## Evidence at Inquiry Into Boat Explosion at Inverness Cannery

BLEW UP-ANDERSON BETWEEN ENGINE

AND TANK

An inquiry was held this forenoon into the circumstances sequent death of Ed. Anderson. Government Agent Norman Watt presided over the inquiry which was held at the government office. The chief witness was George F. Tough, operator and agent of

the Union Oil Company at the Inverness Cannery oil dock. Mr. Tough stated that the W. & F. called at the dock on Tuesday morning at 8.45. There were aboard Ed. Anderson and Alex. Murray. The starboard tank was filled and then they proceeded to

Ill the other tank. As there was not\* enough room between the top of the. tank and the deck to conveniently fill the tank a small piece of hose belonging to the boat was inserted in the nozzle of the company's hose. This was placed over the head of the engine on the left side of the companionway, then around the battery rack and then to the tank at the stern of the engine. He did not know if the engine had

been running that morning. STATIC WIRE

the oil company's regulations, was connected to the winch, and the winch to the engine by chain drive.

Before beginning to fill the tanks he had inspected the boat. Anderson was n a very awkward position as there was only approximately 18 inches between the tank and the engine and he had to stand sideways to guide the

After 15 or 20 gallons had been taker on there was a loud explosion. He immediately shut off the valve and rap to the cannery float. On the way he passed someone, it might have been Murray, at the float . The boat was in flames with the stern towards the float. The heat was too intense to permit his boarding the boat from the stern so he ran to the bows and then heard Anderson groaning in agony. He shouted for help and A. R. Parsons, a lay eader of the Anglican Church resonded and with his assistance he got Anderson through the split in the bow of the boat . Mr. Bestwick arrived in a owhoat and Anderson was lowered into t and then trasferred to the Seamaid. Anderson was conscious all the time. As far as he knew neither Anderson nor Murray smoked.

He had no opinion as to what caused

the explosion. Corroborative evidence was given by Judge Morrison Refuses to Trans-R. Parsons and Henry Dorion, captain of the Seamaid.

WAS ON SEAMAID

Captain Dorion stated that he was painting the Seamaid when he heard the explosion. They tried to pull on the ropes to get to the W and F. but had to start the engine. He met Murray on the way and Bestwick rowing with Anderson in his boat. When he first saw Murray the latter was trying to get on the float.

Robert Johnston, manager of the Inverness Cannery instructed him to proceed to Prince Rupert which he did with all haste.

E. C. Bayliss, manager of the Prince Rupert branch of the Union Oil Co. of Canada gave evidence regarding the procedure adopted in filling the tanks and steps taken to ensure the safety of those getting the oil. All precautions had been observed and he could not suggest any cause for the explosion.

CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENCY OF U.S.

Although the United States presidential election is fifteen months away, people in that country and this are already busy wagging their tongues in connection with the election prospects. On this occasion the campaign is likely to be one of personalities rather than of issues. There are no issues. With Coolidge out of the way the name that comes most easily to the front is that of Henry Ford. He is the best known man in United States. He has made mistakes and these mistakes will militate against him politically.






