The joint road committee, meeting last night with S. E. Parker presiding in the absence of Ald. Amalgamation Definitely Concluded Declares Financial Post

TORONTO, Aug. 18 .- The Financial Post says: The Premier, B.C. Silver and National Silver amalgamation has definitely gone through.

The latest advices, while not official, are from sources that figure very strongly in the deal, and the news from them is that the deal is definitely closed.

Thus, the three big proven mines in the Salmon River section of Portland Canal come under one management. Just how this will be handled, is not yet known.

Premier has a 400 mill, and this can be easily enlarged. It has also capable and experienced engineers, but so has the B.C. Silver. The management of the latter and National Silver has been the same for some considerable time.

### With Season Nearing Close, Prospects Are Salmon Pack Will Be Record Light One

That the 1927 salmon pack, not only in District No. 2 but along the entire British Columbia coast, will be one of the lightest on record, repeating the shortage of 1921, is the prospect today. Such is the opinion in official circles. For the season to date the pack of ail varieties is but fifty per cent of last year at a similar date and, with little promise of an improvement at the present time, it is feared that the pack for the whole season will be less than half of that for 1926.
