INTO WHICH PANIC-STRICKEN HORDES OF CHINESE POUR-22,000 UNEMPLOYED

SHANGHAI, March 19. - The left wing of the Shantungese army defending the Sunkiang front to the southwest crumbled and the northern troops are hurriedly retreating toward Shanghai, leaving the way open for the Cantonese to gain possession of the city. This morning, hordes of panic-stricken Chinese continued to pour into Shanghai from Nanking where the Cantonese armies are reported to be within a few miles.

The general strike did not materialize according to schedule but the unemployed now number 22,000 through workers leaving various industries. Apparently the union leaders are not pressing the strike call but are awaiting further military developments.

: JAPANESE AND HALIBUT FISH

DR. TOLMIE TELLS COMMONS THAT WHITE FISHERMEN ARE WORKIED -CARDIN WILL GIVE REPLY

OTTAWA, March 19 .- In the House of Commons on Friday, Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmie, Conservative member for Victoria, brought up the question of a newspaper despatch to the effect that white halibut fishermen in British Columbia were alarmed over the reports that numbers of Japanese, formerly engaged in salmon fishing and now barred from that Industry by the reduction of the quota under federal regulations, were turning their attention to the halibut banks.

Hon. J. P. A. Cardin, minister of marine and fisheries, said he had not seen the report and could not at the time give any definite information. He announced that he would reply to the question on Monday.

EVIDENCE HAS BEEN FINISHED

LENGTHY HEARING OF RAILWAY BOARD OF GENERAL RATES IS NOW NEARING COMPLETION

OTTAWA, March 19 .- All evidence in the general freight rates investigation which has monopolized the attention of the board of railway commissioners for months was completed on Friday afternoon and the board adjourned until March 29 when counsel will present their arguments. This, it is estimated, will take approximately three weeks and it is expected that the case will be linally in the hands of the board for udgment before Easter.







SCANDINAVIANS

SINCE COMING OF ICELANDERS AR-RIVING NEXT WEEK FOR SET-TLEMENT IN CANADA

WINNIPEG, March 19.-The largest of Scandinavian immito enter Canada since the coming of the Icelanders fifty years ago. will be a group of 400 Norwegians, Swedes and Danes which is due to arrive in Winnipeg next week. A portion of the 3,000 new settlers which will be brought to Winnipeg and the west over the Canadian National lines in the course of the week.

Special trains over the Canadian National lines next week will bring in passengers from seven boats, two of which docked today, and the rest of which are due over the week end. All are heavily loaded with prospective settlers from almost every country of northern and central Europe. Among them will be some 30 German speaking families, for placement by the Canadian National Railways colonization department. There is also a party of German Lutherans, being brought out by the German Lutheran immigration board. The Scandinavian party is accompanied by the Danish Vice-Consul for western Canada, Knud Schioler, who is returning from a trip to the old country. They were met at Halifax by J. C. Bertelson, general passenger agent in Winnipeg for the American Scandinavian line, on whose steamer, the United States, they crossed the Atlantic.

During the present week, the Canadian National railways have brought over approximately 1.500 immigrants. the majority of whom passed through Winnipeg, from where they were reticketed to their new homes in western Canada.

The assumption that all were drowned in the pond was supported later on, when as the ice melted, several caps and other pieces of equipment were found. There was never a sign of the bodies.
