CHART "BLIND SPOT" IN POLAR CRYPT

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 8 .- Seeking the answer to the Arctic's last great riddle, Capt. George H. Wilkins will fly this spring into the "blind spot" of the polar crypt.

Sometime in March he will turn the nose of his "flying gas tank" northward from Point Barrow, Alaska, in a seco effort to find out whether land lies under the ice-capped waters in the vast region above the north Alaskan coast The region has been designated the Arctic "blind spot" by explorers, none knows for certain whether its thousands of acres are land or sea.

Byrd and Amundsen have conquered the north pole by air, but their exploits have not removed opportunity for further exploration in that clime, Captain Wilkins believes.

SECOND ATTEMPT

NEW RESTRICTIONS MAKE IT HARD-ER BUT DO NOT PUT THEM OUT OF BUSINESS.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 8 .- (By C.P.) -- In the barriers will not be insurmountable and that the shipping of contraband liquor to the United States will soon be on its feet again.

The days of shipping intransitu liquor, or goods under bond, are probably over, however, the Minister of Customs, in a communication to the Collector of Customs for the port of Vancouver, states that hereafter intransitu liquor may not lie in customs bond longer than thirty days before it becomes liable to a bond of double the value of the import duty. This double penalty will be enforced by the cusdepartment when intransitu liquor which has exceeded its thirty-

day welcome is entered for export . Interpretation placed here on this latest order is that the exporting of liquor may continue without hindrance with two exceptions—that bonding privileges will not be extended to intransitu shipments for more than thirty days without penalty and that customs collectors must be satisfied that foreign landing certificates are bona

Owners and masters of rum-runners, however, operating out of Vancouver are said to be accepting the new situation with good grace, and while new regulations may prove troublesome, they believe that they will not seriously impede the traffic in liquor between British Columbia and the Coast states.





HOW PLAYING CARDS WERE ORIGINATED

Story Has it That They Were Devised to Divert Mad French King From Delirium and Melancholia

The story goes, according to The Mentor Magazine, that playing cards were devised by a European to divert mad Charles VI. of France from delirium and melancholia. The Puritans maintained that his Satanic Majesty the Devil was the originator. But indications point to Oriental invention of great antiquity. Europe probably knew crads first in the thirteenth century. White men on arriving in America found the Indians playing with painted sticks a game strangely resembling the card games of Asiatic countries. And from this seemingly insignificant fact wise deductions are drawn as to the origin of the first race that people the American continents. The National Museum at Washington treasures a complete set of these aboriginal "cards" enclosed in a crude leather pouch. The Chinese had similar decks of carved ivory.

All cf the earliest cards were, as a matter of course, hand drawn, and much time and labor were devoted to their designing. Often they were signed by the makers. Playing cards were actually the first wood engravings, and forerunners of printing. With the development of the engraving art came a deluge; of the colored cardboards, square, round, rectangular, triangular, oblong. SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, condidional upon residence, occapation, .nd improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge ty addressing the Department Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be For more detailed information see

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease

of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands." Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of

stumpage. HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company. GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form sassciations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers. campers and travellers, up to ten

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
