed were personal friends of his and he had found them to be men of high character. There was however a great principle involved and the attorney general was taking away the privileges the people enjoyed of managing their own affairs. He then quoted figures from various cities on the prairies and in B.C. to show that the fines collected in the city had been out of proportion to the number of people here and did not consider it a good advertisement to people who might locate here. In conclusion the speaker asked for support and said that he would endeavor in the future, to be as faithful to the trust reposed in him if elected as he had been in the past.

Alderman Brown spoke briefly in support of a better sewerage system as it had been demonstrated that the septic tanks had not been a success.

RESPONSIBLE FOR POLICE

Ald. Brown said that he had been one of those responsible for the bringing the provincial police here and if he had been wrong in doing so then the people had an opportunity of saying so in the plebiscite on Thursday. The speaker said that in 1926 the city had saved about \$3000 in the police department.

Coming to the work of the city council in the past year he referred to the plan of giving additional fire pro-

tection to the waterfront and thought that it would prove a sound policy. The garbage tax had not been popular and it had been rescinded although it was done with the idea of assisting the heavy tax payer and to keep down the mill rate. During his first year as Alderman he had been on the utilities committee and last year had been chairman of the committee and as already explained by the mayor there had been a surplus in each department. There had been little change in policy which had not been in practice in former years. The extensions instead of being charged to capital account had been paid for out of earnings. Alderman Brown, in conclusion, asked for further support and assured his hearers that he would do the best possible in the interests of the city.

Ex-Alderman Montgomery had the audience in happy mood as he explained that he was again seeking for the support of the voters. He congratulated the Daily News on its editorial of the day in which it had asked for the co-operation of everyone in supporting the mayor who had been elected by acclamation. It seemed to the speaker that the city needed to formulate a policy to go ahead with at the present time, so as to have more power in order to attract industries. Going back to former years, the speaker referred to the financial condition of the city when it decided to undertake the development of Woodworth lake power. At the present time he believed it important that the city obtain power by some means so that it might take its place as a manufacturing city. "If no private company can see clear to develop this power, then the city must go ahead," he said, and continued "If the city sells or give away its utilities without getting a good bargain it would be foolish. I am not such a hard and fast municipal ownership man as some my think" observed the speaker who pleaded for a serious attempt to solve the power question. In advocating the passage of the sewer bylaw he said that he did not think it the very best plan available, but considered that the details could be worked out if only the bylaw were passed. The former police commissioner then expressed his views on the police situation and referring to the provincial system said "I do not like it." Many things had to be considered in the matter and the question of the government dictating the policy of policing the city was not in the best interest of the citizens.

P. H. LINZEY

P. H. Linzey, described himself as a new recruit and spoke of his connection with the labor movement having held a union card since he was a boy. Just yesterday he had noticed in the Daily News that ten years ago he had held the office of secretary in the local trades and labor council. He then quoted again from the Daily News of a year ago where it was reported that at a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held then, Alderman Casey had moved and Alderman Larson had seconded a resolution approving a clean city. "I am of the firm conviction and I make no bones about it that if elected, I will seek to advance the moral interests of the city," said the speaker. In regard to the plebiscite he considered that possibly it did not matter much as to how it went. He would seek to carry out the wishes of the citizens and was proud to espouse the principles of labor.

Jas. Black was then called on by the chairman and said that he had been endorsed by the Trades and Labor Council and stood for its platform which he then read and commented on. Fuel should be purchased for the city by tender. As one who had gone around to the different districts with the petition against the garbage tax he was in a position to say that the people found it difficult enough in the outlying sections without this increased burden. For the past three years he had been on the library board and the growth of the library had been such that he felt the city would have to provide in the next two years for better accommodation as the present building was not adequate.

As regarded power, the speaker said, the city had always been too late and if it had to go outside for power to meet the further requirements it would take at least two years to have the same reach the city. The development of Shawatans was not sufficient as it would be necessary to go somewhere to obtain ten, fifteen or twenty thousand horse power.

WOULD KEEP PROVINCIALS

The policing of the city was a very important question and Mr. Black

them. "I am a home ruler every time and no one is more serious than I to have the city clean" said the speaker. He did not favor the parade of the police about the city with firearms slung in their belts. It was too military and the countries should be through with that by now.

The matter of the vacant property which had reverted to the city was discussed by Mr. Black who thought it would be a good thing to have these lots sold on terms to people in order that they might bring revenue. If at all possible it might be a good thing for the city to let buyers have these lots for the payment of one year's taxes provided a suitable residence was built thereon and the owner retained the property for sometime. As an old-timer in the city who had all his interests here he asked for the support of

the people and said that the citizens had nothing to fear by supporting the candidates of the Trades and Labor Council.

The last speaker, J. M. Morrison, said that he had been urged at the last minute to stand for aldermanic honors. He considered that the ground had been very well covered by the various speakers. He was in perfect accord with the platform of the Trades and Labor Council which had endorsed him. As agent for the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union, he felt that he represented a large portion of the laboring class. He said that he had been asked several times his views on the police situation, and felt that the matter would be decided by the citizens and he would be only too pleased, if elected, to carry out their wishes in the matter.

As a new man, it was not for him to decide the issue which had been left to the people.

SOME QUESTIONS

Te chairman then asked if there were any questions which any one desired to ask of the mayor or other candidates. J. Squirechuk asked as to the promised improvement in the water supply to the dry dock which was used by a large number of men. Some men with rakes had been sent down when men with shovels were needed. The mayor, in reply, thought that the path had been placed in shape and, if not, then it would not be long until it would be attended to.

COMPANY HAS BIG PROGRAM PROSPECTING

MARLAND OIL CO. ANNOUNCES IN EDMONTON IT WILL CONDUCT EXPLORATIONS IN FOUR WESTERN PROVINCES CASSIAR DISTRICT

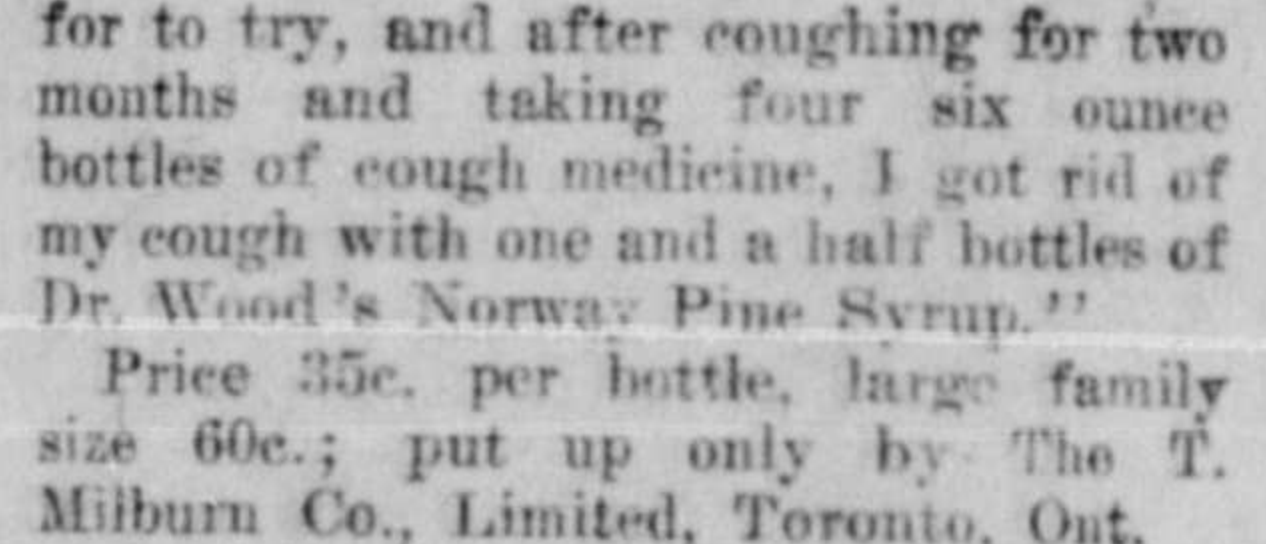
EDMONTON, Jan. 12.—Important announcements as to the plans of the Hudson's Bay-Marland Oil company for carrying on the search for oil in the west are made by Glen M. Ruby, who is in charge of operations. He says that several hundred thousand dollars will be spent in geological work in the four western provinces this year, but there will not be any actual drilling in 1927.

ably be put into service. The company is also installing an up-to-date laboratory, additional space having been obtained by the present offices in the McLeod block.

TESTING APPARATUS

Costly testing apparatus will be placed in the laboratory where two chemists, who have been at Ottawa for some time will carry on their work. The gravity and other factors in oils will be analysed as the company is very desirous of getting all possible information about the productive possibilities of the country. As extensive field work is to be conducted, it will be necessary to make tests from time to time of the samples sent in by geologists.

"We feel that there is a real need of such a laboratory and do not intend to make any charge for doing work for other people as all of us may profit by the information obtained," said Mr. Ruby.

AID IN FIELD WORK

The importance of having an aeroplane for aiding in field work is also recognized by Mr. Ruby. He says that nothing definite will be done in this respect until some further information is obtained from the airmen who are coming up from High River, the fact that Edmonton now has a municipal aeroplane means that a plane can be easily operated from here. It would probably carry a geologist and other members of a crew so that important field work could be done in difficult sections of the country.

STAFF OF GEOLOGISTS

Some 24 geologists will be sent out to various parts of the west as soon as weather conditions are suitable. It is proposed to place one party in the

Police Coupe country, another will work the foothills belt in the southern part of Alberta and thence north, and another will be engaged at work in the Liard river region and in northern British Columbia. Parties will also be at work in Manitoba and Saskatchewan so that the whole of western Canada will be tested out in a drive for geological information and this will be done on a scale that has never been previously attempted.

MAP CASSIAR DISTRICT

The plan also involves the mapping of the Cassiar district in British Columbia. This region is largely unknown, so far as structure is concerned, and it is possible that arrangements will be made with the dominion government to co-operate in carrying on geological work in this section.

"It is our plan to confine the work to geological activities throughout this year," said Mr. Ruby. "We will observe outcroppings and rock structures in certain areas and later on the information will be assembled so that we can decide upon the next step in development. It should not be assumed that we are going to drill for oil in a certain place just because we might send a party in to look over the formation in that district."

Even if the company should later on drill a hole that proved to be dry, the information obtained might be worth thousands of dollars from a geological viewpoint, stated Mr. Ruby.

In a few days or so Mr. Ruby will leave for Ottawa where he will take up certain matters with the federal government. He also plans to visit the scene of a new strike at Grandview, Manitoba, as he considers that this is something of importance to western development plans.

During the past few months the local staff has been engaged at compiling information from logs of various wells and official reports. The reports by Dr. Hume have been regarded as particularly valuable while extensive work by other oil authorities in Alberta has also been closely studied.

SPORT CHAT

Gene Tunney, world's heavyweight champion, has signed a contract with Tex Rickard, New York promoter, to defend his title, probably next September, against a challenger of Rickard's choice for what was declared would be "the highest purse ever paid a boxer."

Dudley Field Malone, Tunney's attorney, said the champion received a flat guarantee of \$400,000, in addition to fifty per cent net of the proceeds over \$1,000,000. RAILWAY HAD STEADY YEAR

C.N.R. VICE-PRESIDENT REPORTS NO UNUSUAL DEVELOPMENTS BUT SATISFACTORY RESULTS DURING 1926

MONTREAL, Jan. 6.—While the year 1926 has seen little in the way of unusual or sensational developments from the operating end, so far as the Canadian National Railways are concerned, there has been a steady betterment over the system and results as a whole have been satisfactory, stated S. J. Hungerford, vice-president in charge of operation of the National System.

Probably the most spectacular development of the year, Mr. Hungerford stated, was the completion of the branch line which takes the Canadian National into the Rouyn gold mining area. Completion of the Dunblane bridge across the South Saskatchewan River was also important in that it connected important territories on both sides of the stream in southwestern Saskatchewan.

Completion of the Hanna-Warden branch of the Canadian National provided an important transportation link and would bring the bituminous coal from the Brazeau field into Southern Saskatchewan over a more direct route and also provided a more direct route for wheat from Southern Saskatchewan to Vancouver via Edmonton. Other lines which have been completed are largely colonization lines which have provided service for districts where such was required for development.

B.C. EXTENSION The completion of the line from Kamloops to Kelowna in British Columbia is outstanding in that it has taken the Canadian National into every important producing district, and has given vastly improved transportation facilities to that territory. The volume of traffic which has already developed has more than ex-

ceeded the company's expectations when the line was built, and the provision of motor ship service from Kelowna to points south has provided good connections for the southern points.

So far as the Hudson Bay Railway is concerned, the Canadian National has acted only as agents of the Federal Government in completing and rehabilitating that line. The steel was formerly as far as Mile 332 from The Pas, and about two-thirds of the work of rehabilitating that portion has been carried out this year as well as a small amount of work on the grade beyond Mile 332. 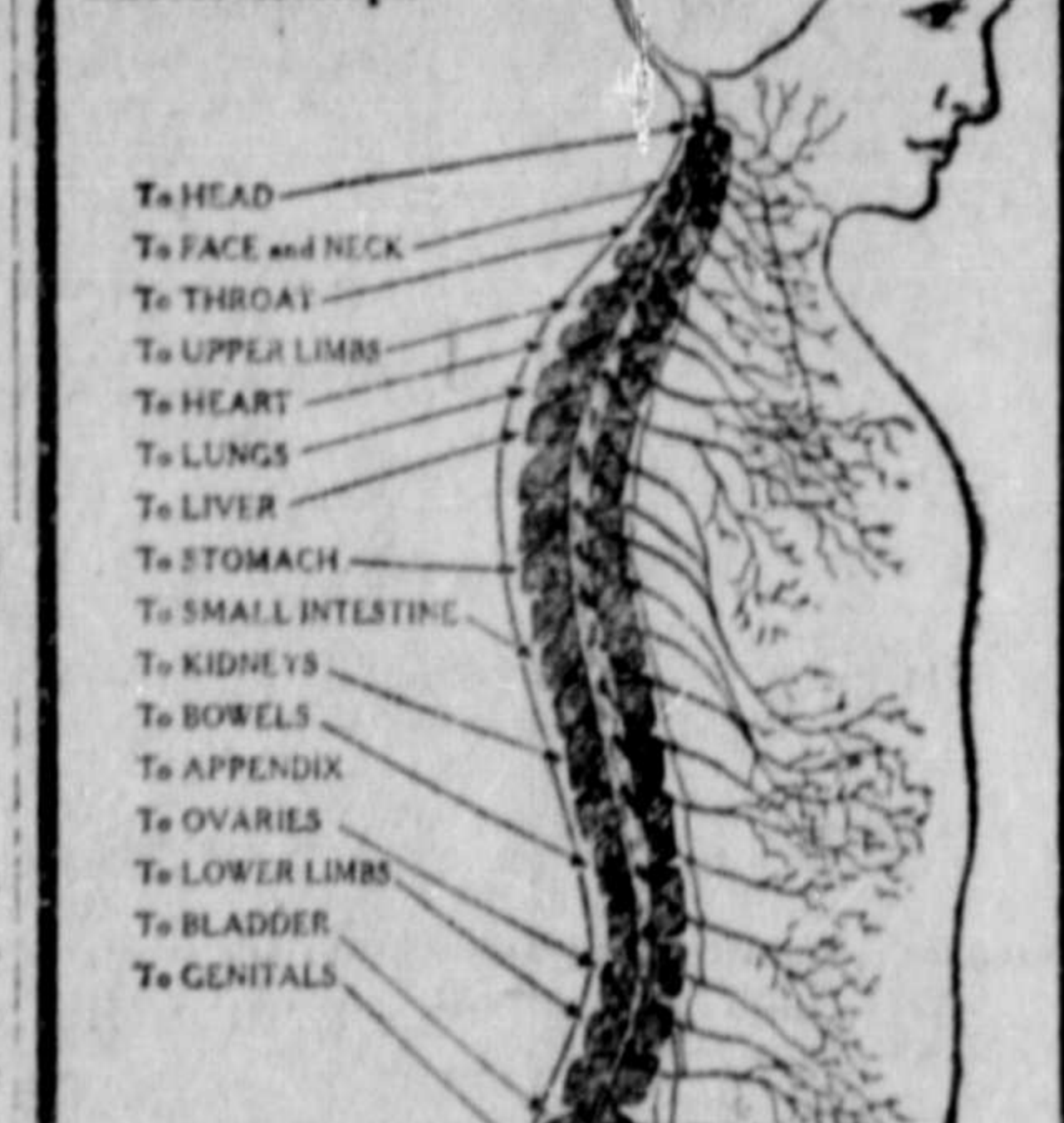
